The Ozona Garden Club was host to the annual convention, held in the fellowship hall of the Ozona Methodist Church, a registered attendance of 135 club members from over 15 districts.

The convention opened with a meeting from 8:30 to 9:00 a.m. presided over by Mrs. Max Leach, District Governor of Abilene. Reception and coffee was served from 9:30 after which the convention opened with Mrs. Bailey Post, District Governor of Abilene. Invocation by Mrs. Ernest Green of Del Rio.

Mrs. Morris Bratton welcomed visiting delegates and Mrs. B. Bratton of Eldorado responded. Mrs. Leach then presided at business sessions of the convention. Mrs. Jay R. Huckabee of Del Rio acted as secretary in the absence of Mrs. Clifton Perkins of Del Rio.

Reports from officers and committee chairmen were heard and District Governor was authorized to appoint an Organizational committee, composed of Mrs. R. Huckabee of Snyder, Mrs. Bowdry of Stamford, Mrs. B. Kennedy of Abilene, Mrs. Clinton of Putnam, Mrs. S. Hickman of Albany, Mrs. Horn of Del Rio and Mrs. Pumphrey of Old Glory. The committee's recommendations were adopted.

It was announced by Mrs. Aus-Ewin of Coleman that the convention will be held at Coleman on March 22, 1961, at the National Guard armory. Mrs. Nanley will be the chairman. Mrs. Reese L. Hayes of Olney is the speaker. Mrs. R. E. Pumphrey of San Angelo was appointed to replace Mrs. W. T. Wiles as club chairman.

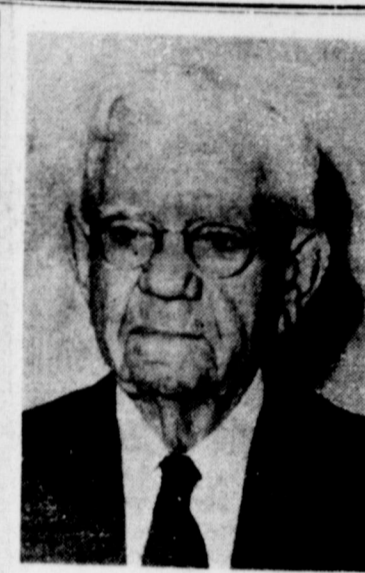
Mr. Kincaid will attend the next meeting of the committee to be held in Washington November 2 to 4.

Rev. J. H. Meredith Is Honored On Preaching 89th Birthday Sermon

Sunday, October 23rd, was "Rev. J. H. Meredith Day" at the Harlandale Methodist Church, San Antonio. The congregation honored this veteran Methodist Pastor as he preached his 89th Birthday Sermon. A history of his life was presented by the Pastor, the Rev. Seshorn M. Kiker. Many friends from his former pastorates were present or sent messages of congratulations or flowers.

The Ozona Methodist Church sent a floral arrangement for use in decorating the Harlandale church in honor of Rev. Meredith who served the Ozona church as its pastor for eight years from 1927 to 1935. Individual members of the church also contributed to a "love offering" to be sent to the beloved former pastor.

The Rev. Meredith was born October 18, 1871 in Decatur County, Indiana. After serving years as a licensed exhorter in the Church he entered the ministry in the Indiana Conference. In 1912 he moved to Texas and was appointed to serve the Church in Bandera. Through the years he has served many churches of the Southwest Texas Conference without interruption except for the 1st World War when he served as Chaplain in the Y. M. C. A. His pastorates have been: Bandera, Aransas Pass, Center Point, Batesville, La Pryor, Spofford, Brackerville, Knippa, Rio Frio, Leakey, Cerrizo Springs, Lometa, Llano, Nixon, Ozona, Uvalde, and Prospect Hill, San Antonio. He also served as Superintendent of the Methodist - Kerrville Assembly. Following retirement he served as a supply pastor to Harper, Comfort, Fashing, Coker, San Antonio, and Chaplain of Stinson Homes Chapel. After a long and honorable career of fifty-five years, Rev. Meredith has retired and lives with his daughter, Mrs. Ruth Meredith Mason at 112 Clutter Avenue, San Antonio, Texas.

Three TDs In Final Quarter Run Up Lopsided Score

Jim Freeman and Tony Parker each scored two touchdowns and Mike Stiles contributed one last Friday night as the Ozona Lions turned a close ball game into a rout in the last quarter whipping Big Lake 37 to 6.

Freeman and Parker each contributed heavily to the Lions' offensive efforts with Parker turning in his best game thus far this season.

The Lions jumped into a quick lead Friday night when they turned the Owls strategy to their own advantage to set the stage for the game's first score.

The Reagan County team tried an on-side kick on the kickoff either with the intent of preventing a long run back or in hope of gaining early possession of the ball but in either case the Lions alertly covered the ball and proceeded to drive fifty-one yards for the game's first score.

The Ozona drive moved along mainly on the heels of short jabs by Parker, Doran and Freeman with Freeman's eleven yard keeper being the longest gainer of the drive.

Freeman plowed over for the score from the four and then shot a pass to Carl Montgomery in the end zone for 2 points to make the score 8 to 0.

The second Lion marker came a bit more suddenly as the Lions, after stalling a threatening Owl rally scored on a 59-yard march with Tony Parker sailing over tackle and cutting out for thirty yards and the score. This time Freeman sent Jim Doran over from the three for the two extra points and the Lions led 16 to 0.

IT MUST BE THE ACCENT

Way back last August, Executive Editor James L. Wick of Human Events — which had stated that there is no essential difference in the political philosophies of Senators Johnson and Kennedy, expressed concern over an editorial in Life Magazine of July 26 "which develops the theme that Senator Johnson is a Conservative and Senator Kennedy a so-called Liberal". He noted the statement attributed to Editor Erwin D. Canham of the Christian Science Monitor that Johnson disagreed with Kennedy at least two-thirds of the time on domestic issues; and further noted that the ACA Index, that monumental analysis of Congressional voting records on Constitutional issues rated Kennedy at 11 percent (out of a possible 100) and Johnson at 10.

And Editor Wick asked American for Constitutional Action, creators and sponsors of the Index who is right.

Now, having had time for some more research and statistical studies, ACA comes back with several pages of charts and tables that make it mathematically clear that while Senator Johnson may look like a Conservative in some lights, and sound like a Conservative in some areas, he is, on the basis of his Senate votes of the past five years, a little to the left of Kennedy and a little to the right of Morse!

During the first session of the

86th Congress, Messrs. Johnson and Kennedy were in agreement on domestic issues 86 percent of the time. Johnson and Morse 81 percent of the time and Johnson and Byrd only 36.53 percent of the time.

Or, looking at it another way, through the years Candidate Kennedy has been in the Senate, 1953 to 1960, Johnson and Byrd have (on all issues, foreign and domestic) disagreed 49 percent of the time; Kennedy and Byrd 51 percent of the time; Johnson and Humphrey disagreed 20 percent of the time Kennedy and Humphrey 23 percent.

We don't know how it could be made any clearer that not only do Johnson and Kennedy espouse the same liberal philosophy but also that they agree substantially with the extreme left of their party and disagree just as conspicuously with the far right of the party.

It would therefore appear that Life, for all the nature study its glamorous pages present to readers, did not (as of July 26th) recognize a political chameleon when it examined one.

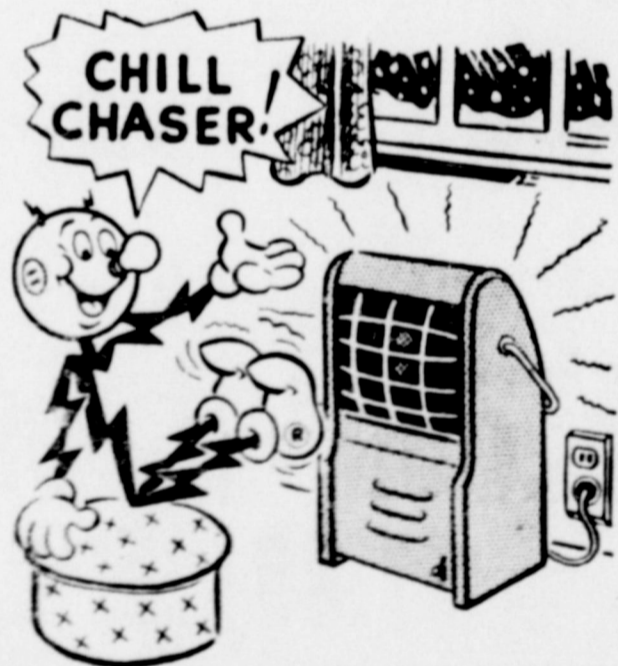

Notes From The County Agent's Office

By Pete W. Jacoby

According to Harlan E. Smith, Extension Plant Pathologist, brown patch on lawns is causing much concern in all sections of Texas. Even though it is much more common in high rainfall areas it begins to occur in the Panhandle during July.

In the Houston area and further southward, it appears during October and remains to some extent throughout the winter and into the early spring. Trace may again be observed in central and northern areas as the weather warms during late winter and early spring.

According to the plant pathologist, first symptoms of the disease appear as brown circular areas from 4 to 48 inches in diameter, even though they may frequently be larger. During latter stages of infection circular patterns may run together and no longer be evident.

Since the fungus is most active on the outer border of these circular patches, these areas may take on a "smoke-ring" appearance. Leaves usually start dying back from the tip and when sufficiently infected may be pulled easily from the stems. After a few weeks the grass tends to start growing back in the center of the brown patches. Rarely does the occurrence of this disease cause loss of stand.

Proper lawn management reduces the chances of a lawn being attacked by this fungus disease. Watering lawns in the late afternoon should be avoided as well as letting thick mats of grass clippings accumulate. Water should not be allowed to stand on the lawn and if necessary one should fill in low areas with soil.

Applying such fungicides as P-CND (Terraclor), Kromad, or Ter-

san before the time for brown spot to appear is the most effective means of control. If the disease is already present, apply the fungicide within 24 hours following a

rain or watering. Where combinations of fertilizers and fungicides are used care should be taken to avoid applying excess control chemicals. Read and follow carefully

the manufacturers recommendations on the container. For additional information contact your county agent for a copy of B-203 "Home Lawns".

Daniel Admits Party Pledge Not Binding On Voter November 8

Austin, Texas — Voting in the Democratic Primary does not obligate anyone "legally or morally to vote for the Democratic presidential nominee in the general election, Governor Price Daniel said today.

The pledge on the primary ballot applies only to nominees selected in that primary for state, district, and local offices, Daniel stated in an interview with a Dallas Morning News correspondent.

Daniel was asked for his views on the matter after a statement quoting him was issued by the State Democratic Executive Committee as follows:

"More than 1,500,000 Texans affiliated themselves with the Democratic party this poll tax year, under provisions of state law. It is the responsibility of all affiliated Democrats to carry their great strength into the general election in support of the party nominees."

Daniel told the News he did not mean to imply that participation in the Democratic Primary obligated a voter to vote for that party's presidential and vice presidential nominees in the general election.

Ozons was now in no mood to be fooled and Tony Parker got an eighty yard drive under way with a forty yard sprint from the Lion twenty to the Owl forty.
