The first section of the Amendment, which hints at the economics involved says: "The Government of the United State shall not engage in any business, professional, commercial, financial or industrial enterprise except as specified in the Constitution." These 25 words, says Mr. Heistand, are worth \$1.5 billion apiece!

Section two protects against abrogation through any "foreign or domestic agreement" and section three, which provides the teeth. lives the Government three year after ratification in which to sell! "properties and facilities" that are







Furthermore, they argued, the imports are only slightly cheaper and frequently of inferior quality.

Attorneys representing the government of Japan, Belgium and West Germany countered that "international trade is a two-way street." 
