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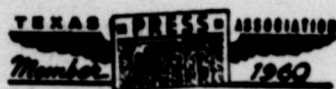

EMANCIPATION AMENDMENT

Not even Presidential election returns — or the World Series — commands all of America's radio listeners at any one time. But it's too bad they weren't all tuned to the Mansion Forum Network the other night when Rep. Edgar W. Heistand of California asked: "How would you like to say goodbye to income tax form 1040 forever? — and proceeded to explain why this is no dream but a possibility!

The proposed 23rd Amendment, now pending in Congress, "would" said Congressman Heistand, "eliminate the words 'income tax' from our pocketbook vocabulary. To put it in blunt — yet delightful — language, the American citizen wouldn't have to pay income taxes any longer."

The first section of the Amendment, which hints at the economics involved says: "The Government of the United States shall not engage in any business, professional, commercial, financial or industrial enterprise except as specified in the Constitution." These 25 words, says Mr. Heistand, are worth \$1.5 billion apiece!

Section two protects against abrogation through any "foreign or domestic agreement" and section three, which provides the teeth, gives the Government three years after ratification in which to sell "properties and facilities" that are in violation of the Amendment.

These add up to 20 percent of the entire industrial capacity of the nation with an investment of \$262 billion — only \$24 billion

less than our colossal national debt — and possession of 40 percent of the land area of the US! Furthermore, these 700 illicit Federal corporations absorb half the total Federal revenue for their support.

Analysis of the effect of the Amendment involves endless calculations, but, in the words of Rep. Heistand, "it boils down to this: We can eliminate individual in-

come taxes, actually increase Federal revenue, and remove the Federal Government from unfair competition with its private taxpaying citizens."

There is further encouragement in the fact that Texas, Wyoming and Nevada have adopted resolutions of approval, and that the National Committee for Economic Freedom which has been leading the crusade has now enlisted the

support of 6,000 citizens organizations in 35 states.

If, as we suggested, all of us had heard Rep. Heistand, we would doubtless all be represented in 50 states. But we could write National Chairman Willis Stone at 6413 Franklin Ave., Los Angeles 28, Calif., and enlist now.

BANNING CENSORSHIP BY TAXATION

Last June the House Ways and Means Committee approved a bill to permit the cost of lobbying to be deducted from taxable income. This measure, if it becomes law, would reverse a Treasury Department ruling holding that deductions of this nature are not a necessary and legitimate business expense, and hence are not allowable.

In the words of a UPI news report, "Under the bill, business men could deduct from gross income the cost of influencing action by Congress or by state or other legislatures or influencing action by the voters on proposals submitted to them. The deductions could be claimed as long as the expenses qualified under the test of existing law as 'ordinary and necessary' to the conduct of business."

It is difficult to see how the Committee could have taken any other action. The Treasury has held that the cost of advertising dealing with legislative proposals or designed to influence the public's attitude toward these proposals "is not deductible as a business expense, even though the legislation may directly affect the taxpayer's business." This means, in certain instances, that an industry may not defend itself against movements which would destroy it, save by paying a heavy tax penalty. The light and power utilities are an outstanding example. Through advertising and in other open and legal ways they have opposed socialized power. This, to them, is

literally a life and death matter. And if advertising designed to save them from extinction isn't a legitimate business expense, what is?

The bill which the Committee approved, finally, is designed to ban censorship by taxation. That kind of censorship is repellant to every American ideal and principle.

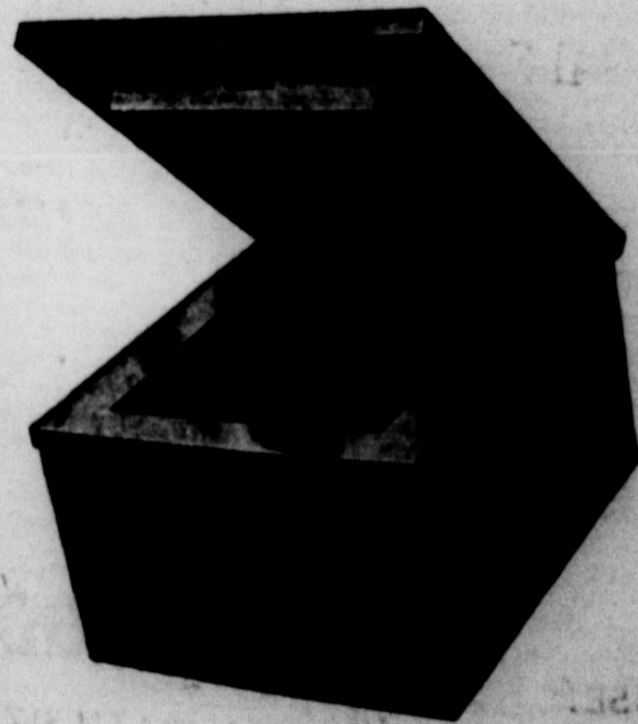

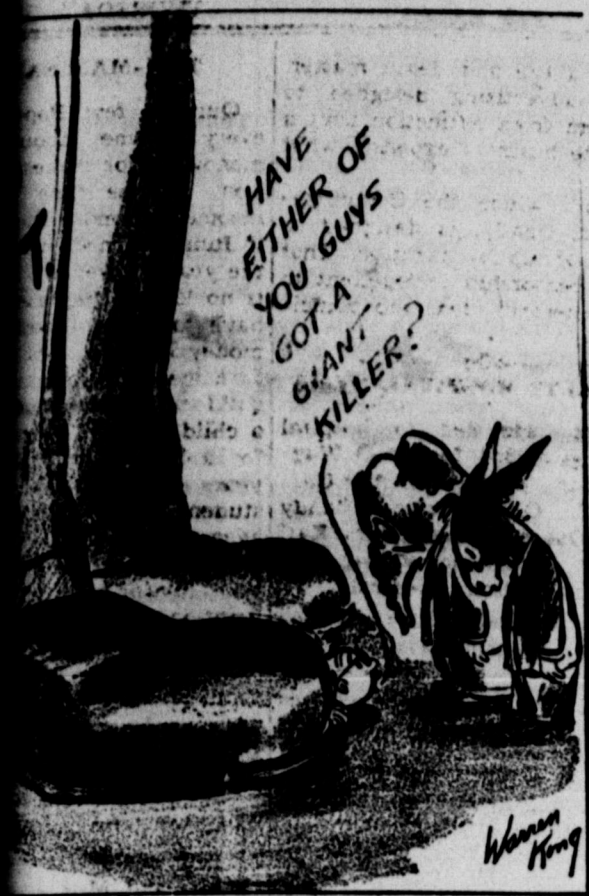

John G. Tower

Senator Barry Goldwater of Ar-
izona told a cheering Houston

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From State Capitol

Austin, Texas — In deciding what kind of materials to use in building Texas roads and bridges, the State Highway Commission found itself plunged headlong into the whirlpool of international relations.

This summer the Commission issued an order that only American-made materials should be used in Texas road and bridge building. Texas industrialists, particularly steel officials, cheered, but representatives of foreign nations lodged a storm of protest at a hearing before the Commission.

As a result, the order has been held up for further study. Decision will come probably in late September.

Representatives of the Texas steel industry called the ban on foreign materials "a forward step for Texas." They said use of imported products brings loss of jobs for Texas workers and loss of taxes from Texas businesses. Furthermore, they argued, the imports are only slightly cheaper and frequently of inferior quality.

Attorneys representing the government of Japan, Belgium and West Germany countered that "international trade is a two-way street." In short, they said Texas cannot expect to continue to profit from selling its products abroad unless it is willing to buy from other countries.

Ballots up to counties — It's up to county election boards to decide the order in which parties will be listed on the general election ballots.

Atty Gen. Will Wilson ruled that counties do not have to list the parties in the same order in which the secretary of state lists them on a sample ballot. Secretary of state sends this out to list the certified nominees for state office.

Republican officials have been urging that county officials draw lots to decide whether Republicans or Democrats shall get the preferred first column on the left.

Tetanus shots urged — State Health Department officials are urging Texans to have tetanus shots and keep their immunity up to date by getting periodic boosters. Lockjaw, which the shots prevent, has not disappeared. Fifty-two persons, 24 of them infants, died of lockjaw in Texas last year.

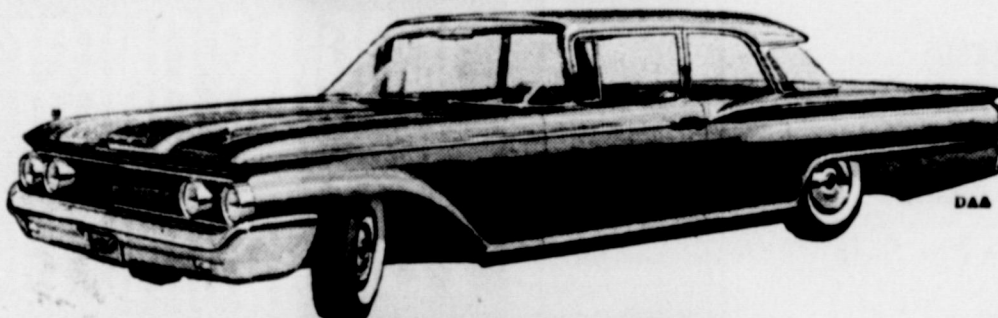
