



So stated Clair M. Roddewig of Chicago president of the Association of Western Railways pefore the annual meeting of the Short Line Railroad Association, in Green Bay, Wis.

Mr. Roddewig's citation of nine areas of major concern to railroad people spell out the reasons why this industry bears more burdens

Failure of government policy to recognize that railroads are essential to the nation's

economy and security.

The inadequacy of railroad earnings and the resultant effect upon their financial con-

Railroad difficulties resulting from excessive, burdensome and outmoded regula-Obstacles encountered by the railroads in

their effort to offer a diversified trans-Difficulties encountered in making com petitive rates, which are necessary if the administrators and legislators

industry is to grow with the expanding

Unfairness of railroad taxation. The need for mergers and consolidations within the industry and prompt action thereon by the government.

The danger to private ownership and opera-tion of the railroad industry resulting from present government policies

Roddewig observed that the public is aware of these problems which hardly belong in a free industrial society. This he credited to an alert and free press which exhibits a rather startling record in keeping the public informed In a 28-month period ending last June 30 there have been 26,819 newspaper editorials published dealing with these nine railroad bur-dens and areas of concern.
