Lions Drop Close Decisions McCamey And Iraan In Succession; Rankin Tourney The Week-End

The Lions dropped two over the past week, losing to McCamey 34-10 and Rankin 34-10. The poorly played contest dropping a well played decision to the strong Lions in Iraan Tuesday.

The Lions still playing without Jim Freeman, their fine ball handler, had hit in the Badgers gym 19 percent of their shots. The Lions got 67 shots at with 47 of them coming from the free throw line but were unable to score. The Lions, meanwhile, were dominated by the Badgers and usually limited the Badgers to one or two shots but were unable to score on their defensive play. The Badgers reversed form Tuesday night, however, as they shot 50 percent from the free throw line and were able to score 47 points. The Lions used their great defense plus some cost-cutting to keep the Lions away from them and stand off a late Lion drive by two points. The Lions, led by Van Miller, shot 19 percent of their shots. The Lions with Van get 10, and Hal 8. The Lions, however, lost 18 to just about all the Iraan scoring. The Lions played so poorly that they were unable to choose between Van Miller who hit 4 of 20 shots for 8 and Hal Long and others, who didn't do better percentage wise, had the Lions hit 3 free throws but in the game hit only 8 of 22. The Lions were one and one. McCamey played a contest and picked up 40 points early in each half. The Lions B team kept its record over the week winning 42 to 40 decision over

McCamey and then toying with Iraan to win 44 to 14. Coach H. O. Hoover continued his policy of playing all of the boys in order to give them game experience, the real purpose of a B team using every man suited cut in both contests. Nine of the Lion B teamers scored against McCamey and the game seemed to be comfortably won until a late McCamey surge and a tight zone defense caused the Lion reserves to have to hold on to win. Pete Montgomery with 9 and Robert Cox with 8 points led the reserve attack.

In Iraan the first string B's went to the showers after the first quarter and Coach Hoover used seventeen payers in easily overpowering the Brave reserves. Eleven of the Lion reserves got into the scoring column with Billy Cornelius, who played only in the first period, leading the scorers with eight.

Billy Semmler with 6 and Scott Mahon with 5 were next among the point makers.

The Lions will travel to Rankin this weekend to take part in the Rankin tourney, facing Crane in the first round Friday.

Permian Basin Scouter Banquet Ticket Sales Under Way In Area

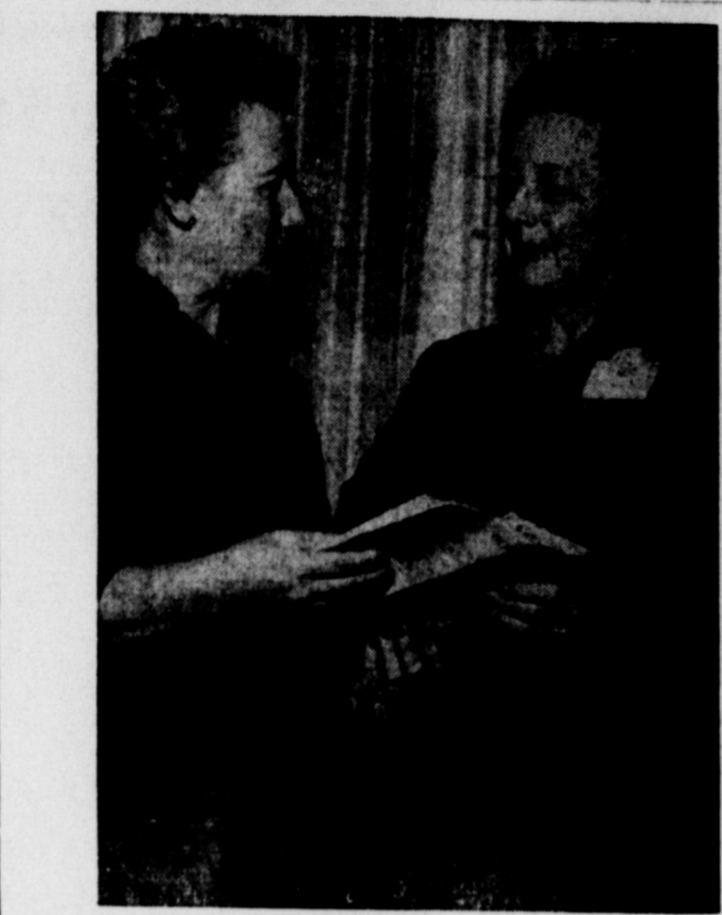

Contract depth is 9,800 feet, sufficient to test the Ellenburger.

Location is 990 feet from the north and west line of 2-0-TCRR. It is also three miles northwest of the Baggett (Strawn gas) field.

The Refoil field has two 3,200-foot sand oil producers and three Strawn gas wells.

Winter's Initial Thrust Triggers .5 Inch Moisture

Slow Falling Moisture, Freeze Accompanies New Cold Front

Winter finally made its presence known in Ozona this week when a norther triggered a slow rain that turned to ice Tuesday night in the course of depositing slightly over .5 of an inch of rain in Ozona.

The wet, cold weather could almost be considered the first disagreeable weather of the year for Ozona since the few light freezes experienced so far this winter have been of the early morning dry variety that faded quickly in the sun.

The half inch of moisture was welcomed in Crockett County where rain has been very light in the past several months.

Predictions of light snow had failed to materialize yet but conditions for snow were favorable.

The appearance of the season's first cold, wet norther on December 6 was in contrast to the much colder one which was accompanied by heavy sleet on November 13 last year.

High way bridges west and northwest of Ozona were sanded Tuesday night as slow rain turned to ice on exposed surfaces and on automobile windshields making driving hazardous both in town and on the highway.

Despite the uncomfortable cold, temperature did not drop too far with the thermometer showing readings in the high twenties and low thirties after dark and above freezing during daylight hours.

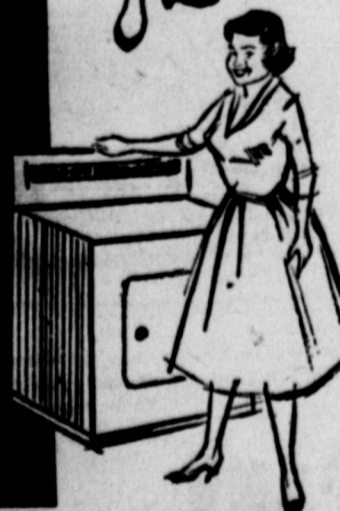

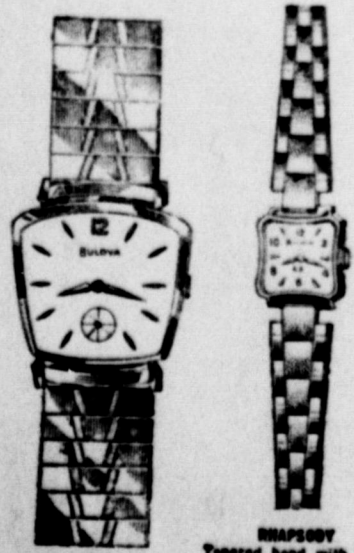


