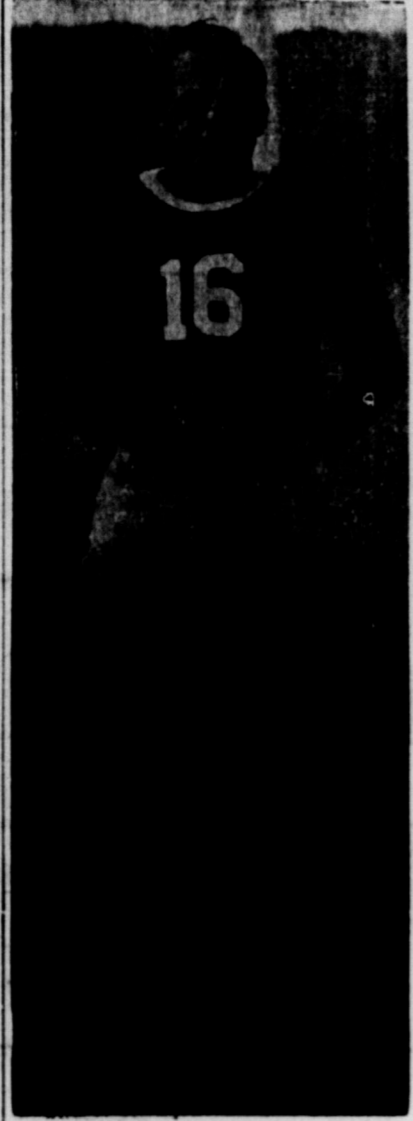

## Lion Cagers Win Consolation Honors In Rankin Tourney; Van Miller Named All-Tournament, Phillip Carnes Winner of Sportsmanship Award

The Ozona Lions bounced back from an opening game defeat to grab consolation honors in the fifth annual Rankin Basketball tourney last weekend and at the same time gained some measure of revenge for two early season losses.

Sharp shooting Lion forward Van Miller was chosen on the all-tourney team and the Lions hustling guard, Phillip Carnes, received the sportsmanship award in the tournaments closing presentations.

Miller hit for a total of 38 points in the Lions three games and did a stellar job of rebounding against the tall Iraan Braves in the Consolation final to win the all-tourney award.

Carnes hit for 26 points and played a good floor game for the Lions in both wins. It was a refreshing thing to have an aggressive but fair player win a sportsmanship award instead of making the award some sort of consolation prize for someone who was not eligible for anything else. Carnes received a number of votes for all-tourney, further indicating that the award was one given in good faith.

The Lions played Crane Friday afternoon in the tourney opener and it was a sad day for the Lions in many ways. Crane

enjoyed its hottest day shooting for the season thus far, hitting a torrid 68% against a poorly executed zone defense that the Lions used through most of the first two quarters.

The Lions, in losing 62 to 41, found little to cheer about except for the hot shooting of Hal Long who prevented a disgrace by hitting for 19 points.

Coch Brooks Dozier dropped his zone Saturday morning and the Lions handed a stubborn McCamey crew a 40 to 26 lacing behind the shooting of Van Miller, who pumped in 17 points, followed by Carl Montgomery, who picked up 10. Five members of the Ozona Lion tri-champion football team were named to the offensive and defensive All-district units by the district Coaches at a meeting held in Sonora last week.

Wayne Albers and Deoney Holden were each named to both units while Tony Parker and Jim Freeman each made the offensive unit as backs, and Carl Montgomery made the defensive backfield unit.

In addition, Mike Stiles and Phillip Carnes were each named on honorable mention. The Lions finished the season with a seven won and three lost mark winding up in a tie with Eldorado and Sonora for the district title, each team with a 3 and 1 lost district mark.

Albers was named to the offensive team as a tackle and the defensive unit as an end, while Holden made the two units in his normal position as offensive guard and defensive linebacker.

Holden and Albers are each seniors as were Parker and Freeman. Carl Montgomery was the only Ozona representative who will return for play next season.

Halfback Tony Parker was the district's leading scorer and ground gainer and is a repeater from last year's squad. Freeman, who was playing his first year as quarterback, was named at a halfback post due to his great running ability.

All of the boys named on the teams are to be the guests of the Ozona Lions Club in January when the All District banquet will be held.

## Crockett Area Lucks Out On Winter Weather

Moderate Cold Brings  
Good Moisture; New  
Front On Way

Clear skies and increasing south winds heralded the approach of what weather men were predicting would be the strongest wave of cold air thus far this season Thursday morning.

The new cold wave which could bring more snow activity into West Texas, comes on the heels of two other "spells" which have thus far produced one and one half inches of rain in Ozona and heavy snowfall over almost all of the West Texas area.

The much needed moisture fell in two different fronts during the past seven days, the first coming in the form of slow rain and drizzle late last week and the second in the form of snow which did not stick Monday and Tuesday.

Despite the heavy snows and cold temperatures over almost all of West Texas, Ozona remained comparatively warm and heavy snow fall Monday hardly hit the ground before melting.

Weather forecasters Wednesday predicted clear skies and warming temperatures in the area until around three this afternoon when the front is scheduled to hit the Crockett County area, bringing much colder temperatures to the area tonight and Friday.

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### The News Reel

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

From The Stockman, Dec. 17, 1931

Ozona's new \$175,000 high school building, just south of the present structure will be ready for occupancy with the resumption of classes after the Christmas holidays, it was announced this week by school authorities. Anderson Bros. Construction Co. of El Paso was the contractor on the building. Formal dedication of the new building will take place January 4, John L. Bishop, superintendent, announced.

A fund estimated at approximately two million dollars was left by Mrs. Margaret A. Shannon widow of the late J. M. Shannon, for the construction and maintenance of a Shannon West Texas Memorial Hospital at San Angelo, under terms of her will filed for probate in county court at San Angelo Wednesday. Mrs. Shannon died at 11:40 Sunday night. Mr. Shannon died in May, 1928.

A spirit of economy is to guide the Christmas spirit in Ozona grade school classes. A "depression" limit was placed on cost of gifts which pupils could give fellow students in the class Christmas gift giving. By faculty decision, pupils in the first four grades are restricted to gifts costing not more than 5 cents and in the high grades not more than 15 cents. Only one gift can be given in the class exercises and no pupil will be permitted to give a gift to teacher, in the classroom at least.

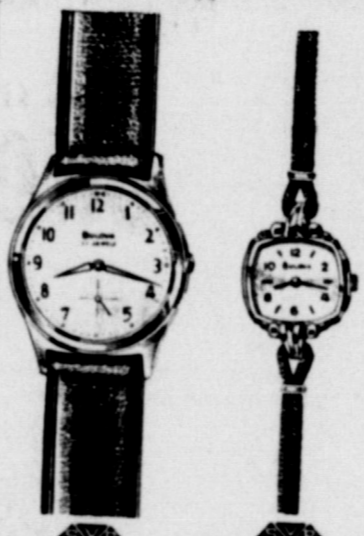

Have you ever seen anyone use the "yawn and stretch" method? This person, fortunately, sits in a row directly in front of the teacher, so this enables him to open

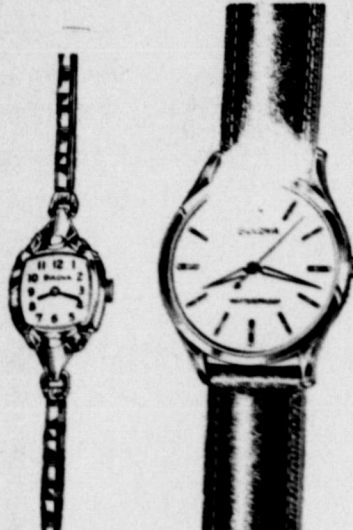

## Notes From The County Agent's Office

By Pete W. Jacoby

Summary of the experiments carried on with flushing ewes prior to breeding by the Sonora Experiment Station during the 1959-60 breeding season show an average of 7.5 percent more lambs by flushing. Eleven cooperating ranchmen in five separate counties supplied 2,410 ewes, of which 1,018 were flushed-fed and 1,392 controls were not flushed-fed.

In four of the seven trials, the increase in lamb crop for the flushed ewes ranged from 13.9 to 26.7 percent, but in three of the trials, the lamb crop was decreased from 4.1 to 9.3 percent. The average lamb crop for the flushed ewes was 94.94 percent and for these not flushed 87.43 percent. The respective percentages for the 1958-59 flushing trial were 105.87 and 96.70.

Condition scores were higher for five of the seven groups of flushed and non-flushed ewes, equal for one group and higher for the controls in one group.

The flushed ewes had an average increase in staple length from

breeding to marketing of 1.82 inches, as compared with 1.74 inches for the controls. Control ewes had the advantage in only one of the seven comparisons.

Flush-fed ewes were fed an average of 3/4 pound of cottonseed meal per head per day. A 6 to 7 percent increase in the lamb crop was required to offset feed costs for flushing.

Expansion of sheep breeding research to speed development of animals with improved ability to produce wool and meat that will satisfy consumer needs was advocated by members of the USDA's Sheep and Wool Research and Marketing Advisory Committee at their annual meeting, held Nov. 2-4, in Washington, D. C.

Breeds and strains of sheep which are resistant to hot, humid weather, parasitism and special diseases are needed to enable the sheep industry to expand into areas of abundant year-around pastures, the committee noted.

In the area of marketing research, the most important need is for studies to determine consumer preferences for lamb quality, especially as they apply to maturity, degree of finish and meat color, the committee said.

Expanded research on chemical

treatment of wool was recommended as the most important need in the field of utilization study. The committee also urged publication of complete annual statistics on wool stocks in the United States.

The committee, of which T. A. Kincaid, Jr., of Ozona, Texas, is a member, also recommended studies to increase mohair production, economic studies of price, supply and consumption, and studies to increase the use of wool in blended fabrics.

Detailed recommendations for sheep and wool research will be formally submitted to the USDA within the next few weeks. Copies of this report will be available from the committee's executive secretary, Max Hinds, Office of the Administrator, Agricultural Research Service, Washington, D. C.

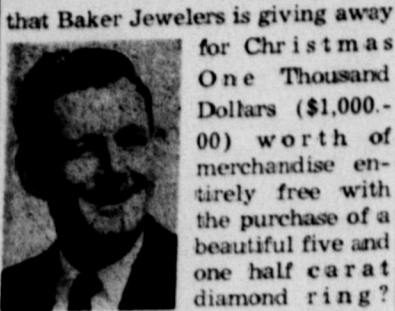
