The Baggett brothers, Mark and Penn, perennial winners at all major shows in the fat lamb division, placed five lambs and made the sale with four lambs. Penn had a 3rd, 5th and 19th; and Mark a 17th and 19th place. Although Mark and Penn didn't get to the top, a Baggett bred finewool lamb fed out by Richard Powell of Fort Stockton did win the championship.

Duwayn Vinson, Jr., placed two lambs in the show, 26th and 28th. Also showing fat lambs were Hughie Coates, Eugene Vinson and Buddy Couch.

Pam Jones showed 6th and 10th place two-tooth Rambouillet rams, 12th place ewe lamb, 4th and 5th place two-tooth ewes and 4th and 5th in the Pen of Three Rambouillet classes.

8th Annual Ozona Volleyball Meet Friday, Saturday

14 Teams Entered For High and Junior Hi Competition

The eighth annual Ozona High School Invitational volleyball tournament will begin in the Ozona High School gym Friday afternoon with eight teams competing for the title now being defended by host Ozona.

Ozona's coach, Miss Geneva Knox, revealed that a recent ruling by the Texas Interscholastic League limiting volleyball games to two a day has resulted in the first round of play being scheduled for Friday in contrast to the one day tourney which has been the case in the past.

Big Lake looms as the most likely team to unseat the Ozona girls even though in two meetings so far this season Ozona has managed to edge the Reagan County crew on both occasions.

The first game Friday afternoon will pit London against San Angelo at 5 p. m. at 6:00 p. m. Barnhart will engage Sonora, at 7:00 p. m. Big Lake will play Ozona B and in the final game at 8:00 p. m. Ozona will play Iraan.

Second round play will begin at 9:30 Saturday morning when the loser in the Big Lake vs Ozona B takes on the loser of the Sonora Barnhart game.

The Jr. High section of the tourney will all be played Saturday with six teams competing for the title now held by Ft. Stockton. The Ft. Stockton crew which has been a perennial champion in the Junior tourney will be heavily favored to repeat as champions.

The first game in the junior tournament will be in the girls gym at 9 a. m. Saturday and will pit Big Lake vs Sonora with Iraan taking on London at 10 a. m.

All finals are scheduled for the Davidson Gym Saturday night.

Bandera Vaulter Sets Class A State Record In Soaring

A surprising band of Sonora Broncos pulled points out of 12 events last Saturday to run away with the ninth annual running of the Ozona Invitational track meet.

Five records were toppled in the meet which was held under possibly the best weather conditions seen at this meet in the past six years.

Roger Poe of Bandera was high point man of the day with 25 and 3-5 points garnered on his first place in the pole vault, a win in the high hurdles and points earned in two relay events.

Poe's mark in the pole vault shattered the meet record by over a foot as he soared to 12' 6½" to beat the old mark of 11' 6". The mark is the third highest posted in the state this year in any class and is better than the state record for class A vaulters. A short pole and the fact that the Ozona standards could not be raised any higher halted Poe's soaring for the day.

Sonora, in winning the meet, posted first places in only the mile run and the discus but that was enough as the Broncos took seconds, thirds and fourths in the field events and the long distance runs.

Junction finished second with 83 points and Ozona third with 72 and 3-10 points, Sanderson with 63 was fourth, followed by Insm, Bandera, Eldorado, Mason, Eden, Big Lake, Robert Lee, Melvin, Garden City and others who did not post points.

REVEALS RECIPE**

We heard about (and finally fast-
ed) some of Mr. Taylor's famous
Louisiana cooking and prevailed
upon him to reveal his secret re-
cipes. It took some high-powered
persuasion, but he finally gave in
and modestly submitted the ingre-
dients and the technique.

Creole

Any kind of meat, poultry or
fish
1/4 cup cooking or vegetable oil
Boiling water
1/2 cup flour
1 chopped onion
1 chopped bell pepper
8 or 10 garlic buds

Celery if desired
1/2 teaspoon thyme
1/2 teaspoon sweet basil
1/2 teaspoon oregano
1 bay leaf
2 to 4 cans tomato sauce
Salt and pepper to taste.

The basis for the most Louisiana
cooking is the "Roux" (pronounced
Roo). Combine cooking oil and
flour in the pot and stir constantly
until the mixture is about the col-
or of smoking tobacco. Dump in
meat and stir until the roux has
adhered to it. Then pour in en-
ough boiling water to cover. You
are then under way! Add spices,
onion, garlic, bell pepper, celery,
and tomato sauce. Cook until the

meat is tender and serve over
rice.

Gumbo

For gumbo, do the same as for
Creole but substitute okra for to-
mato sauce about twenty minutes
before the meat is done.

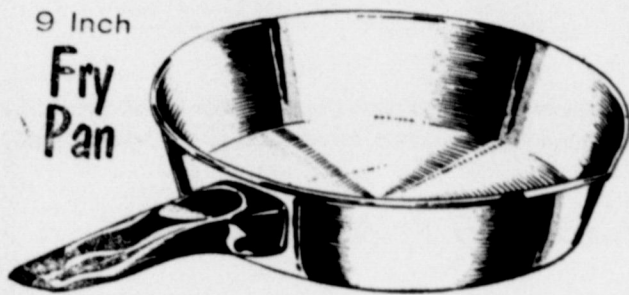

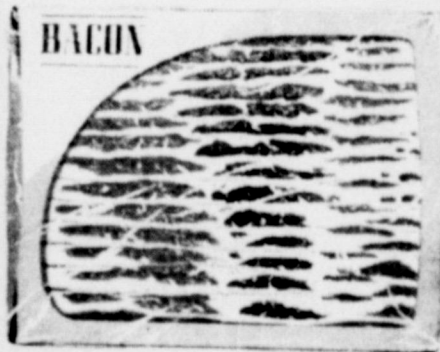

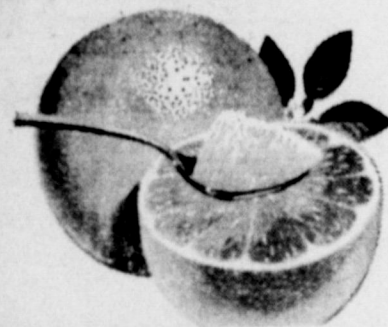
