Flush Producer Added In Ingham W. Crockett Field

Cosden Stakes Site For Outpost; Gulf Spots Field Test

Crockett County has gained a
prolific gas producer and locations
for outposts to two fields.

The Ingham (Devonian) field
gained a prolific producer with
completion of Crockett Oil Co.,
San Antonio, No. 1 Scott, 25 miles
southwest of Ozona.

It was finalized for a calculated,
absolute open flow of 43 million
cubic feet of gas per day, with
gas-liquid ratio of 167,000-1. Grav-
ity of the liquid was 63 degrees.
Production was through perfora-
tions between 7,084-094 feet.

Location is 660 feet from the
north and west lines of 2-FFF-
T&CCR.

Cosden Petroleum Corp., of Big
Spring, will drill the No. 2 Roy
Miller as a 2½-mile northeast out-
post to Strawn gas production in
the Refoil multipay field, eight
miles southwest of Ozona.

Location is 990 feet from the
north and 660 feet from the west
lines of 2-0-TCRR. Contract depth
is 9,800 feet.

It is 330 feet west of the firm's
No. 1 Miller, which was plugged
back from 9,000 feet of 3,600 feet
for tests of the Wichita-Albany,
after operator was unable to re-
cover junk in the hole and attempt
completion in the Strawn.

Gulf Oil Corp. will drill the No.
1-IV State as a ¾-mile east-
northeast side of the Farmer (San
Andres) field 13 miles southeast
of Big Lake.

It was proposed to drill as a
stratigraphic test and now pro-
posed to complete from the field
pay.

Location is 1,650 feet from the
south and 330 feet from the east
lines of 20-47-University. Contract
depth is 2,504 feet; ground eleva-
tion, 2,628 feet.

Eldorado Girls Cop Bi-District Title In Close Contest Here

The Eldorado girls, champions
of district 8A rallied in the final
period Monday night to edge San-
derston 31 to 30 in a bi-district
game played in Ozona.

Kathy Sauer pulled the game out
of the fire for the winners by
sinking the last five Eldorado
points which pulled Eldorado into
the lead, tied the score at 30 all,
and then put them ahead to stay
31 to 30.

Vera Lux of Eldorado and Kath-
y Robbins of Sanderson each
hit thirteen points to lead the two
teams in scoring, even though odd-
ly enough, neither was able to
make any contributions to their
teams in the decisive late stages of
the game.

Eldorado jumped into a first
period lead, and led 7 to 4 at the
quarter. Both teams scored 10
points in the second frame and
the score at the half was 17 to 14.
Sanderson began to make its bid
mid-way of the second period but
it was late in the third period be-
fore they were able to capture the
lead 23 to 22 on Lupe Garza's key-
up shot.

Eldorado, apparently suffering a
bad case of stage fright, became
rather frantic and the effect finally
spread over to the Sanderson crew
resulting in a hectic final period
that saw the lead change hands at
every score with Misses Sauer and
Garza doing almost all of the scor-
ing.

Each team hit eleven field goals
and the margin came at the free
throw line where Eldorado had a
9 to 8 margin. The winning free
shot came with one minute and
twenty-two seconds to go, and af-
ter that each team had chances
from the free throw line, to either
sew up the game or pull it out of
the fire, but none were able to con-
vert the chances into points and
the score remained to the final
buzzer.

Production Indicated In Davidson Outpost

Odesa Natural Gasoline Co. No.
1 Davidson, in 13-F-GC&SF, 1½
miles north-northwest of the one-
well Joe "T" (Strawn) gas field
of Crockett County, 12 miles south-
east of Ozona, flowed gas at the
daily rate of 154,000 cubic feet
from the Strawn.

Flow was through a ¼-inch
choke and open hole between
8,945-90 feet. Tubing pressure was
550 pounds. Testing continued.

Three Candidates File For Places On School Board

Two Of Three Incum- ber Members Seek Re-Election

When the deadline for filing
passed yesterday, three candidates
had filed for places on the ballot
for the election of as many mem-
bers of the district school board
in the 1961 election scheduled for
Saturday, April 1.

Two of the candidates are in-
cumbent members of the board
whose terms are expiring and who
have consented to again seek elec-
tion to the posts. They are Bill
Carson, president of the board,
and Glenn Sutton, member. Joe
Williams, third member of the
board whose term is expiring, de-
clined to offer for re-election.

For the third vacancy on the
board, Taylor Deaton, local busi-
ness man, will be a candidate.
He filed for a place on the ballot
on the final day of the period.

In addition to the district school
board members to be elected on
April 1, the county school board
will come in for election of two
members. This more or less in-
active board is the custodian of
school property and like the dis-
trict board has staggered terms for
its members. To be elected this
year to another term are Wayne
W. West, member at large, and
Hillery Phillips, Precinct 1 trustee.

In the April 1 election, there
will be only one voting place in
Ozona and in three or four vot-
ing places in the county where
voters request an election. The one
Ozona box will be at the court-
house.

Track Performers Need More Time To Reach Condition

Garner One First In Stockton Meet; Home Meet Next Week

Coach Chick Womack's Ozona
track team encountered injury,
stiff competition and too little time
to get ready last Saturday as they
opened their track season at the
Comanche Relays in Fort Stockton.

Some of the outstanding track
powers in the state took part in
the big meet which saw class B,
A, and 2A compete together in one
division and 3A and 4A fight it
out in another division.

Ozona managed one first place
when Phillip Carnes, just one part
of a week out of basketball, cap-
tured the high hurdles title.

Aside from that triumph, the
Lions were hampered by too little
time to get ready and a pulled
muscle in the 440 relay and were
unable to capture only a few places
in the various events.

Carl Montgomery, also just out,
placed in the high jump. The 440
relay even though hamstrung by a
pulled muscle on the first lap fin-
ished fourth. Freddy Dobbs, mak-
ing his first start as a high school
sprinter, suffered the leg injury
which may sideline him for two
to four weeks.

The Lions will not be in action
this week as they await the Ozona
Invitational meet which is sched-
uled to be held next week.

Ozona Coaches will in the mean-
time try to whip their many fine
candidates into to shape for the
Ozona attraction. The Lions ap-
pear to have strength in the hur-
dles, the sprints, and the relays
this season with some good per-
formances scattered in several of
the field events.

A number of the candidates out
this season are new men in track
and it may be some time before
they reach anything like their best
times or distances.

Coaches Womack and Cleere do
have a number of proven perfor-
mers back including Jim Doran
who placed in the 100 yard dash

Bud Kincaid, 51, Laid To Rest In Services Tuesday

Ozona Native Lifetime Rancher Died Mon- day Morning

Funeral services were held at
3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon from
the Ozona Methodist Church for
Ewell Drennan (Bud) Kincaid, 51,
a native of Ozona, lifetime Crock-
ett county rancher and member
of a prominent ranching family
here, who died at 1:10 a. m. Mon-
day in a San Angelo hospital where
he had been ill for twelve days.

Services were conducted by the
Rev. Morris Bratton, pastor, with
burial following in Cedar Hill
Cemetery under direction of the
Cody Funeral Home. Pallbearers
were Caudé Russell, Martin Har-
vick, Jim Ad Harvick, Beecher
Montgomery, Vic Montgomery,
Tom Ed Montgomery and Wayne
E. West, all of Ozona, and E. V.
(Buddy) Hall of San Angelo.

Mr. Kincaid was born in Ozona
September 11, 1909, the son of the
late Mr. and Mrs. T. A. Kincaid,
Sr. His father was one of the out-
standing leaders a o n g pioneer
ranchers having served eleven
years as president of the Texas
Sheep & Goat Raisers Assn. Mrs.
Kincaid, the former Ada R. Dren-
nan, was the first white girl born
in San Angelo.

Mr. Kincaid served with the 10th
Armored Division during World
War II. He ranched about 25 miles
south of Ozona.

Survivors include the widow;
one stepson, Kelly Walker, a stu-
dent at Kemper Military School in
Missouri; six sisters, Mrs. R. P.
Lynn of San Angelo, Mrs. Lee
Childress, Mrs. V. I. Pierce, Mrs.
S. M. Harvick, Mrs. L. M. Morris-
son, and Mrs. W. E. Friend, Jr.,
all of Ozona; two brothers, T. A.
Kincaid, Jr., of Ozona and Bert
Kincaid, Sr., of Rankin, and a
number of nieces and nephews.

DON'T FORGET THE MORAL

The actions of the manufacturers of heavy electrical equipment, and various officials of the companies, who pleaded either guilty or nolo contendere (no defense) to charges of price fixing and bid rigging, came as a shock to the nation. Among the guilty are executives of the largest companies of their kind on earth.

The federal judge, who handed down pay sentences and fines, said, "what really is at stake here is a vast section of our economic system that we are offering to uncommitted sections of the world as an alternative to planned economies. The defendants, he added, "flagrantly mocked the image of that economic system of free enterprise."

Regrettable as this case is, however, it will have its healthy aspect. The government was on the side of the people, and once it had gathered the needed evidence, it acted with all energy to safeguard the people and punish the malefactors. Suppose, on the other hand,

the government had owned these enterprises as it does under socialism and communism, and irregularities had occurred? The people would have been both ignorant of the facts and impotent to act because government does not indict itself. The moral is this: The faults in free, private enterprise can be and are corrected. The faults in all-powerful, dictatorial government activities are beyond the people's reach.

THEY SAID "NO!"

It is encouraging, and perhaps significant, that a majority of the new Congress has endorsed a statement opposing a UN seat for Red China or US recognition of this Oriental branch of Murder, Inc. The Statement, circulated by the Committee of One Million (Against the admission of Communist China to the UN) had the support of 54 Senators and 285 Congressmen in "upholding international morality and keeping faith with the thousands of American youths who gave their lives fighting Communist aggression in Korea."

Those not voting may have been out of town, suffering from a cold or hiding under a bed. It seems hardly possible that man who could get himself elected to national office would be supporting the revolting drive that such recognition is "inevitable" and accepting the insane assumption that by virtue of enslaving 400 millions this bloody regime had achieved some sort of immortality.

It is well to have this vote before Appeaser Macmillan arrives in Washington to work on our leaders.

Notes From The County Agent's Office

In tests conducted by the Texas Experiment Station, range ewes flush-fed before and during breeding averaged 7.5 percent more lambs than those not flush-fed. Of seven groups tested, flush-fed ewes showed an advantage in increase of staple length in six groups and higher condition scores in five.

Single tests were conducted in Tom Green, Pecos and McCulloch counties and two tests were conducted in both Kerr and Glasscock counties. At each location, approximately 3/4 pound of cottonseed meal or pellets was fed per ewe per day, beginning 21 days before the start of breeding and continuing for 14 days into the breeding season. The ewes fed were selected at random and were maintained separately at least through breeding and lambing. In no case were the flushed or control groups smaller than 100 ewes.

Response of ewes to feeding varied considerably in lamb crop percentages. Extremes ranged from 9.3 percent fewer lambs among the flushed ewes to 26.7 percent more. Considering all of the tests, the average crop for the flushed ewes was 94.94 percent as compared to 87.43 percent for the non-flushed ewes. The cost of flushing could be offset by weaning approximately six additional lambs per 100 ewes.

Ponds, reservoirs and lakes furnish necessary water supply for many phases of agriculture and industry in Texas, and demands

for this surface-stored water are increasing constantly. High evaporation losses, however, often eliminate farm reservoirs and stock ponds as useful and economic carry-over structures.

In an attempt to solve the problem of evaporation losses, researchers have increased studies on the use of monomolecular films. Laboratory information on the value and effectiveness of these chemicals has been established, but only limited field tests have been made. To help fill this information gap, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station conducted a series of field tests in Throckmorton county.

For these tests a fairly large earthen dam was constructed on a small watershed, and twin ponds were constructed just below the dam. Dikes and diversions around the ponds reduced runoff intake, and a sheet of polyethylene on the floors and sides prevented seepage. Water was measured into each of the ponds. One of the ponds was treated with the anti-evaporant and the other was used as a check.

Hexadecanol, a fatty alcohol produced from animal, vegetable and marine oils, was used to provide the monomolecular film. For one test this material was supplied as a solid, but for the other test it was applied as a liquid. No de-

crease in evaporation resulted from the application of the solid material, but a reduction of almost 25 percent occurred when the material was applied as a liquid.

Liquid application has its drawbacks, however. If water should get into the application apparatus, or if the temperature drops too low, the liquid hexadecanol will crystallize. Future tests will be made in an attempt to improve ap-

plication methods and obtain more efficient distribution of the material.
