



nO a three-hour test between 5.208-30 feet, gas surfaced in 10 minutes, rated at 70,000 cubic feet daily. Recovery was 680 feet of mud-cut oil, 360 fet of free 42 gravity oil and 10 feet of water. Flowing pressure was 139-878 pounds: 45-minute shut-in pressure, 2,498-2.045 pounds.

On a subsequent three-hour test between 5.230-260 feet, gas surfaced in 12 minutes, rated at 64,-000 cubic feet daily. Recovery was 540 feet of slightly mud-cut and highly gas-cut oil, 360 feet of free oil and 90 feet of water.

Flowing pressure was 112-312 pounds: 45-minute shut-in pressure, 2,485-2,080 pounds.
