Frankie Jones, Ozonans 23 Years, Laid To Rest

Heart Attack Fatal To Business Man Saturday Night

Funeral services were held at 10 o'clock Monday morning from the Methodist Church for W. Frankie Jones, 56, Ozona resident 23 years, who died at 7:30 p. m. Saturday following a heart attack. Mr. Jones was dead on arrival at the hospital after having suffered the attack at his place of business, the Continental Oil Co. and Firestone store here. Services were conducted by the Rev. Morris Bratton, pastor. Burial followed in Cedar Hill Cemetery, under the direction of Co-Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Black, Charles E. Davidson, Stephen Perner, Vic Montgomery, Joe Tom Davidson, Tom Myers, J. B. Parker and A. O. Jones.

Mr. Jones was born in Durant, Okla., July 21, 1904, and moved to San Angelo with his parents, and Mrs. N. M. Jones, early in the San Angelo settlement. He attended San Angelo schools and was employed by Findlater Hardware Co. for a number of years. He moved to Ozona in 1938 to work for Joe Oberkamp in the hardware and plumbing business. After he went into the plumbing and butane business on his own for the past several years had operated the filling station and Firestone store in downtown Ozona. An enthusiastic baseball fan, Mr. Jones had played amateur ball in San Angelo in his youth and was a baseball diamond wearing a mask and protector gear of the umpire behind the plate. Survivors include his wife, the former Rowena Doran; a son, Joe Jones of Ozona; his mother, 1504 Kenwood Drive in San Angelo; three brothers, Dr. E. B. Jones of Big Lake, T. P. Jones, highway patrolman in San Angelo and Marvin Jones of Japan; a sister, Mrs. L. J. Juhl of Abilene, and one granddaughter.

Speed Up Plans For 4th Annual Ozona Jr. Rodeo

Mid-Summer Event To Coincide With Homecoming Date

Preparation for the fourth annual Ozona Lions Club Junior Rodeo and Ozona Homecoming were put into full operation last week when Lion President Woody Mason assigned each club member to work detail.

The show, which is scheduled to run three days, July 13, 14, and 15, this year also will embrace the fourth Ozona Homecoming, even though this portion of the activity has not been previously connected with the rodeo.

Rodeo chairmen Oscar Kost and Vic Montgomery have been at work on the July show ever since last year's program closed, but many details remain to be worked out and must be completed in the next few weeks.

A committee to sell advertising for the rodeo program is now at work in Ozona under the direction of Bill Akers. It is hoped that with the cooperation of Ozona merchants this work can be completed and in the hands of the printers before July 1.

The three days of activity will begin Thursday July 13th with homecoming registration and activities at the high school. A big rodeo and homecoming parade will be staged Thursday afternoon with the first performance of the rodeo that night along with a dance following the show.

A second dance will be held following the performance Friday night and the crowning of the new Rodeo Queen will occur before the final show Saturday, July 15th.

This year's rodeo will be AJRA approved and will include competition in 3 classes for both boys and girls. Contests in pole bending and barrel racing will be held for girls in all three classes, while boys 12 years old and under will have barrel racing and pole bending. Boys from 13 through 15 will have ribbon roping, pole bending and bull riding, and boys 15 through 19 will have steer wrestling, calf tie down and bull riding. Girls may enter boys roping events in the same age groups.

Cody Funeral Home of Ozona was in charge of arrangements.

At Iraan he served as a member of the board of the Iraan Methodist Church for 20 years. He was a member of the Ozona Methodist Church.

MAYBE THEY WANTED A REPUBLICAN SENATOR

It has been amusing to read the "explanations" and "diagnoses" of the recent victory of Republican John G. Tower over Democrat William A. Blakley for the Senate seat vacated by Lyndon Johnson when he accepted the New Frontier vice president's seat.

Democrat big wigs in the state and the Democrat-faithful press have offered all sorts of explanations of the phenomenon by which the first Republican in history was elected by the people of Texas to the United States Senate.

The Republicans had the support of the liberals; the liberals went fishing and didn't vote; the couple of million voters who stayed away from the polls were all Democrats; the Republicans spent more money; the Democrats were too confident; the Democrats ran

scared and on end on.

But it seems to us the simple, unvarnished truth has not yet been admitted — that the people of Texas were darned well tired of taking dictation from a lot of sneaking politicians who are willing to "go-along" with the radical, socialist, free-spending political dynasty which now seeks to establish itself in Washington and voted for the man whose political philosophy more nearly coincides with their own.

But more important, we think, is that it revealed a growing distrust of the Democratic party as such. Texans have seen the trail of broken promises by leading Democratic big wigs, both in and out of this state. They have seen the people's interests and wishes disregarded or thwarted by selfish political machinations of party leaders. Just possibly they remembered that the very election in which they were voting and which was costing them as taxpayers thousands of dollars which their state treasury does not have was simply because one Democratic party bigwig was afraid to trust his political fortunes to the people in one election and by political machinations had the state laws amended so that he could run for two offices at once.

Just possibly, although the Democratic-blessed candidate was billed as a conservative, the voters saw a danger that party discipline would prevail and he who wore the name would ultimately "go along" as so many others have done, and they wanted somebody they could depend on to oppose the Harvard administration in Washington.

And another just possibly — the people of Texas may at last be waking up to the fact that the present Democratic party is a far cry from that to which their fathers and grandfathers adhered and that the nearest thing today to the conservative thinking that once was the Democratic party is presently the Republican party. And, too, the brass-collar South is beginning to realize what it has cost them through the years to wear that collar.

BIG FUTURE IN IT!

Now that submission to Communists; blackmail has become semi-unofficial national policy, far-sighted Americans are tooling up to make a big-time operation of it!

William F. Buckley, Jr., editor of National Review, Henry Hazlitt, author and columnist and Marvin Liebman, New York public relations executive, have announced formation of Ransom, Inc., which plans a permanent, revolving fund of half a billion dollars (\$500 million, you know), for the swift accommodation of future Communist blackmail demands. They are applying, they said, to the Internal Revenue Service for immediate tax exemption and are confident of President Kennedy's full cooperation.

The founders of Ransom, Inc., expressed amazement at the prompt and enthusiastic response of President Kennedy and his 'Citizens' Committee' (Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, Dr. Milton Eisenhower and Mr. Walter Reuther) to Prime Minister Fidel Castro's generous blackmail offer to exchange prisoners for tractors. But they recognize the need for Ransom, Inc. as a continuing operation that will solicit funds from the public day and night, year in and year out, piling up and holding the cash from one Communist blackmail offer to the next.

The vision of Messrs. Buckley, Hazlitt and Liebman practically outdoes the New Frontier as their statement concludes: "The rulers of the Kremlin and Peiping will surely take a page from Premier Castro's book and offer to ransom some of their prisoners at appropriate prices; we suggest two tanks for 20 Hungarian Freedom Fighters; 10 anti-aircraft units for 100 Chinese intellectuals now in slave labor camps; 10 jets bombers for 150 Americans GI's captured during the Korean War and still unaccounted for by the Communists; etc.

"Accordingly, we have organized Ransom, Inc. as a dynamic response to an old problem, which will bring American know-how and efficiency to the field of international blackmail."

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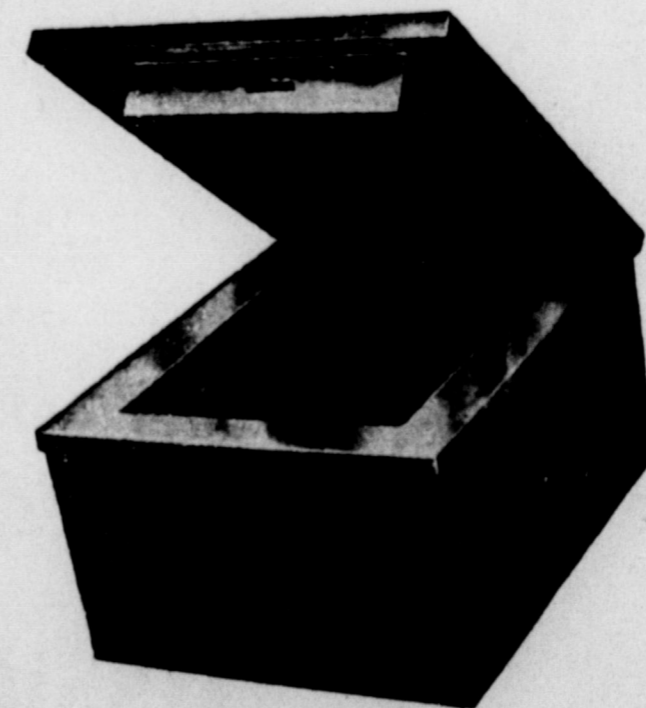

Austin, Texas — From now until July 10 will be a period of testing how representative democracy works in Texas.

Legislature is to re-convene July 10 to make a fresh stab at writing a tax bill to raise some \$350,000,000 for the next two years. Gov. Price Daniel has urged Texans to give the legislators and him their views on how the matter should be handled.

Governor Daniel is strongly opposed to the adoption of any sales tax plan designed to raise the major portion of this needed revenue. He used his influence in the regular session to block a move in this direction.

"But," said the governor, "if this is really what a majority of the people want, I don't see how I can go on fighting it."

He believes, however, that a very limited sales tax, which he terms "selective excise taxes," on only more expensive items, with the balance to be raised from gas pipeline taxes and increased interstate corporation franchise taxes, would be more fair and more acceptable to most Texans.

Only bill which came close to passing the Legislature was one in which the main money-raising feature was a retail sales tax on items costing 25 cents and more, with food, medicine and farm necessities exempted. It also levied increased gas and corporation franchise taxes. Speaker James Turman cast the crucial vote that prevented the bill's being sent to the governor.

Actually, the difference between the governor and those voting for the sales tax "package" is mostly one of degree. Governor Daniel grants the need for some sale (or excise) taxes, but feels that they should be strongly limited. A majority of the Legislature cast votes indicating they felt Texas has reached the point where only a broad-based "growth" tax, such as the sales tax, can raise enough money to meet the state's increasing needs.

Now it is the people's turn to

say what they think. If enough speak up, the legislature will have little difficulty in deciding what to do when it reconvenes July 10.

At that late hour, getting broad agreement in the Legislature will be more important than passing a bill that suits the governor. Bills passed by only a simple majority cannot become effective until 90 days after the session ends, but bills passed by a two-thirds majority of both houses can take effect immediately. That late in the

summer, the legislature will need to get a two-thirds vote for immediate effect so there will be money and authorization to keep the state going after the new fiscal year begins September 1.

And a two-thirds majority is also sufficient to override a governor's veto.

14 Amendments Proposed—Texas voters can get ready for a bumper crop of 14 proposed constitutional amendments to be on the

November ballot in 1962.

Some of the amendments are of major importance; some are only local in effect and application. Among them are proposals to:

1. Increase maximum possible yearly payments to the permanently disabled from \$1,500,000 to \$2,500,000.

2. Allow the state water development board to purchase water storage space in reservoirs constructed by other units of govern-

ment, such as the federal government.

3. Permit the Veterans Land Board to sell forfeited land to non-veteran buyers to liquidate land the state is "stuck with."

4. Authorize the Legislature to provide for "trial de novo" (trial anew) in appeals from decisions of state agencies.

5. Allow the Legislature to name successors to officials knocked out by a major catastrophe such as enemy attack.

6. Raise the present \$42,000,000 year ceiling on public works payments to \$42,000,000.

7. Allow the Legislature to set up hospital districts without special constitutional amendments each one.

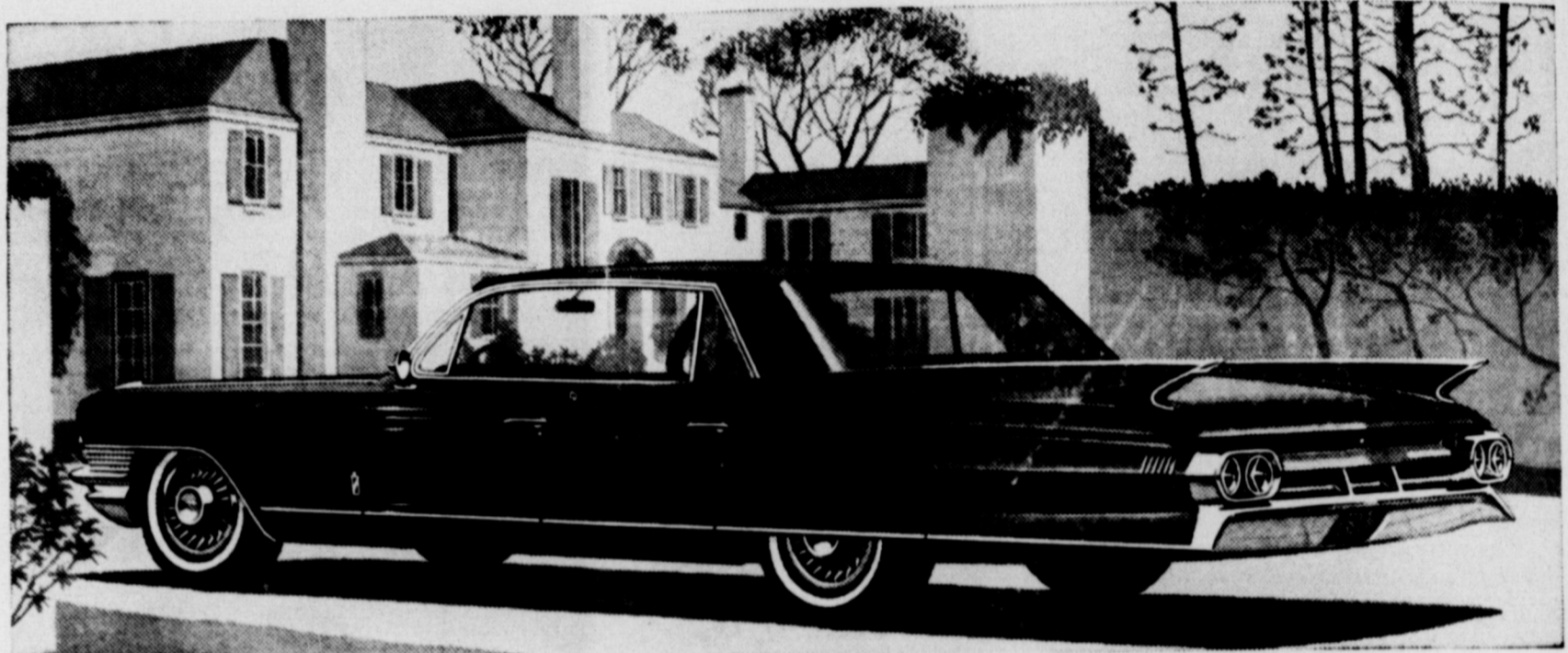
8. Allow the Legislature to delegate to local government the regulation of traffic, parking and zoning on public beaches.

George Bean was the eighth president of the Ozona Women's Club. Other officers in her first year were Mrs. Evert White, first vice president; Mrs. Joe Ober, second vice president; Mrs. J. Grimmer, recording secretary; B. B. Ingham, treasurer; and Ira Carson, parliamentarian.

The club had an enrollment of 140 members at the beginning of the year. Mrs. Madden Read, Mrs. W. J. Grimmer, Mrs. Tom Smith and Mrs. Evert White. Each member had a roll call with highlights of the current event of interest.

Mrs. Evert White, the program chairman and her committee prepared an attractive year book, the first to be in the club color of red and white. The topic for the year was The Atlantic Panel Plan course taken from the Atlantic Monthly.

The club year opened with a president's day, the first, and a health day with a talk by Mrs. I. Sellers Moore. The Federal Day program was held in the home of Mrs. Ira Carson and Mrs. A. C. Hoover, delegate to the State Convention at Austin, at which Mrs. Volney Davis of Brownwood was president, and Mrs. Frank Friend of San Angelo, first vice president.

The art program was held in Ozona, at which time Mrs. Douglas, the Sixth District

Chairman of Art, was the speaker. An art exhibition was held in connection.

A new committee was added this year, Mrs. A. C. Hoover as club counselor, who gave monthly reports from the Texas Club Woman.

This was the year of the Texas Centennial in Dallas, so at each meeting Mrs. W. R. Baggett gave a report on its progress. At one meeting she reported that Mrs. Frank Friend, first vice president of TFWC, had attended a luncheon in Dallas honoring Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, given by the Central Committee of the Cen-

tennial Exposition, both to participate in the opening of the Exposition and in special ceremonies planned by the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs.

Mrs. Bean's officers for the second term were the same with the exception of Mrs. Tip Smith for Mrs. W. J. Grimmer, who, with her family, moved to Winfield, Iowa. Mrs. C. E. Nelson was the only new member.

The course of study was Travelogue and Practical English and Effective Speech. The countries studied were Italy, Portugal, Spain, Morocco, Holland, Belgium, Down the Rhine to Switzerland, Denmark, India, Mexico, U. S., Alaska and Hawaii. Other programs of interest were Texas Centennial Christmas, Art and Health. Each program had a study in effective speech and included music.

Vada Bean was the daughter of James Frederick Jenkins and his wife, Lillian Mackey Jenkins of Hillsboro, Texas, her birthplace. She attended school there and graduated from Texas Woman's University of Denton, then CIA. She came to Ozona as a teacher of Home Economics, in the local school system.

She was married to George James Bean, a native of Scotland, the nephew of an early day Crockett county ranchman, Mr. Robert Massie. The couple exchanged vows in the First Baptist Church in Hillsboro. She and her husband lived at their old Mauldin ranch several years, later moving to Ozona to school their children.

They were the parents of Mary Frances (Mrs. Boyd Baker), Vada Louise (Mrs. Carl Appel), Joe Bean, all of Ozona, and Doris Adell (Mrs. John C. Johnson) of Dallas.

Later Mr. and Mrs. Bean moved to San Angelo where they lived a number of years. She was an active member of the First Baptist Church, the American Association of University Women, and the San Angelo Woman's Club. She was at one time Sixth District chairman of Texas Heritage, and held many offices in both the Ozona and San Angelo Clubs.

The Beans were avid travelers, going to Canada, Alaska, Mexico, Scotland, England and Europe, as well as traveling over most of the United States and Hawaii.

Mr. and Mrs. Bean had returned

to Ozona, planning to make their home on the ranch when Mr. Bean was stricken with a fatal heart attack. He is buried in Cedar Hill Cemetery. Mrs. Bean now resides in San Angelo.

Miss Ida Lee Harlan is spending two weeks with her sister-in-law Mrs. Vernon Harlan in Alpine while her brother attends reserve camp. Mr. and Mrs. Harlan were recently the parents of a baby boy. The Harlans have one other child, Cynthia. Mr. Harlan, a former Ozona teacher, is now an English professor at Sul Ross.

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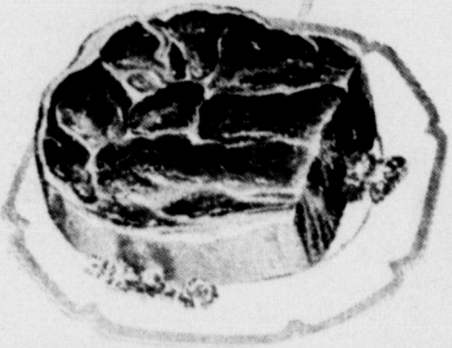

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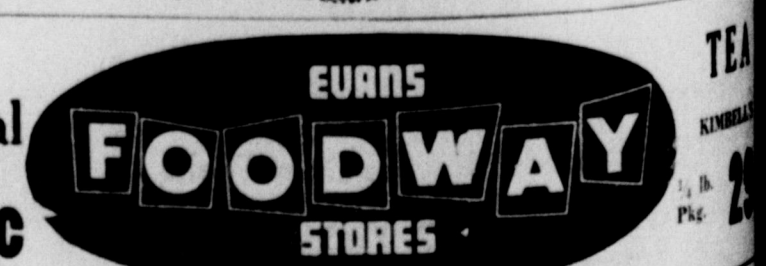
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
