Convinced of its feasibility, and found the female screwworm fly wild flies in time bring the breed

The fund is to be managed by statewide committee representing all segments of the livestock industry which will serve as a legal body to treat with governmental agencies for additional needed funds with which the fly elimination program will ultimately be

financed. The county committee has estimated that this county's quota in the financial drive can be met with a per head assessment on livestock of 10 cents per head for sheep and goats and 50 cents per head for horses and cattle. This assessment if met 100 percent by operators in the county would produce approximately \$50,000, which has been set as the county's goal.

Every other county in the state where livestock are produced will be staging similar campaigns to raise the necessary 3 million dollars as evidence of the desire of producers for government action in helping to eliminate this most expensive pest which besets livestock producers. Savings in livestock lost to the screwworm plus the expenses of ranchmen in fighting them would make back the total millions spent in one year, leaders point out.

That the plan will work has been demonstrated in Florida where it was first tried successfully. These are but the most obvious and most immedate of the disgraceful situations our inaction has allowed to engulf us. It is as if our emergence from World War II some insidious and sinister force has sucked the marrow of initiative from our bones. And it is fair to ask in the light of the moraleshattering disaster of Korea whether we may now be the victims of the childlike faith and dependence we placed in the charade of the United States.

Today, as the crisis of leadership develops in this body - when we are faced with the Communist insistence on a three - headed ("troika") command - is a good time to reconsider its usefulness to this country and this Communist wracked world. Certainly, the geopolitical monster the Russian would create with the vetoes of ne Communist Secretary and the "Neutralist" Secretary arrayed against the Secretary of the West, would be no help.

When the show-down comes, as it soon must, our withdrawal from the UN and its inevitable collapse might well embolden us to other desperately delayed decisions.

It is now Unconstitutional for the Federal Government or any state to require of a public office-holder a "belief in the existence of God" the Supreme Court has ruled. Thus the words "So help me, God", required by law since 1884 in the oaths taken by civilian and military officers are now superfluous.

But the Court is rewriting the banguage as well as the law. How can there be any oath if not sworn by higher than mortal power? Which suggests that the atheistic Communists, incapable of oaths, are likewise incapable of honor. And God-given freedom is like-

wise incomprehensible to them. What the Supreme Court has done is to outlaw the sacredness of any pledge and in efect to repeal our National Motto - "In God We Trust." -- it's now the "law of the land."

Notes From The County Agent's Office By Pete W. Jacoby

What kind of results did you obtain the last time you pruned as beautiful as you planned or did they look pretty botched up? Or perhaps your favorite tree died the after you pruned it. These are common problems of the untrained do-it-yourself pruner.

Pruning plants is an art which can be acquired through learning certain basic principles and the exceptions to them, and through experience and close observation. The purpose of pruning is to remove unwanted growth, and the cardinal rule to follow is that if you have no good reason to prune. put the tools away

Pruning tools should be of high quality, sharp and well adapted to the job at hand. These tools are made in several sizes so the purchaser should decide which size is best suited to his needs.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service has released a bulletin which contains a wealth of information for the home pruner. This

publication, B-977, "Modern Pruning Methods" gives a complete discussion on the reasons for pruning, pruning tools, pruning methods, safety rules, and contains a list of suggested reading material plus special sections on pruning shrubs and small trees, hedges, evergreens and roses.
