Incumbent members of that board, which is practically inactive, to be re-elected are Charlie Black in Precinct 2, Jeff Owens in Precinct 3 and Marshall Montgomery in Precinct 4. Other members of the county board are Wayne West, at large, and Hillery Phillips from Precinct 1.

#### ABOUT GOSSIPS AND 'POISON PEN' ARTISTS

We can feel nothing but contempt for the person who indulges in malicious gossip. The same but double goes for the writer of a "poison pen" letter.

But combine the two into one and you have a vile character for whom there are no adequate words of description — and we wouldn't want to use them if there were.

The father of a 14-year-old Ozona school girl received such a letter from such a person during the past week. Not only was it unsigned, which is cowardly enough, but it's message was wrought by printed words clipped from newspapers and pasted down under scotch tape.

No names were used but the clipped printing message was about some "Very interesting meetings" in front of the hotel and at Ranch Drug "meeting her Airman boy friend."

Now, it so happens that this father is not in the least alarmed nor is he shouldering his shotgun as the "poison pen" artist no doubt hoped he would. On the other hand, he is, as most fathers who maintain a close relation with their children would be, hopping mad at the unfounded and gossipy innuendo contained in the missile. He knows that if the writer were not dealing in strictly unfounded gossip and if he or she were genuinely interested in his daughter, the father would have been contacted in person, not by an unsigned letter.

Trouble makers are trouble makers in any guise, but when they attempt to reach out from behind a screen of anonymity to harm a 14-year-old school girl, they have sunk to a new low in the human order.

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### RECORD HIGH SCORES CHALKED UP IN THIRD ANNUAL BOWLING TOURNEY

High scores along with some sharp individual performances marked the third annual Ozona City Bowling Tournament held in Ozona at Miller Lanes, March 12 through March 16th.

Roy Killingsworth, tourney director, reported that scores posted by various teams revealed unusually high score for an area where bowling experience is for the most part limited to the last three years.

The third tourney was the largest yet with 16 teams, 25 doubles and 50 singles entered.

Evans Foodway, led by Dillon Merritt, won the championship in scratch. Merritt posted games of 236, 210, and 195 for a composite of 641 as Evans posted the team high of 2678.

In second place was Williams El Paso with 2630. Dub Reeves and Jesse O'Rear led the Williams team.

In singles competition John Redden put together games of 270 high for the tourney, 213 and 159 for a top total of 642, one pin better than Dillon Merritt's individual total for Evans. Redden captured both the scratch and handicap titles in the singles competition to make a clean sweep.

Nick Nicholas had a total of 634 with a high game of 233 to win second in both handicap and scratch while Pat Drum won third in scratch and fourth in handicap and Jim Nowak had fourth in

scratch and third in handicap.

In team play in the handicap division, Brooks Dozier and Charles Annett led White's Auto to a first place finish with a score of 3025 while Evans finished second and Williams El Paso third.

In doubles play Jesse O'Rear with 534 and Pat Drum with 589 won first place with a total of 1173 in scratch.

Jim Dudley and Floyd Hokit with a 584 and a 564 combined scores for second in scratch and first in handicap with totals of 1148 and 1268.

### Beneficial Results Of Deferred Grazing On Range Lands Stressed

"Many cooperators in the Crockett Soil Conservation District are beginning their program of pasture deferment," according to James Glynn, local Soil Conservation service technician. All stock will be moved on part of their ranches in order to completely rest one or more pastures.

According to Glynn, deferred grazing is a management practice that is being used to bring about an improvement in the vigor of present grasses and establish new plants.

The best ranges are penalized by continuous grazing year after year. Stock prefer certain ice cream grasses (grama, buffalo and bluestem) and will graze them a majority of the time as long as they are present.

Glynn says deferred grazing also permits grass to make enough growth for ground litter and mulch. This is not a waste of grass by any means. Litter or mulch decreases the puddling of soil by rain drops and allows the rain to penetrate into the soil instead of running off.

Deferred grazing to obtain litter, moisture penetration and less evaporation can be seen visually. The grass following deferment will remain green much longer during dry spells of the growing season.

The SCS will be glad to assist cooperators of the Crockett Soil Conservation District in planning a system of pasture improvement through deferred grazing to fit their needs and operation.

### Screwworm Outbreak On Ranch will not Bring Quarantine of Livestock

Austin — Individual premises on which screwworms are found will not be quarantined, advises Dr. R. G. Garrett, executive director of the Texas Animal Health Commission in Austin.

State and federal animal health authorities must have reports on all suspected screwworm infestations to conduct the eradication program properly. Livestock owners who make such reports will get the earliest and most thorough relief, Dr. Garrett said.

A screwworm transport patrol line has been established by the Commission across Texas from Del Rio generally east to Columbus and south through El Campo and Bay City to the Gulf of Mexico. This action was taken to contain known infestations in the southern part of the State, where their presence has been confirmed, and to prevent their transportation by truck or rail to the free area north and east of the patrol line.

Dr. Garrett requests that all animal handlers be especially watchful for animal wounds. He suggests that, where possible, such wounds be treated immediately with screwworm remedies and fly repellents so they will not become infested.

If worms are found in animal wounds, their identity should be

established as quickly as possible, Dr. Garrett said. Free mailing kits may be obtained from county agricultural agents, livestock inspectors and others. Samples of the worms found will go to Screwworm Identification, ADE-USDA, Box 969, Mission, Texas. Identity of the worms will be made known to the owner immediately.

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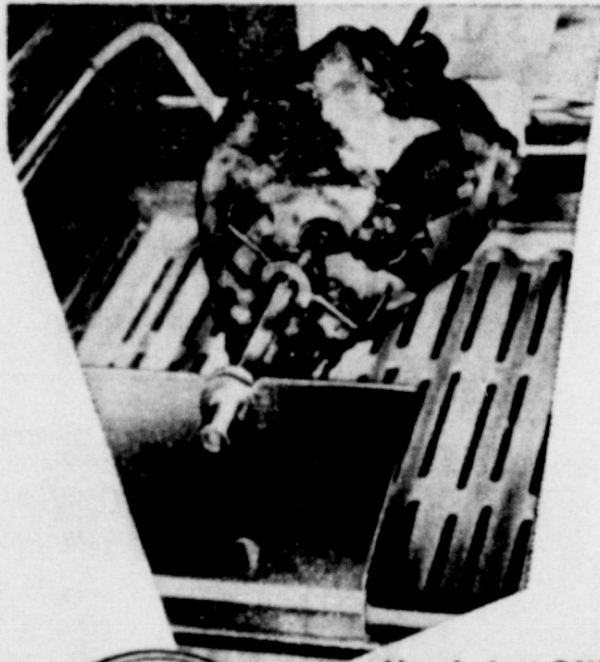

### To Get Refund You Have To File a Return

Refund payments of federal income taxes withheld from wages are paid only upon the filing of a proper federal income tax return, S. Baker Mallett, Administrative Officer, of the IRS today reminded San Angelo area taxpayers. "While everyone whose income was \$600 or more during 1961 must file a return (\$1,200 for those 65 and over)," the IRS representative stressed, "we find frequent cases of people apparently believing that because their tax withheld was greater than their tax owed, they will automatically get a proper refund."

"Somewhat the same belief is held by students or other young people who worked during a portion of the year and whose taxes were withheld from their salaries or wages. To get a refund, they, too, must file a return, even if such income was under \$600."

"For all filers," the IRS representative said, "the filing deadline this year is Monday, April 16, because April 15 falls on a Sunday; but those taxpayers entitled to a refund would do well to file as soon as possible."

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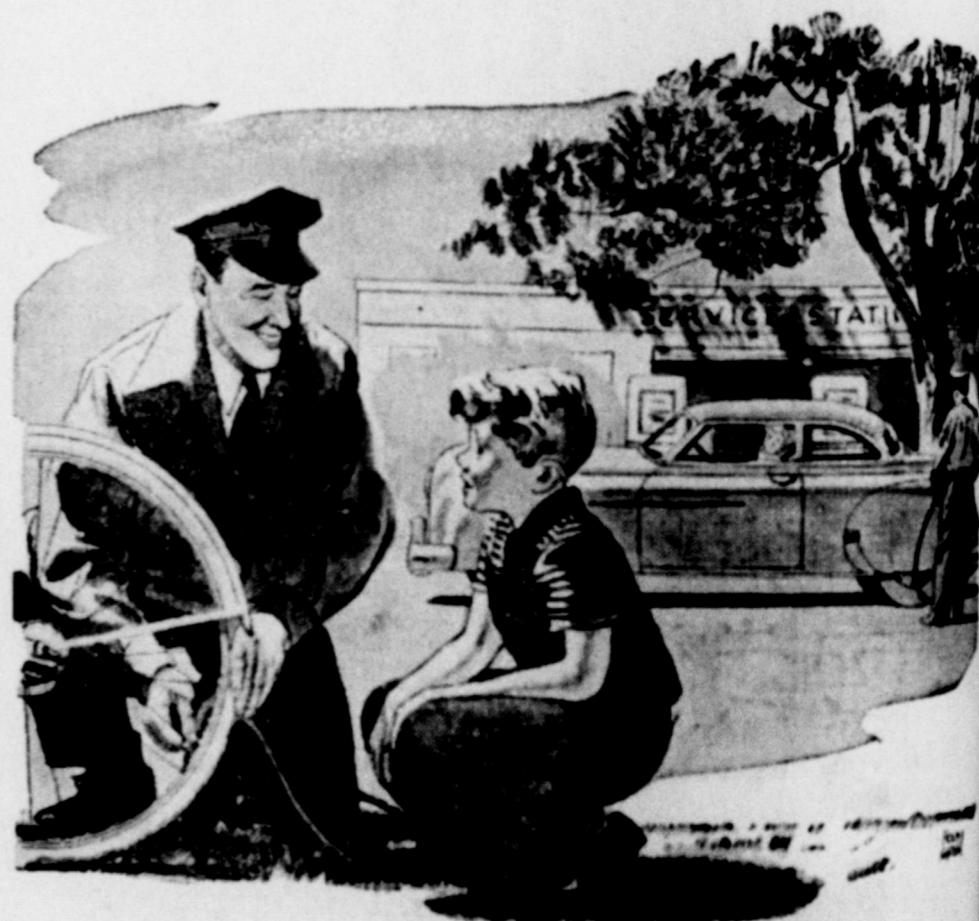

Ruth has always loved the Ozona Women's Club, holding various offices and duties. At the end of her term as president, she was presented a silver tray, as a token of the Club's appreciation of her interests and efforts.

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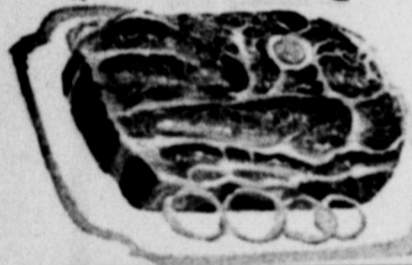
