Historical Society Hears Bosworth In Speech On Writing

Naval Officer, Former Ozonan Speaker At Courthouse Meet

Nearly 130 members of the Crockett County Historical Society and their guests were present at the district Courtroom in Ozona Saturday night to hear Capt. Allan R. Bosworth discuss plans for a book about Ozona which he has been commissioned to write by Harpers.

Before Captain Bosworth was introduced, Alvin Harrell chairman of the nominating committee gave a report from his committee and that Miss Wanda Watson was recommending Joe Couch be elected president of the organization, re-elected secretary-treasurer. On motion of Mrs. B. B. Ingham, Sr., both were unanimously elected.

Captain Bosworth modestly touched on his interesting career, as an enlisted man in the Navy rising to the rank of Captain without benefit of Annapolis, as a newspaper man in California and as a successful free lance writer, author of numerous short stories and magazine articles and a number of successful books.

The mechanics of shaping up material for a book were outlined by Author Bosworth. He showed the audience some of the photo-stated materials gathered in his research preceding the writing of "New Country" his latest book and told of the broad plan of his forthcoming book, tentatively titled "The Ozona Story" for which Harpers has already signed contract.

Some of the anecdotated material which may possibly find its way into that book, stories of the doings of Ozonans in his youth here, was divulged by Bosworth in a following his talk. Capt. Bosworth followed his formal talk.

Sunray Helbing Test Has Strawn Gas Show

Sunray DX Oil Co. No. 1 Ruby Helbing, in 9-MN-GC&SF, Crockett County wildcat, 6 1/2 miles south of Ozona and 2 1/4 miles north-northeast of the nearest production in the Hunt-Baggett (Strawn lime gas) field, flowed gas at the daily rate of 200,000 cubic feet, plus a light spray of load water, from the Strawn.

Flow was through perforations between 8,446-6 feet, which had been shut in 12 hours.

Earlier on a 40-hour swabbing test, recovery was 300 barrels of load water, fluid level was 8,000 feet from the surface.

There still are 80 barrels of load to be recovered.

Land Owners, Game Officials Confer On Next Year Game Laws

Only a small group of Crockett County land owners were on hand at the Crockett County Courthouse Monday morning for a fish and game regulation meeting.

Among the officials on hand were District Chief Warden, Mutt Reinhart, Eldorado Warden, Bill Works, and Crockett County warden David Allen along with two state game biologist.

Among the matters discussed were minor changes in the fishing laws and the bow and arrow hunting season. Some counties have a bow and arrow season prior to the gun season on deer, but Crockett county does not presently make any distinction between the two methods of hunting.

Probable recommendation will be for a continuation of the permit method of taking antlerless deer in this county (with landowner permission) and the usual season on all types of game, the wardens indicated.

Seem Headed for 1st Half Run-Away Victory March

Moore Oil continued to make a run-away of the first half of the Ozona Little League season by swatting Ozona Oil 15 to 10 Monday night following a 6 to 1 win over B&B last Thursday.

The Ozona Oil-Moore Oil contest was largely a case of Moore's regulars building up a big lead and then finding its reserves having trouble holding the pesky red legs.

Thursday's ball game was a different story as right hander Tony Garza blanked the Oilers for the first three frames before being relieved. B&B took the lead in the top of the fourth when they picked up a run, but Moore tied the score in their half, and teed off on Garza's successor for five runs in the sixth to win 6 to 1. Catarino Cervantez worked 5 innings to win for Moore.

B&B got another fine pitching job from Garza Monday as the hard throwing right hander blanked Mason through four frames and left the mound with the Grocers leading 2 to 0. But his reliever got little fielding help from his teammates and a four-run sixth inning rally after two were out fell one short as the Grocers lost 10 to 9.

Allen Merritt started and worked the first four innings for Mason.

Merritt and Albert Grobeck teamed to pitch the Mason team to a perfect week last Thursday when they took a well played 4 to 1 win from Ozona Oil. The Motor Co. picked up three runs in the first frame and even though they were cut off pretty well after that, the lead was ample as the Oilers were able to touch the Mason pitching for but one run.

Southern Part Of County Soaked By Torrential Rains

Draws Run In Some Areas; Devil's River On Rise

Heavy rains triggered by a fast moving cold front poured much needed moisture on large areas of Crockett County early Tuesday morning, even though Ozona and the northwestern quarter of the county missed the downpours.

Rains in excess of three inches were reported around Juno which caused a good rise on Devils River along with the nearest thing to general rains in the county in some time, set draws to running and which sent a number of fishermen to higher ground.

The rains began around Brock Jones ranch northeast of Ozona and ranged from an inch and a half starting at Albert Bailey's to over two inches on the Bill Childress ranch in the southwest.

Reports of good rains ran as far west as the area west of the Pecos but no rain reports had been received of any North of U. S. 290.

A few reports, some of which were unconfirmed, were as follows: Alvin Harrell 1.4, Wayne West 1.5, Mrs. S. M. Harvick over 2.00, Vic Pierce 1.5, Roy Miller, 1.3, Ira Carson from about an inch near the house to over an inch south, Joe Clayton 6, Hugh Childress 1.5, Jake Young 1.5, Bill Childress from 2 to 3 inches, Early Baggett 1.1, Jake Miller from 3 a the house to over an inch to the east, the Blakeney ranch received over 3 inches and Bill Clegg and James Childress were reported to have gotten rain, Bud Cox 1.25 over part of country.

Some of the area hit by the rains had not received moisture in nearly a year, while many of the others who have gotten rain recently were jubilant over the chance presented for young plants spawned by the earlier moisture to now.

Miller Robison, Former Ozonan, Victim of Hail Storm at Marfa Ranch

Miller Robison, former Ozonan and now ranching south of Marfa suffered considerable property damage last week when a tremendous hail storm hit his ranch.

Hail as large as hen eggs heavily damaged the house, cars and fences on the ranch and piled up as deep as three feet in places. The heavy hail was concentrated on the Miller Robison, Tom Robison, C. B. "Mutt" Black and George Howard ranches.

The hail was accompanied by hard rain, and dry lakes and stock tanks caught as high as ten feet of water to help offset some of the hail damage. Draws ran bank full for the first time in a good number of months and the Marfa Sentinel stated that the rain had exceeded the fall for the last five months. In areas of Crockett County this would not be a sensational total.

The heavy hail was concentrated on a strip about 10 miles wide and of undetermined length and was in great enough quantities that pictures, looking very much like winter time snow scenes, were taken the day after the hail fell.

Ozona will also have some golfers who could make trouble for the best of them. Beecher Montgomery, James Scott, Arthur and Art Kyle, Brooks Dozier, Bill Clegg and T. J. Bailey are all capable of winning the title.

Committees appointed by the club president have been hard at work on the courses for several months and a great deal of work has been done on the tees and fairways which should make the course more pleasant to play.

Activities will begin Saturday when partnership, low ball play will begin along with qualification for the championship flight.

Saturday evening a barbecue will be held for club members and guests and Sunday championship play will be held in the six flights plus the championship flight. The field has been limited to 112 golfers and entry scores in the top flight must be scored on the Ozona course.

Marlon Smith, the Club professional, and the club tournament committee are in charge of the tourney.

Prizes to be given to the Medalist flight winners, runners up, and consolation champions and runners up, will be pro line equipment and trophies.

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The Sick American

Former Governor Charles Edison as director of the company Committee for Public Affairs, has mailed to all McGraw-Edison employees a copy of a letter by an unnamed San Franciscan. It was published in the Copley newspapers in California, but deserves the attention of all the author's fellow citizens in the other 49 States as well. The writer says:

"I am one of the Americans who heard Mr. Khrushchev tell our nation that my great-grandchildren will grow up in a Communist world. For some time now, this has bothered me. I am not a brave man — not even a big one — I am now 50. I paint my own house, repair my own car, grub my own devil grass, and nurse a modest savings account — I am a law-abiding man on the quiet side, and dissension makes me terribly nervous. Frankly, I am the kind who simply doesn't have it in him to fight anyone ever."

He goes on to report coming across "the huge old family bible" in the attic with his great-grandmother's journal of her covered wagon trek across the Great Plains to the wild, new land of California.

"On the trail she wrote of sickness and hunger, and heat and cold, and dust and thirst, and the deaths and births like beads strung together on a thread of hope — hope of freedom and a land of plenty for their children yet unborn . . . As I read, I began to think about America and what it all stands for; and I thought about our enemies and what they intend

to do to America — to its freedom and its hope.

"And, suddenly, I realized that I am a sick American. I mean really sick . . . I am sick of bureaucrats who tell me that my enemy is not really my enemy and that I should live together with murderers and tyrants. I am sick of government that hasn't the guts to clean traitors out of its own offices. And I'm sick of being a nice, pleasant guy about it . . . I am sick of my country being ridiculed all over the world. I am sick of pink-fingered diplomats and lily-livered politicians who place personal career above the fate of the flag.

"I am sick of 40 years of relentless, creeping, cancerous Communist godlessness that never once has wavered from its avowed purpose of conquering that flag and seeing it trampled in the mud under Russian boots. I am sick of my genteel desire to stand pat and pray while the enemy advances. I am sick of educators who teach tolerance of subversion and of clergymen who would have me quail at the spectre of battle and turn my cheek in fear of what our enemies might do.

"In all honesty, the thing of which I am sick is the man who let these things come to me: myself. And by the living God who made me, Sir, I am a sick American who intends to get well."

The letter is signed "Fed-up Citizen". Are there enough more, we wonder, who will make up their troubled minds to get well?

It's Not Easy to keep up with the National Dept. Before we recover from the shock of Former Budget Director Maurice Stans' estimate of a trillion dollars, Senator Harry Byrd says it's \$1.2 trillion. And foreign experts say that's right.

Then the House votes the Administration request for a \$208 billion debt ceiling! Which means we have an iceberg-type debt — most of it out of sight.

No nation in all history, we presume, ever owed so much to so many.

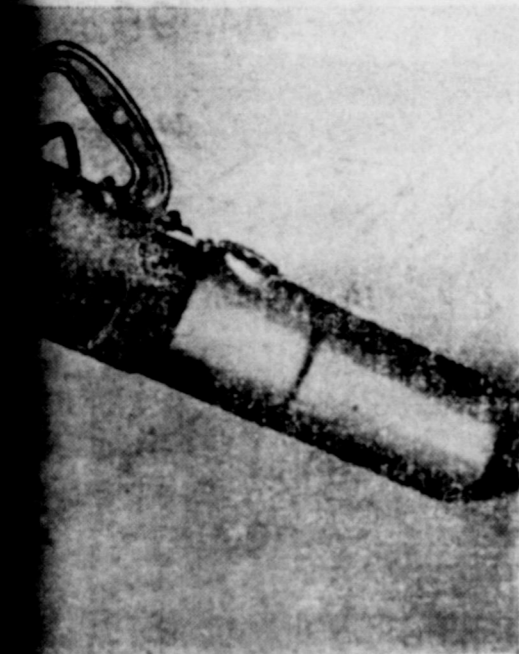

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From State Capitol

Austin, Texas — Texas' crime situation looks a little better. FBI reports covering the first three months of 1962, based on statistics from the 12 largest cities, show major crimes down 6.7 per cent.

Across the U. S. in cities of comparable size, major crime rates rose one per cent.

Too Many Colleges?—Dr. Ralph Green of the Texas Commission on Higher Education thinks the legislature should quit creating four-year, state-supported colleges.

He told a House Committee on Saving Taxes that 20 state colleges are about enough.

Legislators have extended state support to four new colleges in the last four years.

Water Supply — Texas enters the summer with its major reservoirs 76 per cent full.

Texas Water Commission reports that May rains couldn't keep up with use and evaporation, so the water supplies shrank by 291,000 acre feet.

Livestock Rules Amended—The Texas Animal Health Commission, after hearing pleas of livestock market operators, relaxed rules designed to speed up the eradication or at least control of brucellosis (undulant fever).

Commission action amending the rules came just before they were to go into effect June 15.

Before the change, the rules would have required testing for brucellosis before cattle could be moved from one market to another.

As amended, the rule says the cattle may move from one approved market to another approved market without having to take the test. This was put on a trial basis.

Restriction of movement was opposed by representatives of the big stockyards at San Antonio, Fort Worth and Houston. Auction markets also had an ardent champion present.

James D. Sartwell, president of Houston's Port City Stockyards,

said the economic effect of the proposed rule could be "dangerous", particularly so in view of "the predicted downturn in cattle prices now beginning."

Firing Resumes — There was only a brief respite from campaigning after Democratic primaries.

John Connally, the Democratic nominee for governor, and Jack Cox, the Republican nominee, both had their chance to talk at the meetings of their respective state executive committees Saturday, convening to canvass the returns.

Campaigns will start in earnest September 18th, when both parties have their state conventions.

But the two young gubernatorial nominees both have state campaign headquarters in operation in Austin. They sound like they plan all-out campaigns in the summer and fall.

Sen. John Tower will be a major campaigner for the Republicans. Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson and Sen. Ralph Yarborough will take to the stump for the Democrats.

They are beginning to make this look like a two-party state. Whether the label sticks depends on what the voters say on November 6th.

Safe Driving Plan — The State Board of Insurance will hold hearing June 29th on automobile insurance rates and rules.

High on the agenda will be proposals to revise drastically the "safe driving insurance plan" by which those with accidents or traffic law violations pay more, while those without them pay less.

Statistics say the plan has cut rates for 78 per cent, raised them for 22 per cent. But the complaints about the plan being received by legislators indicates that even those who save aren't too happy with the possibility that one slip might run up their rates.

Drastic revision is possible. Without revision of the plan, a rate cut is in the cards. But if penalty provisions are reduced, it may wipe out the chance of a rate cut.

The News Reel

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

From The Stockman, June 22, 1933
