## New School Year To Begin Sept. 4 In Ozona System

### First Faculty Meeting Sept. 1; Classes After Labor Day Holiday

The 1962-63 school year will begin in Ozona September 4 with a full day of school according to the calendar recently released by Superintendent L. B. T. Sikes.

The September starting date is one of the latest in recent years, but with the unusually hot weather might prove to be a particular blessing this year.

High School students will be pre-registered late this month but elementary students will not be registered in advance of the first day of school, a plan followed in the elementary schools for a number of years.

Advance indications are that the 1962-63 school year will be the largest in Ozona's history with particularly large advances in High School enrollment expected this fall.

Even though no acute shortage of space is expected except in the administration offices, the High School enrollment will be around 200 this fall in comparison to less than eighty at the time the building was built.

Ten years ago every student in the Ozona school system could be seated in the high school auditorium for a program if so desired. Last year the auditorium would not hold quite half of the students enrolled.

The first faculty meeting of the year will be held in the High School auditorium Sept. 1 with school getting under way after the labor day holiday.

Football, band, and administration services will all go back on fulltime August 29. Some changes have been made in the school faculty but all replacements have not been named and a list of the new faculty has not been released.

## Sale Of Reserved Seats For Football Season Under Way

### Reserved Seat Prices No Higher Than Per Game Admissions

A number of choice reserved seats to this year's Ozona Lion home football games were made available on a first come, first served basis this week, according to announcement from the Ozona High School office.

The reserve tickets are priced the same as general admission tickets at the gate, but afford the buyer seats inside the forty yard lines in exchange for the purchase of all five tickets in advance.

In previous years it has been the custom to give last year's ticket holders first choice at their seats from the previous year, but for the past few years the number of seats going unclaimed from the previous year has risen to the point where no waiting period is needed for a number of seats in choice positions.

This year Ozona will have an entertaining home schedule which will begin Sept. 7 at 8 p. m. with the Lions playing host to the McCamey Badgers. Rocksprings will come to Ozona Sept. 29. Iraan will make an appearance Oct. 19. Rankin will return Nov. 2 and Eldorado will finish the home season Nov. 9.

The purchase of season tickets by Ozona fans aids the high school athletic fund by assuring gate guarantee and providing operating funds in advance of gate receipts among other things.

In view of the good the sales do for the high school athletic program, and the lack of any kind of penalty that buying reserved seats brings, there should be a large number of Ozona fans seeking the tickets.

## Goats In FFA Feeding Program To Be Sheared August 15 At Ag Barn

Wednesday, August 15, has been set as the day for the shearing of 12 kid goats to be shown in the January FFA Angora goat show. M. A. Barber, Vocational ag. teacher and show director, stated this week.

The goats are to be sheared on this date in order that all goats fed for the show may have the same number of days for the growth of mohair. At the January show each goat will have five months of hair. The Angora industry has proclaimed a standard of one inch and one pound of hair per month.

Each student feeding Angora kid goats will observe the goats on feed, study the feeding habits, and observe hair growth. In February the goats will be sheared again and each fleece weighed and placed in order of value.

Students planning to feed Angora kid goats in this year's feeding program are asked to bring the goats to the Livestock barn August 15 to be sheared.

Services were conducted by the Rev. Frank K. Suddath of the Methodist Church in Fort Worth where Mrs. Kersey attended church in the last ten years when she made her home with her daughter. Burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery under the direction of James Funeral Home.

Pallbearers were Richard Flowers, Ewart White, Pascal Northcutt, Bud Russell, Brock Jones, Bud Cox, Boyd Clayton and Glenn Capps.

Mrs. Kersey was born August 28 1877, in Moulton, Texas, the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Augustus Avriett. She married James R. Kersey in Jones Prairie, Texas, December 1, 1901. The couple moved to Ozona in 1919 when Mr. Kersey became manager for the Ozona Improvement Co., early-day operators of the Ozona water and electric system. The school, which is one of the largest of its type in the United States, will have an outstanding faculty this summer and expectations are that the school will break its attendance record, a feat accomplished almost every year.

An outstanding faculty will be on hand once again this year with Ray Graves of Florida University and Leo Strang of Massillon High in Ohio, heading the list of football masters and with Jack Patterson of Baylor the leading track mentor. Basketball experts like Bob Rodgers of Texas A&M, and baseball authorities like Red Muff of Houston Colts and trainer Don Sparks of Texas Tech, all will lecture on their specialties.

An all-star basketball game will be played Friday night, and an all-star football game Saturday night will close out the school. Record attendance is likely at both events with over 6,000 tickets to the basketball game already sold.

#### THE PEOPLE PAY

What idea, what philosophy, dominated the minds of the men who founded this country, and laid down the principles they meant it to abide by?

Thomas Jefferson expressed a fundamental thought perfectly when he said: "I am for a government that is rigorously frugal and simple, and not for one that multiplies offices to make partisans, that is, to get votes, and by every device increases the public debt under the guise of being a public benefit."

Admittedly, there have been vast changes in the nation and the world since the great Jefferson's day. But this does not excuse the development of an attitude which makes the attraction of votes the paramount objective of great numbers of government officials who show small concern for the value of the dollar and who seek more and more monolithic and dictatorial power.

The people put up every dollar that is returned to them by government through welfare state charity. And they pay not only in money but in the infinitely more important coin of lost liberty.

"The federal government now spends more than 90 times as much as it did when the income tax law first went into effect. Question: Are the people 90 times as well governed as they were then?" — Fullerton (Neb.) Journal.

Now that the House has passed the Trade Expansion Act on the

theory that by enabling the President to cut tariffs, foreigners would do the same and open gates to US exports, Rep. Thomas B. Curtis warns it may simply substitute bureaucratic control for the tariff system. The Senators, soon to vote on it, might think about this as well as the edge it can give low-wage imports over US goods.

"Our industrial plants may flourish, our universities may thrive, our commerce may crowd the markets of the globe; but all this will be sterile and finally useless unless love of country transforms material success into spiritual greatness." — Dwight D. Eisenhower.

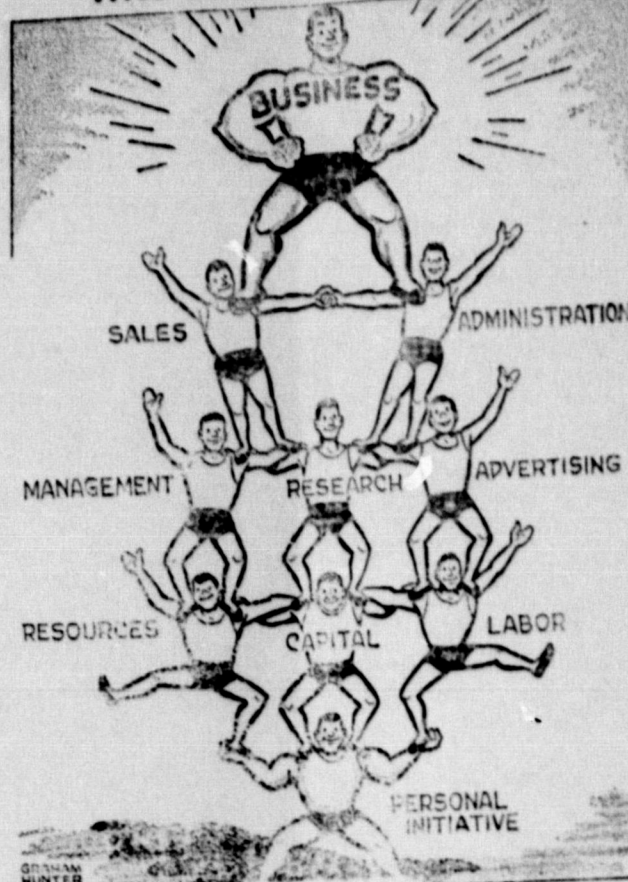

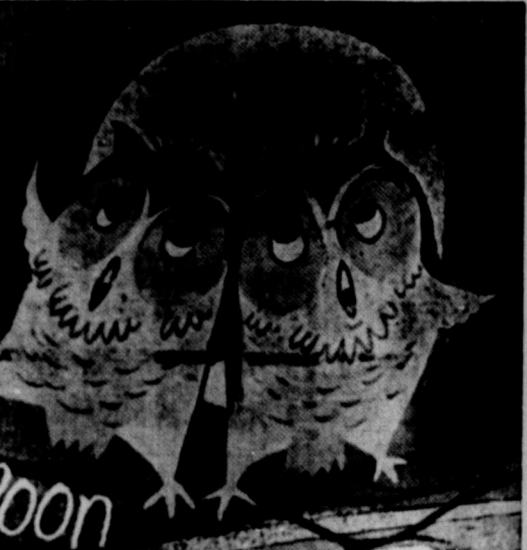

power that is bent on our own destruction? Do we think that the remaining free nations of this world are going to follow our leadership if we don't have the guts to lead, if we don't have the courage to assert a goal that we not only dream about, or aspire to, but can actually hope to achieve? The Soviet Union is weak, relatively. We are the strongest nation in the world, militarily. We are strategically and technologically superior. We have, in our hands, the ability to destroy the Communist world and have enough left over, according to the Defense Department, to settle the hash of any third power that wanted to get in on the act. We know what the Soviet economy is weak. Whenever the wealth and resources of a country are marshalled and channeled in a particular direction, wherever individual initiative is stifled and people are not free to make economic decisions, there is not a strong economy. If we were engaged in war with the Communist world, their economy could not stand a sustained war. We are the ones that are in a strong position. Isn't it folly for us, now, to talk of compromise, concession, and negotiation, when we should be pressing for victory in the cold war? Are we going to sit around until they perhaps become strong enough to beat us? There are those connected with the New Frontier, who feel that they have a great human attitude toward the underprivileged peoples of this world. They regard themselves as the saviors of the poor downtrodden. But, I submit to you, you, that it is those of us who want to create a climate of freedom in this world, who are the champions of downtrodden people throughout the world. I am not advocating war. Indeed, my whole thesis has always been that if we possess superior force, and the will to use it, if we

have to, it will reduce the likelihood that we will have to fight a major war. We can proceed under the protective cover of military superiority to win the cold war on the political, economic, and ideological fronts. We certainly can take pause when we read that Mr. Rostow has proposed that we unilaterally disarm, admit Red China to the UN, extend them diplomatic recognition, that we find areas of "mutual interest" with the Soviet bloc, that we make concessions because they are softening. If they are softening, it's not because, suddenly, they have been seized with a great feeling of good will toward the West. If they are softening, it's because they know that they hold suzerainty over captive peoples only by force of arms and suppression of the truth, and by no other means. I have stood in the ruins of a cathedral in Coventry, England, and seen a plaque which said, "the latter glory of this place shall be greater than the former." I have stood in the rubble of one of our Texas coastal towns and watched people digging out and rebuilding, after the destructive force of a hurricane. I have toured the wall that divides Berlin, and am continually moved and impressed by the magnificence of the human spirit. God has endowed us with an innate nobility that enables people to triumph over catastrophe, to meet crisis with courage and resolution. I can tell you that the people of Berlin are not defeated. They are not ready to make concessions, and they're under the gun, my friends. I hope American resolution can be equally as strong. I'm confident that the resolution of our people is as strong. I hope our national leadership will understand this. After all, our God-given qualities have enabled us to make progress as a people. We have striven for centuries to better ourselves, to discipline ourselves, to do for ourselves and our community what must be done, and look how far we have come. Is it time, now, for a group of intellectual snobs to tell us we are no longer capable of making our own decisions? And so, our mission, this year, is to show in the ballot boxes, in

November, decisively, that the American people do not want to abdicate the responsibility for governing themselves to a few conceited men. I am reassured by the spirit which is evidenced throughout our country, and I'm confident that we will apply ourselves to the task. The question of who is going to be set in governance over us and to what extent we are going to be allowed to govern ourselves — the question of the preservation of our free institutions — and the question of victory in the cold war will be resolved by you, the people of the great American republic. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding thereto a new Section to read as follows:

"Section 14. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of hospital districts in Brazoria, Harris and Hopkins Counties, each district to be coextensive with the limits of such county."

"If any such district is created, it may be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (\$0.75) on the One Hundred Four (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the district, provided, however, that the tax may be levied and collected by a majority vote of the participating qualified property-taxpaying voters who have inrolled their names for the purpose of taxation. The maximum rate of the tax to be levied on such property shall not exceed the maximum rate levied on the maximum taxable valuation of such property."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 40 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 40. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable all counties and other political subdivisions of this State to provide insurance for all employees providing for the submission of the form of ballot, providing for the proclamation and publication of the same."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT PROVIDING WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION INSURANCE FOR ALL EMPLOYEES OF ALL POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS."

## Air Defense Forces Set Continent-Wide Exercise September 2

Colorado Springs—A continent-wide exercise of all U. S. and Canadian aerospace defense forces is scheduled for Sunday, Sept. 2.

It will ground all airline and other non-participating flights for 5½ hours.

The North American Air Defense Command of which the Ozona AF Station is a unit, said the exercise, the latest in a series, will provide the necessary framework to exercise the continental aerospace defense system as a whole and is thus an important training operation essential to adequate defense readiness.

Called Sky Shield III, the exercise will last from noon to 5:30 p. m. (MST). The date and time were chosen as the best available which would least disrupt civil aviation.

Civil aviation authorities said it

will be necessary to restrict civil flights over or into Canada, the continental United States and Alaska during the exercise in the interest of safety.

Electronic countermeasures will be used and will affect all air traffic control radar and other electronic guidance systems.

## Three Ozona Air Force Reservists On Active Duty With Angelo Unit

## Notes From The County Agent's Office

By Pete W. Jacoby

According to Ed Uvacek, Livestock Marketing Specialist of the Extension Service and Texas A&M College, there were 216,000 head of cattle and calves on feed in Texas on July 1 of this year, or 10% more than a year earlier. About 88% of these were in feedlots with capacities of 1,000 or more.

Steers accounted for 54% of the total on feed, while heifers represented 45% and the remainder was cows and calves. The shift in Texas feedlots has been toward lighter weight animals and a shorter feeding period.

According to a Crop and Livestock Reporting Service Bulletin, Texas wool production is down 9% from last year and is the lowest since 1948.

An estimated 6,003,000 sheep will be shown in Texas this year, 5% down from last year. The average wool fleece weight is expected to be 7.8 pounds as compared to 8.0 last year. Wool production in the United States is expected to be down 5% from 1961.

### Slaughter Cattle Market Higher In Texas During July

Fort Worth — The market was active and slaughter cattle prices moved higher in Texas during July. Demand for Texas fed cattle came from a broad area during the month with cattle moving to the Southeast, West and other regions.

Demand for all classes of fed cattle was good and heavier, higher grading steers and heifers were in particular demand. Choice steers looked \$1.00 higher compared to the close of the previous month.

Most feedlots have sold up close on cattle which are carrying reasonable slaughter finish, according to the latest monthly summary published by the Cattle Feeders Division of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association. "Cattle are leaving feedlots with a shorter feed and at lighter weights than normal," said Lloyd Bergsman, director of the Cattle Feeders Division. "From the standpoint of the feeder, this is a healthy situation and could be a factor in a continued strong fed cattle market," he said.
