Move Up Date To Avoid Conflict With Eldorado-Big Lake

The final game of the Ozona Lions 1962 football season was advanced from Friday night to Thursday night in order not to conflict with the game between Eldorado and Big Lake for the district 8-A title in Eldorado Friday night.

The game with Sanderson will be played in Sanderson with the kickoff slated for 7:30 p. m. and will probably determine third place in this year's district 8-A race.

The Lions emerged from last week's loss to Eldorado without further injury and it is expected that Penn Baggett will be available once again for offensive duty and that Jimmy Semmler, who was considerably weakened by a case of the flu last week, will be back in form this week.

Missing from the Lion lineup will be Dubbie Scrivner who missed the Eldorado contest with cracked ribs and who is out for the season.

Ozona, in giving consideration to the moving up of the playing date, was also concerned about a band trip that would have taken the band to the area marching contest early Saturday morning following the long Sanderson trip.

The Lions, even though facing a strong and very alert team Friday night, did not play one of their better games of the season and came out of the contest with a season record which now stands at 4 wins 4 losses and 1 tie and by winning tonight could end the season on a winning note as well as with a winning year.

Ozona will once again be resting its offensive hopes on the fine punning of senior halfback Pete Montgomery and on the accurate arm of quarterback Leroy Cooper. Montgomery will be once again getting strong support in the running department from Richard Vargas and either Brent Moore or Bernabe Villareal while the targets of Cooper's air shots will be Scott Mahon, Bill Bowman, Richard Vargas and Jimmy Semmler. The Sanderson team began the season with some success and is expected to be up Thursday attempting to extend the Eagle win streak over the Lions to two and to end the season on a winning note.

A combination of speed, power, and frequent Ozona fumbles sent the Eldorado Eagles flying past the crippled Ozona Lions 45 to 20 last Friday night to tumble the locals from the title picture and set the stage for the showdown between the loop's two unbeaten eleven, Big Lake in Eldorado next Friday night.

The game started early to be a scoring duel but frequent Lion fumbles, two of which occurred deep in Lion territory, soon turned the game into a rout even though the Lions outscored the visitors 14 to 13 in the second half. Eldorado scored first on a 32 yard scamper over left tackle on the Eagles second possession in the first period. Ozona kicked off and after holding for downs on their own forty the Eagles kicked to Ozona with the ball rolling dead on the Lion five yard line.

Ozona could not make a first down but Robert Cox, who has been having his trouble with punting recently, got off a fine 47 yd. effort that was counter punched to the Lion forty on a fine return by Lynn Mesdor.

McAngus picked up eight yards on the first effort in the series and then Whitten took the handoff, found a gaping hole on the Lion left flank and raced 32 yards for the game's first score. McGregor kicking the extra point.

The Lions lost little time in getting back on the field.

You Can't Use Bonus Deer Tag Without Doe Permit By Landowner

Three deer tags on the 1962 Hunting License have caused some confusion among hunters. An explanation from David Allen, local game warden should clarify many questions:

A bonus (or third) deer tag is attached to hunting licenses so hunters may legally kill as many as three deer in specified areas of unusually high deer populations.

In high deer populated areas landowners have been issued Antlerless Deer Permits by the Game and Fish Commission. Landowners are urged to harvest as many deer as the Game Department recommends, but the use of Antlerless Permits is solely at the landowner's discretion.

Hunters wishing to use their bonus deer tag must acquire an Antlerless Deer Permit from the landowner on whose property they plan to hunt.

Warden Allen cautioned hunters to be sure and punch out the month and date of the kill.

Quail season opens in Crockett County today and deer season opens Friday.

2,000 In Ozona Get Oral Vaccine In Sunday Drive

Make-Up Session Planned Next Sunday At North Elementary

Nearly 2,000 Ozona residents, over 50 percent of the population, took advantage of Sunday's all out effort at mass inoculation against polio with the new Sabin oral vaccine, final figures from the day's tabulation show.

Next Sunday, Nov. 18, will be "make-up Sunday" and every person of every age who failed to get a dose of the vaccine last Sunday will be expected at the one station — North Elementary School — where doctors and assistants will be on hand from 1 to 5 p. m. to administer the vaccine.

Actual breakdown on the vaccine given Sunday showed that a total of 932 doses were given at the South Elementary station and 1066 at North Elementary. A scattered number of Ozona residents have received the vaccine earlier at other places but the number was estimated to be less than 100. An dleft a considerable number of Crockett County residents who have not availed themselves of the opportunity to stamp out the dread crippler which has had almost half of its U. S. cases in Texas in recent years.

The Sabin type I vaccine which was given Sunday and which will be given again this Sunday is the first of a three shot series planned for the County with the type II to be given in Sunday, Dec. 16.

Ozona doctors pointed out that while older persons are not as subject to the disease as are youngsters, they can be carriers of the disease and it is very important in any plan of prevention to take care of both the subject and the source of the disease.

The vaccine is given on a cube of sugar and is recommended for all ages young or old. A form for registration is available and should be filled out in advance of the make-up session Sunday if possible.

There will be no charge for the vaccine although each person will be given an opportunity to donate 25c a dose toward paying for the vaccine. Any money obtained above the actual cost will be contributed to a worthwhile charity.

Dr. Ralph Simon was in charge of the South Elementary station, and Dr. Lloyd Sherrill was in charge at the North Elementary station, both with a corps of volunteer assistants. Both expressed appreciation to the many persons who assisted in making the mass inoculation drive a splendid success. The percentage of response was considered good and doctors hoped that next Sunday's make-up session would raise the percentage figures considerably.

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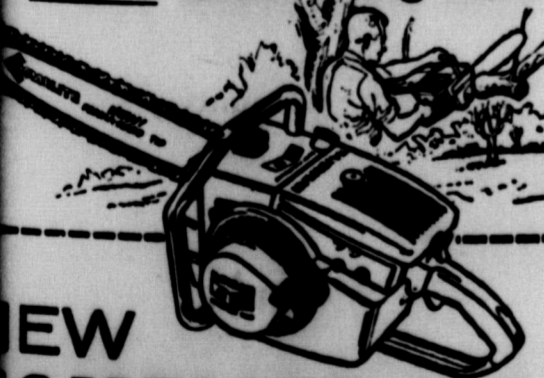

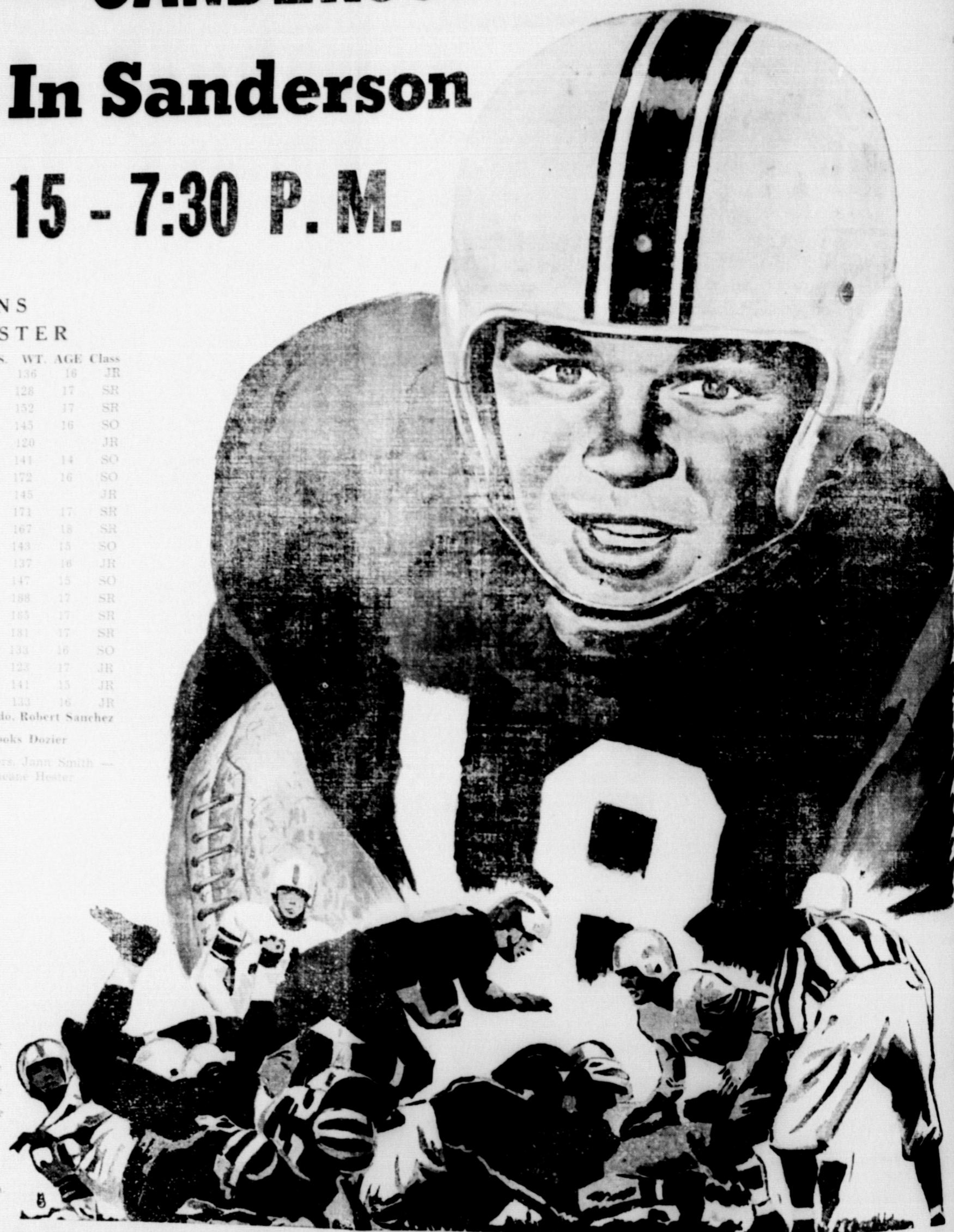

Cooper sneaked in for the Lions score but the effort at two points failed and the Lions trailed 7 to 6.

The Eagles, not to be outdone, drove 68 yards for their second score with quarterback John McGregor diving over from the 1 for the tally. The effort to run over two points failed and the score stood at 13 to 6 at the quarter just before the roof fell in.

The Lion defense seemed to have stiffened considerably and Eldorado was forced to kick following the game's third kick off. Eldorado's kick was a good one and the Lions took over on their own 25. Max Schneemann, Sr., was the winner of the bazaar prize, a tur-

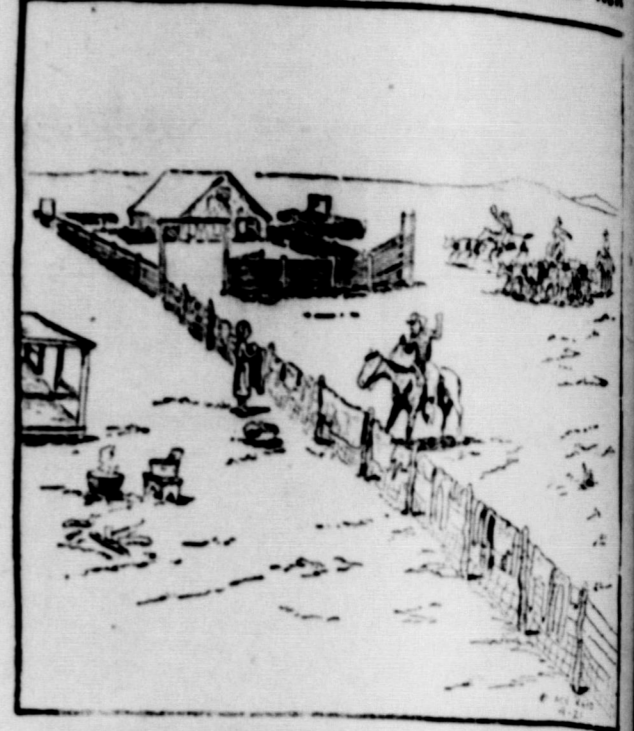
key for Thanksgiving, a turkey for Christmas and a leg of lamb for Easter.
