You Can't Use Bonus Deer Tag Without Doe Permit By Landowner

Three deer tags on the 1962 Three deer tags on the 1962 In Sunday Drive confusion among hunters. An explanation from David Allen, local game warden should clarify many questions:

A bonus (or third) deer tag is attached to hunting licenses so hunters may legally kill as many as three deer in specified areas of unusually high deer populations.

In high deer populated areas landowners have been issued Anterless Deer Permits by the Game and Fish Commission. Landowners are urged to harvest as many deer as the Game Department recommends, but the use of Anterless Permits is solely at the landowner's discretion.




