Improvement In Condition Ele **Baggett Noted**

Youth Shot On Hunting Trip Was In Critical Condition

Decided improvement was noted Monday in the condition of Ele Bright Baggett, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bright Baggett, who is in a San Angelo hospital under treatment for shock resulting from a gunshot wound in the right knee suffered last Wednesday in this county's first hunting accident of the current season.

The youth, a senior this year in A. & M. College and home on vacation from that institution during the Christmas holdiays, was injured early Wednesday morning on the Massie West ranch south of Ozona when his gun, a 22 calibre high powered rifle, was aceidentally discharged when he slipped on a rock. One of his two companions, Tommy Foster of Sterling City, and Jack Aycock of San Angelo, went back to the ranch for help and due to a misunderstanding concerning directions to the scene of the accident it was nearly five hours before the injured lad was found by his father and sister, Mrs. Massie

Although his companions had applied a tourniquet, excessive oss of blood had so weakened the accident victim that it was necessary to stop in San Angelo for immediate medical attention. The parents started with their son to a bone specialist in Dallas. When the party arrived in San Angelo, doctors there immediately gave a blood transfusion and three other transfusions were given later. The youth was described as in a very dangerous condition upon arrival in San Angelo.

Further than a preliminary operation to clean out the wound, ctors have made no move toward repairing the injured knee, that Baggett's physical condition is im-

After the blood is mixed with sodium ni tate and tested for syphilis, it is allowed to settle over night in a refrigerator, and then is treated in a centrifuge that separates the red corpuscies and plasma. Another longer period is to allow the blood to settle for five days. The plasma is then siphoned off and preservatives added. Star-Journal

Roll Off the Road ...

Rolling is the newest trick in driving to avoid serious injury in an emergency. If you see a crash coming, instead of jamming on your brakes and crashing head-on into whatever is ahead, you turn off the road and let 'er roll. I first heard about rolling from the safest and most experienced drivers in the world. They are the fellows who test cars for automobile manufacturers at proving grounds in Detroit, Dearborn, Milford and Utica, Mich., in South Bend, Ind., and in Kenosha, Wis. I talked with men who have driven more than one million miles each. Motorists, they told me, should train themselves to swing fearlessly off the road when there is room. If they do roll over, they won't be hurt as much as if they hit a car head-on. One-third of our accidents, they estimated, would be much less severe if the drivers weren't afraid to switch off the

They pointed out that in these days of steel bodies you are inside a capsule, and a side roll is comparatively safe. If you hit headon, your engine is likely to be jammed into your stomach, and the heads of your passengers will crash against the windshield or the back of the front seat. A 10foot fall is not so dangerous as a collision at 50 miles an hour, for your car is plowing forward! as it wells down an embankment, and much of the force of the impact is absorbed before the crash. And the centrifugal force helps to keep you from being thrown against the roof. it's better to hit a fixed object, such as a tree, than an on-coming car, for when two cars meet head-on at 50, the impact is a 100-mile-an-hour smash; and two carloads of peo-ple are hurt, instead of one. * * * Jerome Beatty in American Mag-





HIS NOSE KNOWS
