The tour is scheduled to begin at 8 a. m. and will be concluded about three hours. Ragsdale said that all teams and interested persons will be requested to meet at the square in Ozona for registration and to get ready for traveling to the contest.

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Crews Arrive To Start Work On Grandstand At Crockett Fair Park

Work crews of the Central Texas Iron Works of Waco, successful bidders on the contract to erect the new grandstand at the Crockett County fair park, arrived here the middle of the week to begin construction of the new stands.

The company has promised completion of the project in 25 days. Contract price on the job was \$10,600.

The new grandstands, to replace the wooden stands which served fair and rodeo goers for nearly forty years, will be of steel and concrete, with treated wood seats such as used in the football stadium stands. It will be 115 feet long and 18 rows high, with a seating capacity of 1485.

Six Ozona Track Performers Enter Lubbock Regional

Pete Montgomery Rated Best Chance To Gain State Meet

Coaches Chick Womack and Sonny Cleere will take six of their 1963 Ozona track squad members to Lubbock Friday where they will take part in the regional meet to be staged there this weekend.

The Lions will have Pete Montgomery entered in the 120 H. H. the 180 L. H. and possibly the broad jump while Scott Mahon will enter the pole vault. The other four entries will be the members of the Lion male relay which finished second in district competition.

A survey of the best times turned in by entries from over region it would seem to indicate that Pete Montgomery has the best chance to advance to the state meet as he has posted the second best time in the 180 L. H. and is among the top low time men entered in the H. H. Montgomery also qualified in the broad jump but may not enter that event and was also running a leg of the mile relay in the district meet, in which he will be replaced.

A survey of the heights achieved in the pole vault reveals that Mahon, performing as he is capable, would be among the best entered in the meet.

The mile relay is rated the least chance of being able to qualify for state, having posted a 3:40 as its best time in district, well off the pace of most of the better teams, which is about 3:34 or slightly better.

The district will have its best chances of sending men to Austin in the persons of Mike Holmes of Big Lake, Buddy Lanehart of Iraan and Pete Montgomery of Ozona. Eldorado, winner of the district meet, will have its best chance in the 440 relay but will have to do considerably better than at any time thus far if they hope to make the Austin trip.

Ozona School administrators were in San Angelo Wednesday night for an area meeting in which the new math program soon to be adopted in Texas was discussed.

The meeting, which was one of six held each school year, attracted a good number of area school men and officers for the next school year were elected as the April meeting is the last one for this school year.

Supt. Joe Kassel of the Lakeview Schools in San Angelo has served the group as president during this year and received the thanks of the group for the work he has done this year as program chairman.

The area meetings were begun under a grant for the purpose of school study and have developed into instructional programs for area supervisors in matters of interest and new programs and regulations issued by the state.

Producers Urged To Do All Possible To Prevent Outbreak of Screwworms

Mission, April — Screwworm cases now being reported in many counties throughout the area where sterile flies are being dispersed could lead to widespread infestation such as that experienced in 1962, unless livestock producers conscientiously follow precautions in handling their livestock.

Reports being received by eradication officials indicate that many producers feel the program has progressed to a point that individual screwworm control measures are no longer required. This attitude, if left unchanged, could seriously hamper eradication efforts, authorities state.

For that reason, eradication officials have issued an urgent appeal to producers, asking them to treat animals with approved sprays and sprays that will prevent screwworm attacks and collect and submit samples from all infestations detected.

Eradication workers point out that while an increasing number of counties are reporting infestations, as yet no large build-up of native screwworms is evident. They feel if producers will make effort to treat open wounds before screwworm flies are attracted to them, the native flies can be overwhelmed through the release of sterile flies. Screwworm flies will lay eggs only on open wounds.

C. G. Scruggs, president of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, said recently it would be traitorous for anyone not to do all in his power to prevent the development of a screwworm case.

West Texas Quarter Horse Futurity Purse Of \$20,000 At Sonora

Sonora, Texas April 18 — The fifth running of the West Texas Quarter Horse Futurity will be held at the Sonora, Park, Sonora, beginning April 27 when the trials will be run. The final, for an estimated purse of \$20,000.00, will be run on Saturday, May 4th. More than one hundred registered Quarter Horse Colts, from several states, are eligible for the trials. Many famous bloodlines are represented by these entries such as Go Man Go, Three Bars, King, Hobo and many others.

The West Texas Quarter Horse Futurity has shown a steady growth since its inauguration in 1959 by the Quarter Horse Assn. of West Texas. That year nine colts ran, 1960 saw twenty enter the gate, 1961 offered thirty two to start, 1962 had fifty to run and this year near eighty are expected to compete, of the one hundred and two still eligible.

The Sonora Park Assn. announces three week ends of racing this year, April 27-28 — May and 11-12. At least six races daily are announced, running from 220 yards to one mile and 70 yards. Races will be held each Saturday evening of the meet.

Outstanding Bible Scholar To Teach Methodist Series

Dr. E. W. McLaurin, Retired Professor, In 5-Day Study Series

A five-night Bible study of the Book of Romans led by Dr. E. W. McLaurin of Waskom, Texas, retired professor of Biblical Theology and New Testament Greek at the Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary, will begin next Sunday night at the Ozona Methodist Church, the pastor, Rev. William R. Fleming announced.

The Ozona Church is joining with all of the other Methodist churches of the world in this special observance of the 225th anniversary of John Wesley's heart-warming experience in Aldersgate Street, London, England, on May 24, 1738. Rev. Fleming said. It was while listening to the reading of Luther's Preface to the Book of Romans that Wesley felt his heart "strangely warmed" and from this experience the Methodist Church was born.

The special Bible study in observance of the anniversary will begin at 7:30 each evening in the fellowship hall of the church, beginning next Sunday night, April 21. The public is cordially invited to attend any or all sessions of the study, Rev. Fleming said.

Dr. McLaurin is a graduate of the University of Texas, receiving from that institution his Master of Arts and Doctor of Philosophy degrees. He is also a graduate of the Seminary which later employed him as a professor. He holds Bachelor of Divinity and Doctor of Divinity degrees also.

Dr. McLaurin has served as pastor of Presbyterian churches over Texas and in many West Texas cities. He is a former president of the Texas Presbyterian Synod.

"Dr. McLaurin is a very capable teacher and minister and I feel that our church is fortunate in being able to hear him in the coming study series," Rev. Fleming said. "I hope all Ozona will join in this experience."

Canyon Sand Gas Discovery Widens Local Field Area

Texas-Americans-Henderson Discovery Heavily Producer

Canyon sand gas production in the potentially huge area from east to west of Ozona was extended west with two discoveries and another was being completed from both the Canyon sand and Strawn formation during the past week.

Texas American Oil Corp., Midland, No. 1 Henderson, Crockett County Canyon sand gas discovery, 20 miles southwest of Ozona, was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 5.6 million cubic feet of gas per day, plus 420 barrels of 65 gravity condensate.

Production was through perforations between 6,200-568 feet, which had been washed with 2,000 gallons of mud acid and fractured with 70,000 gallons.

Drilled to 10,541 feet, 4 1/2-inch casing was set at 5,879 feet.

Location is 990 feet from the south and east lines of 9-TCRR. It is 11 miles southwest of Dalton H. Cobb and Texas American No. 1 Helbing, Canyon sand gas discovery completed last week for 3.6 million cubic feet of gas, plus 151.2 barrels of 65 gravity condensate, through perforations between 6,372-6,896 feet.

The No. 1 Helbing was drilled to 9,301 feet, and 4 1/2-inch casing was set at 7,342 feet.

Location is 990 feet from the north and west lines of 28-QR-EL&RR.

It is 4 1/2 miles southwest of Canyon sand gas production in the Ozona, East multipay field and 2 1/2 miles north of the initial portion of the Hunt-Baggett (Strawn) gas field.

B. W. Wiseman, Jr., and Texas American Oil Corp. Midland were calculating absolute open flow potential at the No. 1 Sarah C. Millsbaugh, in 20-2-1&GN, Crockett County Canyon sand and Strawn gas discovery, 18 miles southwest of Ozona and six miles northwest of the No. 1 Henderson.

Strawn production is being effected through perforations between 8,284-358 feet; and Canyon, through perforations between 5,781-6,744 feet.

Drilled to 9,802 feet, 5 1/2-inch casing was set at that depth.

B. W. Wiseman, Jr., set 4 1/2-inch casing at 7,158 feet on total depth of 9,520 feet, and plugged back to 7,080 feet for completion attempt in the Canyon through perforations at the No. 1-A Sarah C. Millsbaugh, in 20-2-1GN, 3/8-mile southwest of the No. 1 Millsbaugh.

No tests were reported.

New Little League Park Nearly Ready For Season Opener

New Fence, Stands, Rest Rooms, Lights To Be In Use

Work on the new Little League Park, now being built on the site of the park destroyed in the 1954 flood, was nearing completion this week but it will be some time before the field is ready for play.

The new park, constructed in large part by Little League supporters, will be enclosed by a pipe welded fence covered with wire with block rest rooms and supply rooms on top of which will be a press box, and with an entirely new lighting system. The park is of Little League regulation size and will be used only for that purpose.

League director Bill Lewis has been busy the past week getting things ready for the start of a new season. Once again there will be four teams with additional members of the teams being chosen from the group taking part in the try-outs which will begin soon.

We have no quarrel with anyone who seeks to protect his own property, and, although personally we would prefer not to inflict

What Can We Say?

New York's Governor Rockefeller spoke for an increasing number of his fellow citizens when he told newsmen at a Washington press conference the other day that he was having difficulty in understanding why the Administration supports "freedom fighters" in South Vietnam and clamps down on the Cuban patriots.

He noted the "very sharp change of policy" respecting the Cuban exiles and that the American people have not been advised on Administration "objectives" or "plans." He said he hoped this was not "an endeavor to placate or to appease the Soviet," but found it "hard to see what other reason there could be."

In Miami, an all-night meeting of the Cuban Revolutionary Coun-

fighters to liberate their nation from Communism."

"It is conceivable," said Rickenbacker, "that a president of the US might see fit to temporarily suspend the Monroe Doctrine for immediate strategic reasons. However, . . . to actively aid in the destruction of the Monroe Doctrine by utilizing his power to protect foreign troops in this hemisphere is inconceivable."

But Fidel Castro spent over an hour and a half on the radio expressing his approval of US policy. In stopping the US-based refugee raids, he said, we had fulfilled one of "five points for peace" that he and Khrush had agreed on. Among the four remaining to be fulfilled, he said, is abandonment of Guantanamo.

Coexistence with Castro is now US policy, say the Miami exiles. And what can we say?

President Under Fire — Washington (D. C.) Evening Star: "Although the voice of his crisis is being heard throughout the land, there is no reason that we know of to feel sorry for John F. Kennedy. In the first place, the President does not seem to feel sorry for himself. It may require some effort on his part, but he manages to convey the impression that if this is not the best of all possible worlds, it is at least one with which he is more or less satisfied. Again, if the failures and complaints are galling, Mr. Kennedy begged and pleaded back in the campaign days for the chance to expose himself to this sort of thing. And finally, the President has only himself to blame for much of the disenchantment which has set in. It certainly is true that the bloom is off the New Frontier. Performance has fallen far short of promise. America is not 'moving again.'"

There is no Comfort for anyone in the reports that Castro, sulking over Khrushchev's removal of offensive weapons from Cuba, is copying up to Mao Tse-tung. Whether or not Fidel thinks K's control of the Kremlin is slipping, he should be a good enough Communist to know that there will be no East-West split so long as the Reds have a free world to conquer.

For our own part, we might pause and consider whether we'd rather be buried by Khrush's bully-boys or Mao's maniacs.

THE STRUGGLE — CAPITALISM VS SOCIALISM

The real struggle in the world today is between capitalism and socialism. The free world, and especially we in the United States have allowed the Communist to put us on the defensive and have made us afraid to say what we are fighting for. They have made capitalism a dirty word and we have let them get away with it.

We cannot win the struggle for survival and the freedom of mankind until the people and Members of Congress have the courage to stand up and shout that we believe in capitalism, that the choice man must make is between capitalism and socialism. The victory between these two basic systems will decide whether or not man will be free, for only under capitalism can he be free; he can be only a slave under socialism.

The time has come for us to stop being apologists for a system which has given mankind its greatest opportunity and freedom in the history of the world. We know, and it is time to say it out loud, that profits are good, not evil.

The people know what the world struggle is all about. Members of Congress know the real issue, but few have the courage to name the combatants in this world struggle. We see the failure to say what we are fighting for in the stalling tactics of the present session of Congress. Nearly three months of this session have gone by and little, if any legislation has been passed by Congress. Indeed, no measures are being reported from the Committees.

Why? Because practically all of the New Frontier sponsored legislation moves us farther along the road to socialism and Congress is stalling in an effort to save our free enterprise system — capitalism. The only way we can save it is to face the issue openly and squarely, call socialistic legislation socialistic and serve notice that we are out to save and strengthen the capitalistic system.

Anthrax Immunization Of Livestock Urged

Austin — Dr. R. G. Garrett, Executive Director of the Texas Animal Health Commission, recommended today that April is the time for all livestock producers to vaccinate livestock for anthrax in areas that have had outbreaks of the disease in the past.

Immunizing cattle and horses just prior to the anthrax season will give protection through the summer and fall and will prevent death losses, inconvenience in livestock movements, and quarantines.

Anthrax is an acute, infectious and usually fatal disease of livestock (especially cattle and horses) and is transmissible to man.

More Taxes — Some \$43,000,000 in additional revenue would be gained during the next two years by adoption of a House Revenue and Taxation Committee substitute for House Bill 106.

Rep. R. H. Cory of Victoria, chairman of the subcommittee that revised the proposed tax law to comply with Governor Connally's program, said the bill as now drawn would incorporate a one-year extension of the state franchise tax to April 30, 1965. This would net the state \$11,200,000. Repeal of the exemption of outer clothing under \$10 would get \$20,400,000. Bringing motor vehicles under the sales tax would provide \$6,100,000. Other minor changes would round up additional millions.

Women's Rights — Legislation to provide equal rights for women is in this status: Senate Joint Resolution No. 2, which is what the women want, has passed the Senate. It was heard by the House Constitutional Amendments Committee and sent to a subcommittee.

If the resolution gets through the Legislature, it will have cleared perhaps its biggest hurdle. Next step calls for passage of a constitutional amendment, by vote of the people. Amendments usually receive public approval.

However, even after that, all question of women's rights would not be defined. A good bit of legislation still would be required.

Former Attorney General Will Wilson, in testimony before the House committee, said that if the amendment is passed, "The Legislature will have its work cut out

for it in the next session."

Padre Action — Both Houses of the Legislature have passed, and Governor Connally has signed the bill to give the state's approval — and some of its land — to the Padre Island National Seashore project.

U. S. Dept. of Interior will build the vast recreational area, designed to preserve 81 miles of Padre island in its natural state. Texas had to give about 40,000 acres in Laguna Madre as a part of the project.

Congressmen — The House spent a long day of back-and-forth debate on the bill by Rep. Rayford Price of Frankston to reapportion Texas for congressional purposes. Major points in the bill are the abolition of the fourth district in North Texas — long represented by the late Speaker Sam Rayburn — and the creation of a second congressional district in Dallas County.

Under the House version, a new South Texas district, with no present congressman, would be formed.

U. S. Reps. Wright Patman of

Texarkana and Ray Roberts of McKinney would be placed in the same district. Otherwise, present congressmen may have their districts altered somewhat, but still reside in their present districts.
