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CUT IN OUT — NOT DOWN

The most searing indictment of our foreign aid program — "after going through ten different administrators, five major reorganizations and more than 100 billion tax dollars" — comes, logically enough, from the man who probably knows it best.

In his article, "Let's Stop Sending US Dollars to Aid Our Enemies," in the August Reader's Digest, Author Charles Stevenson quotes the summing-up of Chairman Otto E. Passman of the House Appropriations Committee after 1,000 hours of official hearings:

"The trouble is," says Rep. Passman, "that too much of our foreign aid has deteriorated into a subsidy of Communist takeover. And the spenders are so power-hungry, they so withhold the truth from the public, they are so beyond the normal controls of Congress, that there seems no way to confine assistance to helping people help themselves unless we kill the entire operation and start over."

But, as Mr. Steven says, in spite of the mountainous evidence that our "aid" largesse has done us more harm than good, President Kennedy is insisting that Congress provide \$4.5 billion more for another year, and Secretary of State Rusk charges that anyone who tries to cut down this request is playing the Communist game!

And yet the record, as revealed by Chairman Harry F. Byrd of the Senate Finance Committee, shows the administrators have not been

able, since 1958, to spend the aid money they have been given, and had, in fact, amassed the staggering sum of \$21,273,000,000 as of last June in unexpended balance. This, the Senator pointed out, would keep the aid spenders busy for years without another cent from Congress.

Mr. Stevenson, in the report that Reader's Digest is now filming for TV presentation, cites the fantastic history of our foreign aid blunders in India, Poland, Yugoslavia, Burma, Cambodia, Ceylon, Brazil, Egypt, Algeria, Indonesia — and notes that: "What we do has so eased the pressure on Russia to feed its dependent states that it is able now to use its own wheat to spearhead its infiltration of Latin America." Our gifts to the Poles, he says, "enabled them to send \$13-million worth of aid to Castro's Cuba and \$15-million worth to North Vietnam . . ." The latter is sad to include arms for shooting American soldiers in South Vietnam.

The briefest recital (even without TV presentation of the ill-will and geophysical embarrassment we have purchased at unbelievable cost should stir every American to violent protest and the demand that Congress put an end to foreign aid.

The time has come, not merely to cut it, but to cut it out!

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ONLY THE SENATE COUNTS

If it weren't for the obvious purpose of frightening out of his wits any US Senator who might, at the prodding of his own conscience and intellect, vote against ratifying the "test-ban" treaty, the spectacle of 30 nations, maybe 62, perhaps even 100 who have never spit an atom, and probably never will, queuing up to sign this deceitful document would be ludicrous.

Plainly, Bully Boy Khrush has reason to preen himself over this accomplishment, but it is hard to see why Messrs. Harriman, Rusk, et al. are so pleased with themselves. The Kremlin Kid, it will be remembered, overcame our nuclear lead during the previous "moratorium" on testing — when we didn't and he did. And now, he's all set to do it again! The bases for this assumption are:

1. Top scientific advice that, free of on-the-ground inspection, the Soviets can continue military testing undetected.

2. The Soviet Constitution (Article 49-0) authorizes the Red government to disregard any treaty at any time, with or without cause.

3. In the past 25 years, the US has entered into 52 major (and solemn) agreements with the Soviets — of which they have thus far broken 50.

Furthermore, Khrushchev seems confident that the non-aggression pact for which he has been beating the drum will automatically follow the automatic ratification of the nuclear test agreement by the US Senate. What assurance of this he has had from Administration spokesmen, if any, we are not privileged to know.

However, President Kennedy, in a special message transmitting the much-signed treaty to the Senate urged that body to "move swiftly" in its ratification, and declared: "This treaty will assure the security of the United States better than unlimited testing on both sides."

In his radio-TV address to the nation on the resumption of US testing last spring, the President pointed out that "our nuclear posture affects the security of all A-

DPS Warns Motorists To Accept New Speed Limit Law With Caution

Austin — The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety warned motorists today "not to take the new, higher speed limits too literally" when they go into effect August 23.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., reminded that "there are a multitude of circumstances and situations under which even the old limits were too fast for safety."

"With more than two-thirds of the Texas highway system under a 70-mile-per-hour daytime maximum speed for passenger cars and 65 miles per hour at night, we wish to appeal to all Texans to exercise keen judgment and drive reasonably and prudently regardless of what the signs say. The law prohibits driving a vehicle too fast for existing conditions.

"The Department of Public Safety believes that the objective of speed legislation is to contribute to the efficient movement of traffic on the highways. We feel the new law will help to accomplish this, and our objectives of enforcement is to secure substantial compliance with the speed law by all users of the rural highways. The prima facie speed limits fixed by the Legislature or established by zoning authority will be construed to be the maximum permissible speeds under normal conditions, and speeds in excess of such limits will be considered illegal.

"Our enforcement personnel will stop and initiate appropriate enforcement action against all persons observed by them to be committing clear-cut and substantial violations of the speed law."

Garrison urged motorists to be particularly cautious in assuming the higher night speed limit of 65 per hour. He said research by the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads shows that increasing night speeds from 55 MPH to 70 MPH doubles the accident involvement rate, and that the severity of accidents increases rapidly at speeds over 70 MPH.

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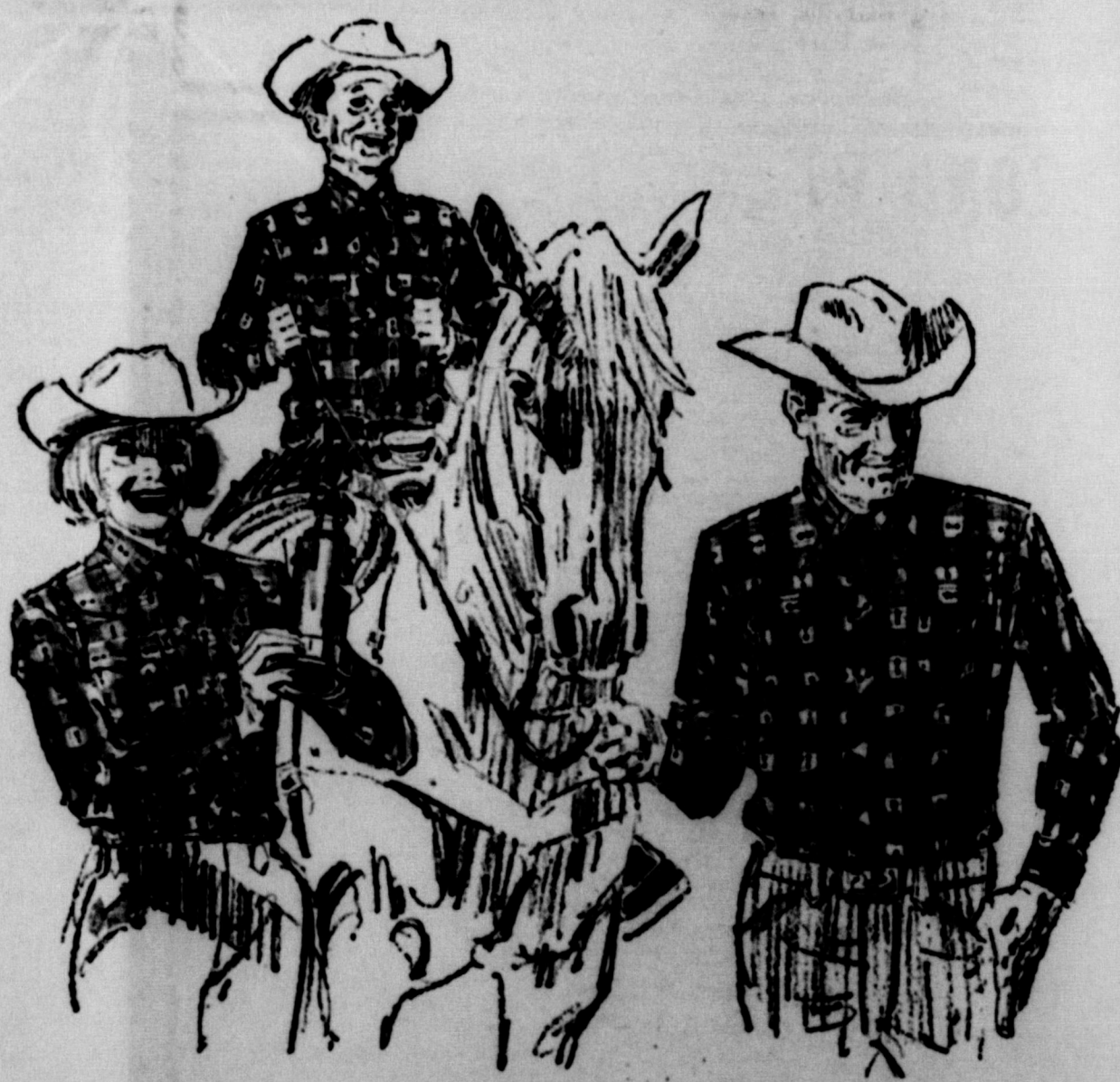

Well, I have just finished my fifteenth book, which will be out in February (advertisement), and probably have done more writing than this writer's school. But why should the spirit of mortal be proud, even of the four books in four years, if nobody knows about them?

And then, a number of months ago, there was a glowing report from one of those publishers who turn out volumes of biographical sketches on what would seem to be very prominent people. I had been chosen, they said, because of my writings. They had already compiled a sketch about me, and only wanted me to correct or approve it. I was doing them a favor, they said, by allowing them to include me in the book, and my inclusion was in no way contingent upon my purchase of a copy. However, they were enclosing an order blank, and for about nineteen dollars I could reserve a copy of the book with my name in it.

This is a lot of hogwash, and a prime example of what is called the "vanity publications racket." I

did not order a nineteen dollar book, since my name is in the telephone directory at no additional cost. And so far as I know, a beautiful friendship ended there, and my name was not included.

Maybe if it had been, I would not have received this letter from the writer's school.

But letters that ask if you've done much writing lately are really disturbing, because of course you haven't done as much as you intended to do, and they are a reminder that you haven't written the Great American Novel. They remind me of the time I went into a second hand bookstore in Boston, hoping to replace copies of the seven books I had had published at that time — mine had been destroyed in a fire. A clerk began hovering over me. I told him I was just browsing, but he became persistent, and finally I asked him if he had any titles by Allan R. Bosworth.

"Allan R. Bosworth?" the clerk said helpfully. "Never heard of him."

Well, you live and learn not to get the swellhead simply because you are one of the fifteen to twenty thousand people who had a

book published last year.

But things do happen to a writer. A long time back, when I was doing only short stories, a western magazine published my name and the fact that I was working for a West Coast newspaper. I received a letter from an inmate of the State Hospital for the Insane, which was in the same county.

"Dear Sir," the letter began. "I can see by your story in — magazine that you are a cattleman. I am a cattleman, too, and they have no right to keep me in here. Now, since you have become a newspaperman, you should have some influence with the Governor. I want you to get me out of here. If you don't do this for an old cattleman, I will damned well come around and take care of you when I do get out of this place."

Well, of course there was nothing I could do with the Governor. All I could do was sit at my desk in the newspaper office, and cringe and freeze every time a shadow fell across it...

Writers don't have to be crazy, but I guess it helps.

Our favorite fish in the Gulf of Mexico knows no particular season.

It is the flounder — one of the most unusual of all fishes.

This is a fish with many aliases, the most popular of which is the fluke. Webster describes fluke as a mistake. And that's what a flounder looks like.

It is a fish flattened by nature's steam roller in the process of creation. But it is a wonderful fish to catch and eat.

Flounder fishing long has been considered one of the favorite night fishing sports. It can be found in shallow waters, at night by the use of a Coleman lantern or a strong beam lamp of similar nature.

During the last few years rod and reel anglers also have discovered that bait fishing for flounder can be real sport.

A flounder will hit on most anything that will tempt a speckled trout. It will fight lures. Or it will nibble away at a live shrimp and finally take it with a grab.

You can catch flounder while fishing off boat docks. Also in the middle of Laguna Madre. Or in any of the backbay waters along the Texas coast. There is particularly good flounder fishing along the coast from Rockport south to Port Isabel.

Flounder put up a wonderful fight on light tackle.

Use Live or Artificial Bait.

Last fall Doug English, who makes Bingo baits was standing on the concrete wall of the basin around the Red Fish Lodge at Port Mansfield. He was just killing time while his boat was being reared.

Doug flipped a yellow Bingo alongside a concrete revetment. Next thing he knew he had a big flounder. He caught a half-dozen in as many casts.

Another time a group of biologists working down the intra-coastal canal decided to spend the night off Padre Island near the Port Mansfield cut. They caught flounder until they tired.

A group of Sweetwater business men, headed by Earl Webb, go to Port Isabel each summer. They fish in Laguna Madre in the vicinity of Three Islands and catch enough flounder in a couple of

Jays to fill their deep freeze. Usually flounder are found on the bottom, where they do their feeding in the mud. That is why in the fall of the year they move into the shallow waters, along the coastline, to feed.

Fish for Flounder Day or Night. There is tremendous floundering activity in the vicinity of Port Aransas during the early winter months. Hundreds of persons, wearing hip waders and carrying gas lanterns and gigs, work these shallow waters.

By shining the light down on the water they are able to see the backs of these flounders as the fish grope through the mud looking for small crustaceans. When sighted they are speared and dropped into gunny sacks trailing in the water behind the fishermen.

Although fried flounder is delicious, undoubtedly one of the most appetizing fish dishes served anywhere is a stuffed flounder.

Many seafood restaurants along the coast make a specialty of this delicacy.

Cooking The Flounder.

Stuffing of the flounder is simple. After they are cleaned and placed flat in a well-greased pan, they are slit down the middle of the exposed side. Flesh then of pulled back to make room for stuffing.

Stuffing is made of a mixture of onions, cracker crumbs and celery, held together with your favorite dressing or sauce. Once stuffed,

the flounder is placed in the oven and cooked until done.

There are many recipes in the cookbooks so you can take your choice. But whichever one you select, you'll be surprised at how delicious flounder can be.

And if you've never tried flounder fishing, give it a whirl this year. You'll have fun. It isn't hard work. Anyway, not too hard.

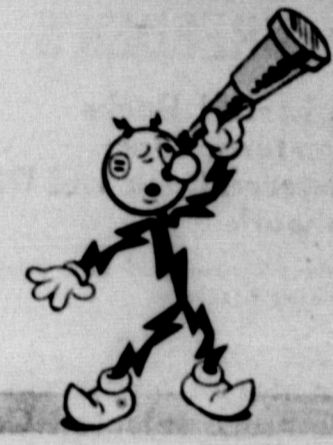

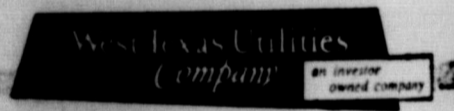

development of an attitude of complacency on the part of livestock men and a consequent neglect of all ordinary precautions against screw worm outbreaks. It could be that news about the screw worm developments in the screw worm eradication program resulted in complacency, with the feeling that the need for their continued vigilance and cooperation has diminished," the official was quoted. "Occasionally reports are being received where screw worms are working their lives out and failing to treat wounds are incurred. Sheep and goat owners have started and routine livestock management activities will soon follow.

Remember last year when screw worm incidence fell off in dry August? Remember how soon right back when it rained early in September? Well, the same thing could happen this year. Cases are extremely rare now, but as soon as cool, wet weather arrives, you can just bet screw worm activity will pick up."

County Agent Pete Jacoby urged area ranchmen who send in samples of larva notify him or Herbert Stewart, inspector, of the fact so that accurate records can be kept.

Austin, Texas—The Texas Safety Association today issued a "water safety alert" warning the public of potential water hazards and citing an apparent increase in drownings.

"Drowning is the fourth leading cause of accidental death in Texas, with approximately 300 fatalities a year," J. O. Musick, TSA General Manager, said.

"Reports for the past six weeks indicate an increase in the number of drownings over the same period last year, and unless water enthusiasts start putting safety first, fatalities will continue to increase."

Noting that many drownings are occurring in lakes, the safety director said anyone planning to swim, boat or water ski on a lake, should familiarize himself with the hazards of that particular body of water.

He also stressed that it is not just the persons who are already "in the water" who drown.

in or on deposit with the bank, if the drawer shall not have paid the holder thereof the amount due thereon within ten days after notice has been given to the drawer that the check has not been paid by the bank. This notice shall be in writing sent by registered or certified mail, or telegram, addressed to the drawer at the place listed on the check; therefore, all merchants should have the address of the check placed on the check by the maker at the time that the check is drawn.

In the event that a holder of a check wishes to prosecute under the new law, he may obtain a letter from the office of the County Attorney, located in the Court House Annex, for the giving of proper notice under the statute. He will then send the letter by registered or certified mail to the maker of the check and if, within ten days, the maker has not paid the check, he should bring the registered or certified mail receipt showing that notice was given to the maker of the check as set forth

in the law and file his complaint with the County Attorney.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1963.
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Sections 21-a and 21-b of Article III so that the same shall read as follows: "The Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of sums to (1) citizens of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years; (2) needy persons who are at least eighteen (18) years of age and less than sixty-five (65) years of age who are permanently and totally disabled; (3) needy blind persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years; and (4) needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility for such assistance; repealing the Constitutional limit on the amount paid out of state funds to individual recipients of Old Age Assistance and Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing that the amount for such assistance payments shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds for such purposes; providing that the amount expended out of state funds for such purposes shall not exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000); providing for the acceptance of Federal aid from the Government of the United States; providing for the necessary action, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication."

assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate is provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

"(4) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial aid for such assistance as such Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions herein set forth; provided, however, that the amount of such assistance out of state funds to each person assisted shall not exceed the amount matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended per year out of state funds for such assistance shall not exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000).

"The Legislature may enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder available for inspection, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed appropriate by the Legislature.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Sections 21-a and 21-b of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended and the same be hereby amended so that the same shall hereafter consist of one section to be known as Section 21-a of Article III, which shall read as follows:

"Section 21-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be deemed appropriate by the Legislature, for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate is provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

"(2) Needy individuals, who are citizens of the United States, who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixtieth (60th) birthday, who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps and not feigning for vocational rehabilitation; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided further, that no individual shall receive assistance under this program for the permanently and totally disabled during any period when he is receiving Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Needy Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children, nor while he is residing permanently in any completely state-supported institution; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

"(3) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and who are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance payments to the (1) needy aged, (2) needy individuals who are permanently and totally disabled, (3) needy blind and (4) needy children; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility; authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations out of state funds for the payment of assistance grants on behalf of the recipients; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Government of the United States for the purpose of paying such assistance grants; providing that the amount expended out of state funds on behalf of individual recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amount of money to be expended per year out of state funds for such assistance payments shall not exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000)."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance payments to the (1) needy aged, (2) needy individuals who are permanently and totally disabled, (3) needy blind and (4) needy children; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility; authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations out of state funds for the purpose of paying such assistance grants; providing that the amount expended out of state funds on behalf of individual recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amount of money to be expended per year out of state funds for such assistance payments shall not exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000)."

Sec. 2 The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be printed on the ballot and the date of the election shall be determined by the Constitution and laws of this State.
