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CIVIL RIGHTS AND LEGAL WRONGS

For the first time in the peacetime history of the United States, it is proposed in legislation now pending before the Congress to deny the right of trial by jury!

This is one of the more important (and least publicized) aspects of S. 1731 and H. R. 7152 — that legislative Trojan Horse named "The Civil Rights Act of 1963" — in which dictatorial Federal control of business, industry, individual citizens and the "sovereign" states is disguised as protection of racial and religious minorities.

Under this insidious bill, the judgment of Federal inspectors, appointed to bring about social reforms, would supersede our traditional and Constitutional judicial processes. Through the sly device of eliminating criminal penalties, those who drew the bill have made it so a violator of the "public accommodations" section (Title II), would be hailed without hearing before a judge and placed under Federal injunction to cease and desist whatever act of discrimination the Federal overseer may have charged him with. And the penalty would be fine or imprisonment for contempt of court — from which there is no appeal.

Given this cloak of civil rights, the President would thus have raw, unchallenged power. Similarly, under other provisions of the bill, Federal control would be extended to every home, every school, every business, every bank and to every citizen who owns property or casts a vote. The President — or his political appointees — would have the power to tell the owners of every business whom they may hire, fire, promote or demote; to call, foreclose or refuse loans; to exclude individuals and businesses from federal programs, activities, subsidies and benefits; to blacklist banks, contractors, schools, businesses and individuals. Think of that.

As one critic has said: "The Administration's bill proposes, in effect, that the Congress abdicate, and turn its legislative powers over to the White House. The powers here demanded are not the powers rightfully to be exercised by a President in a free country. These are the powers of a despot."

No citizen, whatever his color, race or religion — for this bill extends to all races and creeds — should need further urging to demand of his Senators (both of them) and his Representative that they vote down S. 1731 and H. R. 7152 — kill it all!

ed to Nathan Hale are mythical, then they belonged with Volt-airé's: "If there were no God, it would be necessary to invent him." We were a new nation; we desperately needed hero images and ideals to which we could cling. We needed a tradition, and we need it today.

You don't find the traditions, now, in our school books. A survey conducted by a weekly news magazine shows that before 1920 Nathan Hale was in eleven texts, but is now in only one of the new ones. Paul Jones was in nine of the old books, and in none of the new. Patrick Henry's immortal "Give me liberty or give me

death!" was in twelve out of fourteen of the old texts, and in only two out of forty five of those most recent.

We still let our children believe in Santa Claus until they are perhaps eight or nine, and for the columnist who denigrated Nathan Hale: let him reminded that one of the classic editorials of all time began: "Yes, Virginia, there is a

Santa Claus. . . . It is more than time to begin saying, "Yes, Virginia, there is a Nathan Hale, and he was sorry that he had one life to give for his country. Because you see, Virginia, that willingness to die for an ideal that made great, and it is something that must never be forgotten."

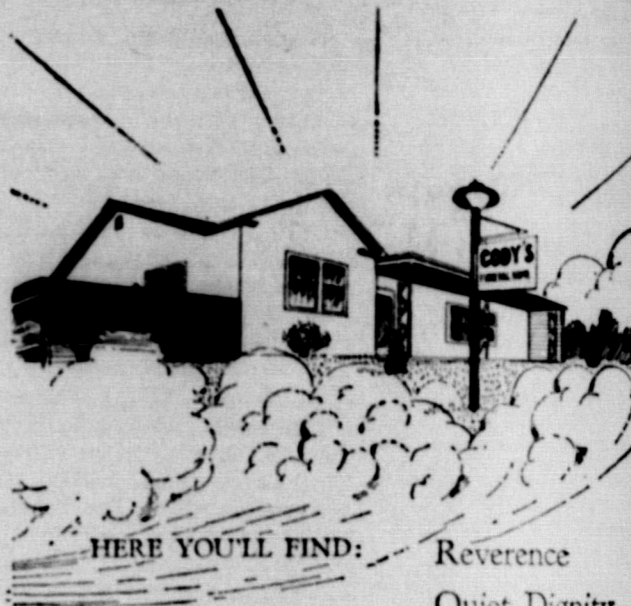

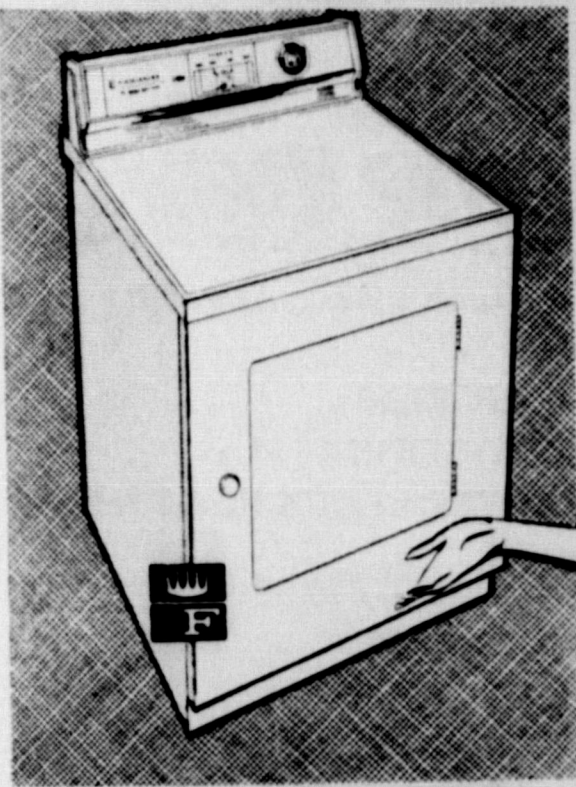

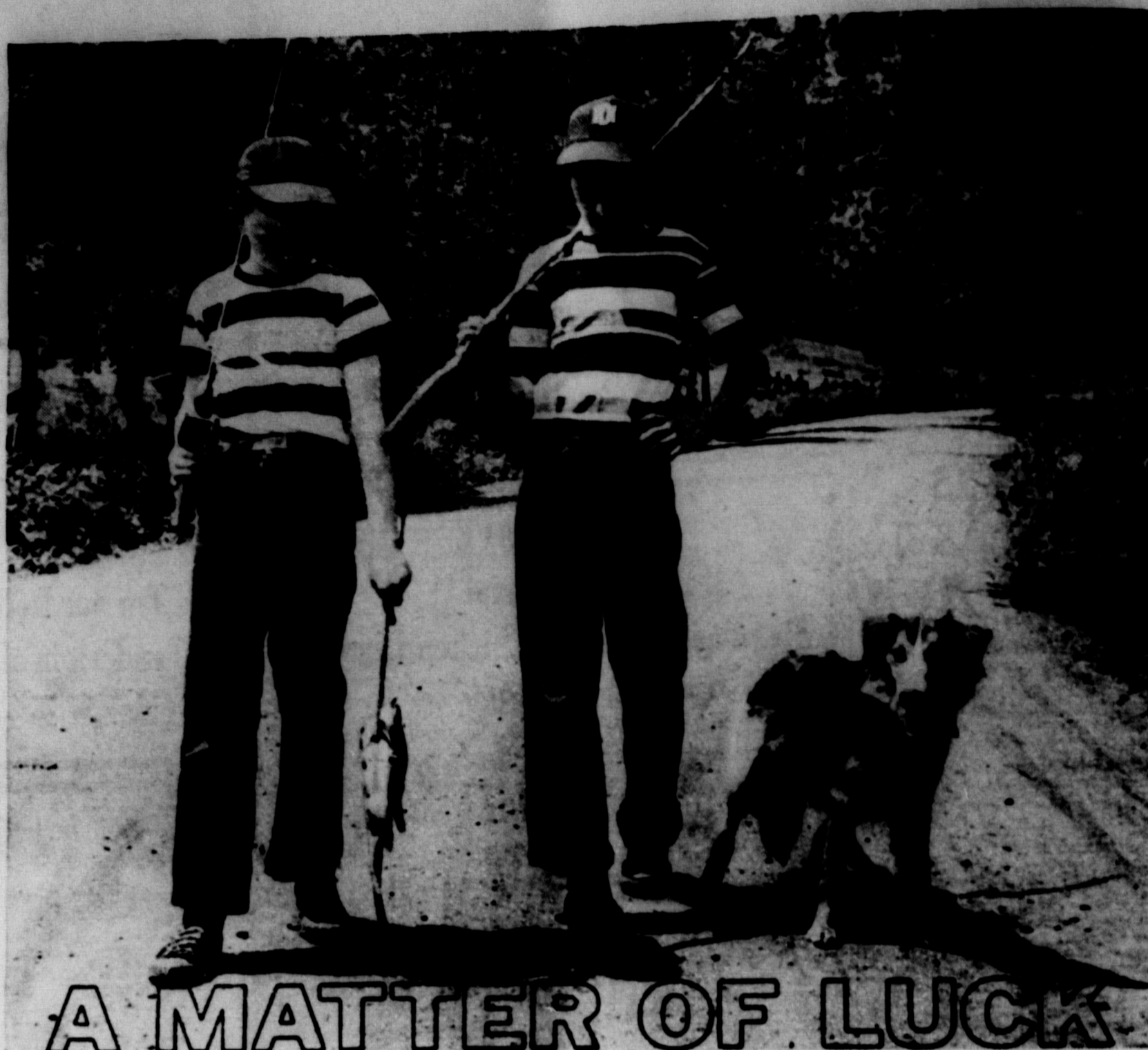

Crockett County Been Free Of Screwworm In Stock Since July 28

A full month in midsummer a screwworm case among stock in the entire county is reported to have been attained on August 28. A full month had passed since a case of screwworms had been reported in the county.

The last screwworm case reported in Crockett county was on the Max Schneemann, ranch north of Ozona, County Judge Pete Jacoby said. The "hot" drop of sterile screwworm flies from the Mission facility has been effective in stamping out the numerous isolated outbreaks being reported in early August.

The Mission plant is now turning out around 130 million sterile flies a week, the week of August breaking previous records with a production of 132,997,850. Officials predict even higher production will be achieved in the near future.

Stockmen are being urged to take particular pains to avoid infestation by treating all stock and spraying with Co-ral after fall work.

Reports from eradication headquarters at Mission indicate that the screwworm fly population is quite low at this time. Less than 60 cases have been recorded during August, compared with more than 5,000 reported infestations the same month last year. This low population, chances are, will build up considerably in the fall, and eradication workers are on hand.

agement and good weather will provide good quail hunting for Crockett county," the warden reported.

About the same summary was made on prospects for dove hunters. Dove hunting was poor in 1962 but prospects are for a more plentiful supply this year since more were raised and food supply has been better, all of which is calculated to "provide clean sport and good eating for Crockett county dove hunters this year," Warden Allen concludes.

There will even be fair hunting prospects for wild turkey, the Warden's report shows. Although the wild turkey population in the county seems to stay very low, the birds have spread out and raised this year but there has been a low survival of young. Fifty-four wild turkeys were killed in this county last year, and there will be some good turkey hunting again this year in the county, the Warden reports.

"Crockett county still provides good hunting for the sportsman," Warden Allen summarized his report. "There were 35 shooting preserve licenses sold last year, from which licensees realized \$20,000 in income. As you can well see, game still provides the rancher with a good income with no overhead to speak of."
