## Co. Employee Specially Burned Field Accident

### McAlister Suffers Wounds Over 85 Pct. His Body

Ray V. McAlister, 43, an employee of F. J. Callery, Inc., is in a critical condition in John Hospital in Galveston where surgery was taken for treatment of wounds suffered in a gas explosion in a field area in north-Crockett county early Monday.

McAlister is said to have received second and third degree burns over 85 percent of his body. He was enveloped in flames attempting to knock ice from a compressor in the field. Exact cause of the explosion has not been determined.

McAlister was alone at the time of the accident. Information gathered after the accident indicated that he had tapped an uncrusted pipe or valve with a tool to break the ice and a fire in the line sprayed him with gasoline and the flames followed his clothing in flames. Mr. McAlister ran more than a quarter of a mile in the field before he got help in extinguishing flames. He was brought to the county hospital and was immediately by James Fun-Hime ambulance to San Antonio and thence by plane to Galveston.

Reports from attending physicians at midweek indicated that slight hope is held for Mr. McAlister's recovery. His wife and children reside in Ozona.

## Youth Is Killed, Another Hurt In One-Car Accident

### Jimmy Phillips, 19, Of Lamesa Died Instantly In Sat. Crash

Jimmy L. Phillips, 19, of Lamesa son of Mr. and Mrs. James Phillips of that city was killed instantly and a companion, William Goolsby, 33, escaped with minor injuries when the car young Phillips was driving went out of control and turned over three times on Highway 163 about two miles this side of Juno, in Val Verde county, early Saturday evening.

Phillips and Goolsby were driving south and the car apparently left the pavement on the left side and when young Phillips jerked it back he lost control and the vehicle overturned three times, landing in a pasture adjoining the road, according to a report on the accident by investigating officers, Highway Patrolmen Jim Harvey and Joe Brownlee of Ozona.

Young Phillips' body was hurled 109 feet through the air, Patrolman Harvey said. He died of head injuries. Goolsby was brought to the Crockett county hospital where he received treatment for minor injuries and shock. He was released the following day.

The body of Jimmy Phillips was brought to Ozona in a James Funeral Home car and later was turned over to the Higginbotham Funeral Home in Lamesa where funeral services were held.

## Former Ozonan Dies In Plane Crash In Ohio

### Wm. Joseph Hubbard Killed When Company Plane Falls

William Joseph Hubbard 42, son of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Hubbard of Ozona and a pilot for Phillips Petroleum Company of Bartlesville, Oklahoma was killed in a plane crash in Finley, Ohio, Tuesday.

Hubbard was a graduate of Ozona High School and served in Civil Service for a number of years in Panama after graduating from high school.

According to reports from Finley, the Phillips plane on which Hubbard was serving as co-pilot, was scheduled to stop to pick up three officials of an industrial firm there, and had cleared for a landing when the crash occurred in a residential section of Finley. It was understood here that the pilot and two passengers in the plane were also killed in the crash.

Hubbard was born in Hammond, Texas but moved to Ozona shortly after and grew up in Ozona attending the public schools here.

Survivors include a wife Alice, two sons, Kim 7, and Cecil Kirk, 11, residents of Bartlesville, Oklahoma, his parents Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Hubbard of Ozona, two sisters, Mrs. Fred Summers of Oklahoma City and Mrs. Lee Crenweige of Midland, and one brother, Perry Hubbard of Ozona.

Tentative plans are for funeral services to be held at the First Baptist Church in Bartlesville, Oklahoma at 10 a. m. Friday after which the body is to be flown to Ozona for services at the First Baptist Church here at 3 p. m. Saturday. Burial is to be in Cedar Hill Cemetery in Ozona. James Funeral Home of Ozona will be in charge of local services.

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#### REDS GET TOLD

At long last a spokesman for the United States has rared back in the General Assembly of the United Nations and brought the Soviet members up to date on some modern history that Western nations have been allowing them to turn inside-out with-out rebuke.

Fed up with the incessant Soviet references to American imperialism, Sidney R. Yates told the Assembly in a debate on colonialism that the USSR is "the last survivor of the great imperial powers" and that while other countries have been liberating their colonies the Soviet has acquired a domain as vast as that of the British Empire in the days of Queen Victoria.

"Can the Soviet Union point to one single area it has given up?" Answering his rhetorical question, Mr. Yates snapped, "It cannot!"

The Russians and Communist bloc nations, he charged, were evading the real question of how to put an end to colonialism and befogging the issue instead with cold war propaganda.

It's a pleasure to hear that one of our boys laid it on the line and we hope that his plain talk stiffened the rest of the Western spines that are so sadly out-numbered in the East River KaffeeKlatch and Snickersnee Society.

But we'd still like to know when the Russians are going to pay their dues.

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### HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From State Capitol

Austin, Texas — Gov. John Connally is "back home" in Austin, after a 13-day stay in Parkland Hospital in Dallas. He has had what he termed "amazing" recovery from critical wounds inflicted by President John Kennedy's assassin.

As everyone knows, the governor didn't spend much time being purely a patient. Within a few days he had converted the hospital into a "Little Capitol".

Now the Governor is "officing" in the Mansion, across the street from the big state-government complex. His staff is working out of his business office in the Capitol.

People around the Statehouse say that Connally seems to enjoy working under stress. The month he came into office, he was forced to undergo a hernia operation. He ran the executive department from a hospital room then, too, and later from the Mansion.

It will be six months before doctors know for sure whether Connally will regain full use of his bullet-shattered right arm. It must remain in a heavy cast for 90 days. He will be unable to see visitors for several weeks.

### This Winter May See Final Eradication Of Screwworm In S'west

Mission — The number of screwworm infestations being detected in the Southwest is steadily declining and screwworm eradication workers are marshalling all available forces to overwhelm the livestock pest this winter and bring about eradication.

Texas farmers and ranchers have been detecting less than 100 cases per week; at the same time, production and release of sterile screwworm flies is reaching all-time high proportions. Last week, nearly 150 million flies were released.

During November, livestock producers in 84 Texas counties reported 860 screwworm cases. During the same month last year, 2,710 infestations from 163 counties were recorded.

Cold weather has apparently driven most of the native screwworm flies into the South Texas Plains area where they can normally survive the winter, program officials said. They expect, however, that occasional cases will occur outside of this "overwintering area."

A further reduction in screwworm cases because of high sterile fly production and weather unfavorable for screwworm survival, should speed the arrival of the day when the insect will be extinct in the Southwest, eradication workers declare. Assistance from farmers and ranchers, who treat livestock wounds and infestations and report screwworm cases, will allow that time to come even faster, they said.

### Immunization Against Tetanus With Toxoid Recommended By MDs

A committee on disaster medical care of the Texas Medical Assn. has outlined reasons for and urged the public to immunize against tetanus through use of the tetanus toxoid. In the hope that it may save a life, the Stockman offers below the committee's points:

About 50% of those who acquire tetanus die. Care of the patient with tetanus infection is prolonged and expensive.

Tetanus antitoxin serum given at the time of an injury is not as effective as tetanus toxoid immunization given before injury occurs.

Tetanus antitoxin may produce serious and even fatal reactions. Allergy to tetanus toxoid is quite rare and complications are mild.

Tetanus toxoid is 99.9% effective when properly used.

Any object which punctures the skin may cause tetanus. Many cases of tetanus have occurred from trivial scratches or wounds. Approximately 55 persons die from tetanus in Texas each year.

In Hamburg, during World War II, 10% of all bombing casualties developed tetanus; 90% of these died.

Among the properly immunized United States Forces in World War II, there was only 1 death from tetanus, while over 2,500 deaths resulted from this disease during the same period in our civilian population.

Two injections of tetanus toxoid one month apart, a third injection one year later, and then one every four years, could save millions of Americans in event of natural or man-made disasters.

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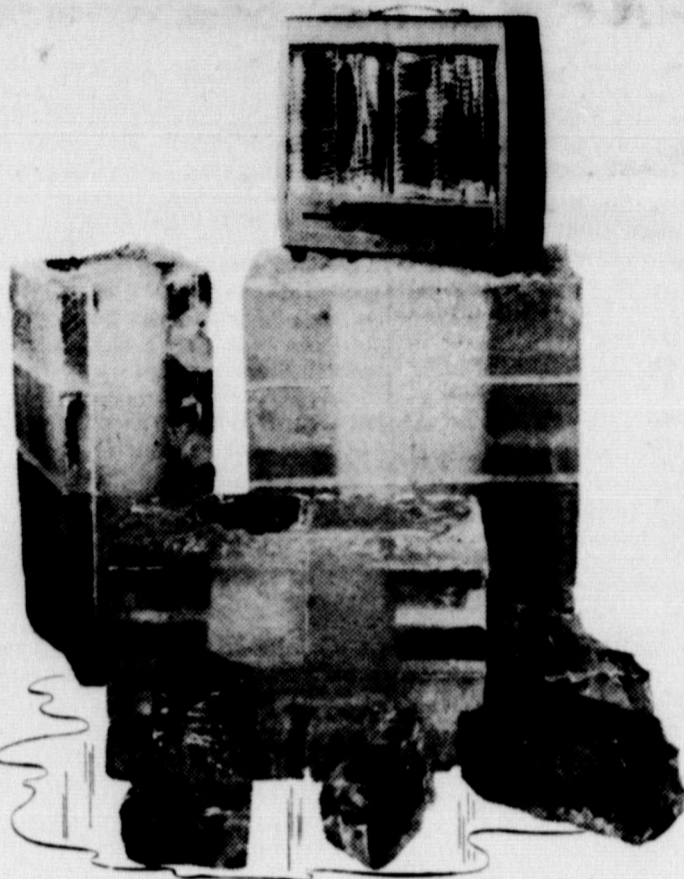

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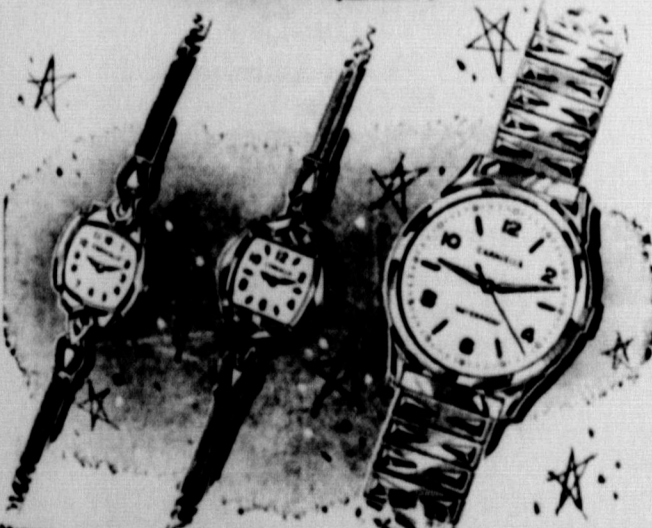

## Basketball Teams Make Clean Sweep Over Mertzon In First Home Appearance

The Ozona Lions, Lionesses and reserves all posted wins over Mertzon in Ozona Tuesday night as Coach Brooks Dozier's team made it home debut.

The Lions responded to the home court advantage by pouring 71 points thru the nets to drub the visiting Hornets 71 to 35.

The girls after posting a two point win earlier in Mertzon, were hard pressed to repeat the feat with Shirley Wagner's field goal in an overtime giving Ozona a 38 to 36 win over the Mertzon girls.

In the B game, Billy Carson led the Ozona attack with 18 points as the B team posted a 64 to 42 win.

The Lions started rather slowly and led at the end of the first period by a narrow 15 to 14 margin. But a shift in defense and a hot shooting streak in the second and third quarters sent the regulars to the bench for the final period as they limited the visitors to a meager total of 11 points in the two quarters while hitting for 39 themselves.

Leroy Cooper, Scott Mahon and Rodney Stewart led the big Ozona attack, Mahon finishing as the game's high point man with 15 followed by Stewart's 14 and Cooper's 11.

Cooper turned in a fine ball game for the Lions, doing a stellar job on defense as well as hitting well when the Lions put the game away in the second quarter.

Larry Baxter, a fine outside shooter, kept the Hornets in the game in the first period but Cooper took on the job of covering Baxter in the second period and the Hornet sharpshooter had trouble getting a shot off after that until the Lion senior left the game late in the third period. Baxter finished the night with 14 points garnered chiefly in the first and last periods.

Coach Dozier used all 12 of his suited out team and 11 of them broke into the scoring column.

In the girls' game, the Ozona team, was plagued with a multitude of errors that cost them the ball twenty-five to thirty times, but managed to pull into a tie in the fading seconds of the regulations game and score the winning points in the overtime to win their second two-points game of the season over the Mertzon girls.

Sandra Martinez provided the spark that sent the home team into a tie as she repeatedly stole the ball and rattled the Mertzon attack

to give her team a chance to come from six points behind to tie the score on Janie Gilliam's two free throws.

In the overtime, Shirley Wagner, who led the Ozona team with 22 points, hit a jump shot from the free throw line to put the home team in front to stay.

The boys B team was not close as Carson, Thomas Garza and Pete Garza teamed up to dominate the backboards and tally a large share of the points.

Mertzon's Tom Sellman, who went all the way for the visitors, was high for the game with 20. However, all the Lion reserves spent a part of the game on the bench as Coaches let all their charges get into the contest.

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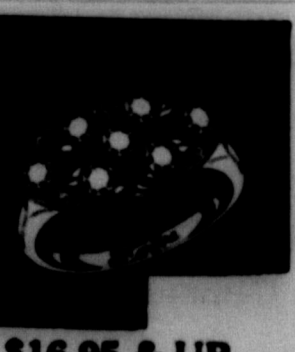

**Congressman  
 ED FOREMAN  
 Reports**

As you well know and understand, it has been a busy and trying time in Washington for the several days. We all mourn the terrible tragedy that brought to our President and painful loss to Governor Connally. Our prayers and support are for our new President, Lyndon Johnson, in the trying days ahead.

**Guadalupe Park**  
 This week I have arranged for meeting of the various parties involved concerning the establishment of a park at Guadalupe. On Thursday (12-12-63), representatives of the Rockefeller Foundation, New York; Mr. Glenn Biggs, representative for the property owner, Mr. J. C. Hunter of Abilene; Mr. Conrad Wirth, National Parks Director, and others from the Interior Department will meet with me here in Washington to discuss the proposed establishment of Guadalupe Park.

Mr. Lawrence Rockefeller has advised me that the foundation has little or no funds available for purchasing the property, but they will be pleased to meet with us to advise and discuss possible plans for the park development. As you know the Rockefeller foundation was instrumental in the establishment of the two large National Park Projects, the Grand Teton National Park, Jackson, Wyoming, and the Virgin Islands.

I believe, and have stated in the past that it would be good, and perhaps profitable, to have a park at Guadalupe. My only question has been "Where's the money coming from?" Therefore, I have worked to secure free enterprise interest and capital in bringing this about. I will continue to pursue this course.

Many farmers and ranchers have expressed their growing concern to me over the livestock losses due to the eagle problem. I have requested, along with Governor Connally, that livestock owners and their agents be authorized to take golden eagles without a permit in designated positions of Texas for a stated period to control depredations on domestic livestock.

According to the Interior Department, the letter has already been submitted for final signature to go to Governor Connally authorizing this action in 32 Texas Counties to be effective through April 30, 1964. Counties within the 16th District include Brewster, Crane, Crockett, Culberson, El Paso, Jeff Davis, Glasscock, Hudspeth, Presidio, Reagan, Terrell, Upton and Ward.

I expect that the Governor will announce this authority shortly. Under this authorization, golden eagles may be taken by any suitable means except by the use of poison or from aircraft.

**Continental To Drill  
 Strawn Wildcat Test  
 In World Field Area**

Continental Oil Co., Odessa, will drill the No. 1-54 L. P. Powell, an 8,300-foot Strawn wildcat in Crockett County, one location west of San Andres production and one mile west and slightly south of the depleted Strawn opener and lone producer from that pay in the world field.

Location is 660 feet from the north and east lines of 54-BB-TSRR. It is two miles east of Strawn production the World, West multipay field and five miles north-east of Conoco's No. 1-1 Shannon, recent dual Fusselman and lower Pennsylvanian pay opener.

The Joe "T" (Strawn gas) field of Crockett County gained its third producer and a 5/8-mile west and very slightly north extension with completion of Texam Oil Corp. Midland, No. 1 E. G. Baggett, 12 miles south of Ozona.

It was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 9.2 million cubic feet of dry gas per day through perforations between 9,002-121 feet. Gas-liquid ratio was unreported.

Location is 990 feet from the south and 2,080 feet from the east lines of 22-F-GC&SF.

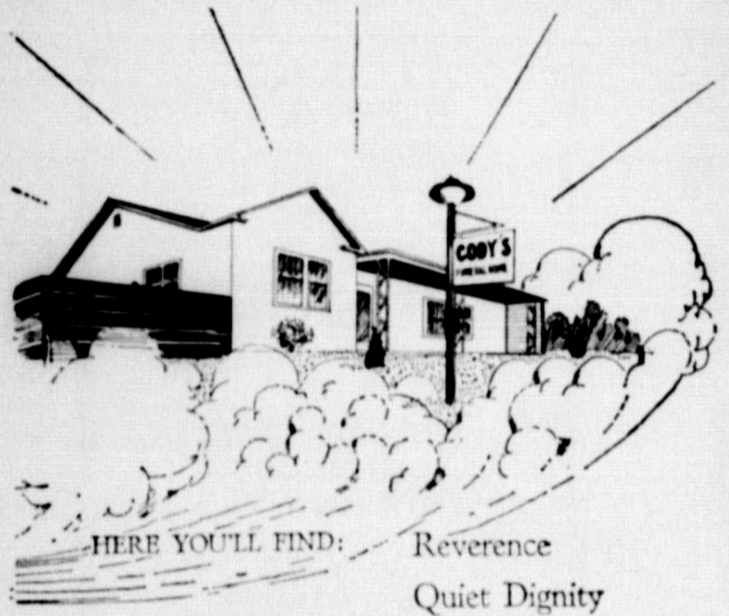

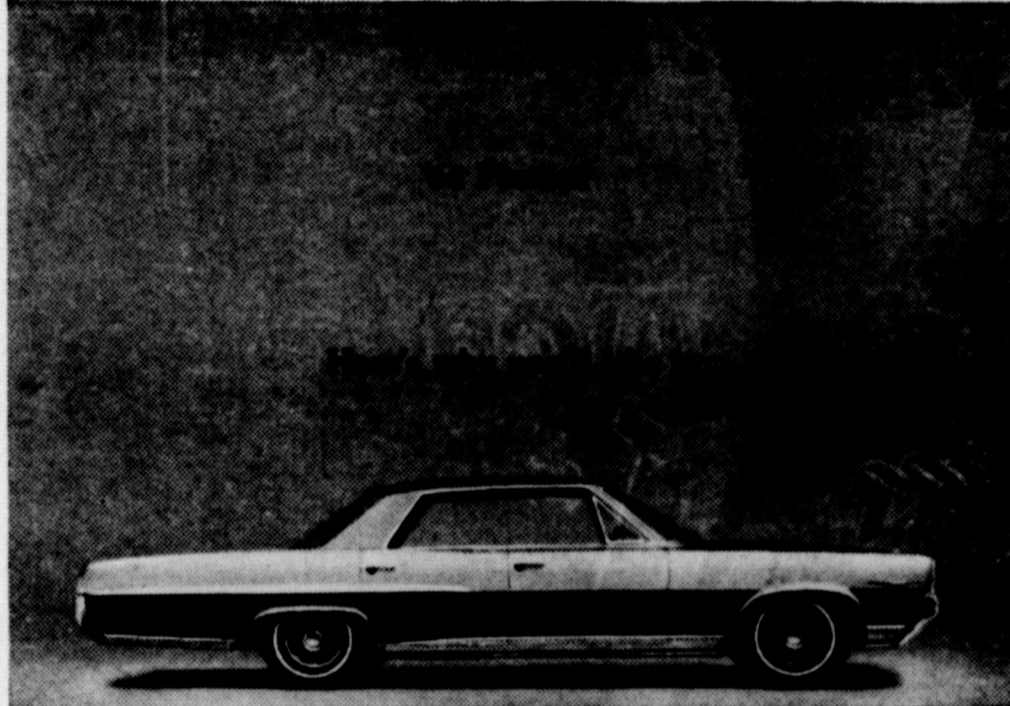

and Qualify yourself to vote in 1964. Since state voters rejected the proposed amendment that would have abolished the poll tax, you will need a valid poll tax receipt next year to vote in the Democratic or Republican primaries, elections for school trustees or any special elections that might be called. People over 60 years of age in this county do not have to have an exemption; 21-year-olds can get their exemption now or in anticipation they will be 21. They must have the exemption 30 days before any election they wish to vote in. Deadline for paying your poll tax is January 31, 1964.

A Reminder: If you have not already paid your County and State taxes, a 1% discount is allowed when payment is made in December.
