Fifth Crockett Co. Member To Win AGRA Award

Larry Williams, age 16, son of Mrs. Troy Williams, and Crockett county 4-H club member for eight years, has been a state winner in the 1963 4-H Range Management A-Program.

The 4-H club office announced Larry would receive expense paid trip to the Range Camp held each year at Junction, and a spur tie. Donor for the program is the Sheep and Goat Raisers' Assn.

Larry has for a number of years been successful 4-H feeder in beef cattle and fat hogs and has been active in 4-H work, winning many individual team awards in judging mohair, livestock, grass and management. He was a member of the state champion 4-H judging team at Texas this year.

Larry has carried on range management demonstrations on the ranches for several years, doing brush control work on an leased ranch in partnership with older brother Bill, who has named a state winner in this program several years.

Larry is the fifth Crockett county member to win the state award in range management. Previous winners were Bill Jacoby in 1951, Larry Williams in 1959, P. L. Ross in 1962.

In addition to his 4-H club activities, Larry is active in FFA, and work and is an Ozona high school football player.

The 1963-64 squad will have 15 regulars and one part time player back for the new season. Hoover will be without the much needed man, as usual.

Regulars returning this year are Leroy Cooper and Rod Stewart, guards, and David Jones a forward. Scott Mahon, lettered last season, will also be returning but the replacement and size of departed Roy Cox and Brent Moore does seem to be in sight.

Several other squadmen will return this year, including Richard Jones and Joel Huff, both of whom saw some service last year. The B team squad, several of whom will be making strong bids for varsity.

The Lions will enter the same tournaments this season that they have entered for the past few years, beginning with the Rankin Invitational in Rankin Dec. 6 and 7. From 2 through 4 the Lions are scheduled in the Big Lake tourney which will be in their own Jan. 16 and 17.

The 1963-64 team will open its season away from home on the court on Nov. 22 then will travel to Sonora before the Rankin Invitational. Following the Rankin Invitational the Lions will face Eldorado in their first home game on Dec. 9.

Doe Deer Permits To Be Issued Land Owners Nov. 11-12

Southeast Quarter Of County May Take 3 Does To Section

Permits for taking doe deer on an authorized area of Crockett county will be issued by Game Warden David Allen on November 11 and 12 between 8 a. m. and 5 p. m. at the warden's office in the courthouse annex.

New game regulations this year expand the Crockett county area in which doe deer may be taken, Warden Allen said. The area in which landowners will be issued permits to allow harvesting of limited numbers of does will be the southeast area of the county east of Highway 163 and south of FM road 33 (Midway Lane).

Landowners who wish doe deer harvested may secure a permit from the Warden. Hunters, in turn, will get permits from the landowner. Only three doe deer to a section will be permitted to be killed during the coming hunting season, Warden Allen said.

Deer are reported plentiful in the county and at present are fat and are expected to remain in good shape, at least until hunting season opens. Drouth may reduce numbers this winter but there is a good crop of fawns, Warden Allen said, and if weather conditions become more favorable numbers are expected to hold.

Crockett Voters To Vote On Amendments At Courthouse Box

Crockett county voters will vote in only one voting place in the special election set for November 9 to decide on four proposed changes in the State Constitution.

All voting will take place at the courthouse voting box, County Judge Brock Jones announced this week. The polling place will be open from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. and the Commissioners Court felt that as many as will be interested in voting in the amendment election will be able to vote at the courthouse during the day.

The first amendment, and one of great importance to the future of Texas, is that calling for repeal of the provision making the payment of a poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a registration system. The \$1.75 poll tax goes to the support of the schools of Texas and its abolition will reduce the tax revenues for school by several million dollars.

Two of the other amendments call for more spending in Texas. One, the Number 2 on the ballot again raises the ceiling on the amount of payments to the needy aged, disabled and needy children and the last would authorize the issuance of another \$150 million in state bonds to add to the Veterans Land Fund. The number 3 on the ballot is one of those "local issue" provisions giving Jefferson county authority to provide a retirement, disability and death compensation program for its elected and appointive officers.

Dr. Cox, Early Ozona Doctor, Former State Health Officer, Dies

Dr. George W. Cox, a brother of the late L. B. Cox, Jr., pioneer Ozona merchant and Crockett county rancher, and himself an early day practicing physician in Ozona, died Tuesday in Houston.

Dr. Cox, 84, had made his home in Houston with a son, since the death of his wife several years ago.

Funeral services were scheduled for 9 o'clock this morning from the Waltrip Funeral Home in Houston with burial in Corpus Christi beside the body of his wife. Surviving are the son and a granddaughter, L. B. Cox, Jr., of Ozona is a nephew.

Dr. Cox worked for a time on the ranch of his brother in Crockett county and later, after finishing his medical education, returned to practice medicine here for a while. He moved from here to Del Rio where he practiced twelve years.

Dr. Cox served as Texas Public Health officer longer than any man had before him, from 1936 to around 1950. He is credited with expanding that department from a small, impotent unit to a well organized department rendering valuable health service to the entire state.

Lions To Face Another Big Fb In Rankin Tilt

League-Leading Red Devils To Be Friday Night Foes

The Ozona Lions will travel to Rankin Friday night to meet the league leading Rankin Red Devils in their third district game.

Rankin, with the finest running fullback in the district, has rammed out wins over favored Eldorado and Sanderson to tie Big Lake for the loop lead and it has been the running of Jerry McDonald, 200-pound speedster, that has been largely responsible for the Red Devils' success.

Last year the Lions weathered out the hard charges of the big fullback and hammered the Red Devils by a rather surprising margin, and it can be imagined that the Devils, who have had meager luck with the Lions in the last 11 years, will be looking forward to getting at least some measure of revenge.

The Lions emerged from the Big Lake game with some bruised feelings but no physical damage above the usual bumps and bruises and should be at top strength for the Red Devils.

The chief task facing Coaches Fred Hickman and Sonny Cleere is that of cranking up some kind of offense that can at least hold on to the ball for awhile and give the defense some rest during the game (not that they would really get any rest since they are also the offense). The old adage that the best defense is a good offense has some measure of merit.

Coaches Hickman and Cleere were very blue after last week's game and were at a loss as to where to put the blame. But the truth of the matter is that there is little blame to be put anywhere. With only 19 boys and worse than that only four seniors, all of whom are relatively small boys, it is no accident that things have turned out as they have.

The Lions do have some fine juniors but half of them have only limited experience and if they stay on the job and work hard at it they are going to make a tough nucleus for next year's team, providing some able backs come through next fall.

Hagelstein Ranch Canyon Sand Oil Discovery Finaled

Shell Spots Location On W.R. Baggett Land For Exploration

Gulf Oil Corp. has completed the No. 1 Hazel Hagelstein, Crockett County Canyon sand oil discovery, three miles north-northeast of Ozona, 2 1/2 miles northeast of the Ozona, Northwest (Canyon sand oil and gas) field and the same distance northwest of a recent long extension to Canyon sand gas-distillate production in the Ozona, East multipay oil and gas field.

It was finaled for a daily pumping potential of 35.88 barrels of 42.5 gravity oil, plus 5.52 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 1-448-1. Gas volume was at the daily rate of 48,000 cubic feet.

Production was through perforations between 6,704-14 feet, and perforations between 6,615-17 feet, which had been fractured with 30,000 gallons.

Location is 660 feet from the north and 556 feet from the west lines of 5-OP-GC&SF.

Shell Oil Co., will drill the No. 1-20 W. R. Baggett, a 7,000-foot Canyon test, 1/4-mile west of the No. 1 Hagelstein, 1,980 feet from the south and 660 feet from the east lines of 20-OP-GC&SF.

Poll Tax Repeal Would Lead To Take-Over By Liberals, Says Writer

Repeal of the poll tax can result in block voting "by the cattle truck loads" and the capture of state government by a coalition of liberal groups, warned a long-time observer of the Capitol scene.

Preston A. Weathered of Dallas familiar with the innerworkings of state government for many years, said the totals of the liberal coalition included:

—defeat of Governor John Connally and election of liberal Don Yarborough as his successor.

—defeat of Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith and House Speaker Byron Tunnell.

—repeal of the right to work law and all other Texas laws which impose restrictions upon unions.

—enactment of a state wage and hour law and enforced arbitration of labor disputes.

—substitution of a personal and corporate income tax for the sales tax.

—enactment of a state civil rights measure even stronger than pending federal legislation in this field.

Weathered noted that some people arguing for repeal of the poll

tax are well-intentioned, added:

"But a means, however intended, to evil ends it comes evil.
