Most Of Ozonans May Not Be Able To Vote In 1964

Confusion May Cause Many To Overlook Payment

Unless there's a general awakening and an examination of reason on the part of many Crockett County taxpayers, a lot of residents who like to vote in the elections are going to be mighty unhappy when they find they are ineligible to cast ballots in 1964 elections.

All comes about because of the confusion attendant on the attempt to amend a constitutional amendment in Texas last fall to abolish poll tax as a pre-requisite to vote. The amendment failed of passage and left the status the same in Texas.

At the same time, tax collectors all over the state were asking taxpayers to pay their poll tax pending the outcome of the poll tax amendment in the general election. This confusion has resulted in many taxpayers who have not yet paid their poll tax.

As a result of this confusion, many taxpayers are accustomed to the years of paying their taxes along with their property taxes and thus have developed a habit of paying their poll tax from their minds the fact they have not yet paid the tax this year.

In an effort to call attention to this unusual situation, Mrs. Gerry Perry and her office staff in the office of Sheriff Billy Mills have mailed special notices to property taxpayers who have not paid their property taxes to failed that time, on instructions from the collector, to pay their poll tax.

This has resulted in a spurt in the payment of poll tax. Mrs. Perry reports that many have yet to come forward and she regrets when the election rolls around.

SMU Coach To Be Here For Lions Club Event Mon. Night

S. M. U.'s head football coach, personable Hayden Fry, will be the speaker next Monday night at the Ozona Lions Club annual All-District football banquet to be held at the Ozona High Cafeteria beginning at 7:30 p. m.

Coach Fry was the all-state quarterback for the Odessa Bronco's in 1946, when they captured the state 4-A school boy title. One of Fry's best known teammates on that eleven was Byron Townsend, who later starred for the University of Texas, and Steve Dowden a powerful tackle who played his college football at Baylor where Fry attended school.

Fry was noted, even as a student, for his astute football knowledge and even though he had the misfortune to play behind two of the Southwest Conference's great quarterbacks, Adrian Burk his first two years and the incomparable Larry Isbell his Junior and Senior years, Fry was used extensively.

Walker Candidate For Commissioner From Precinct 1

Incumbent Has Served Total Of 11 Years on Commis. Court

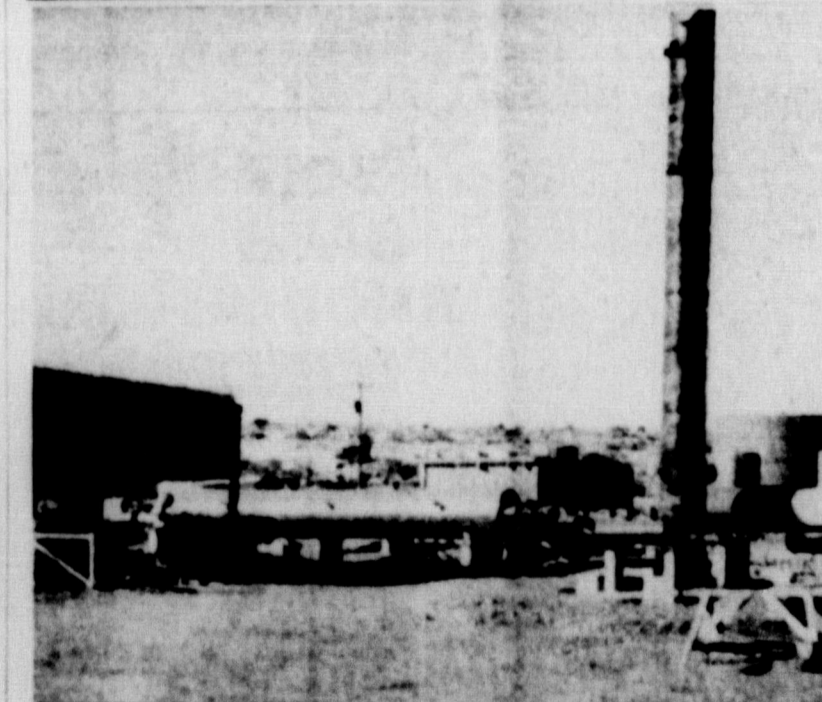
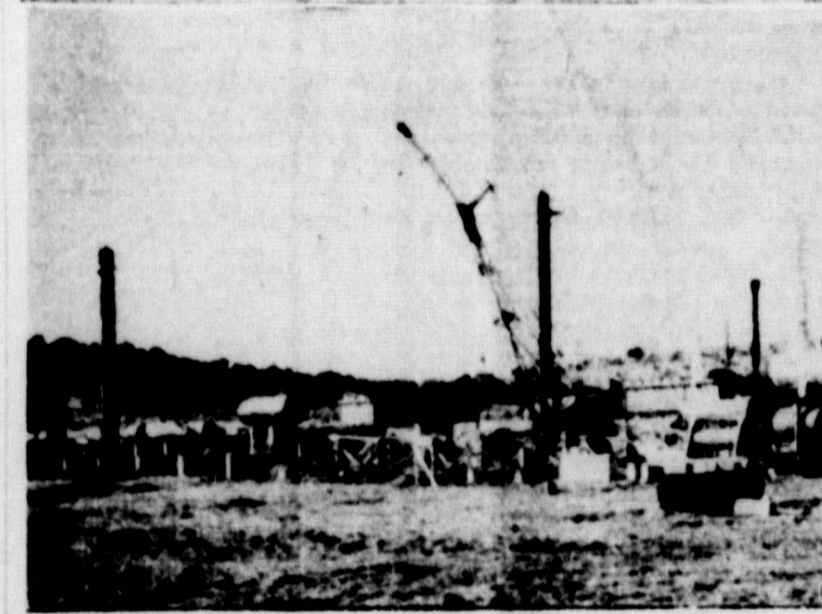
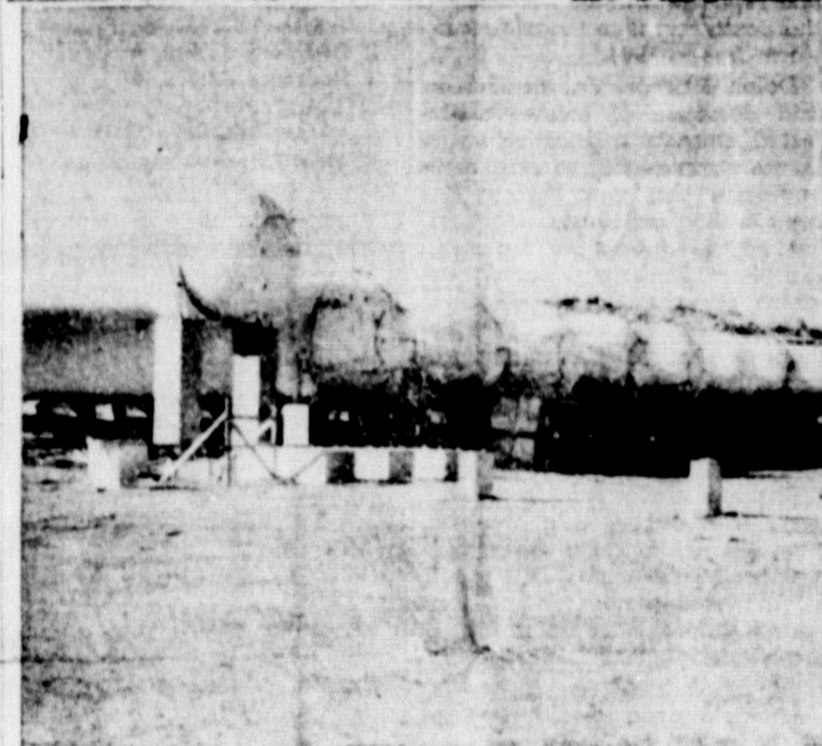
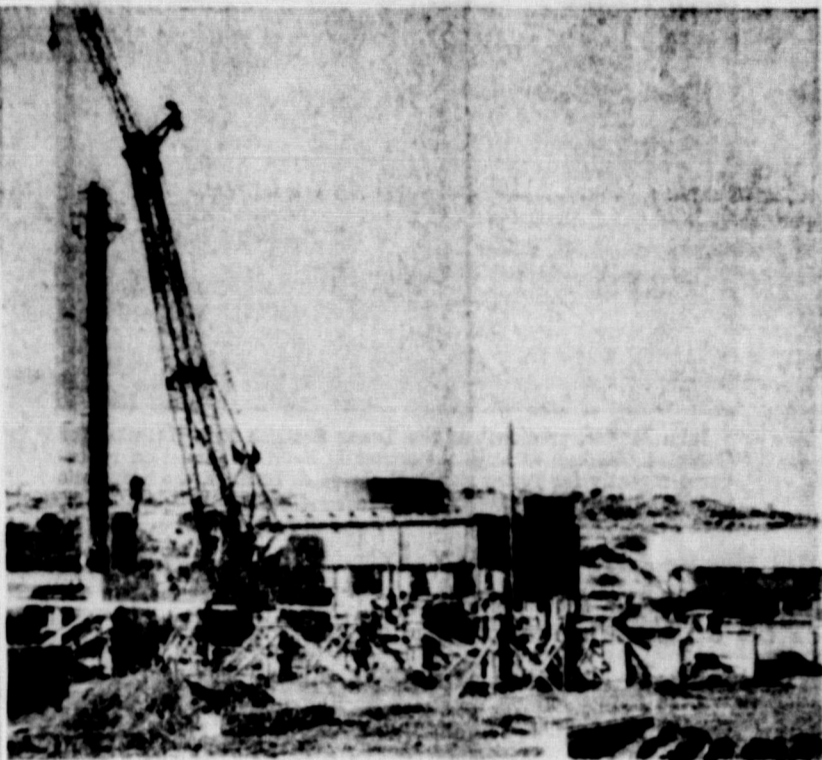
C. O. (Lefty) Walker, now serving his first term as county commissioner from Precinct 1, but a veteran of six years of service on the court, this week authorized announcement of his candidacy for re-election as Commissioner in Precinct 1.

Commissioner Walker served four years as commissioner from Precinct 2 while operating a ranch at the north edge of Ozona. The family later moved into Ozona, occupying the residence in southeast part of town, in Precinct 1.

At the death of County Judge Houston Smith, then Precinct 1 Commissioner Ralph Jones was elevated to the judgeship and Walker shifted to Precinct 1 Commissioner by appointment, elected to a full term at the next election.

Announcing a continued adherence to his creed of public service, "If you need me, call me," Walker asked the continued support of voters in the precinct.

"I have enjoyed working for you and I hope you will let me continue," Walker said. "If you call me and I can help you, I will. If not, I will tell you so. I will be glad if you'd call me any time I can be of service."



Construction Speeds Up On \$2 Million Gas Plant

A maze of condensers, heaters, stills, storage tanks, and other strange pieces of intricate machinery necessary in the treatment of gas from the prolific Ozona area gas field litters the 40-acre plot two miles south of Ozona where the Ozona gas plant is under construction.

Photos at left and below show progress of the work under way by crews of experts from the Stearns & Roger Construction Co. of Denver, Colo., contractors on construction of the huge \$2-million plant. At left a crane sets in place a 30-foot tall condenser unit while the surrounding area is littered with foundations, tanks, etc., where additional tanks and the like are to be installed.

The battery of 13 huge storage processing tanks, each a city block long, are already in place. Each of these giant tanks was hauled to the site on truck wheels mounted at the rear and towed by a truck tractor. Each was delivered without mishap save one which was dumped in the ear ditch just around the point at the south edge of Ozona, occasioning a sizeable pick up job.

Other photos, taken during progress of the plant construction, show heater and condenser units in place with other pieces of the processing complex.

The plant, to be served by a network of gas gathering lines yet to be laid, will extract gasoline and other liquids from gas produced from the Canyon formation. Construction of the plant, expected to be complete by April of this year, was initiated by Delta Drilling Co. and Pawley Petroleum Co., who, with other companies, initiated development of the prolific gas fields around Ozona. Information concerning the plant has been restricted because of difficulties encountered in completing legal work on formation of the new corporation which will own and operate the plant. A number of other interests are said to have entered the venture to form the new company.

Two residences have been constructed on the site. One is occupied by Henry Miller, who will be operations superintendent of the plant, and his family. Chamber of Commerce headquarters has received requests for housing information for some six or seven other families expected to be here to work at the plant. No definite information has been made available as to the number of employees to be stationed at the plant permanently.

Ralph Jones In Race For Old Job As Commissioner

Former Commissioner & County Judge Opposes Lefty Walker

Ralph Jones, former County Commissioner and Crockett county's fourth county judge in its history, this week announced his candidacy for Commissioner from Precinct 1, the post he vacated by resignation to accept appointment as county judge at the death of the late Judge Houston S. Smith.

Jones served nine years on the Commissioners Court as representative from Precinct 1. At the death of Judge Houston Smith, fellow members of the court elevated Jones to the judgeship to serve out the remaining year for Judge Smith's term.

Unsuccessful in his bid for election to a full term as county judge, Jones retired from public life.

"I feel that I can be of service to the people of Crockett county by reason of my long experience as a commissioner and my time spent in the county judge's office," Jones said in announcing his candidacy. "I will appreciate the support of all in the May 2 primary."

16 Voters Show Up To Elect Members Of Water Dist. Board

By a margin of 16 votes — that's all that were cast — two members of the Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 were re-elected in last week's annual election.

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From State Capitol

Austin, Texas — For the past three months, Texas has led the nation in the number of people taking a newly-developed, 11-lesson course in "Medical Self-Help."

Prepared by the U. S. Public Service, the plan is to train at least one member of each family in emergency do-it-yourself doctoring.

Thousands of Texans have been taught what to do until the doctor comes. But state health officials agree with federal officials that still more need to know what to do in case the doctor never gets there. Prime reason of course is in case of a disaster or attack.

Information or assistance in setting up a local program may be obtained from the State Health Department in Austin.

Courts Speak — In upholding the conviction and eight-year prison sentence assessed Billie Sol Estes, the Court of Criminal Appeals announced conclusions of importance to news media, as well as to attorneys and those facing felony trial.

Estes' attorney had complained of television coverage of the trial and contended that widespread newspaper stories on the case kept jurors from being open-minded.

Wrote Judge W. A. Morrison: "The wheels of justice must not stop merely because an accused is of such prominence that he and his alleged misdeeds have been publicized throughout the state . . . It is apparent that nothing beneficial to appellant (Estes) could be accomplished by changing venue countless times."

As to the controlled TV coverage, Judge Morrison wrote: "Under the facts certified, we fail to perceive any injury to the appellant as a result of the telecasting of the proceedings . . . Of the many cases coming to this court, we know of no case where the accused received better or more efficient representation than appellant in the present case."

Same Court declared "constitutional" the Sunday "Blue Law", passed the 57 Legislature. Court's ruling was in the case of a Houston auto salesman charged with vio-

lation of the Sabbath sales Statute. Under the 1961 law, a retail merchant may observe either Saturday or Sunday as the Sabbath, but cannot make sales on both.

Ruling is considered a setback for Spartan discount stores which is appealing a San Antonio court order curtailing its weekend sales in several Texas cities.

Texas Supreme Court threw out the effort of East Texas oilmen to have 35 civil penalty suits resulting from slant hole oil investigations tried in their home counties rather than Austin.

Cigarette Tax Revenues Holding — A federal study committee's report linking cigarette smoking to lung cancer and other serious ailments is slowing state tobacco tax revenues little so far, according to Comptroller Robert S. Calvert.

Calvert recalls that an earlier warning caused smoking and revenues to decline for about a month. An increase followed.

Last year's cigarette tax take hit an all-time high . . . \$90,400,000.

Oil Allowable Raised — Railroad Commission set the highest oil production allowable in 12 months when it put the February allowable at 29 per cent of capacity. It's an estimated increase of 25,249 barrels a day over January. Commission will invite top officers of oil purchasing companies to a March 18 hearing, to express their views on market prospects and other facets of the oil industry.

Whooping Cough on Increase — whooping cough — known in medical jargon as pertussis — is not the killer it used to be. But it still is causing a significant scattering of infant deaths and a spread of sickness each year.

Its incidence seems to be on the increase in Texas. During the first week of December, city and county health officers across the state reported 19 new cases of whooping cough, bringing the 1963 total to 2,312 — an increase of 530 cases over the same period in 1962.

Only five deaths due to whooping cough were reported last year, but the State Department of Public Health already has received reports of 15 infant deaths from the disease this year.

State health officials say whooping cough is a large problem in the first six months of childhood.

Will 1964 Be Screwworm-Free? Close Watch Required If '64 be Screwworm-Free

Uvalde, Tex. — Vigorous participation in the screwworm eradication program by Texas farmers and ranchers will be necessary if the Southwest is to become screwworm-free in 1964.

Dolph Briscoe, Jr., of Uvalde, said detection of screwworm-infested animals and collection of larvae samples will be even more important this year than it has been in the past. Briscoe is president of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, which spearheaded the drive to collect \$3,000,000 from livestockmen to get the eradication program under way two years ago.

Briscoe noted that several weeks elapsed with no screwworm cases being reported in the five-state eradication area. He cautioned, however, that during cold weather, screwworm flies in the pupae stage can remain embedded in the soil for extended periods; when they emerge during brief warm spells, new rounds of infestations could result.

A single undetected, unreported case could set the eradication program back for several months, Briscoe said.

"We must always keep up our guard when dealing with this insect," Briscoe warned. "The screwworm fly has shown a remarkable ability of taking advantage of any lapses in vigilance by livestock men."

He urged livestock producers to watch their animals closely and treat cuts or scratches that could become infested. After several larvae have been collected from infested wounds and mailed to the Mission laboratory for positive identification, wounds should be treated with insecticide.

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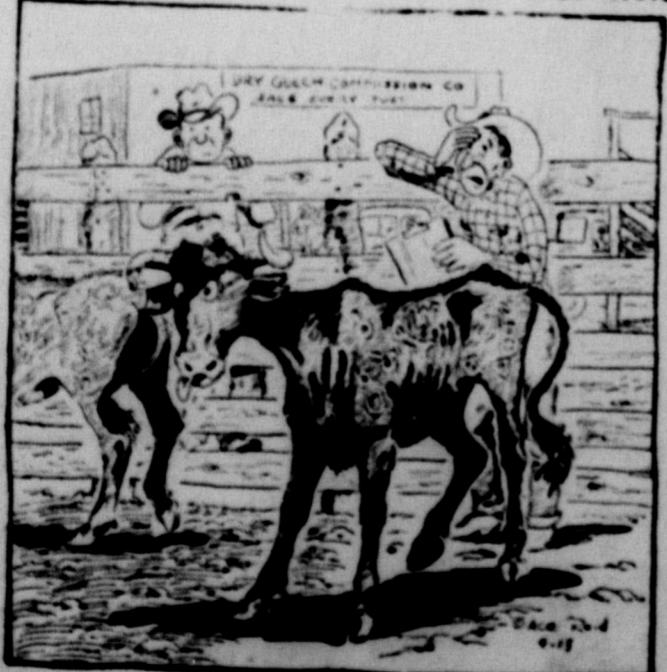
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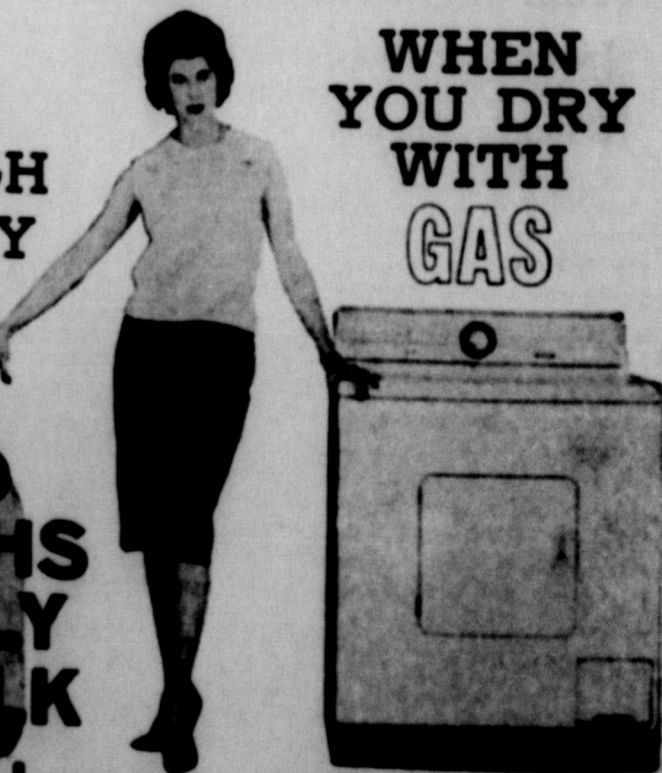
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Men Bowlers In City Tournament Thurs, Fri, and Saturday Nights

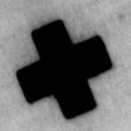

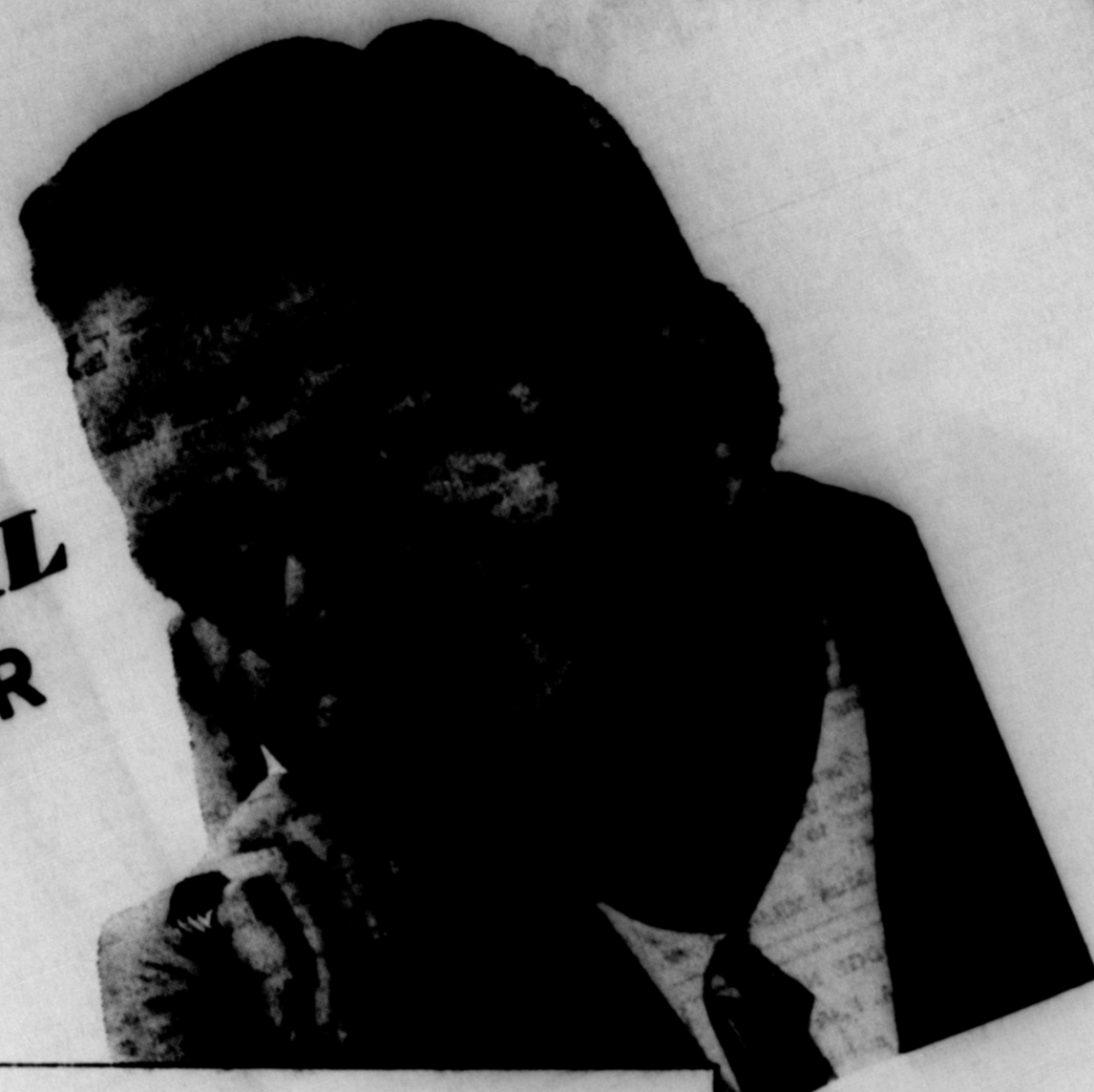

Miller Ranch Test Shows Heavy Gas Flow From Ellenburger

Pan American Petroleum Corp. and Highland Oil Co. No. 1 Miller Ranch, in 6-0-W. E. Jones, Crockett County Ellenburger gas discovery, 20 miles south of Ozona and 11 miles south of the Hunt-Baggett and Joe "T" gas fields, flowed gas at the daily rate of 4 million cubic feet.

Flow was through perforations between 11,601 to 11,614 which had been acidized with 30,000 gallons.

Earlier it tested through perforations between 11,70-680 feet, making gas at the daily rate of 1,426,000 cubic feet; and still earlier through perforations between 11,610-710 feet, making gas at the daily rate of 6 million cubic feet.

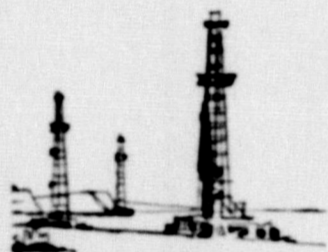

The icy fingers of a determined winter clutched inadequately clad Ozonans late Sunday night and Monday when this area experienced its first real "weather" of the winter. Ozona Bows Out Early Wall Runner-Up, Eldorado Consolation

The Big Lake Owls sparked by fine play from Johnny Howard, Alton Wilburn and Frank Horton won their third tournament of the year Saturday night when they downed the Wall Hawks to capture the title in the 33rd annual Ozona Invitational basketball tournament.

Ozona opened its activity in the tournament Thursday night when they defeated the Mertzon Hornets 54 to 39. The game was a close one all the way to the final quarter when the Hornet spark plug guard fouled out and the visitors fell apart. Rodney Stewart, Leroy Cooper and Scott Mahon led the Lion attack but on the whole the Lions did not have one of their better nights.

Named as all-tourney were, Rudy Menchaca, of Christoval the tourney's top shooter this year with 99 points in four games, Gary Pittard of Mozelle, Jerome Glass of Wall, Alton Wilburn of Big Lake, Rodney Stewart of Ozona, Richard Preston of Eldorado, Tino Noreiga of Sonora, Larry Blair, Eldorado, Randy Gray, Wall, and Johnny Day, Miles.

Crowds were off somewhat on Thursday but began to pick up on Friday, and Saturday crowds appeared to be better than at any time the last few years with a near full house on hand for the Saturday night finals.
