California Man Is Killed In One-Car Accident Near Here

Victim Pinned Under Wheel At Bottom Of Deep Ravine

Orvis Ray Day, 42, of Harbor City, Calif., was killed in a one-car accident on Bachelor Hill 25 miles west of Ozona Saturday.

Day, who was a passenger in a car driven by Huey Pierce Oliver, of Harbor City, was thrown from the vehicle when it struck a road post on a curve on the hill and a tire blew out. Day was thrown down a steep embankment and the car followed him, its front end coming to rest on Day's car in the bottom of the deep ravine. The car did not overturn.

Oliver rode the car to the bottom of the ravine and suffered minor injuries. When he was unable to do anything for Day, he climbed back up the embankment and attempted to stop passing cars to get help. He was unable to get anyone to stop but a motorist stopped in Ozona to get a man in the road on Bachelor Hill and Sheriff's department men went to investigate.

Justice of the Peace A. O. Fields pronounced the man dead at the scene. It was necessary to summon a wrecker to the scene before the car could be lifted from Day's car. Oliver was admitted to Crockett County Hospital for examination.

Day's body was taken to James Earl Home and was later shipped to California. He is survived by his wife and four children living in Harbor City. Both men were on their way to Navasota to a job.

County Judge Brock Jones, Commissioner Rusty Smith and Chamber of Commerce representatives Oscar Kost and Troy Williams left this morning to join members of the Val Verde Commissioners Court and Del Rio Chamber of Commerce men in the meeting with the Commission.

Winding, narrow State Highway 163 south from Ozona has needed widening and straightening for years, but with the increased traffic load and still greater increase in store when Amistad lake is created, it has become imperative that improvements be made at once on the highway.

The Austin hearing was set up by the Commission at the request of County Judge Jim Lindsey of Val Verde county. Officials and road boosters from both counties are agreed on the route and will press for early action by the Highway Commission.

Lions Pull Upset Win Over Rankin In District Play

Win After 49-42 Loss To Powerful Big Lake Owls Fri. Night

The Ozona Lions, led by co-captains Rodney Stewart and Leroy Cooper, pulled the first major upset of the 1963-64 title chase in Ozona Tuesday night when they defeated the Rankin Red Devils 47 to 39 in a tightly played ball game.

The Red Devils, who had visions of still getting a share of the title even though they lost a narrow 76 to 73 decision to Eldorado in Eldorado Friday night, saw those hopes go glimmering as the Lions continued their ball control style basketball, playing tight defense and holding for a good shot.

First Rainfall Of New Year Registered Here; Overnight Total Is .7

First rainfall of 1964, and for some time before that, as a matter of fact, fell in Ozona last night and Wednesday morning.

Moisture reached a total of .7 of an inch in the water works gauge, with .06 of an inch to be added for the slow, soft fall of early Wednesday morning.

The rain clouds moved in before daylight Wednesday but cleared up during the day. But with nightfall, the clouds re-assembled and slow falling light rains, interspersed with thunder showers continued through most of last night to bring the much needed moisture.

Ozona Man Is Killed By Lawman's Bullet

Jose Galan, 43, father of seven children, was shot and killed here Saturday night after he apparently went berserk, barricaded himself in his home and fired one shot from a rifle before he was felled by a lawman's bullet.

Crockett County Sheriff Billy Mills said one of Galan's children called the sheriff's office around 2:30 a. m. to report that her father was beating her mother and threatening the children.

Deputy Sheriff Lavon Parker went to the home to investigate

and reported that Galan was barricaded in the home and refused to come out. Deputy Parker called Sheriff Mills, who, with Deputy Rex Fenton had gone to investigate an accident on west Highway 290.

When the other officers arrived, Sheriff Mills said, he and Parker went to the front door. Galan showed the rifle through the door, pointed it in Mills' face, he said. Sheriff Mills grabbed the rifle barrel and attempted to wrest it from the man's grasp. Mills said the rifle went off as he deflected it, the bullet going over his shoulder. Both Sheriff Mills and Deputy Parker fired one shot each at Galan. What is thought to have been Parker's bullet struck Galan in the front portion of his throat. He died instantly.

Texas Ranger L. H. Purvis of Sonora was called immediately to conduct an inquiry into the shooting. Information is being assembled for presentation to the grand jury at its next meeting. Statements have been taken from members of the Galan family and from officers at the scene.

Funeral services for Galan were held at 4 p. m. Sunday from the Assembly of God Church here, with Rev. Santos Becerra officiating and assisted by Rev. Dionicio Gonzales, local pastor. Burial was in Ozona Cemetery under the direction of James Funeral Home.

Galan was born March 26, 1920, in Del Rio and had lived in Ozona the past 20 years.

Survivors include his widow; three daughters, Enriqueta, Ludivina, and Mariena Galan all of Ozona; four sons, Francisco, Javier, Andy and Jose Galan, all of Ozona; four brothers, Ruben, Armando, Oscar and Sebero Galan; two sisters, Guadalupe and Olga Galan, and his mother, all of Ciudad Acuna, Mexico.

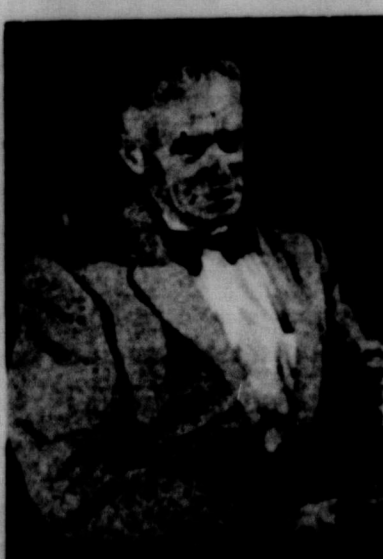
Foreman Announces For Re-Election To Congressional Post

Young Odessa Conservative Attracts Nationwide Attention

Congressman Ed Foreman, Odessa Republican, today announced for re-election as U. S. Representative for Texas' 16th Congressional district. Foreman, 39, recently honored as one of America's Ten Outstanding Young Men, stated, "I believe the people of this country, as well as our national economy, can best be improved by stimulation and encouragement of our free enterprise system. My convictions in support of a strong, healthy free enterprise economy and limited federal government have not changed. This kind of program and goal, I will continue to pursue and support with all my energies."

Immediately upon his election to Congress in 1962, Congressman Foreman was appointed to a post on the powerful House Armed Services Committee, an unusual key assignment for a new member. Foreman is the only southern Republican member of this prestige committee. He also serves as the Texas Representative on the National Republican Congressional Committee.

Early in the first session of the 88th Congress, Foreman, an experienced business leader and a civil engineer, was credited with the direct savings of over \$5 million in the single item purchase of Army helicopters. Congressman Foreman has been an effective supporter of the oil and gas industry and the preservation of the percentage depletion principle. Filing deadline for Texas primaries is February 3, Congress and other state officials do think the high court will interfere with election machinery already in progress.

Last October a Houston federal court held Texas congressional district boundaries unconstitutional since they are not based on population.

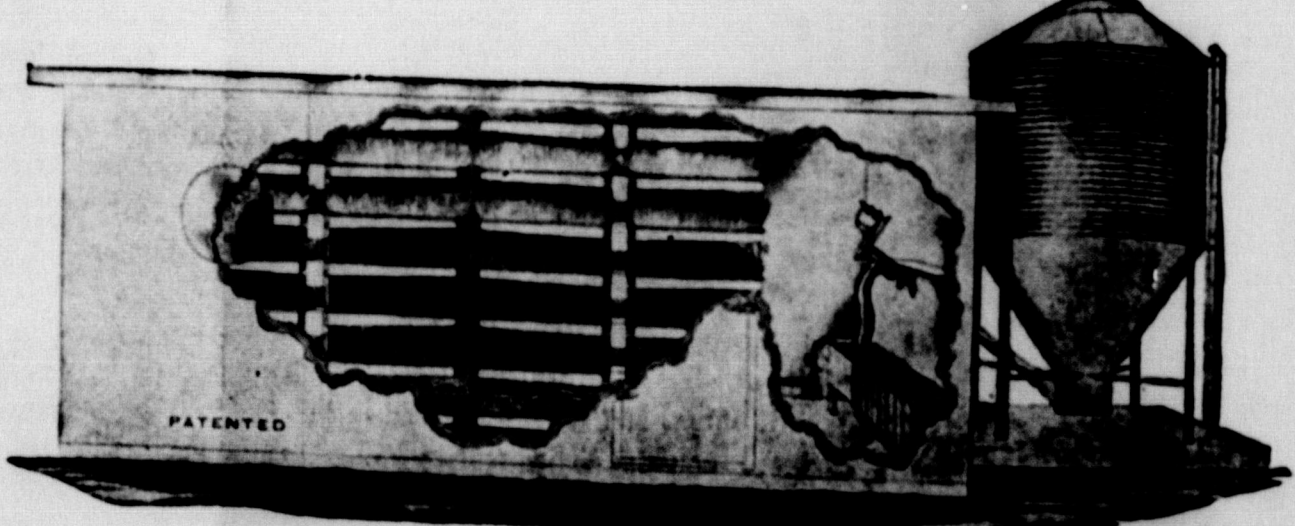

Stockman, Jan. 31, 1935
