Ozona Community Center will have an open house Sunday, Feb. 8, from 3 to 4:30 p. m., and the public is invited to visit and see the repairs and improvements that has been done and also the new home recently for the staff's living quarters.

Ozona community has worked hard to make these things happen and the staff members announced that it is in operation and with deepest gratitude that the open house is being held.

The Center serves on an open basis and averages over 150 people daily in organized activities. Following services and activities are available: Pre-kindergarten, play groups, parents' study discussion groups, driver's education, English, citizenship classes, sewing, study hall, reading and crafts, playground, and T. V., food preparation, sewing, Alcoholics Anonymous, library, counselling, and Scouting. This program changes as needs arise and is determined by the Center.

The Center is a project of the Division of the Board of the Methodist Church and is governed locally by a Board of Officers which meets monthly and is comprised of representatives from the total community. Miss P. T. A. is director and Miss P. T. A. is program director. They have served the Center for seven years.

## Ozona Girls Chalk Up Second Dist. Win With Victory Over Sanderson

The Ozona high school girls basketball team scored their second district 3-A win Tuesday night when they gained a measure of revenge against the Sanderson girls winning a 42 to 28 decision.

The game started much like the first contest in Sanderson a month ago in which the Sanderson team rallied from well behind to win a narrow decision. But this time there was no rally and coach Butch Murdock was able to use his reserves in the final quarter.

Shirley Wagner, who has been the Ozona team's leading scorer this season, led the Ozona attack with 23 points while the Sanderson team was led by Pixie Mansfield with 10 points.

The shooting of Wagner Alford, and Gilliam gave Ozona a first quarter lead which was cut considerably by a warm Sanderson second quarter. But after the third quarter saw the home team hold on to its lead and extend it to 11 points, the game developed into a rout in the final period.

The game left the Ozona team with a 2 won and 1 lost district record with two games to go. Eldorado, with a 3 and 0 record, is leading the district and the two teams will meet in Eldorado Friday night with the winner a strong favorite for the title.

A win by Eldorado would give them the title outright while an Ozona win would throw the district chase into a tie. Eldorado, having scored a overwhelming win over the Ozona team in Ozona earlier, will be considered almost a cinch to drop Ozona and clinch the title.

## Despite Confusion, Near Record Total Voter Registration

### 1,286 Registered Voting Strength For 1964 Elections

In spite of all the confusion generated by the adoption of the anti-poll tax amendment to the U. S. Constitution and the defeat by Texas voters of a state anti-poll tax amendment, Crockett county voters registered heavily in the waning days of the poll tax paying period to be sure and qualify for all kinds of elections that might be forthcoming in this year of 1964.

To the final deadline for paying poll taxes, there had been issued 1226 regular poll tax receipts and 60 exemptions for a total registered voting strength of 1,286. In addition to this number will be a possible 50 to 100 overage exemptions who are not required to get an exemption certificate to vote.

This figure, as announced by Mrs. Gertrude Perry, office deputy in the office of Sheriff Billy Mills, compares with 888 regular polls in 1962, plus 20 exemptions. The 1961 registration total was 1173 regular polls and 29 exemptions while the last presidential election year of 1960 saw a slightly higher voter registration of 1318 regular polls and 33 exemptions.

### Lions Make It Three In Row For 4-2 District Record

The Ozona Lions ran their district 3-A record to four wins and two losses over the Friday to Tuesday span during the last week as they extended their win streak to three in defeating Iraan in Iraan last Friday and Sanderson at home Tuesday night.

The Lions turned in a hot second half to down the Braves on their court. Rodney Stewart, Leroy Cooper, and David Childress led the scoring parade with an able assist from returning regular Scott Mahon, who tallied seven straight points in the final few minutes of the last quarter.

Stewart had 13 points to lead the Lions but the scoring was well divided as the Lions used a balanced attack to post the win.

In the shooting department, the Lions were not very warm, taking 46 shots and hitting on only 14 efforts but they made up for some of that by hitting a good 19 of 30 free throws.

The Lions slowed the contest down all the way and the slow tempo became increasingly troublesome to the Braves, who began to make mistakes after mistakes, losing the ball to the Lions 13 times on steals over and above the more than usual number of violations.

The Lions made only 12 errors themselves with four of those in the final minutes of play, after the game was decided.

Ozona started hot and led at the quarter but had a poor second period and trailed 21 to 14 at the half. The third quarter, however, saw the Lions get hot and grab the lead again and then pull sharply away in the final period.

In rebounding, the Lions picked off 21 on defense and 14 on offense, with Stewart getting five each and Cooper five on defense and three on offense. Joel Huff played a strong game for the Lions, getting 6 points, 1 steal, four rebounds and playing a strong game on defense.

Tuesday night the Lions used a big fourth quarter to sew up their third straight win as they downed the Sanderson Eagles 52 to 34.

## New Motor Vehicle License Plates Go On Sale Here Feb. 1

The 1964 motor vehicle license plates went on sale at the local tax collector's office effective Feb. 1. Motorists have two months in which to buy the new plates and install them on their cars or trucks.

The 1964 plates are a reversal of the 1963 plates in color combination. The new plates will be white letters on a black background.

The prefix letters for Crockett county will be KJ and the passenger car plates assigned this county begin at 8900.

Mrs. Gertrude Perry, Chief Office Deputy in the office of Sheriff Billy Mills, called attention to the law's requirement that vehicle owners must present copies of their certificates of title and registration papers before new plates can be issued.

## Two Races Up For Voter Decision In Crockett Politics

### Precinct 1 Commissioner Race, Sheriff's Only County Contests

Voters of Precinct 1 in Crockett county will have the decision on selecting a County Commissioner and county-wide the voters will face a decision in the sheriff's office as the only local contests in the 1964 elections.

Incumbent Precinct 1 Commissioner C. O. (Lefty) Walker is being opposed by two candidates. Ralph Jones, former Commissioner from the precinct who stepped up by appointment of the court to become county judge at the death of Judge Houston Smith, is seeking the commission post. Doyle Perdue, the other announced candidate, is in the running for the post.

Sheriff, Tax Assessor and Collector Billy Mills has announced as a candidate for re-election to a third term in the office. Sheriff Mills, who has attended a number of law enforcement schools in his many years as an officer, served for a number of years as Deputy Sheriff under former Sheriff V. O. Earnest. He has since served four terms, or a total of eight years in the office.

Filing for a place on the primary ballot a few hours before the deadline Monday for the sheriff's office was Delbert Stewart.

Unopposed candidates will be Precinct 3 Commissioner Rusty Smith, and Constable Gene Williams. County Attorney Robert Owen has not filed for re-election and is understood to be planning on moving away from Ozona in the near future. No other eligible attorney being a resident of the county, the office of county attorney will again become vacant if Mr. Owen leaves.

Districtwise, voters will find a contest for State Representative from the 66th District. Incumbent James E. (Jim) Nugent is being opposed in his bid for re-election by Jerry Shurley, Sonora attorney, who was a candidate for the office when Nugent first won election.

District Attorney Dixon Mahon of the 112th Judicial District must run for re-election this year but will be unopposed in the Democratic primary.

State Senator Dorsey B. Hardestad of San Angelo is to be opposed by a woman candidate from San Angelo.

## Red Measles Outbreak Causes Heavy Absentee Record in Lower Grade

School attendance in the first three grades in the Ozona Public schools has been below normal for the past few weeks due to an unusually heavy siege of the red measles it was revealed this week.

Even though no accurate count is made of what type illness is affecting students who are out of the Ozona schools, it is readily apparent that a big part of the forty to sixty youngsters out of school due to illness this week were out due to the old-fashioned type red measles.

School officials pointed out that wet, cold weather for the past week also added to the absentee total and to the delayed return to school of a number of pupils who have recovered from their bout with illness.

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### HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From State Capitol

Austin, Texas — A controversial section of the new Texas Regulatory Loan Act, passed last year after 3 years of legislative wrangling over loan control, has been declared unconstitutional.

District Judge Herman Jones of Austin held invalid the provision that at least 51 per cent of stock in lending firms operating in Texas must be owned by Texans.

Jones emphasized this was the only section of the 1963 act affected by his ruling in a suit brought by three out-of-state firms.

Park Improvements Started — Tuesday's ground-breaking ceremonies at Falcon State Park in Starr and Zapata Counties near Zapata launched a three-park improvement program which will cost \$1,041,966.

The \$279,416 in improvements at Falcon will include a boat ramp, parking area, paved road, 24 shelters, 50 tent campsites with water, cooking grills, tables, three restrooms with showers and laundry units, ranger's residence and concession building.

Similar improvements are planned for Dam "B" Park near Jasper in East Texas and Lake Whitney State Park in Central Texas, according to J. Weldon Watson, Parks and Wildlife Department executive director.

Library Additions — Texas State Library last week obtained an historic treaty and an historic suit of clothes. Both are certain to be viewed by thousands in years ahead.

The Library received a certified State Department copy of the El Chamizal treaty signed by President John on December 29 — defining the boundary along the Texas-Chihuahua and El Paso-Juarez borders.

Governor Connally, at the Library's request, turned over to the State archives the black, lightweight suit he was wearing when he was seriously wounded in Dallas. He was the first Texas governor to be the victim of an assassination attempt. The suit bears bullet holes in the back, front and right sleeve. Also placed in the archives is the blood-stained shirt Connally wore on the tragic November day, and his black and gold silk tie.

Bracero Program — The U. S. Congress has extended the bracero program for another year — through 1964 — as a compromise between the close-out or phase-out argument by states where the contract laborers from Mexico are employed. However, figures from the Texas Employment Commission indicate that a phase-out has been in effect in Texas for the past two years.

Henry LeBlanc of the commission's farm labor division reports that 38,000 braceros worked on Texas crops in August, 1961; 12,917 in August, 1962; and 12,008 in August, 1963.

Water Study — Texans in the future may get very thirsty if they don't plan ahead to catch and save more water. This conclusion and other information about water, including the fact that since 1890 Texas has been using up its water resources at a rate 11 times faster than its population growth, has been spelled out for students.

The water story has been published in a 40-page illustrated booklet, "How Can We Meet Our Water Needs?" prepared by the Texas Society of Professional Engineers and printed by the Texas Education Agency.

### Congressman ED FOREMAN Reports

#### Where There is Smoke There's Fire

We all are somewhat reluctant to say anything about our new President, hoping for, and wanting to believe the best — but testimony given here in Washington last week in the Bobby Baker investigation was just too much for anyone concerned about good government to take. As has been rumored here on Capitol Hill for many weeks, the Bobby Baker investigation finally hit pay dirt. In seeming support of the old saw, "Where there is smoke there is fire," the Baker investigation turned up evidence that LBJ received a stereophonic Magnavox Hi-Fi set and a \$1,200.00 "bonus" in advertising for his LBJ company. The testimony as it was written up in the Washington Evening Star on Tuesday, January 21, 1964, revealed the following:

1. In answer to a question by the investigating committee counsel concerning whether or not LBJ knew who the Hi-Fi set came from, insurance man Don Reynolds said, "I don't think there would have been any question about it sir, because this set, the invoice was billed from the Magnavox Company directly to Senator Johnson. It showed that the charges were to be sent to Don Reynolds, Sir."

2. In regard to one business matter, "That he (Don Reynolds) was persuaded to buy advertising on the Texas TV station owned by the LBJ Company, controlled until recently by Mrs. Johnson." Even though his small insurance agency operates only in Silver Spring, Maryland.

There has been the natural reluctance of the Democrat controlled Senate to dig into this matter as fully as is needed to bring out all of the facts, but the tremendous efforts on the part of Senator Williams of Delaware and the glaring preponderance of evidence has forced the issue out under the door. ## YOUTH'S STAKE IN CONSERVATION

Editor's Note: This past week each student in OHS was required to write an essay entitled Youth's Stake in Conservation. The following is an anonymous essay that didn't quite make the finals.

Generally, a youth's stake in conservation is approximately eighteen inches long, two inches wide, and three eighths of an inch thick. The stake is most often made of well seasoned yellow pine but on occasions black oak is used. The quality of the material used in making one of these stakes is very important because the stake must last until the owner is eligible to trade it in on an old person's stake in conservation.

Exactly one and four-fifths inches below the top of the stake, which is perpendicular to the left edge, there is a precisely cut notch used to tie the ropes and flags onto. The top of this notch is parallel to the top of the stake so as to stand the stress placed on it when it is hammered into the ground. The bottom of the notch is cut at a thirty degree angle to the edge.

Thirteen inches from the top of the stake it begins to taper to a point. This point is very delicately formed so that driving it in the ground will not be a difficult task.

As everyone knows, a youth's stake in conservation is very important.

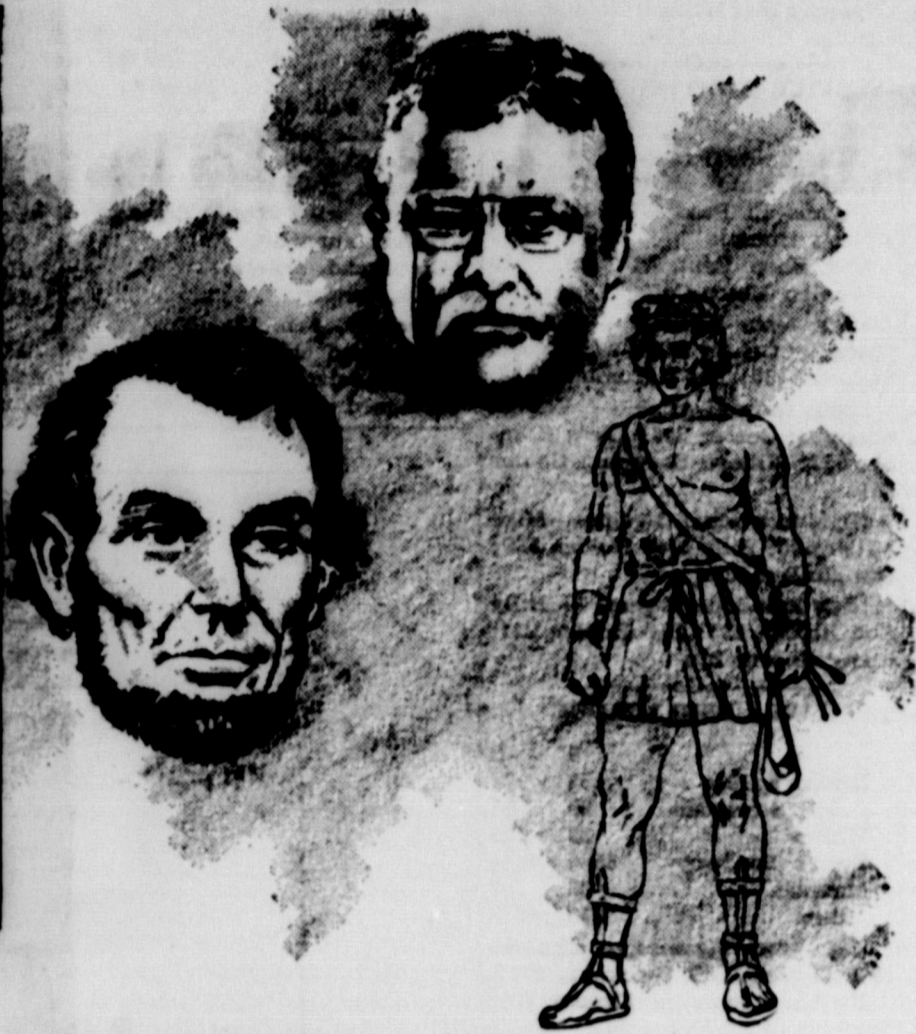

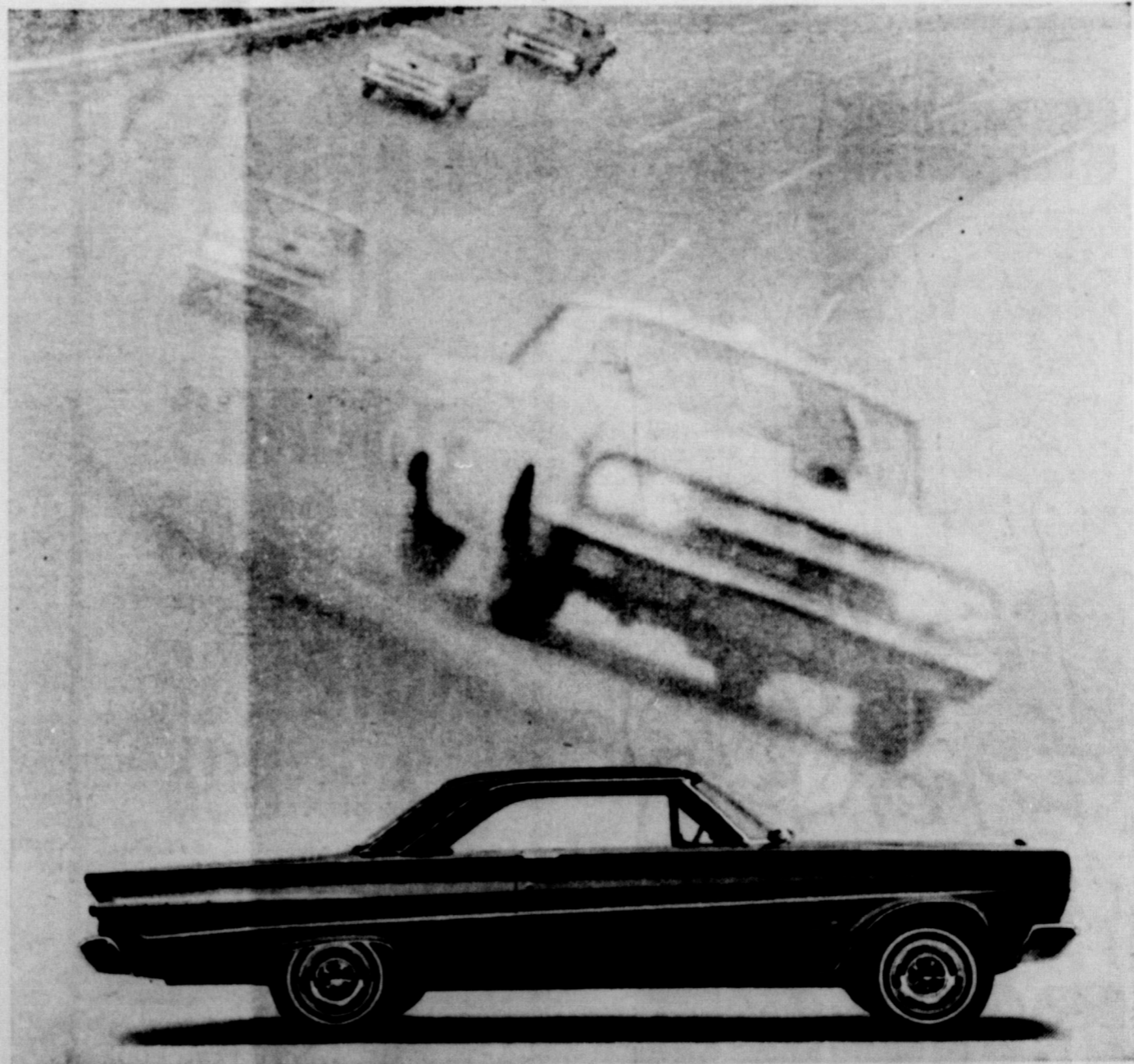

"Bosworth has written the best of book that all of us dream about doing, but few really get around to it. Dr. Walter Webb, whom you doubtless remember came to Ozona when I was there in 1940, and wrote something of a minor crisis in blunt remarks, told me many times before his death that I should write the story of Ozona and whose memory is as fresh as Bosworth's has finally done.
