Signers Sought To Petition For Civic Center Bond Vote

125,000 Issue Would Build Center For All Civic Functions

A petition was being circulated for signatures this week asking the Crockett County Commissioners Court to order an election to decide whether or not bonds in the amount of \$125,000 shall be issued in this county for the purpose of constructing a civic center building for use of the public as a meeting place for banquets, conventions, club meetings, family gatherings, plays, musical entertainments, lectures etc.

The petition was drawn by County Attorney Robert Owen at the request of members of a citizens committee composed of representatives of organized civic groups in Ozona. This group, headed by Mrs. Boyd Baker as chairman, has been engaged in a study of the proposed civic center building for the past two months. The committee secured the voluntary services of San Angelo architect Jack McDermitt, who drew a rough floor plan sketch and outside elevation sketch for the committee's consideration.

After study of the floor plans, some changes and improvements were suggested and another plan drawn. These drawings are on display for public study in the window of Watson's Department Store at the downtown intersection corner.

The citizens committee and the Commissioners Court propose to build the civic center building in the newly developed County Memorial Park, formerly the Crockett County Fair Grounds. Plans are for its maintenance to be supervised by paid employes and its operation under a board of directors working under the county's supervision. The building will be open to all individuals and groups who can meet the rules and regulations to be devised by the board and the county. A nominal fee sufficient to cover costs of cleaning and arranging after use will be charged for use of the building.

The committee to circulate the petition will be headed by Mrs. Leonard Boyd. Signers will be sought from now until the March meeting of the Commissioners Court when the petition will be presented to the court and that body asked to call an election on the question within the time specified by the law.

Allan Bosworth's 'Ozona Country' Gets Enthusiastic Reviews In Press of Texas

Allan Bosworth's "Ozona Country" has received some fine reviews in Texas newspapers.

One of the finest is by Leonard Sanders in the Sunday issue of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram. Not only does Sanders give "Ozona Country" a big play but he gives what he describes as "an unabashed plug" for Bosworth's "New Country."

"Although 'Ozona Country' can stand alone, it is in a sense a sequel to 'New Country,'" Sanders wrote. "It will be enjoyed much more by readers of the earlier work which — in at least one reader's opinion — was never fully credited for its timelessness as the distilled essence of the Southwest family story."

Ozona Girl Cagers Lose To Eldorado In Season's Best Game

Coach Ron Mardock's Ozona High School girls basketball team lost a 61 to 40 decision to the league leading Eldorado girls in Eldorado last Tuesday night in what was probably their best showing of the season.

The Ozona girls, who had looked like a leaf in a hurricane in the Eldorado game played here earlier this season, made a game of it all the way and with four minutes trailed only 47 to 40.

Lane Kay Alford and Shirley Wagner led the Ozona team with Alford getting 14 for high but it was not enough, the classy Eldorado crew pulling away when it needed to.

The Ozona girls, with a district record of two wins and three losses can even up their record and pull into second place with a win over Rankin in Rankin Friday night. The Friday night game will end the season for the Ozona girls.

"Our soft, vacillating foreign policy continues to embarrass our allies and degrade our image and prestige around the world when we let two-bit, leftist, Communist sympathizers like Castro shove the U. S. around and intentionally violate treaties and international agreements such as the water supply agreement at Guantanamo Naval Base and permit violations such as our Panama Canal Zone treaty.

"There are some in Congress who say, oh well, the Panama canal is antiquated and too narrow to carry the big ships of today. I don't care if it won't carry anything but a row boat, there is a principle involved and a treaty right paid for by American dollars to the government of Panama for such rights. They talk of cutting another canal — do we spend more billions for a new canal and turn it over to somebody else at the first whimper?"

If Castro persists in refusing to supply the base with water, Foreman advocates the U. S. taking over control of the supply facilities, and a sea blockade around Cuba if Castro hostilities continue.

On the sale of subsidized American wheat to Communist Russia, Foreman declared.

"It is a deplorable situation, indeed, when the United States, working and fighting for freedom around the world, is forced by a Democrat controlled Congress and Administration to issue Russia a Credit Card for Communism.

"At a time when we are spending \$50 billions a year to maintain a strong defense against the spread of Communism — at a time when unarmed American flyers are being shot down by Russians in Germany — at a time when American fighting men are being shot and killed by Communist bullets in Viet Nam, I cannot understand condone nor tolerate our shipment of subsidized American wheat to fill their hungry Communist bellies."

"Although I would like to believe, and certainly would support in action, President Johnson's conservative pledges, I expect he will continue to work to carry out the Kennedy program to its fullest," Foreman said Johnson by his admission is a "Roosevelt New Dealer" and, being a master politician, appears to be all things to all men to get their political support.

The visiting Congressman, a Republican, predicted Senator Barry Goldwater, of Arizona, who is expected to receive the support of conservative thinking Americans in both the Republican and Democrat parties, will be nominated by the Republicans and will be elected President in November.

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SOLVENT OR LUNY?

There is some uneasiness, we understand, among the engineers, scientists and assorted double-domes engaged in the Government's effort to colonize the moon. They seem to suspect that Congress may somehow be critical of them after the sixth straight failure to conduct an unmanned probe as planned.

It was a spectacular thing, of course, that Ranger 6 landed on target on the moon and on time after having its course corrected from the ground after it was in outer space. That such things can be done is miraculous, mysterious and downright spooky. But the purpose, as everyone knows, was to get close-up pictures of the moon's surface (from 900 miles down to 2,000 feet) that are said to be essential to further planning of a landing by astronauts in 1970.

Thus, there will be another try for these pictures within a month — providing the slide-rule boys can figure out what went wrong in the means of preventing it next time. Succeeding in this, "Soft landings" will be undertaken late next year with instruments to analyze the moon's soil. We shall then know definitively, it would appear, whether or not the moon is really made of green cheese.

But in the meanwhile there is going to be an election — for every member of the House and a third

of the Senate. And the people who will do the voting have become increasingly disturbed over Government extravagance, continued deficit spending and a debt ceiling that long ago poked through the stratosphere.

Furthermore they are not soothed by Administration ideas of economy that involve cutting down on our defenses — "phasing out" manned aircraft and military bases at home and abroad — and turning out lights in the White House.

Nor will the voters fail to note that the President's budget for 1965 proposes appropriation of \$4.99 billion for space research and technology and that the estimated deficit of \$4.9 billion is just a shade less. Many will regard this as quite a coincidence — and mention it to their Congressmen and Senators.

They may well ask: "Should we go for broke in going to the moon?"

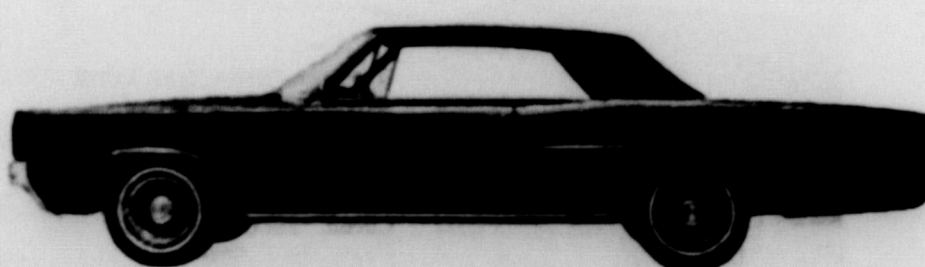



Crockett World Field Gets New Discovery In Conoco's Powell Test

An unidentified discovery, possibly Strawn, was indicated on the west edge of the World (Grayburg) field and one mile west of the depicted Strawn opener of Crockett County with the recovery of 460 feet of oil and 90 feet of oil and gas-cut mud on a drillstem test at Continental Oil Co., Odessa, No. 1-54 L. P. Powell, in 54-BB-TCRR, 15 miles southwest of Big Lake, and two miles east of the World, West (Strawn) field and five miles northeast of the recently opened Esccondado (Fusselman and Pennsylvanian) field.

Gas surfaced in five minutes, no gauges, on the three-hour test taken between 8,030-70 feet. Flowing pressure was 49-220 pounds; initial and final shut-in pressures, no time, were 3,473 and 3,373 pounds, respectively.

Drilling continued below 5,985 feet in shale and sand on an 8,300-foot contract.

Earlier, a test of the Grayburg

between 2,673-688 feet returned 20 feet of oil, 254 feet of mud and 240 feet of salt water.

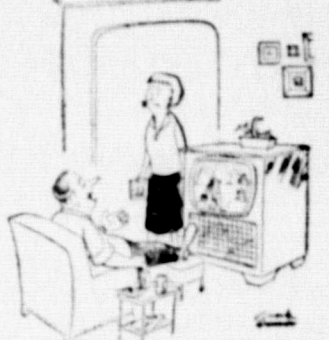

bigger Owls seemed always out of position and a little late.

The Owls, apparently concerned over Ozona's recently slow up method of attack, tried pressing the Lions most of the way but that, too, seemed to have gone sour as they rarely got the ball and even when they did were unable to do anything with it.

The Lion win in Big Lake in district play marked a first in a good many years for the Lions. Big Lake came into the district with Ozona in 1959 after having been a frequent bi-district foe prior to that.

The Lions might have lost a chance for the title in Eldorado last Tuesday night when they dropped a foul scarred 61 to 47 decision to the Eagles.

Eldorado ran up a comfortable second period lead chiefly on foul throws and then protected their win with a 29 point output from the district's tallest player, Richard Preston.

The Lions, hampered by fouls and trailing, went to the press in the third period and had it not been for Preston's over shadowing height, might have pulled the game out of the fire. The Eagles cracked repeatedly under the

stress of Lion pressure, and the Lions, at one point, crawled back into contention. However, Preston was always there to dunk in an easy one or a hard one, the Lions being too short to contest the shots.

Rodney Stewart led the Lion attack with 14 points before fouling out but was followed closely by David Childress with 13 and Joel Huff who hit a personal all-time high of 12.

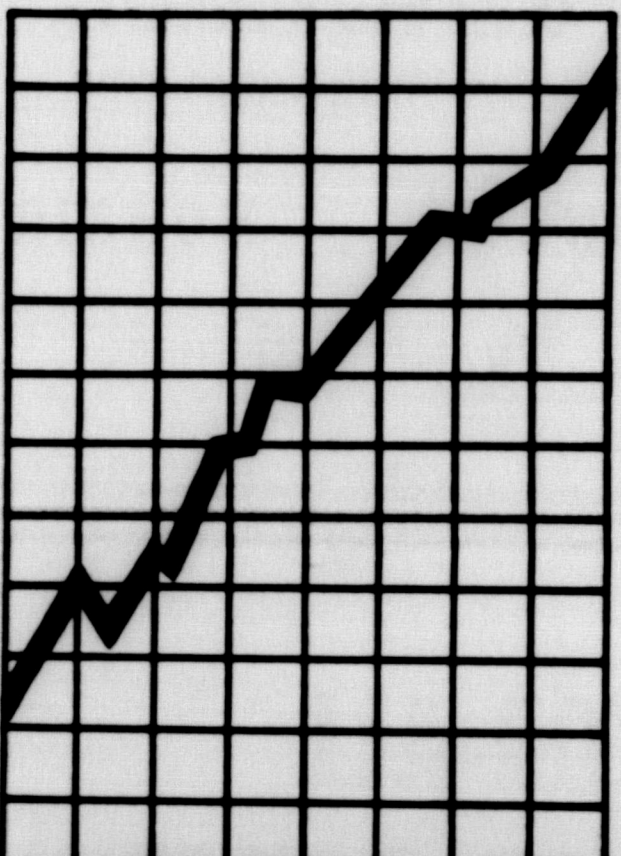
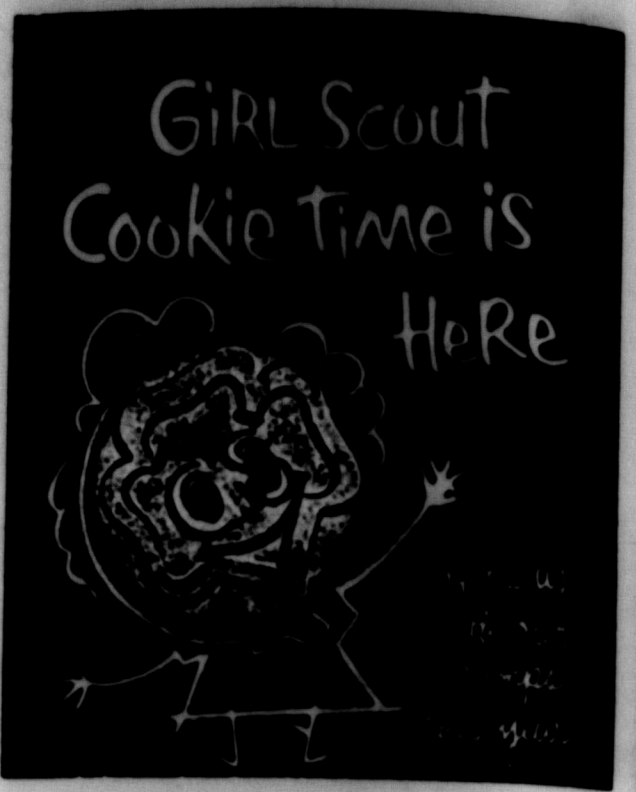
Scotch Foursomes Net \$40 For Polio Fund
