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What and Why A Civic Center

An Editorial

Soon you will be called upon to cast your vote on the question whether or not bonds shall be issued in Crockett county for the construction of a civic center.

What is a civic center? We might call it a community building, a city center or whatever. It is to be a "youth center" in that it is to be dedicated to the youth of the county, or largely for a youth center, although if a youth program developed it will be the place for its enactment.

A civic center is a building, large enough to accommodate the public gathering probable in the community's foreseeable future. It is a building where club meetings can be held — several times if need be by the use of the rooms. It is a place for receptions, conventions, meetings, family reunions, banquets, employe - conference meetings, plays, musical concerts, and other kind of gathering where a banquet, kitchen or stage are needed.

Does Ozona need a civic center? In the very early days, the "house" or the "courthouse" was the community gathering place on the rare occasions when a sizeable gathering was held. These were the needs of the times.

Every town has many organizations which meet more or less regularly. They need a public meeting place. These organizations, often attract conventions and meetings — and these meetings are held in the community at some time during the year could attract some entertainment, a musical, a play, a concert, a need stage, an auditorium.

do such meetings, entertainments, conventions have to be held in Ozona? No meeting place except in the facilities of the churches, and other types of gatherings held in the courthouse. Dorsey Hardeman Seeks Re-Election As State Senator

San Angeloan Has Been Member Of Senate Since 1947

Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo has announced his candidacy for re-election as State Senator from the 25th District.

Senator Hardeman has been a member of the Senate since 1947 and has served as Chairman or member of all major Standing Committees of the Senate, as well as on many important special and interim committees. He is presently Chairman of the influential Jurisprudence Committee and a member of the Legislative Budget Board, on which he has served for twelve years.

Senator Hardeman is recognized as being one of the three most powerful members of the 58th Legislature, along with the Speaker of the House and the Lieutenant Governor, who presides in the Senate. Senator Hardeman was elected President Pro Tempore of the Senate and served as acting Governor of the State on December 3, 1954, during the absence of then Governor, Allan Shivers, and Lieutenant Governor, Ben Ramsey.

Senator Hardeman is respected by his colleagues as an authority on constitutional law and Texas and American history. He often has been invited by his colleagues to address the Senate on Constitutional questions and historical subjects. He was accorded honorary life membership in the Texas State Historical Association for outstanding service rendered to Texas, which is the highest honor the Association bestows. Two of the four will not be candidates for re-election, it is understood. Dr. Simon plans to leave Ozona in the near future and Mr. Henderson has moved with his family to Quemado where he will maintain headquarters in his grass and citrus farm operations there.

Terms of three members of the board do not expire for another year. The hold-over members are Bill Carson, board president, Taylor Deaton and Chas. E. Davidson III.

Lions Finish Highly Successful Cage Season Despite Handicaps

Coach Brooks Dozier had good reason to be happy when the Lions finished their season at Davidson Gym Tuesday night with a win over Iraan.

The Lions had finished much higher in district play than had been expected, with a record of 6 wins and four losses, had compiled a respectable 17 wins and eight losses over the season, and had finished the year with a strong effort and good team work.

Dozier, who has been forced to stand up during the Lions last seven or eight games due to a back ailment, could take particular pride in this year's record, since the team was short, had to undergo a big rebuilding program this year, and yet came down to the finish as one of Ozona's better clubs in recent years.

The Ozona High School girls basketball team finished its 1963-64 season in Rankin last Friday night, winning a 33 to 29 decision over the Rankin girls and a tie for second place in district 8-A with Sanderson.

Shirley Wagner led the Ozona attack with 20 points but it was left for a field goal by Wagner and two free throws by Lana Alford to pull the Ozona team from one point behind and to a victory in the fading seconds of the game.

Ozona jumped off to a commanding lead early in the first quarter but then lost the range, missing dozens of shots along with most of the few free throws they got.

While Ozona was banging away fruitlessly at the hoop, the Rankin crew was not doing much better but did do well enough to gain the lead shortly before the half.

The Ozona team did only slightly better in the third period but then as the game began to come to a close Janie Gilliam hit two free throws, Alford and Wagner each hit field goals to tie the score before Wagner hit again from the field and Alford twice from the line to sew up the contest.

Seniors Janie Gilliam, Diana Coates, and Shirley Wagner, all three of whom are seniors, finished their careers for Ozona High.

Collect Signers Of Petition For Civic Center Bonds

Request For Election To Be Presented To Commissioners

Signatures were being collected this week on a petition, to be presented at the next meeting of the Commissioners Court, asking for an election to decide on the issuance of \$125,000 in county bonds for the purpose of constructing a civic center building in Ozona.

Conceived by a joint committee of citizens, selected from the various civic organizations in the city, the civic center building is being promoted as a project through these various clubs.

Already presented at a meeting of the Ozona Rotary Club for member signatures, the petition is destined to go before the Lions Club, the Music Club, the Garden Club, the Woman's Club, the Woman's Forum and the Woman's League in meetings between now and the next Commissioners Court meeting.

Mrs. Leonard Boyd, chairman of the sub-committee named to circulate the petition, announced that many volunteer signers had called at her store, the Small Fashions Shop, to sign. Anyone wishing to sign the petition will find it at the store.

Plans for the civic center were drawn by Jack McDermitt, San Angelo architect, after conferences with members of a committee representing the various civic organizations of the town and named by the Chamber of Commerce. The building will contain about 10,000 square feet of floor space and will include an auditorium with stage, three smaller party rooms, a fully equipped kitchen, store rooms and checkroom.

Tentative plans call for the center to be located on the hillside overlooking the Crockett County Memorial Fair Park and rodeo arena.

Ozonan Announces Plan For Annual Ev- ent In Larger City

Odessa has been selected as the site for the 1964 Miss Wool of Texas Pageant, it was announced this week by James Baggett of Ozona, representing the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers Assn., sponsors of the pageant.

Miss Wool of Texas Pageant, formerly held each year in San Angelo, is set for June 17-19. The national pageant still is held in San Angelo.

Winston Barclay, Odessa Chamber of Commerce president, said that his city is pleased to host the pageant. Baggett pointed out that sheep and goat raising is a big industry and he felt it appropriate that the pageant be staged in the larger, growing city.

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... INTO DARKNESS

There could be no more complete misnomer than the so-called "Civil Rights Act of 1963." It is belligerently uncivil. It destroys rights of all rather than protecting the rights of any. And while, mercifully, it was not passed in 1963, Congress is being pressed now for passage of a revised version that is not "watered down," but more drastic and more sweeping than the original.

This measure should, in all truth, be renamed the "Socialists' Omnibus Bill of 1963." That its concern for "discrimination," "race" and "religion" — none of which terms is defined in the bill — is a cover for an unprecedented power grab by the Executive is revealed in such language as: "The President is authorized to take such action as may be appropriate..." and "Each Federal department and agency... shall take action to effectuate..." Title VI, if you read it carefully, reveals the \$100 billion blackbook that is to be swung over the heads of all — to belabor all races and all creeds.

A minority report filed by six members of the House Judiciary Committee, Reps. Willis, Forrester, Tuck, Astrovore, Dowdy and White — all of them Democrats, all of them lawyers and all of them experts on this type of legislation — declares flatly that the bill is unconstitutional and points out

that it "vests almost unlimited authority in the President and his appointees to do whatever they desire."

It reminded them, they said, of the words of George Washington: "Government is not reason, it is not eloquence — it is force. Like fire, it is a dangerous servant and a fearful master..."

And in conclusion these lawmakers said: "In all the years Congress has pondered the equities of civil rights legislation, no committee has ever suggested for the executive such totality of power as is embodied in this package of legislation. Grant it, and our fire ball of liberty will spin into darkness, suffocate. For our Republic cannot live without breath and the breath of our Republic is personal liberty and personal responsibility."

But this "totality of power" will be granted — unless those who recognize the peril can offset the pressure of the misguided and the ambitious. If you cherish liberty and the right of free choice on which American achievement is based, write both of your Senators. Tell them why you want them to vote against that Civil Rights Act of 1963.

Gun Accident Is Fatal To Worker At Power Plant

James Wooten Dead Of Rifle Bullet In Home Accident

James Alton Wooten, 35, employed at the West Texas Utilities Company power plant in north-west Crockett county, near McCamey, was killed instantly late Wednesday afternoon when a .22 caliber rifle was accidentally discharged in his home.

Mr. Wooten, Mrs. Wooten and their friends, Mr. and Mrs. Joel Nanney were planning to go rabbit hunting. When Mr. Wooten took the gun down from its rack it was discharged in some manner.

The bullet struck Wooten in the head just over the right ear and emerged in the center of the forehead. He was rushed to the McCamey hospital where he was pronounced dead on arrival.

Sheriff Billy Mills and Peace Justice A. O. Fields investigated the shooting and pronounced the death due to accidental gunshot wound.

Mr. Wooten had been employed at the power plant for 14 years.

Registration of voters who want to qualify for free votes in federal elections will continue March 7. County tax collectors are issuing the free receipts which may be obtained by direct personal or mail application.

Holders of the free registrations cannot vote in state or local races, in constitutional amendment or bond elections — only for president, vice president, U. S. senator, U. S. representative and congressman-at-large.

State attorneys emphasize, however, that the free registration receipts are good for primary elections, the November general election and any special election involving federal offices during the coming year. In other words, those who have them can vote in their party primary for senators, congressmen and congressman-at-large or in any special election for these offices, as well as the general election.

Voters over 60 in cities of 10,000 or more population who did not get their poll tax exemptions before the January 31 deadline cannot qualify for special registration. Over-age voters in smaller cities need no certificate of any kind.

Record Vote Predicted — Although the official compilation of poll tax payments and exemption certificates is not due from State Comptroller Robert Calvert until the first of April, many county tax assessor-collectors have stated they expect the number of qualified voters to exceed 1960's 2,594,000.

This prediction does not take into account registrations of those voters who cast ballots in federal races only. Registration for federal certificates seems to be going slow, but poll-tax registration also ran slow until the last week in January.

Population Picture — Although the State Health Department reported an "uninterrupted decline" in the Texas birth rate per 1,000 population between 1956 and 1962, the state's population continues to rise.

Births in 1962 totaled 244,069. New settlers moving in from other states accounted for a 200,000 increase, helping to make the population pass the 10 million mark last year. But at the same time the number of deaths for one year reached an all-time high of 81,118.

district games and lost them both. Last year's club folded badly in the latter stages of the season and left Coach Dozier with a bad taste over the season after a near complete fold in the last three games last season. But this year it was a different story.

The Lions bounced back from the losses to Eldorado and Big Lake, both of which were by surprisingly narrow margins, whipped Rankin in a big surprise, downed Iraan rather handily in Iraan had a little let-down but beat Sanderson easily, lost a hard played game to Eldorado, pulled the season's biggest upset in beating Big Lake and then split their last two games.

Among the Lions losses were two games to tree-top-tall Eldorado, one loss to top-rated Big Lake, one to triple A Colorado City and two narrow losses in the Rankin Tourney at the start of the season. The Lions had piled up a mark of ten wins and three losses at the time of the Ozona tourney but looked very poor in edging Merton and had a real bad time shooting in their loss to Mozelle the next day.

Following the tournament Coach Dozier decided on a more deliberate style of ball, playing for the good shot, running patterns and relying on the great ability of Stewart to get a shot when all else failed. The system paid off handsomely as the Lions responded by rebounding strongly, playing a much improved type of defense, and cashing in on free throws in a manner few Ozona teams have ever done.

The Lions' deliberate attack confused a number of Ozona's foes, forcing them into errors when they

tried to get the Lions to run when they would not.

When a ball club has been running all season and suddenly changes style it is hard for them not to get confused and run just enough to get beat, and a great deal of credit must go to Captain Leroy Cooper in controlling the style of play.

Cooper was chosen all-tourney at Rankin. When the Lions went for the close shot, that threw most of the shooting to Stewart and Childress, still Cooper was always able to take up some slack in the scoring when needed.

Stewart, with his tremendous talent and ability to do everything, averaged 16 points a game for the Lions over the season, once reaching 29, and not being held to less than double figures in any game in which he played to any extent.

Childress and Mahon were both frail boys and hard running proved to be too much for them for the entire course of the game, so the slow down style gave them a better opportunity to compete with bigger and stronger boys and both

did very well.

The whole story of the 1963-64 Lions was not told in its five or six starters since the reserves came through very well this season. Richard Vargas, Joel Huff, George Kyle and Dude Melton all saw extensive service and all came through at one time or another to prove their worth to the squad.

Coach Dozier told the Ozona Rotary Club before the season got under way that he had a group of small boys who wanted to play and that he felt they would give no one reason to be ashamed of them. They certainly didn't.

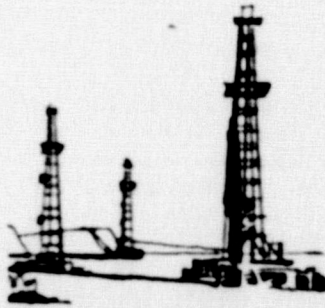
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
