





Absence of infestations could lead livestockmen to the false belief that threat from the insect has been destroyed. They reminded producers that this program is attempting to alter a centuries-old biological pattern of an insect that has a remarkable ability to bounce back if given the opportunity. Don't give it that opportunity, they said.
