Attendant Hired To Keep Museum Open Full Time

Tourist Attraction To Be Open To Public Six Days a Week

A fulltime attendant for the Crockett County Museum has been employed by the county and beginning Monday the museum will be open about six hours a day, six days a week.

Acting on the request of members of the museum board of directors, the Crockett County Commissioners Court Monday took action to approve the employment of a full time attendant to make the many attractive displays in the museum available to public view.

Mrs. Mahlon Robertson, member of a pioneer Crockett county family, will begin next Monday as the new museum attendant. She will keep the museum open from 9:30 a. m. to 11:30 a. m. each morning and from 1:30 p. m. to 5:30 p. m. each afternoon, six days a week.

This schedule of hours was determined for the beginning of the new open period. When the tourist season is in full swing, it may be found advisable to keep the museum open longer or different hours, members of the board pointed out.

Last summer the museum was opened at irregular intervals, members of the museum board giving into their pockets for several hundred dollars to pay attendants for keeping it open.

During the past year, the museum space has been increased with the addition of room formerly occupied by the county agent's office. Museum directors are now busy cataloguing and rearranging various displays to make the museum more interesting to visitors.

Ozona people are cordially invited to visit the museum. There are many interesting relics of early days in Crockett county and West Texas, Indian artifacts, specimens from area caves of an even earlier (Continued on Last Page)

Foreman Amendment Provides Incentive Pay For Govt. Employees

When the U. S. House of Representatives was considering the Federal pay bill, which, incidentally, proposes a \$10,000 a year salary increase for members of Congress, West Texas Republican Congressman Ed Foreman offered a "balanced budget" amendment to the bill which would give Congressmen an incentive to balance the budget in order to draw their pay.

Foreman's amendment reads: "The authorization for an appropriation contained in this act shall not be effective until such times as the receipts of the government for the preceding fiscal year have exceeded the expenditures of the government for such year, as determined by the director of the Bureau of the Budget."

Under this amendment, Congressman Foreman pointed out, those who make many of the fundamental decisions on Federal spending — Congressmen, Senators, Cabinet Officers — would have a powerful personal incentive (\$10,000 a year, to be exact) to eliminate waste and cut back.

"To a lesser degree, so would all other Federal employees. "Each cut would help to balance the budget and a balanced budget would be the key to higher pay."

Shell Henderson Well Is Field Extension

A 1 1/4-mile southwest extension has been indicated to the Ozona Northwest (Canyon sand oil and gas) field of Crockett County with the flowing of 13 barrels of condensate, plus 251 barrels of load water, in 10 hours at Shell Oil Co., Midland, No. 1-47 Henderson, in 47-OP-GC&SF, two miles west of Ozona.

Flow was through an 18-64-inch choke and perforations at 6,431-458 feet, which had been acidized with 2,400 gallons and fractured with 46,000 gallons. No gas was reported.

Court Agrees to Order Bond Election For Civic Center

A petition signed by more than 100 qualified taxpayers asking that an election be called on the question of issuing \$125,000 in county bonds to finance the construction of a civic center for Ozona was presented to the Commissioners Court Monday by a member of a special citizens committee which has investigated and planned the center building.

The Commissioners Court, after discussing the project, voted to

call the election as required and following further investigation by the court to determine necessary details of the laws governing such elections, will pass a formal order calling for the election and setting the date.

County Judge Brock Jones said that the court agreed to order the election and that such action probably would be taken in the next few days as soon as necessary information is assembled.

Meanwhile, members of the citizens committee, named by the Chamber of Commerce, and composed of representatives from various organized groups in the city, and county officials are studying various proposed sites for the civic center building. It was at first planned to put the building in the new county memorial fair park but the Texas Attorney General's office advised that such action, building a public building on leased land, would result in disapproval of the bonds by the Attorney General.

A number of possible sites have been considered and these are being studied prior to opening negotiations for purchase of a location. A site readily accessible and providing plenty of parking space is being sought.

The proposed civic center building will be open to use of the entire community for all kinds of gatherings, conventions, club meetings, parties, dances, plays, musicals, family reunions and all kinds of public meetings. It is the citizens committee's hope that the county will set up a governing board, similar to the hospital board, and this board will make and enforce rules for use of the building, to assure its being well kept and properly cleaned after use. Employment of a caretaker under the board's supervision will probably be considered.

Eligible to vote in the coming election will be only those otherwise qualified voters who have rendered and paid taxes on personal property in the county.

Increased Demand Seen For New Texas Travel Maps by Highway Dept.

Austin, Texas — A sparkling new extension of the theme "Texas: America's Fun-Tier," is now rolling off multi-color presses by tens of thousands as the 1964 Official Highway Travel Map of Texas becomes available to native motorists and Lone Star State enthusiasts from Seattle to Siam.

The Texas Highway Department estimates that three-quarters of a million copies, and perhaps more, will be distributed during the coming months to almost every member of individual and institution.

An elementary class in Brooklyn may write for a map in conjunction with a study project; an Indian maharaja may request one prior to a visit; Communist espionage agents may even steal a few, though the maps are free for the asking to anyone, anywhere.

Every line, symbol and figure on Texas' Official Highway Travel Map has been newly calculated, plotted and engraved, and every effort has been directed toward making the map more legible and easier to read. The average motorist to use Type faces are bolder, colors have been selected for maximum brilliance, and the national standard system of highway symbols has been followed.

Highway Dept. Gives Hints On Planting The Texas Bluebonnet Seeds

Austin, Texas — Each Spring as the Texas countryside becomes bathed in the beauty of Bluebonnets, Texas Highway Department mail grows heavy with requests for information. Hundreds of people in every section of the state want to know about the planting and care of the world famous Texas State Flower.

But, by then it is too late to plant bluebonnets for enjoyment during the current season. So the Texas Highway Department has compiled the following information which will assure the "green thumb" crowd the opportunity to include Bluebonnets in their gardening plans for 1965.

The Bluebonnet blooming date is influenced to some degree by the weather. In general, the first flowers open about March 15 in the southern part of the state, and in the more northern section the first flowers may not show before May 1. The length of the flowering period is about one month.

Seed mature about six weeks after the last flowers fade. These should be harvested before the seed. Pods explode and scatter the seed. Seed may be planted immediately after harvest or may be stored. However, seed should be planted prior to November 1, so that they may germinate and grow throughout the winter months. During this period a heavy root system and a sturdy plant is developed to produce an abundance of spring flowers.

Bluebonnet seed can be obtained from seed distributors if orders are placed well before the crop is ready for harvest. The Texas Highway Department harvest seed from time to time for its own use by mowing the plants when the seeds are mature, and immediately distributing them thinly over the area to be seeded. No seed is retained for the ensuing season by the Highway Department.

It is extremely important to inoculate Bluebonnets seed prior to planting. This procedure is necessary because Bluebonnets require the presence of certain bacteria in order for its root system to form the nodules (knots) on its roots and to carry on its nitrogen fixation process.

These bacteria cultures, called inoculants, may be purchased through commercial seed stores. Be sure that the seedsman is told that the inoculant is for Bluebonnets. Dampen the seed with a small amount of water and mix the inoculant by stirring it into the wet seed. Plant the seed soon after inoculation.

Bluebonnets grow best in soils that are sweet (contain lime), moderate in fertility and most important of all, well drained.

STUDENTS TAKE SCHOLARSHIP TEST

Fifteen students at Ozona High School plan to take the 1964 National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, J. A. Peltó, principal, announced today.

The test will be administered at the school 8:15 a. m. Saturday, March 14. All students who wish to be considered for Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1965 should take the test at that time.

The qualifying test is a three-hour examination of educational

development. The test is the first step in the tenth annual competition for four-year Merit Scholarships provided by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation and by sponsoring corporations, foundations, colleges, associations, unions, trusts, and individuals.

Some 14,000 Semifinalists, the highest scorers in each state, will be named early next fall. An additional 35,000 students, selected on a national basis, receive Letters of Commendation for their high performance on the qualifying test.

Each Semifinalist will be asked to take a second examination. Those who repeat their high performance will become Finalists in the Merit Program. Winners of Merit Scholarships will be selected from the Finalist group on the basis of school records and recommendations, test scores, extracurricular activities, leadership ability, and accomplishments outside the classroom. Each Finalist is awarded a Certificate of Merit attesting to his outstanding performance.

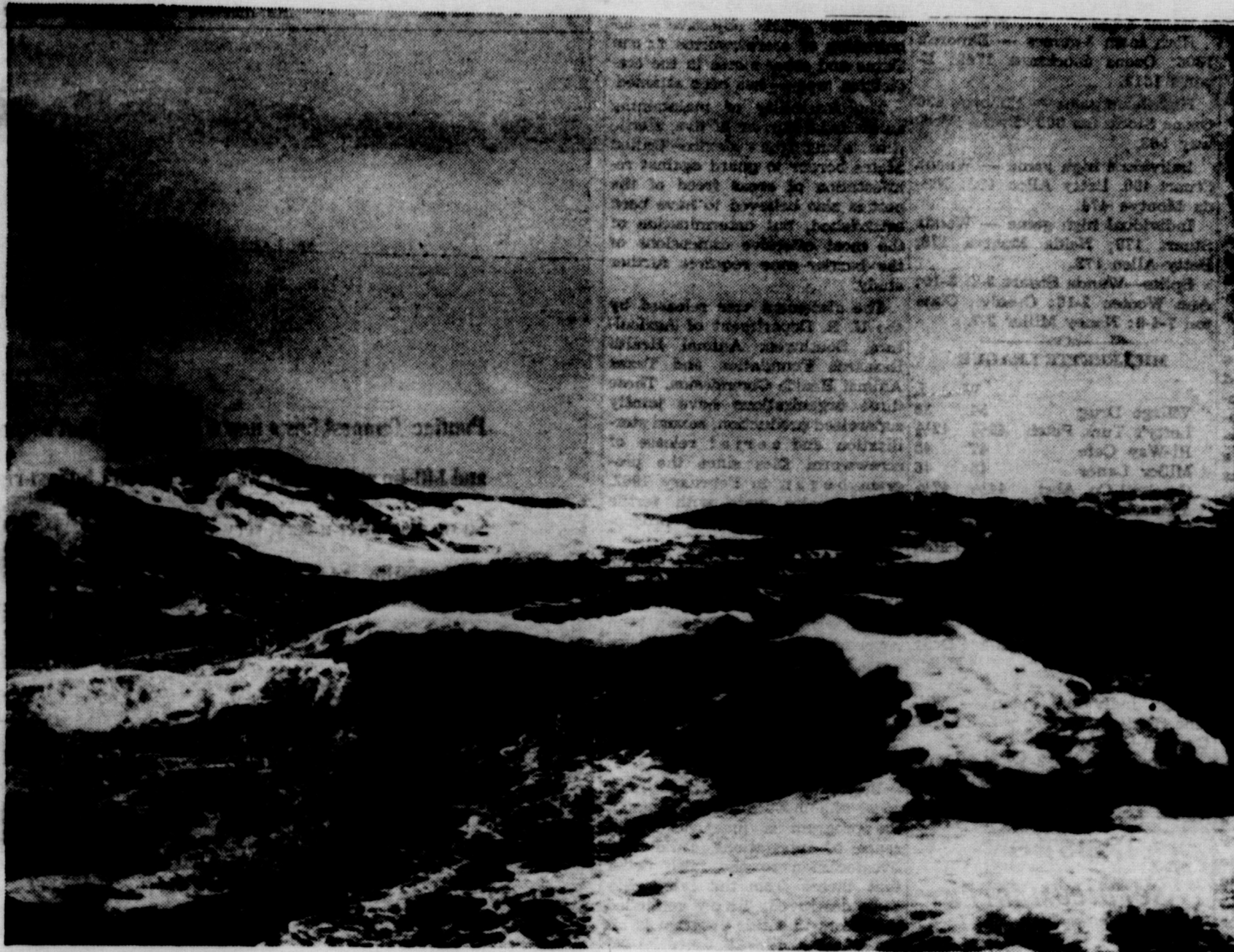

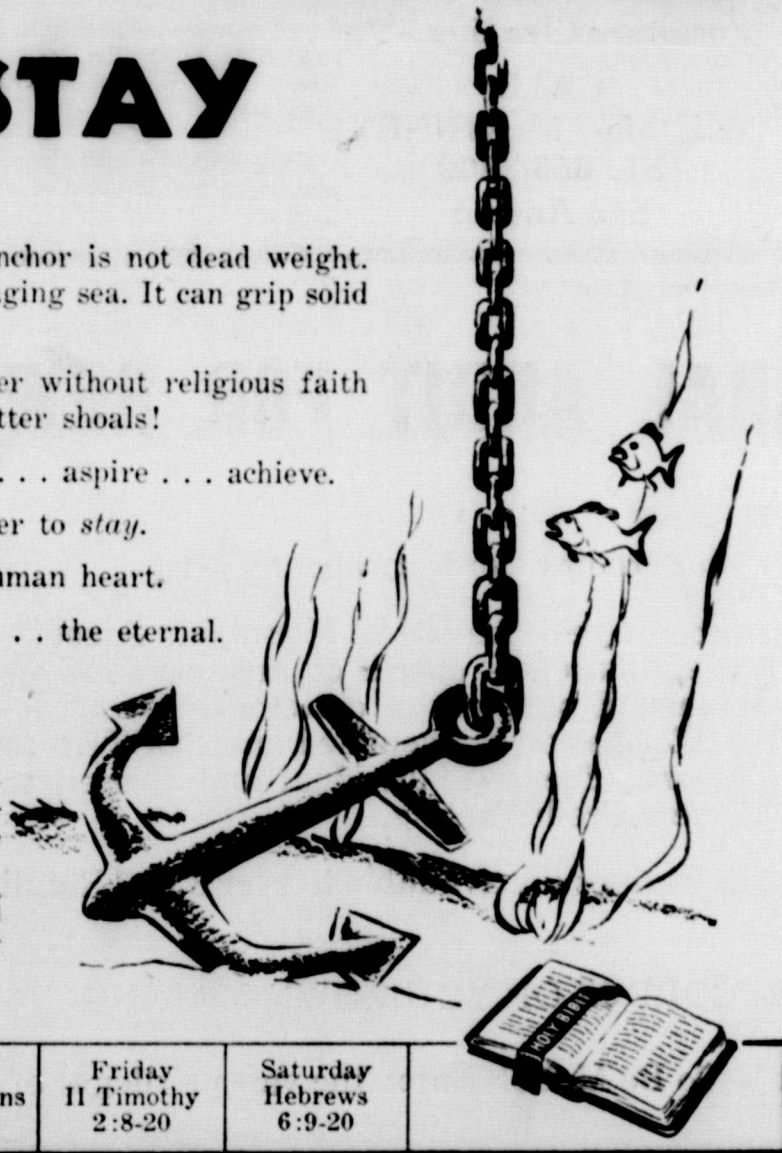

Southwest Screwworm Free Longest Period In History; Care Urged

Mission — The longest period in the recorded history of the Southwest with no screwworm infestations has prompted screwworm eradication officials to issue a statement that a basic objective — elimination of screwworms from Texas and other states in the eradication area — has been attained.

The feasibility of maintaining an artificial barrier of live, sterile flies along the Mexico-United States border to guard against reinfestation of areas freed of the pest is also believed to have been established, but determination of the most effective dimensions of the barrier zone requires further study.

The statement was released by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation and Texas Animal Health Commission. These three organizations have jointly supervised production, sexual sterilization and aerial release of screwworm flies since the program began in February 1962. Sterile males mate with fertile female flies, preventing production of offspring.

Continuous release of sterile flies in screwworm-infested areas of the Southwest has resulted in no screwworm cases having been reported in more than two months.

The joint statement implied that farmers and ranchers cannot afford to relax their efforts, as some screwworm infestations are expected to occur within the eradication area in the months ahead.

Eradication officials said in a sense the most difficult stage of the program is just ahead. Absence of infestations could lead livestockmen to the false belief that threat from the insect has been destroyed. They reminded producers that this program is attempting to alter a centuries-old biological pattern of an insect that has a remarkable ability to bounce back if given the opportunity. Don't give it that opportunity, they said.

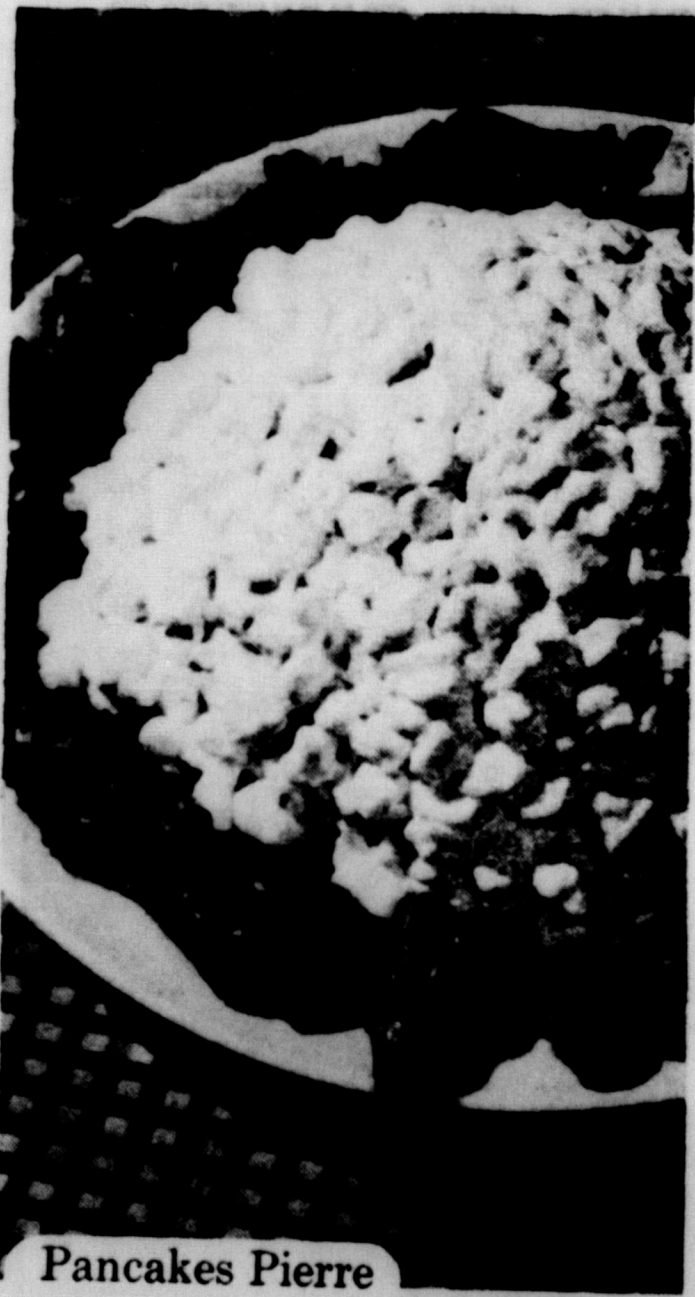
