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THINK HARD, SENATOR

In this eleventh hour while the Senate debates the irrevocable step of plunging this Republic into dictatorship via the subterfuge of "Civil Rights" the northern and western members of this "most exclusive club in the world" have a lot to think about.

From the very beginning of the Administration campaign for this legislation, the news and publicity dwelt on its chances of passage and who was for it and who against — but seldom on the provisions or merits of the bill. An emotion-charged background of inspired uncivil contempt for rights and law and order has been widely successful in obscuring its true objective of Federal control.

Under the measure passed by the House, and now before a hard-pressed Senate for the final vote in abrogation of the Constitution, the sovereignty of the states and the traditional rights of Americans Federal inspectors would control every bank, every business, every professional man, every farmer, every employer and every worker receiving any benefit from any Federal financial program. Similarly, the contract rights of unions and the seniority rights of members would have no force or effect where Federal busybodies charge the existence of racial or religious "imbalance" in any work force.

Nor, by the same token, would an employer have the rights to hire, fire, promote and demote his own workers.

The thoughtful American of any color or creed wants his rights, and he wants them for everybody. He is wise enough to realize — whether his Senators do or not — that the welfare of one citizen can not be improved by curtailing the rights of another. And the constituents of every Senator, in the

North, South, East or West, will hold him responsible if his vote has helped to bring upon them the destruction, despair and despotism implicit in the camouflaged "Civil Rights" Act.

Let no Senator confuse the grandstanding, holier-than-thou attitude with the statesmanship needed to rescue the traditional rights of all Americans from Executive trespass. His rights and his tenure are also at stake.

Lawyers, Constitutional And Otherwise, are beginning to wonder about the Supreme Court's ruling last month that Congressional districts within each state must have approximately equal population. By this yardstick, only 37 out of 435 Congressmen appear to have been legally elected. Do we, then, legally have a Congress? Could a non-existent House of Representatives have passed the Civil Rights bill? Is there really a Federal tax cut after all? Why don't they stop talking in the Capitol and go home?

Or was the Court's action an intrusion of the judiciary into the affairs of the legislative, and thus unconstitutional? If so, who is going to do what to whom when?

ACA Rates Foreman 100% On Vote Record For The American Way

Washington, D. C. — U. S. Congressman Ed Foreman, Texas' 16th District, received the rating of 100% for his voting record during the First Session of the 88th Congress by Americans for Constitutional Action.

Congressman Foreman, of Odessa, according to ACA, has voted during 1963 to uphold the Constitution of the United States and his opposed appeasement of Communists abroad and the trend toward socialism at home through centralization of power in a mammoth bureaucracy in Washington, D. C.

The latest ACA-Index, which presents the results of ACA's analysis of the voting performance of the entire United States Congress was released today by Admiral Ben Morell, Chairman of the Board of Trustees.

ACA has gained national attention by its non-partisan role of total dedication to the support and preservation of constitutional government. Among the twelve members of its Board of Trustees are the Honorable Herbert Hoover, our 31st President and Edgar Eisenhower.

Congressman Foreman, a member of the powerful House Armed

Services Committee, was cited by ACA as a "courageous legislator dedicated to individual freedom and liberty, the private enterprise system and preserving the inherent American heritage for our children."

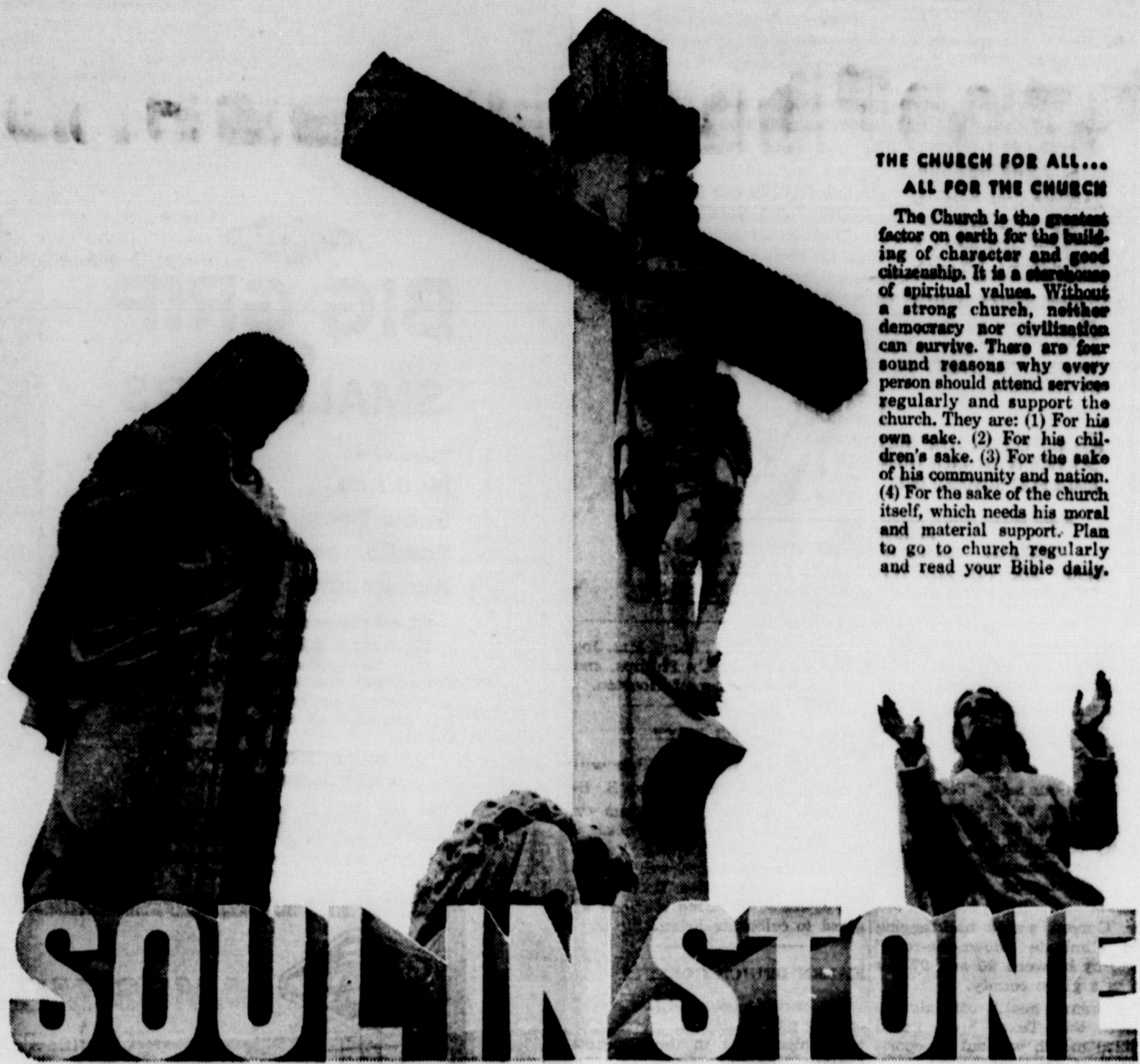

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From State Capitol

Austin, Texas — For the first time in history, Texas Republicans will have an opportunity to express their preferences for the GOP presidential nomination in a statewide straw poll.

Republican Executive Committee voted to hold the presidential referendum on the May 2 primary ballot. The opinion sampling has no binding effect. Principal purpose is to boost the stock of Goldwater and to lure restless conservative Democrats into the GOP primary.

Democratic Executive Committee offered no special voter bonus to keep their own partisans in the fold.

Leader of both parties, in simultaneous meetings in Austin, declined to submit requested referendums on sale of liquor by the drink and curtailment of Mexican national's commuting to jobs in Texas.

Names of Goldwater, Nelson Rockefeller, Margaret Chase Smith and Harold Stassen will appear on the GOP ballot. Originally the names of Richard Nixon, William Scranton, George Romney and Henry Cabot Lodge were included, but they were asked to be omitted. Rockefeller wanted off. He was told he had to stay since he already had announced.

Democrats responded warmly to Gov. John Connally's call for all-out support of President Johnson in party conventions. But they squabbled at length before accepting Dallas as the site of their September 15th state convention. Dallas finally won, 33-18 over Corpus Christi.

Hospital Losing Doctors — Texas salaries aren't good enough to keep top doctors on the job at state hospitals. Dr. James M. Schless, director of tuberculosis hospitals, told the hospital board at a recent meeting here.

He cited resignations of doctors at Harlingen State Hospital, East Texas Tuberculosis Hospital, and San Antonio State Hospital and possibility of the McKnight State Hospital clinical director's taking a job in another state.

Key medical jobs in the state institutions pay \$14,000 to \$15,000 a year, plus housing. Schless said the next Legislature will be asked to raise that to \$19,500.

Backtagging — The "backtagging" of culls and dry cows may be used to solve the growing problem of certifying all Texas counties for brucellosis eradication. Dr. R. G. Garrett, executive director of the Texas Animal Health Commission, and Dr. John Wilbur, veterinarian in charge of the U. S. animal disease eradication division in Texas, say the backtagging market testing program is in force in several northwestern states.

Under this program, culls and dry cows headed through concentration points on their way to

slaughter are marked so that the state county and herd from which the cow came can be identified.

When the cow goes to slaughter, a blood sample is taken and the results of a brucellosis test is recorded.

As Dr. Wilbur says, "Brucellosis being what it is, if older female animals are free of the disease, it is pretty certain the herd is free. In this way, about 97 to 98 percent of the testing could be eliminated."

Dr. Garrett says backtagging could eliminate "down-the-road" testing by between 90 and 97 percent in a given county.

The animal health officials announced that Texas has entered its third month without a reported case of screwworms.

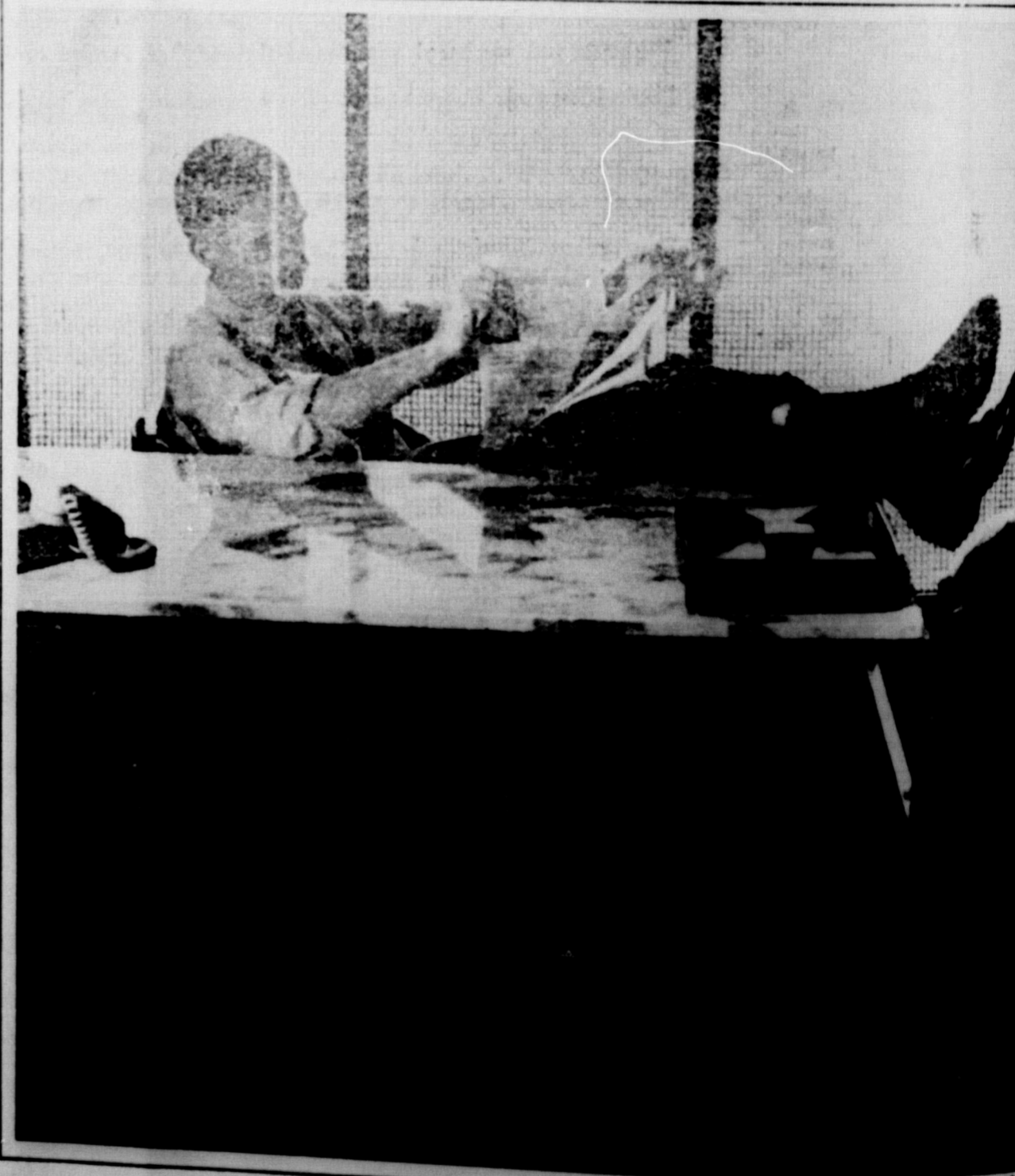

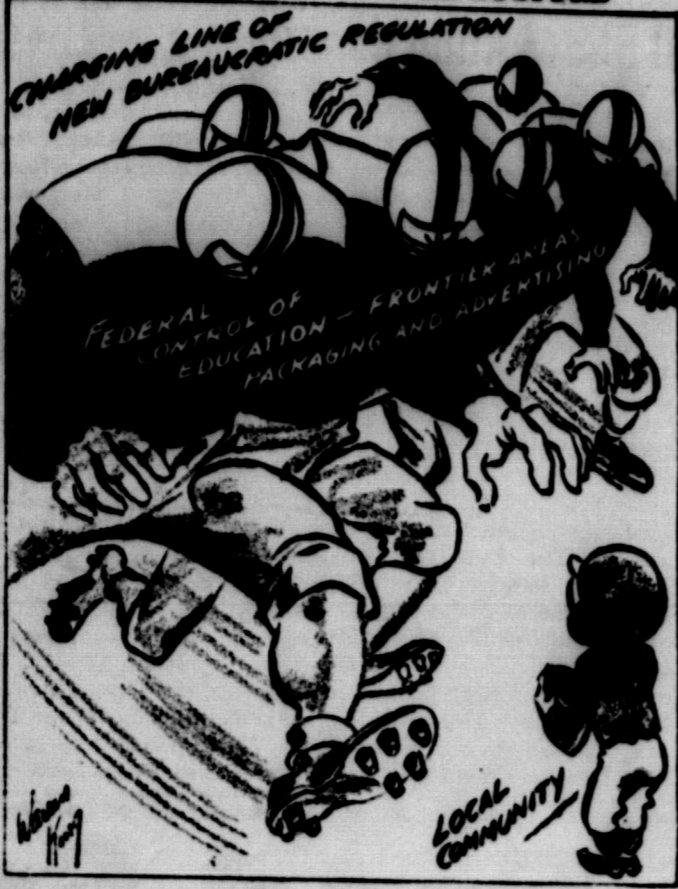
