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Sikes Dies Heart Attack; Funeral Pending

Sikes, 59, head football coach at East Texas State in Commerce since 1937 and a former Texas College athletic great, died of a heart attack Wednesday afternoon.

Sikes was stricken while on a college golf course and was taken to a Commerce hospital an hour later. He was the brother of L. B. T. Sikes, superintendent of Ozona High Schools, and of Pete Sikes, former San Angelo coach and now an insurgent there.

Sikes returned to East Texas State in 1954 after serving as head football coach at the University of Texas. Prior to that he served on the coaching staff at Texas A&M and the University of Georgia. Sikes won three letters while at A&M. He was first base and pitcher on the baseball team and forward and center on the basketball team. He was an All-Southwest Conference football player and played in the 1927 East-Texas Shrine game at end of the war for two years in the United States Army. He coached service teams at the University of Georgia from 1937 to 1948. He was end coach for football teams that played in Orange, Sugar and Rose games.

Funeral services were held this morning. Sikes is survived by his widow; his mother, Mrs. G. Sikes of Leonard; his brothers, Harold Sikes of Leonard, Pete Sikes of Angelo and L. B. T. Sikes of Ozona; and three sisters, Mrs. Bob Johnson of Angelo, Mrs. L. P. Kirk of Commerce and Mrs. Brooks Hasty of Anson, Texas.

Winnie Goolsby, 47 Former Ozonan Is Victim of Cancer

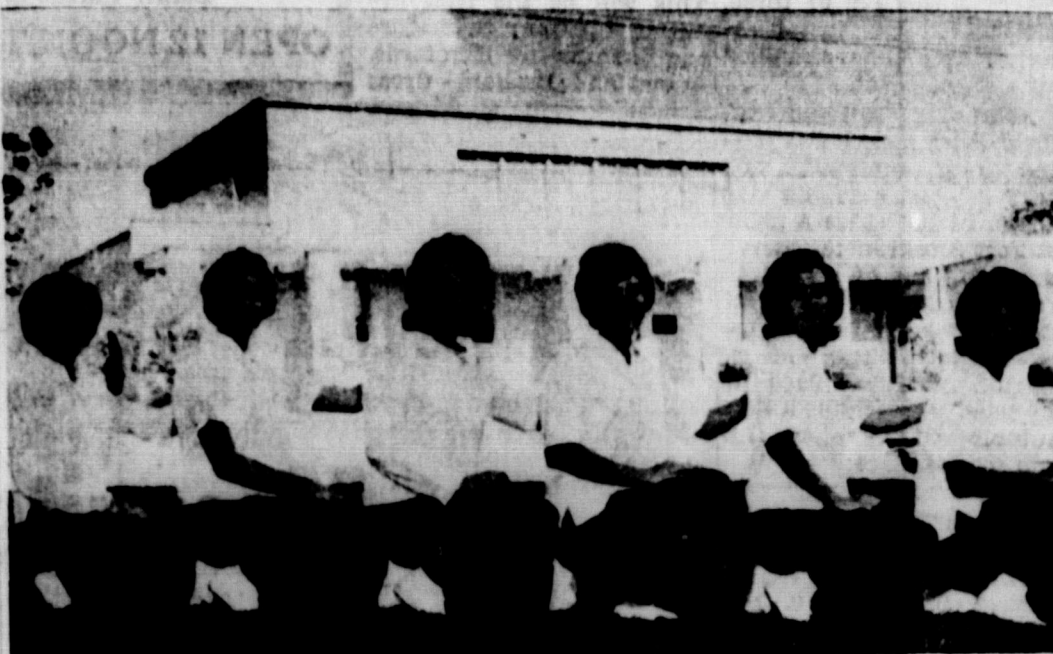

Ozona Area Gas Play Featured In Magazine

The Oil & Gas Journal in its May 1 issue carried a 4 1/2-page story by Robert J. Enright, Southwest editor, saying a huge gas area is building up in the Permian Basin — in the Ozona area of Crockett County.

Oil writers in West Texas for the past 1 1/2 years have been calling the area "the hottest spot on the North American Continent." The area now has 65 wells, with three of four more making production tests and locations staked for several more.

The key to the upcoming development flurry is the market for gas. East Ozona area wells have just been tied into a pipeline and most completions to the southwest will be connected before the end of the year.

Offset obligations in lease agreements will compel operators of most of the present isolated Canyon sand completions to start development within two to six months of the date of initial production. Thus, construction of the initial gathering system should set off a chainlike development surge which will sweep across the trend.

Now taking its first gas from the East Ozona wells is a new \$3.5 million gas plant near Ozona. It is owned by Pauley Petroleum Inc., Los Angeles; Northern Gas Products Co., Omaha; Delta Drilling Co., Tyler; and Johnson & Lindley, Inc., Houston. Initially it will process a minimum of 8 million cubic feet per day, but has an ultimate built-in capacity of 48 million cubic feet thick and average well depth is 6,500 feet. In addition to Canyon, the most

prolific production, it produces from the upper and big feet per day and gas input will climb in stages to that volume by no later than Jan. 1, 1967.

The field extends some 25 miles in a northeast-southwest direction, with a maximum width of 11 miles. Estimates of the eventual size of the production area range upward from 70,000 to 150,000 acres.

Average gas production from 30 of the Canyon wells is 3.3 million cubic feet per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 10,980-1 to 145,000-1; average potential from seven oil producers was 220 barrels. (Continued on Last Page)

Weak Market In Wool Results In Slow Sale Here

Wool men and growers had hoped that the unexplained drop in wool prices might have corrected itself and that some strength might be showing, but they were disappointed when Ozona Wool & Mohair Co., offered both eight months and 12 months fleeces in a bid sale here Tuesday.

Although buyers came in numbers they were able to purchase only about 125,000 to 130,000 pounds of the 361,000 pounds which had been offered in the sale. Their bids were rejected on other lots when growers decided to ride out the depressed wool prices a little longer in the hope that conditions might improve.

Beall Barbee, warehouse owner, expressed regret that more of the wool wasn't sold but said that bids were not high enough to warrant acceptance.

Prices paid for the clips sold ranged from 47 to 55 cents for the 12 months and from 48 1/2 to 52 1/2 cents for the 8 months fleeces. Nearly 69,000 pounds of 12 months and 57 to 58,000 pounds of eight months were sold.

Purchasers of the 12-months fleeces were: Burlington Industries, 11,300 pounds; Stevens, 2,700 pounds; Fort, 1,500 pounds; and Prouvest-Lefebvre Co., 47,300 pounds.

Voters To Have Few Choices In Run-Off Ballots

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Sanitary Measures Needed to Keep Fly Numbers Down

Keeping premises clean and eliminating possible breeding places as much as possible are necessary in keeping down house fly population. Frequent spraying of all fly breeding areas with recommended sprays will eliminate most of the house fly problems in an area.

Livestock barns and poultry houses, corrals and pens where livestock are kept, are all excellent breeding areas for house flies. Adequate sanitary measures, including proper disposition or handling of manure are necessary to eliminate fly breeding areas.

Chlordane, DDT and Toxaphene are recommended as outside premise sprays for control of flies. Inside of barns, Lindane, Malathion and Methoxychlor are excellent spray materials. Always follow the recommendations on the manufacturer's label concerning dosage, frequency of application and uses.

Prepared baits of Diptex, Malathion or Diazinon outside of buildings are recommended — but keep out of reach of children and pets.

Good sanitary practices around the home are also important in the control of house flies. Spray or paint malathion solution to all window facings, door

One of the major changes that will come with the new season will be district alignment the Lions will find themselves in.

The new District 8A will have nine teams instead of the six it has had for the past few years and all of the new teams in the district this year will be old members who have drifted out of the district the past few years and who are now returnings.

From a standpoint of long standing rivalry, the return of Sonora will be welcomed and for Ozona fans of some experience the return of Menard and Junction will bring back some

Ozona will open its season with McCamey here and then face one other non-district foe before getting into an eight team run for the championship.

In basketball, the Lions will play in the West zone with about the same teams, less Eldorado, that they have been playing with the past few years. The winner of the east and west zones will meet in a playoff for the district crown and that could be Big Lake and Eldorado.

The Lions will have lost Rodney Stewart, Leroy Cooper, Dude Melton, and Scott Mahon from this year's fine spirited team that finished third in district play but will have some good players

like David Childress, Richard Vargas, Joel Huff, George Kyle and some promising youngsters to choose from. It looks like a big rebuilding job will be needed from here.

In track, Coaches Chick Womack and Sonny Cleere would have to do pretty well to match the past one and are still living in the glow of winning district and defeating the class A state champs in doing so.

The Lions will lose some dedicated talent in Leroy Cooper and Scott Mahon but will return the bulk of this year's squad, a long with some very talented freshmen.

Many of the 1964 track performers were freshmen and soph and they could show a great deal of improvement and, for that matter, nearly always do between their freshman and sophomore years.

The Lions will be a threat

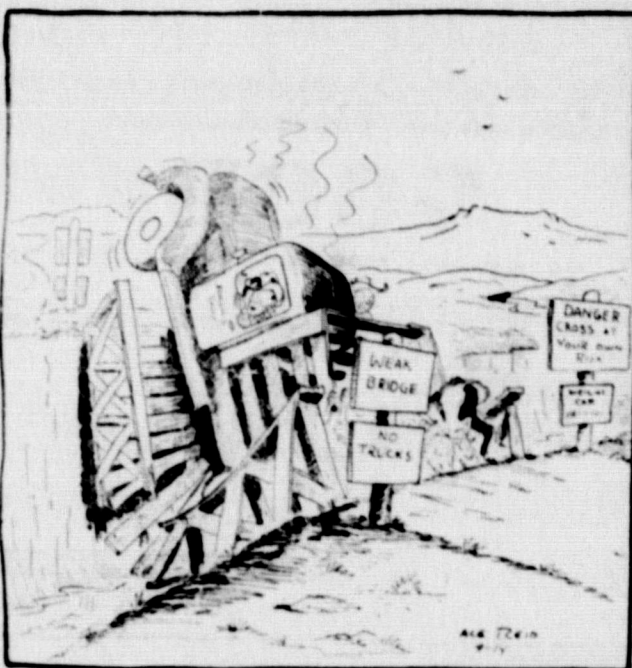

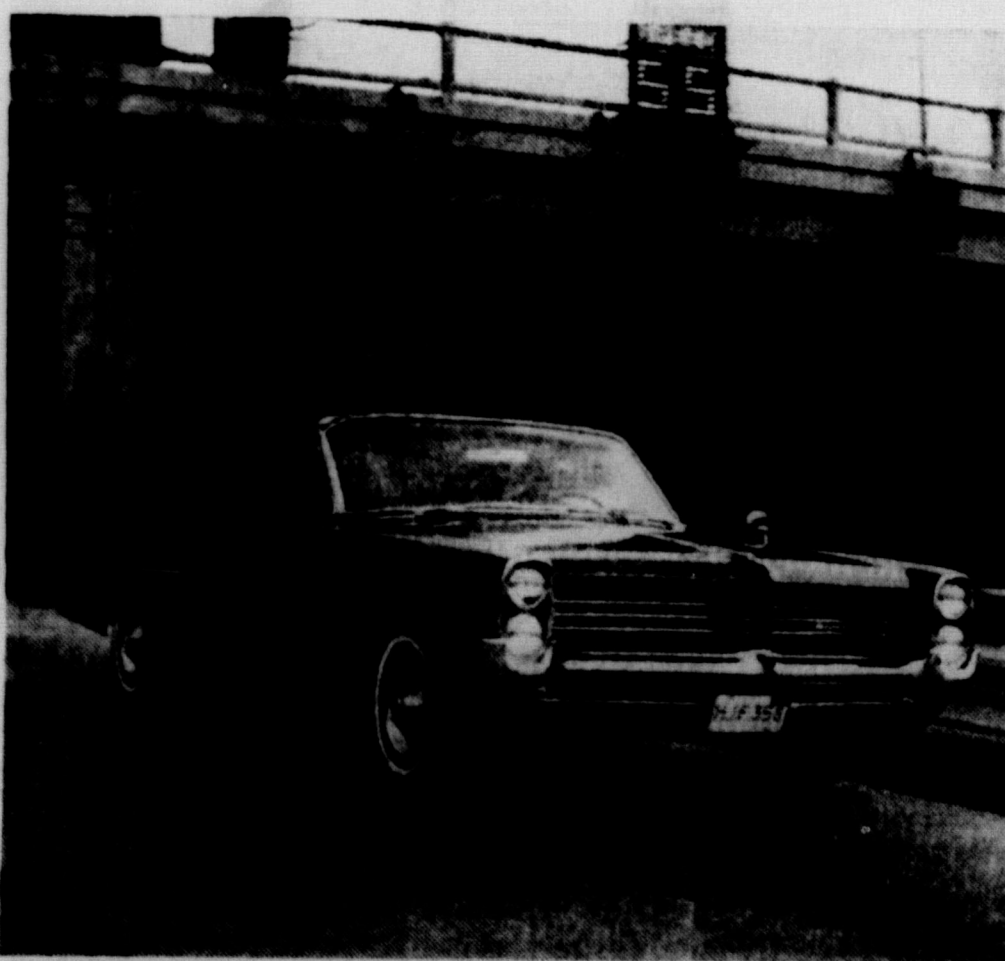
