A number of Ozona rodeo performers were listed among the winners last following the close of seventh annual Ozona Club Jr. Rodeo, which concluded in Ozona on Friday and Saturday nights.

Although not recording crowds were on for all three performances as well as the dance.

Amy Harper, of Mar-Texas, Miss AJRA was named outstanding performer at the 1964 rodeo, winning the title with a go-around in the rib-rope, open to boys girls, a best go-around average win in the barrel race and a second in age in the break-away roping for girls 16 to 19.

## Three Service Men Killed In One-Car Crash

Bodies of two service men who died in a one-car crash 23 miles east of Ozona on U. S. Highway 290 at 4:10 p. m. Tuesday, were picked up here by an ambulance from Fort Hood Wednesday and the body of the third, who died shortly after the accident in Husepeth Memorial Hospital in Sonora is also to be taken to Fort Hood pending funeral arrangements.

Robert C. Murfin of Support Command, First Armored Division, and Herman F. Scheetz of the 501st Battalion, First Armored Division, were dead at the scene following the crash and the third soldier, Geo. Franklin Siz, Jr., died at 11:15 p. m. Tuesday from head injuries suffered in the accident.

Janes Funeral home ambulance from Ozona picked up the injured soldier and took him to the Sonora hospital, 13 miles away, and returning, picked up the two bodies and brought them here for preparation for burial.

The men were riding in an Army vehicle which overturned twice after a tire apparently blew out as the vehicle entered a curve, an investigating patrolman said.

Home towns of the dead men were not available here nor were funeral arrangements.

## Funeral Today For Mrs. Clayton Crockett Pioneer

Funeral services will be held at 3:30 Thursday afternoon from the Methodist Church here for Mrs. A. W. Clayton, 85, widow of an early day Ozona-San Angelo physician and member of a pioneer Crockett county ranch family.

Mrs. Clayton, who had been ill for several months, died at 7 a. m. Wednesday at her home here. Janes Funeral Home will be in charge of arrangements.

Mrs. Clayton was the widow of the late Dr. A. W. Clayton, a native of Arkansas who started his West Texas practice at Paint Rock in 1890 and later practiced in Ozona and San Angelo.

A daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John W. Henderson, who started ranching in West Texas nearly a century ago, Mrs. Clayton was born Feb. 2 1879, in San Saba County. The family moved to Crockett County before the turn of the century and had extensive ranching interests in this area. Dr. Clayton and Miss Adela Henderson were married here.

The family lived here for several years and moved in 1912 or 1913 to San Angelo, where Dr. Clayton practiced medicine for a number of years before joining with a group of physicians and surgeons in the establishment of San Angelo Medical & Surgical Clinic. He had retired from active practice at the time of his death in 1936.

Mrs. Clayton continued to make her home in San Angelo at 1101 S. David St., until about 1943 when she returned to Ozona, where she had lived since.

Survivors include one daughter, Mrs. John B. Hemphill of San Angelo; two sons, Boyd C. Clayton and Joe Clayton, and three brothers, Roy, Floyd and John Henderson, all prominent Crockett Co. ranchmen.

## Ozona AF Base Declared Surplus By Govt. Agency

A "Notice of Surplus Determination" of government property was received this week by County Judge Brock Jones from the General Services Administration, the government's "utilization and disposal service, real property division, advising that the former Ozona Air Force station has been determined to be surplus property and subject to sale.

The property consists of approximately 41.68 acres of fee-owned land and 2.12 acres of easements, together with 42 structures and is located 4 miles east of Ozona on U. S. 290.

"The applicable regulations provide that public agencies (non-Federal) shall be allowed a reasonable period of time to develop a comprehensive and coordinated plan of use and procurement for surplus real property in which they may be interested," the GSA announcement said. "Disposal of this property, or portions thereof, may be made to public agencies for the public uses stated below whenever the government has determined that the property is available for such uses and that disposal there of is authorized by the statutes cited and applicable regulations.

The uses cited include public park, recreational area, or historic monument; school, classroom or other educational purposes; protection of public health, including research; negotiated sales to public bodies for (Continued on Last Page)

County Judge Brock Jones opened the meeting of the court with its newly appointed committee with a statement of its purpose and a delineation of the committee's function as a building committee and its relations with the court.

"The court selected you members of the committee as a representative group of citizens to advise with the court in planning and in the actual construction of the community building," Judge Jones said. "The court did not pick any of you because you were for or against the bond issue but as a cross section of the community and, I am sure, are as interested as the court in building the best community building possible and spending our dollars as wisely as possible."

The judge explained that the court wanted the committee's help in choosing an architect, in perfecting final plans for the building and in following through on the construction. After the building is completed and accepted by the court, the committee will be discharged, the judge said. The court plans later, he said, to appoint a board of directors to administer the use and maintenance of the building but the present committee was named as a building committee only to advise with the court.

Judge Jones told the group that the court had received applications from five or six architectural firms for the job.

"Are members of the old committee satisfied with the work of Architect Jack McDermitt?" Commissioner C. O. (Lefty) Walker wanted to know.

Joe Couch, Mrs. Boyd Baker and Mrs. Leonard Boyd, all members of the original committee and named to membership on the new committee, agreed that the committee was well satisfied with his work, expressed gratitude to him for his gratis service in helping to formulate planning for the project, and urged that he be given consideration for (Continued on Last Page)

## Signs Urge Tourists Stay With 290

That travelers along U. S. 290 headed east are heeding the advice of the big signs which proclaim 290 as the "direct route" to Austin, Houston, New Orleans, etc. is indicated by information being gathered by filling stations, motels, etc. from tourists.

Many travelers report seeing the signs and continuing on U. S. 290 as the best and most direct route, rather than heeding the call of another sign which seeks to lure travelers to take State Highway 29 which would take them through Iraan, Eldorado, Menard, etc.

There are three signs, located west of Sheffield and before the intersection of Highway 29, the first as travelers approach from the west, is 8x16 feet and cautions the travelers: "Don't Be Misled — Go Straight Ahead," and the U. S. Highway 290 seal is below. Another sign, with the same message, but a little larger in size, 12x24 feet is next and before the traveler reaches the State Highway 29 intersection, he sees the big 12x36 foot sign which proclaims U. S. 290 as the "Direct Route" and lists the LBJ Ranch, Austin, Houston (Continued on Last Page)

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#### LBJ FADES NORMAN THOMAS

President Johnson, in an address of greeting to leaders of various organizations of so-called "senior citizens" who met in the White House last January 15, said:

"We are going to try to take all of the money we think is unnecessarily being spent and take it from the 'haves' and give it to the 'have nots' that need it so much."

This statement, at the time, was written off in many quarters as just another aphorism to reassure the medicare proponents that the Administration would go all-out for health insurance tied in with social security — so that the "haves" (who didn't need or want regimented medical and hospital services) would be paying for the "have nots."

But anyone who has given any thought to the President's pending "war on poverty" bill is sadder and wiser today — and ready to accept an earlier LBJ statement quoted by Robert Spivack in the N. Y. Herald Tribune of last December 1: "You say I am not a liberal. Let me tell you I am more liberal than Eleanor Roosevelt, and I will prove it to you. Franklin D. Roosevelt was my hero — he gave me my start."

And, if that is not proof enough, there is the very recent praise of our President by Norman Thomas, standard-bearer of the Socialist Party, and its quadrennial Presidential candidate as far back as memory serves. In his eulogium, Mr. Thomas made it plain, we thought, that since LBJ expects to run this year, he, himself, may now take it easy — secure in the realization that the banner of Socialism is in strong hands.

For the purposes of the measure now before Congress, "poverty" (which had been generally regarded as a condition threatening starvation) is the parlous state of a citizen with a cash income of no more than \$3,000 a year — who would then be eligible to economic salvation under one or more of the innumerable "programs" this Robin Hood legislation would provide.

Among those who are puzzled over this \$3,000 figure is South Carolina's Democratic Senator Strom Thurman, who points out that: "More than a million members of the US armed services make less than this amount," and that if \$3,000 a year is poverty, "it seems contradictory that in 1963 the Government collected \$3.54 billion in personal income taxes from the 4.1 million Americans having incomes of less than \$1,500."

### Ellenburger Pay Opened Part Vaughn Field

Ellenburger production opened in the original Vaughn field of Crockett County with recompleting with recompletion of the R. Antwell & Associates, Hobbs, N. M., No. 1 Vaughn (Deep) former camp pay opener 11 miles northwest of Ozona three miles northwest of the two-well Ellenburger Vaughn field, which is surrounded by shallow production in the Purefield field.

It was finalized to pump 74 barrels of 42 gravity oil, no water, from open hole between 7,344 feet, where 5 1/2-inch casing was set, and the total depth of the section was acidized with 500 gallons.

Pay was picked at 1,980 feet on Kelly bushing between 2,636 feet. Originally drilled by Gulf Corp. as the No. 1-A Vaughn, it was finalized Oct. 22, as a Wolfcamp pay opener, gauging 239 barrels of 41 gravity oil through a 64-inch choke and perforations between 5,320-340 feet.

### Grass Fires Cost Everybody, Range Specialist Says

College Station - Next time you start to toss a lighted cigarette or match out your car window, why not light a \$20 bill and toss it out instead? Of course you wouldn't think of doing such a thing. However, each time a grass fire destroys the cattleman's pasture, it is costing you as well as him. For each acre of forage burned, \$20-\$50 worth of grass is lost, says C. O. Hoffman, Extension Range Specialist at Texas A&M University.

The grass you see when traveling is the winter hay crop for the stockman. It helps supply beef for you as a consumer. Throughout the year he has worked hard to produce this grass, which is more than just "cow feed." In addition to producing tasty steaks and lamb chops, it provides food and cover for wildlife, holds soil moisture, prevents runoff into lakes and streams and certainly gives the countryside a better face

than does a black cover of burned grass and trees.

This grass doesn't belong just to the rancher - you also have a stake in it. When hunting season rolls around, you will want a big fat buck to hunt and large coveys of quail for the dog to point. Without grass and cover these won't be around. Now, you want plenty of healthy fish, a good place to swim and water ski or just relax and picnic. If someone had burned the acreage around your favorite lake last year, you wouldn't have these now, or did some careless person ruin your summer recreation spot for this year?

After a look at just a few things grass does for you, won't you help the farmer and rancher keep the grass by helping control grass fires? He has done his part by providing fire lanes around his pastures. Now you take your share of the responsibility in conserving one of our most valuable natural resources - grass.

### HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

#### From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas - A costly plan for "catching up" with other states in the field of higher education has been outlined to Texans by the Governor's Committee on Education Beyond the High School.

It will take considerable money to accomplish just one of the major tests of excellence in education - bringing Texas faculty salaries up to the national average. More is needed for libraries and research facilities.

To help achieve goals in those three fields, the Committee recommended that further college construction be delayed.

Gov. John Connally conceded that it will take new taxes to finance the program which he has termed his No. 1 interest. Neither he nor the committee recommended a financing plan.

**Cut Again** - Another 28,602-barrel cut in daily oil allowables was ordered by the Texas Railroad Commission as it held August production to 26.5 per cent of the capability of the wells. Two large purchasers complained they are over-supplied with oil and unable to sell it.

**Public Pier** - Parks and Wildlife Department will advertise a second time for bids for concession rights on the new State fishing pier at Port Lavaca. Only one person submitted a bid July 1 after 13 said they were interested.

The 3,200-foot-long pier, which replaced one destroyed by Hurricane Carla, is said to be the world's longest fishing pier. Access to it will be free to the public, but the department is trying to provide a source of

bait, soft drinks and fishing gear via a concessionaire contract.

**Animal Health Head Change Due** - Texas Animal Health Commission will decide on July 27 on a new commission director to replace Dr. R. G. Garrett of Taylor who plans to resign.

Decision will be made at a meeting to be hosted by Chariman Ed Knolle of Sandia at his Knolle Jersey Farm in Jim Wells County. Knolle said there have been several "well-qualified" applicants for the post, but declined to list them. However, it has been rumored that a staff veterinarian with the commission, Dr. S. B. Walker, will be favored.

**Brucellosis Program Blocked** - Annual Health Commission postponed to September a decision on whether to let a Type II brucellosis control program be set up in one part of Brooks County.

Commission has been informed that many Brooks County producers want to organize a program, but the King Ranch which has 3,991 of the 16,000 head of cattle on county tax rolls does not. Approval of the owners of 75 per cent of the cattle in a county is necessary so the proponents want to organize a program in just the soil conservation district which covers all of the county except King Ranch property.

Commission said it lacked sufficient information for a decision at this time.

**West Texas School** - West Texas cities that want to be home to a new West Texas School for the mentally retarded will have to wait until at least September 14 to learn which will be chosen. Chairman of the Board for State Hospitals and Special Schools' site selections committee, C. E. Bentley of Abilene, said his committee will report to the board on that date. However, Bentley did not say that the committee will make a definite recommendation on a single site at that time.

employment as architect on the project.

Mr. Couch pointed out that the plans were not only approved by the committee but were displayed publicly and reproductions were published in the paper prior to the election. This was the plan on which voters cast their vote of approval, he said.

The floor plan and outside elevation drawing made by Mr. McDermitt were on display before the court and committee. Except for some minor changes suggested, all agreed that the overall plan as outlined by the architect at the original committee's suggestions would meet the community's needs for a civic center building.

"Since architect fees are all the same, and all else being equal, I think he deserves the job and I move that we hire Jack McDermitt as architect and let's get started on this thing," Commissioner Walker said. The motion was seconded and adopted by vote of the court and committee.

In response to an inquiry as to whether or not the building can be built for the amount of bonds voted, Mr. Couch related that Mr. McDermitt had secured separate bids from contractors, with instructions to them to "pad" their estimates liberally to take care of any contingencies, and in each case the estimates for construction of the building and

partial furnishing was under \$100,000, which, he said, should make it possible to build, equip and furnish the structure within the budget limits of the bonds.

"We'll know when we get the bids. If they don't stay within the limits we can rub out and start over again," commented Commissioner Walker in response to a comment by Dick Kirby county auditor, that most architects' estimates of costs usually fall short of actual construction bids. There followed some speculative talk on the possible cost of operation and maintenance of the building but that, too, was finally abandoned and left for determination in the light of actuality.

Judge Jones, after the group had voted to employ Mr. McDermitt as architect, said the next step would be a meeting with the architect to begin the preparation of plans for the building.

"When would you want to meet with him?" Judge Jones asked.

"Tomorrow! Why wait?" was the response from Mrs. Boyd. Judge Jones was then asked to call McDermitt and seek a meeting date but the meeting had to adjourn without contacting him because he was not available by telephone.
