From President Johnson in New York, where he was addressing an Associated Press luncheon, and from Premier Khrushchev in Moscow via Tass news agency, came practically simultaneous annouecements of cutbacks in fissionable materials.

The President said we would cut plutonium production by 20 percent, enriched uranium by 40 percent. Khrushy said he would stop construction on two plutonium plants, divert more fissionable materials to peaceful uses. He would reduce production of Uranium 235 "for nuclear weapons." He didn't say how much.

NATIONAL ISSUES

ECONOMY – Hoover-type commissions, Directly answerable to the Congress, should be instituted along with a system of incentives for Department and Bureau heads who initiate savings in their operations. Also, the various bureaus should be allowed to place surpluses in reserve instead of being compelled to use every dime of appropriations every year.

FOREIGN AID – While maintaining our strategic bases and position abroad, an immediate re-evaluation of our entire Foreign Aid Program is imperative. Stronger loyalty ties must be required of any Foreign A i d recipients. Any waste in Foreign Aid could much better be spent on domestic programs.

NATIONAL CITIZENS COUNCIL – A National Advisory Council composed of leaders from all areas and interest groups should be formed to make recommendations to the Executive and Legislative branches on moving issues of the day, and to established guidelines for Federal action in relation to State and Local governments and Private Enterprise. FOREIGN SERVICE ACADEMY – A Foreign Service Academy, patterned along the lines of our present military academies, should be created in the interest of developing the finest possible corps of diplomats to represent the United States in the arena of world opinion and international negotiation.



OIL IMPORTS – A re-evaluation of the 12.2 percent quota, particularly considering that this figure does not include imported fuel oil.

MEAT IMPORTS – In the interest of protecting one of the basic industries of West Texas, imports of meats must be reduced materially from the present eleven percent quota ceiling.

WATER – An Immediate program of finding new water sources for West Texas is of paramount importance . . . by diversion of flood waters through conduits from other areas, similar to the Imperial valley project, and water conversion plants.
