Peito following the annual averaging of grades of the senior class, covering entire high school careers, by the school faculty.

Keith had a four-year grade point of 94.250 while Janet's average was 92.857.

In third place in scholastic average was Scott Mahon with 92.081. Fourth was Leroy Cooper with 90.250; fifth, Shirley Wagner, 89.088; sixth, Richard Ross, 88.765; and seventh, Diana Faye Coates, 88.5.

## Crockett County's First Republican Primary Planned

### Voting To Be In Basement Of Courthouse Annex Building

For the first time in Crockett county's history a Republican primary is to be held this year, next Saturday, May 2, simultaneously with the Democratic primary.

Under a law passed by a Democratic Texas legislature, the Republican party is being forced to have a primary election to nominate candidates of the party for the November general election ballot. The law requires that a party which polls over a certain number of votes for governor in the last general election must hold a primary.

James Baggett, Republican county chairman, has announced that the primary will be held in the basement of the courthouse annex building. There will be voting boxes for voters in all of the voting precincts in the one polling place, the chairman said.

"We are conducting this primary to protect the rights of voters who may wish to split their ballots in the November election," Mr. Baggett said. "Crockett county has gone Republican in presidential election years recently and to make sure the votes of conservative Crockett county voters are counted in the general election, the Republican primary is being held to comply to the letter with the Texas election code."

With contests for local offices and hot state contests under way among the Democrats, the voting in the Republican primary in this county is expected to be only a token vote. But the chairman pointed out that by holding the primary the November general election split ballot will be strictly legal.

## Area Teams Compete In Invitational Range, Grass Judging Contests Today

### County Rejects Bids For Mineral Leases On County Owned Land

In a special meeting Wednesday, members of the Crockett County Commissioners Court turned down for the present a bid of \$9,491 for an oil and gas lease on approximately 145 acres of county owned land submitted by Earl Rodman, Odessa oil man.

Rodman and associates had submitted the bid for the county acreage for the purpose of including it in an acreage pool to form a drilling unit with oil and gas wells to be drilled near the town of Ozona.

The court had pondered the question for two weeks while members contacted constituents to sound out public opinion. County Judge Brock Jones reported that canvass of commissioners was made and their opinion was that constituents did not favor the lease and consequently their vote was to reject it.

The court acted to reject the bid as of now and to withdraw the county land from the lease market. This does not mean, Judge Jones explained, that the land will not be leased at a later date. If new and more attractive propositions should be made the court will consider them, he said.

## Livestock Judging Team Qualifies To Compete In State

### Ozona FFA Teams Win Honors at Lubbock; First on Wool

Ozona's FFA livestock judging team composed of Jerry Johnson, Dwight Childress, and Moe Barber competed last Saturday in one of Texas Tech's largest and roughest contests.

Of the 135 teams judging, Ozona's team tied for third place in the stiff competition and qualified for the State Finals next Saturday, May 2nd, at Texas A&M University. The Tech contests drew teams from schools all over the Panhandle, North Central and West Texas areas.

The top ten teams in the overall contest were in the following order: O'Donnell 1323, Muleshoe 1288, Ozona and Slaton 1273, Freona 1271, Abilene-Cooper 1266, Brownwood 1258, Post 1256, Sterling City 1250, Iraan 1242.

The contest consisted of judging two classes of sheep, two classes of swine, two classes of cattle, grading two classes of cattle and answering questions on the classes about good and bad points on the animals. Each judging class consisted of four animals.

High scoring individual, Randy Upham, with 477 points in wool judging, led the Ozona FFA wool team to victory and the 1964 winner of the Texas Tech regional wool contest last Saturday. Other team members were Pon Seahorn, tenth high scoring individual with 399 points and Steve Talliaferro with 392 points.

The top 10 teams in the overall wool judging and grading contest were as follows: Ozona 1238, Spur 1199, Iraan 1162, Balmorhea 1161, Memphis 1115, Alpine 1108, Lakeview 1108, Stanton 1101, Sterling City 1097, and Roby, 973.

The contest consisted of four classes of four fleeces each to judge and answer twenty questions about the wool fleeces. The boys had to grade twenty fleeces of wool and give length and shrinkage of each fleece.

#### WILL CROSS HIS HEART

From President Johnson in New York, where he was addressing an Associated Press luncheon, and from Premier Khrushchev in Moscow via Tass news agency, came practically simultaneous announcements of cutbacks in fissionable materials.

The President said he would cut plutonium production by 20 percent, enriched uranium by 40 percent. Khrushchev said he would stop construction on two plutonium plants, divert more fissionable materials to peaceful uses. He would reduce production of Uranium 235 "for nuclear weapons." He didn't say how much.

We will do as we say. Khrushchev might — if only for the novelty of it. But how will we know? No means of checking has been suggested.

Discovery Assured In West Crockett; Delta Spots New Friend Test

A Wolfcamp detrital discovery was assured in Crockett County with the flowing of oil and water on production tests through perforations between 6,762-63 feet at Broseco Corp., Fort Worth.

Swabbed and flowed 20 hours, recovery was 104.83 barrels of oil and 52.41 barrels of water; it then flowed 75 barrels of oil and nine barrels of water in an unreported time on a 24-64-inch choke, with tubing pressure of 75-25 pounds and casing pressure, 600-825 pounds.

Then tested 24 hours it flowed oil at the daily rate of 119.8 barrels. No choke was reported.

It was continuing to flow on various chokes at the hourly rate

of 5.5 barrels of fluid, 70 per cent oil and 30 per cent water. Tubing pressure was 0-325 pounds; casing pressure, 900-1,025 pounds.

Drilled to 8,302 feet, it recovered 1,400 feet of gas, 280 feet of oil and 180 feet of oil and gas-cut mud on a test of the Ellenburger between 8,200-262 feet and 600 feet of gas, 60 feet of oil and 960 feet of oil and gas-cut sulphur water on a test between 8,272-302 feet.

Delta & Pauley, Odessa, will drill the No. 1-C Friend as a 3/4-mile west outpost to Canyon sand gas production in the Ozona, East multipay oil and gas field of Crockett County, 1/2-mile south of Ozona.

Location is 660 feet from the south and west lines of 2-OP-GC&SF. Contract depth is 6,700 feet; ground elevation, 2,479 feet.

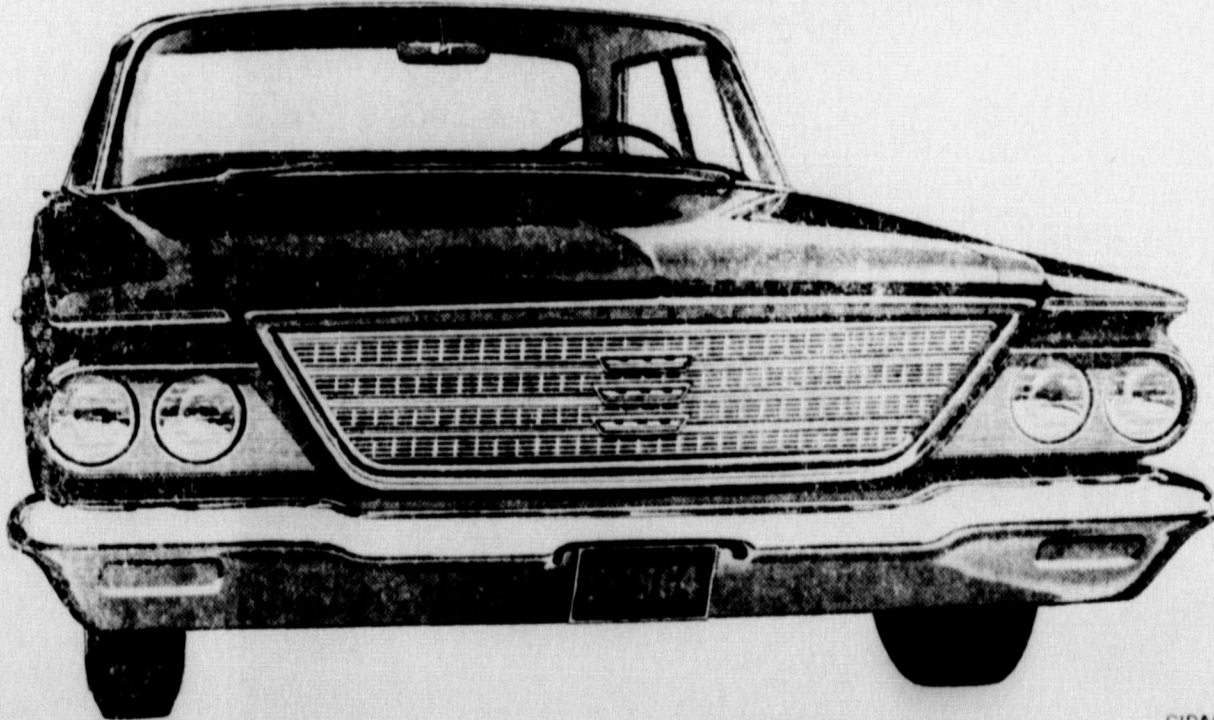

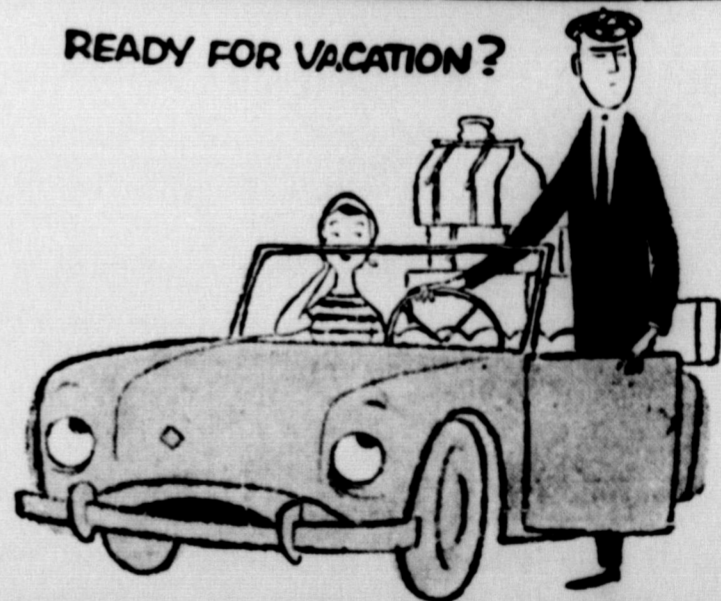

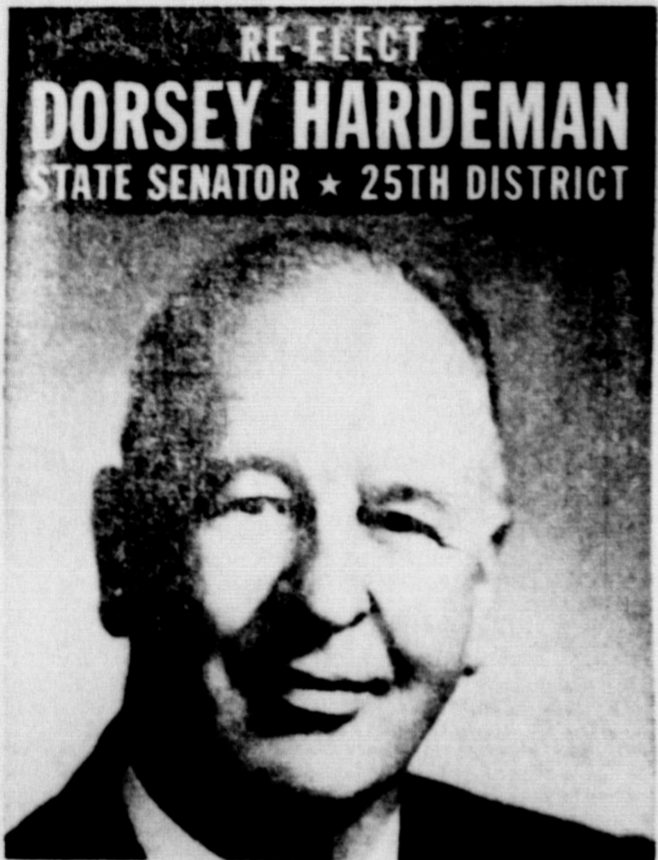
