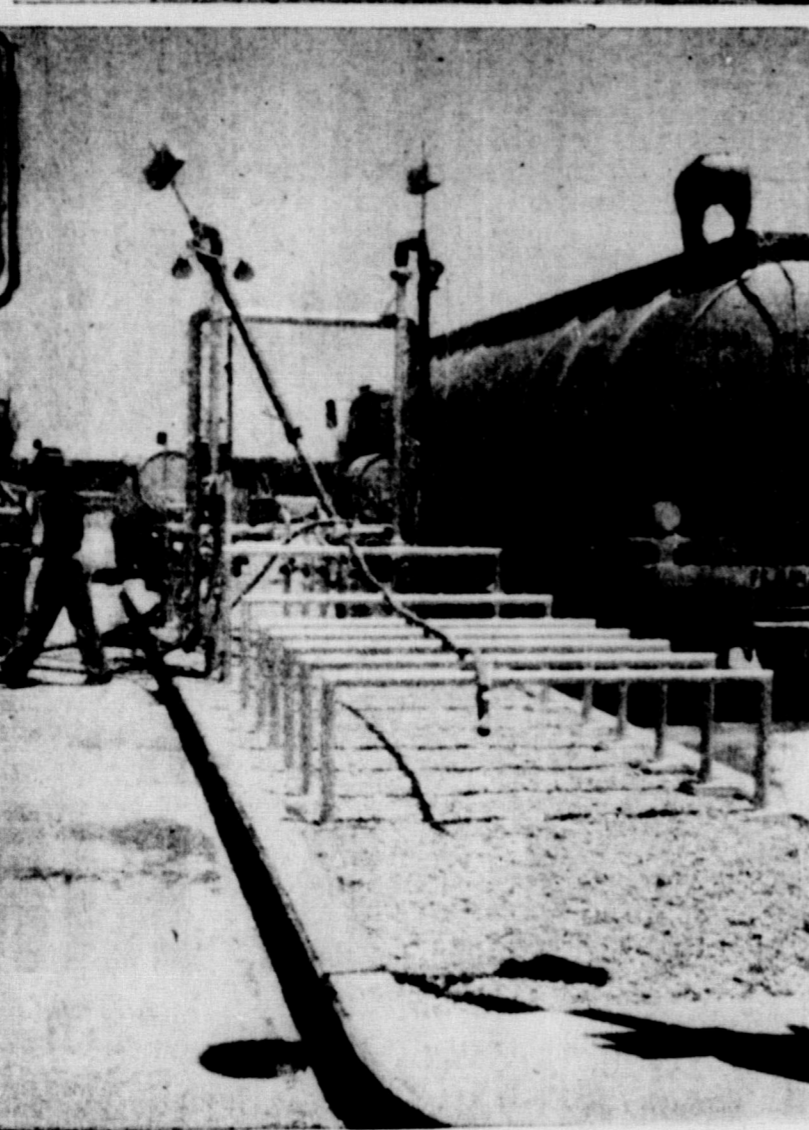

## First Butane Loaded Out At Gas Plant

First product delivery from the new \$3 1/2 million gasoline plant two miles south of Ozona took place Friday and the first trucks being loaded with butane and propane at the new plant's loading dock are pictured above and left.

The huge transport tank trucks are in process of being loaded with the first run of butane and propane produced in the new plant from processing gas from the Hunt-Baggett and the Ozona Canyon gas fields to the east and south and southwest of the plant site.

Henry Miller, superintendent of the sprawling gas plant, said that the loading of tank trucks from the plant's docks would be almost a continuous process as the products are extracted from the gas in the maze of condensers, vessels, compressors, etc., through which it passes. The trucks are lined up in front of the battery of huge round-nosed tanks in which the highly volatile liquids are stored. The round tanks in the background hold condensate from the gas and the tall towers, or vessels, are part of the refining equipment.

## Canyon Gas Pay Added In Hunt Baggett Field

Miller Ranch Reentry  
Extends Canyon  
Production 4 Miles

Crockett County gained a discovery and a confirmation during the past week.

Chambers & Kennedy, Midland, No. 1 Hunt-Miller, Canyon sand gas-distillate discovery, 12 miles south of Ozona, 1 1/2 miles east of the Hunt-Baggett (Strawn gas-distillate) field and 1/2-mile west of 3,200-foot oil production in the Refoil multipay pay, was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2,850,000 cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 127,500-1. Gravity of the liquid was 66.5 degrees.

Production was through perforations at 6,262, 6,268, 6,506, 6,511, 6,516, 6,520 and 6,524 feet in 4 1/2-inch casing set at 9,831 feet. Pay section had been fractured with 35,000 gallons and 30,000 pounds of sand.

Originally drilled by the same operator as the No. 1 Miller, it was temporarily abandoned July 31, 1961, at 9,798 feet. Elevation is 2,445 feet.

Operator has suggested field designation of Hunt-Baggett (Canyon sand).

In precinct 1, voters pulled a surprise and, by a four-vote margin, renominated C. O. (Lefty) Walker for another term as Commissioner of Precinct 1 without a run-off. Walker won the renomination over his two opponents by a vote of 192 to their combined 188. Former Commissioner and county judge Ralph Jones polled a total of 95 votes while Doyle Perdue received 93.

In the state races, Crockett voters favored Governor John Connally in his bid for re-election. Connally polled 831 votes to 178 for Don Yarborough, 20 for Banks and 9 for Hachworthe.

Preston Smith received 797 votes to 188 for Fuentes and Ralph Yarborough barely nosed out Gordon McClendon by a vote of 500 to 480.

Joe Pool, congressman at large was the favorite of local voters, polling 492 to 209 for his nearest rival, Don Sullivan. For land commissioner, White was favored over Shivers and Jerry Sadler ran ahead of Fred Williams 754 to 188.

Jim Langdon, former district judge here, was another heavy favorite, polling 806 to 159 for his opponent, Jack Pope was favored by a vote of 615 to 191.

In the race for the Democratic nomination for U. S. Congressman from the 16th district, Richard White received 542, Malcolm McGregor, 226, and Betty Dooley 159.

State Senator Dorsey Hardeeman was an easy winner with 810 votes to 168 for Miss Camfield. State Representative James A. Nugent, District Judge Charles Sherrill and District Attorney Dixon Mahon, all received heavy votes. Mahon led with 1100 votes. Rusty Smith, unopposed in Precinct 3 for Commissioner, polled 348 votes. Gene Williams received 1098 for constable and Robert Owen was a write-in for county attorney on 12 ballots.

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#### WE'VE BEEN HAD

Not since the Depression, when President Franklin D. Roosevelt took the nation off the gold standard, has it been possible for a citizen with a paper dollar to get gold for it. During the interim, the US has been credited with having more gold than anybody in the vaults at Fort Knox — \$24.5 billion at one point!

Today, thanks to reckless foreign aid policies, plus spending for and by our overseas forces, foreigners now hold \$26 billion of our money we have said is redeemable in gold. But we ain't got it!

We now have \$15.461 billion in gold. We must reserve \$12.7686 billion by law to support our currency and banking liabilities. The Government has borrowed \$1.830 billions repayable in gold. That leaves \$832.4 million (not billion). Obviously, that \$26 billion held abroad will not be convertible to gold.

But, devaluation of the dollar is still not inevitable. Cutting foreign spending to the bone would restore a favorable balance of trade, relieve planned budget deficits. Passage of the Johnson \$3.4 billion foreign aid program would really tear it — our dollar bill, that is. Hold your hats! And holler!

#### Congressman ED FOREMAN Reports

The new "War on Poverty" package is primarily an expansion and duplication of already existing federal programs . . . a "war" that has been going on for years.

The Administration is proposing the new "poverty-package", H. R. 10440, at total first year cost of \$962.5 million and a projected cost in subsequent years that could easily run as high as \$14 billion annually. Excluding Social Security benefits and other trust funds, 42 federal programs now existing and aimed directly at eliminating the causes of poverty and its effects, will cost nearly \$9 billion in fiscal 1965.

America's needy have not exactly been abandoned to the wolves for so, these many years,

although you could possibly lose sight of the facts amid the cries of "New and Better Deals." I believe the "best deal" for eliminating poverty is the creation of new jobs and employment opportunities through an expansion, encouragement and unleashing of our free enterprise economy, not by catchy slogans, shop-worn programs or more welfare handouts.

Approximately 80% of the revenue from personal income taxes are paid by the folks in the 20% bracket. The "little man" is the poor chap saddled with the soaring spend-thrift cost of "big government".

If our nation's millionaires were taxed 100% of their incomes, each year, it would run the federal government only 39 hours . . . If all the income from individuals making over \$25,000 per year was taken as tax, it would run the government for only 18½ days. This might be one reason why the majority of Americans, at least those who are paying the bill, want to reduce the size, cost and control of federal government.

A news dispatch sent by the Associated Press from Saigon, Viet Nam, April 16, reported "the mounting bloodshed of South Viet Nam's guerrilla war has

rocketed the American casualty rate. In the first months of 1964, 234 American servicemen have been killed, but if it continues steadily, it is now the total for the year. It is expected to reach 500. In Washington, April 16, the Defense Department announced that for the period from 1961, to Monday, April 12, 124 Americans had been killed in action, another 85 killed in nonbelligerent circumstances, and 788 wounded or more American servicemen killed in action.

## OZONA STUDENTS TO ATTEND SUMMER PROGRAMS

Eight Texas colleges and universities sponsor a Summer Science Training Program for high ability, high school students during the summer of 1964. This year Joel Huff, Pete Garza, and Rick Hagelstein were recommended from Ozona to take the application tests. Over 5,500 competed for admission to these schools which can accept about 30 students for the programs.

Pete Garza was accepted at Texas College, Tyler, Texas, in chemistry and was selected as alternate at Texas University in chemistry. Pete will attend the program at Tyler from June 1, through July 24.

Rick Hagelstein was selected as alternate at Texas University in chemistry and at Texas A&M in mathematics.

Joel Huff was accepted at SMU in math, Texas A&M in math,

Colorado School of Mines in chemistry, University of Houston in Science and math, and at Texas University in chemistry. Joel plans to attend the summer program at Texas University in chemistry. The program will last from June 14, through July 25.

Expenses of participants in the summer programs will be paid for by the Ozona Women's Forum. Certainly the selection of three Ozona students as participants or alternates from over 5,500 top students in the state speaks very well for the school system here in Ozona.

Top of pay was picked at 8,393 feet on ground elevation of 2,649 feet. Tubing pressure was 655 pounds; casing pressure, 625 pounds. Total depth is 9,337 feet. Dual completion from the Fus-
