Lasater is a member of the ETSC mile relay team that won first place in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics National Meet recently. The team's best time this year was 4:12.4.

Delta-Pauley Plans Test On Couch Ranch

Oil and gas activity near Ozona continued to be successful during the last week with the following reports having been listed over the past few days.

Delta and Pauley, among owners of the Ozona Gas Processing plant, will drill the No. 1-A Couch, a 7,100 foot Canyon test, one and three eighths miles northeast of the nearest Canyon production in the Ozona South-west multipay field of Crockett county, seven miles southwest of Ozona.

Location is 660 feet from the south and 900 feet from the east lines of the 19-QR-TTRR. Ground elevation 2,515 feet.

In another report, Henderson and Lynn Inc. of Midland set four and one half inch casing at the 1,078 feet, perforated opposite the Queen from 1,054-58 feet acidized with 500 gallons and was swabbing to test, no gauges, at the No. 1 W. E. West Estate, in 2-Runnels east, Crockett County wildcat 12 miles northwest of Ozona and one and one half miles southeast of the Midway Lane multipay field.

Slated to 1,700 feet to test the San Andres, it was drilled to 1,515 feet and is plugged back to 1,080 feet.

Tower Calls For Reduction In Oil Imports To U. S.

Senator John Tower, in separate letter to President Lyndon Johnson and Secretary of the Interior Stewart Udall, urged moves to reduce foreign oil imports.

Tower told the President that "there is a drastic need, throughout the domestic oil and gas industry, for measures that would relieve the present unhealthy situation."

The Senator asked Udall for "some definite action in the way of drastically reducing foreign imports so this vital domestic industry may survive."

In the letter to Udall, Tower said the present situation "cannot continue or the domestic oil and gas industry will perish. It is almost impossible for an independent to survive in this business today, and it is becoming increasingly more difficult for the smaller companies to stay in business."

18-Year-Olds To Be Called Up For Exam By Draft

Austin—The first official call directing the physical and mental examination of 18-year-old males by state draft boards is scheduled to be placed in the mail Wednesday, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said this morning.

The quota, effective in July, directs the examination of 1,816 Texas 18-year-olds in that month. These youths will not be considered for armed forces service at this time, Colonel Schwartz pointed out. Normally, a man is not reached for draft induction until about age 22.

Instead, their examination is the result of President Johnson's action of January 5, announcing that he was ordering the Director of Selective Service and the Secretary of Defense to examine all newly-registered men who are out of school and otherwise available for service.

Men married at age 18 and those known to be continuing in school currently will not be examined under the program. Also, high school graduates whose draft files show they intend to enter college the following semester will not be ordered for examination. If a high school graduate plans

Officers Arrest Trio of Robbery Suspect Monday

Crockett County Sheriff's forces arrested three heavily armed young men near the old drive - in theater Monday and they later admitted under questioning a number of robberies ranging from Benton, Arkansas, to Brownsville, Texas.

The trio, armed with a 30-30, a sawed-off shotgun and two Bowie Knives, offered no resistance when they were arrested after the break down of their car just north of Ozona.

The admitted robberies, which were of a break-in nature, were listed by the trio as having occurred near Benton, Ark. at Brownsville, Texas, and at Olmito, Texas.

The trio are suspected by law enforcement officers of having been in more than has thus far been admitted and further questioning was slated for this week while inquiries on the men, who carried identification from Illinois, are being made.

The car in which the three men were riding contained some of the loot which the group admitted taking.

Officers lodged the trio in separate jails, in Eldorado, Ozona and Sonora, for safe keeping following their arrest.

West Texas Boys Ranch Dedicates New Building

On June 7th, the West Texas Boys Ranch dedicated a new vocational building. Funds for the building were donated by Mr. and Mrs. R. G. Carr of San Angelo. This building is a long-time dream for the Ranch. For years the Ranch has placed emphasis on introductory vocational training and job placement. It has needed a place where the younger boys and older boys could develop more skill in working with machinery etc. The Carr Building has a shop for the younger boys and one for the older boys, a classroom and a library.

In the vocational building the boys will be taught basic skills and given an opportunity to make projects which they can use. One program planned is the upholstering and remodeling of furniture. As a result of the training the boys receive at the Ranch, many of them go on to further a life time trade which was started at the Ranch.

The West Texas Boys Ranch has 66 boys in residence and 16 to 20 in placement away from the Ranch. The boys are given an opportunity to work away from the Ranch during the summer on such jobs as ranching, garages, etc. This has been very beneficial as it gives the older boys an opportunity to develop more skill, self-respect, and also an opportunity to earn extra money.

In the early days of the Ranch, food, clothing, and shelter, were the primary concerns. However, through the years, the Ranch has come to develop a program centered around the social, emotional, and spiritual needs of the boys. The Ranch has its full-time chaplain and the boys accept the major responsibility in carrying out the church program. Each boy

gives one dime to the church each week out of his allowance.

Throughout the years, since it was founded, the Ranch has continued to operate solely on donations. More than 600 boys have lived at the Ranch. The Ranch accepts boys from ages 8-14 and since January have received over 80 applications and have only been able to take care of twelve. At the present time, the Ranch is trying to make arrangements to accept ten boys who definitely need to be at the Ranch.

A boy is kept at the Ranch until he has progressed to the point that he can go into society on his own. This depends on the boy and the community.

Boys are generally referred to the Ranch by churches, interested citizens or professional juvenile workers. Some of the boys go to the Ranch on their own. The Executive Director, Morris H. Craig pointed out that one boy came for a week-end and stayed five years.

"West Texas Boys Ranch is West Texans way of taking care of their own and what they do for the Ranch is done because of love", remarked Morris Craig.

Local Missionary Home on Leave From Formosa

Miss Lola Mae Daniels, formerly a teacher in the Ozona Public Schools and now a Missionary for the Southern Baptist Convention in Free China (Formosa) is visiting friends and relatives in Ozona and Austin for a few weeks while on leave from her position.

Miss Daniels stated that she loved her work and that she had been blessed along with the other American missionaries with a rather warm reception by the Chinese people, but Miss Daniels said that the great multitude of people who were untouched by any mission activity, left one with a feeling of the tremendous scope of the task undertaken.

Miss Daniels said that bombing and shelling on the little outpost islands of Quemoy and Matsu could be heard at times and that Chiang Kai-shek held his troops in a constant state of readiness either to invade China or to repel an invasion of Formosa, neither of which seems very likely at the moment.

The lack of variety in Chinese food, principally rice, and the extreme poverty of the people were two things that were the hardest to get used to Miss Daniels said.

A few additional basic products such as coffee and sugar are available if the buyer has the money, but most often coffee can only be obtained on the black market where prices are far too high for anything but the most wealthy Chinese and the few scattered Americans on the island. For some time now there has been a certain uneasiness on the island and Miss Daniels said that all American citizens have been warned to take precaution because of the presumed threat of Communist internal activity, but thus far no sign of any unrest among the people is apparent and it appears that the Chiang Government which is supported by the U. S. is in firm control.

Miss Daniels said that the soil on the island is very rich and that she had never seen anywhere where

flowers grew in such beauty and profusion.

The former Ozona teacher teaches in a mission school and also has a number of adult classes in English, which along with personal contact work keeps her very busy.

Miss Daniels was in Ozona for several days last week and is now in Austin, but will return here for a few weeks before returning to the Far East in August.

NEITHER RIGHT NOR LEFT?

To those who have accepted the glib formula, "middle of the road" as delineating the path of moderation and virtue in all things - especially politics - we present the views of Howard Kershner on the subject, excerpted from his book, "God, Gold and Government".

"Let us look closely at this middle-of-the-road doctrine," writes Mr. Kershner.

"Is there something sacred about keeping in the 'middle-of-the-road' as between right and left?"

"Why is less effort being made currently to determine what is right and what is wrong, and more emphasis being placed on the desirability of steering a course between the two?"

"Compromises are sometimes necessary, but not as between right and wrong, not as between truth and error..."

"If one group says 12 times 12 is 144 and another group contends it is 160, why not try to discover the facts rather than assume the correctness of a middle course that 12 times twelve is 152?"

"The middle-ground philosophy is an absurdity — a course plausible only to the unthinking who are not willing to bestir themselves in an effort to find the facts but are eager to appear tolerant and compromising in the hope of retaining popularity in all quarters."

"I once heard a middle-of-the-road preacher declare: 'If you don't repent in a measure and change your ways considerably, you will be damned to a certain extent.'"

"What we need is a resolute determination in all quarters to find the right course of action and then adopt it, and not go wobbling down the middle-of-the-road, comforting ourselves that we are at least half right."

"If the truth lies on one side of the road or the other, we are certainly wrong if we stay in the middle."

And since Ike's effort to dust off Pennsylvania's Governor Scranton as one who won't rock the boat has fizzled, accept—even at the risk of copper-velvetting a Johnson victory.

destiny at San Francisco the words of Michigan's Governor Romney to the Governor's Conference at Cleveland. He said (somewhat redundantly, but he said it):

NO WAY TO DIE

It is beginning to dawn on the American people that they have once again been sucked into a Korean-type war that we are not supposed to win. This time, of course, it is in South Viet Nam, and there are other differences. US military men are supposed to be advising and training South Viet Nam forces in their unequal struggle against the Communist Viet Cong guerillas, not fighting. They are not, as yet at least, under UN direction as in Korea, their orders coming from Washington. But they are fighting — and dying — in another war in which the enemy cannot be pursued or harassed beyond the borders of South Viet Nam into the Red sanctuaries of Cambodia or Laos or North Viet Nam.

Most shocking of all the reports coming out of this heart-breaking struggle tell of the obsolescence of our pilots have had to fly, presumably because of the terms of a Geneva treaty of 1954 requiring that worn-out equipment in South Viet Nam could only be replaced (piece by piece) by similarly delapidated items. And the story that rocked Washington was that of Jim Lucas, of Scripps Howard, who told of two U S airmen who died in their T-28 trainers when the wings came off in bombing runs — and of the other pilots who could expect the same fate any day!

to enter college this summer or fall, he should notify his draft board immediately.

The 18-year-olds going for the examination in July will be primarily those who registered with draft boards in January 1964.

"The 18-year-olds who will be sent for examination in July and succeeding months," Colonel Schwartz said, "are those in class I-A, I-A-O, and I-O who became 18 years of age on or after January 1, 1964, the eldest first."

The examination of these 18-year-olds is a part of the President's actions on manpower conservation, generally referred to as the "war on poverty," the news release said. The 18-year-olds who fail the mental examination in July and subsequent months will be referred by draft board letters to local offices of the Texas Employment Commission, where they will receive advice and counsel on jobs preparation for jobs.

The youths who get these letters will be under no compulsion to visit the TEC offices, but may go if they feel the government's offer to help will benefit them, the release declared.

The new route recommended by the other signs failed to mention poor stretches of crooked road, limited or non-existent cafe and tourist court accommodations and other hazards of which the motorist would not be advised.

Leader Of Dairy Industry Is Dead

Bryan Blalock, for years a leading spokesman for the dairy industry, died Saturday (June 13) in Marshall, Texas.

The 63-year-old native of East Texas, who as a boy could not muster courage for a classroom recitation, later developed a unique style of platform speaking that boosted him as one of the nation's top-flight orators.

He organized the first dairy manufacturing plant in Marshall in 1939 and expanded his operations to five Texas cities. In 1943, Blalock's company was acquired by Borden's.

Only last year, Blalock retired as a vice president of the Southern Division of The Borden Company. In the past 20 years, he made more than 2,000 talks in 36 states and Canada in behalf of the dairy industry.
