## Three Ozona FFA Members Leave On Good Will European Tour; Group To Visit Eight Countries

Three Ozonans will be included in a Texas Future Farmers of America Goodwill People-to-People Delegation to Western and Eastern Europe this month which left New York Tuesday, June 9th, for a twenty day tour of six countries on the continent in addition to Scotland and England.

Ozonans making the tour are Keith Mitchell, Jr., Monroe (Moe) Barbee and Herbert C. Noelke. A total of 26 students from Texas will be included on the tour which is being conducted by Mr. and Mrs. Wilbert Meischen of Raymondville with the tour conductor Mr. Johannes Antonius Nollet of Amsterdam, Holland.

The tour and arrangements were made for Mr. and Mrs. Meischen by Mautpout Associates of Lawrence Kansas.

The group assembled in New York on Sunday and flew from New York via KLM Royal Dutch Airlines at Kennedy airport for Glasgow Scotland where the group arrived yesterday.

While in New York the group visited the New York World Fair and also had a sightseeing tour of some of the great attractions in the city.

While in Scotland the FFA group will visit Scottish farms and leave Friday for London where they will spend most of Friday and all day Saturday before flying on to Copenhagen for several days before going to Prague in Czechoslovakia thence to Budapest in Bulgaria and then back to West Germany and on to Belgium and Holland thence home.

Purpose of the goodwill tour is to establish better understanding between American farm youth and their counterparts in Europe with of course a vast amount of educational experience and knowledge about other peoples of the world becoming available to the group.

The entire tour in so far as the country to country tour is concerned will be by air giving the group as much time as possible at the locations of the visits during the brief three week tour.

## Two Native Ozonans Lose Lives In Airplane Crash Near Mason

### County Supports Winners; Light Vote Saturday

A light Crockett County vote went solidly for winners in Saturday's Democratic and Republican Primary runoffs giving almost a two to one margin to all three winners.

Six Republican voters turned out for the single runoff race between George Bush and Jack Cox and Bush got four of the six ballots as he won rather handily from Cox all over the state.

In the Democratic runoff boxes were open at the Court House, Powell Field, Owens, and the Power Plant with a total of 96 ballots being cast.

The court house had 62 of the votes, that including several absentee votes and the Power Plant had a rather astonishing 20 votes with Powell six and Owens 8.

The vote in all boxes correctly named the winners and by rather sizeable margins as Joe Pool, running for Congressman at large from Dallas County, ran off and hid from his opponent Robert W. Baker, by a 76 to 18 margin.

It is expected that the soon to come re-districting of the states congressional districts will give Dallas another place and it is speculated that Pool will get it.

### 1964 Ayer Goes To Publisher

The final proof of the 1963-64 edition of the Ozona School annual, Ayres, which is now the "Lion" was turned over to the publishers by Miss Mildred North, faculty annual sponsor this week.

The annual which comes out each year soon after school begins the following year will contain sections on each of the schools in the Ozona system with the emphasis on the 1963-64 school year in Ozona High School.

Since school ended Miss North has been at work printing late pictures, making corrections and arranging copy in proper sequence.

Funeral services were conducted in Ozona Monday afternoon for a son and a daughter of a prominent Crockett County ranching family, killed along with the pilot of the private chartered plane which crashed last Thursday on its way to Houston.

Those killed were Robert (Bob) Massie West, 27, of Ozona, Mrs. Ann West Simons, 33, of San Angelo, and John Wilbur Longenette, 43, pilot of the plane.

Robert West and his sister, Mrs. Ann West Simons, son and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Massie West who ranch in Crockett County.

It is believed that the plane carrying West and his sister went down shortly after take-off even though for awhile there were conflicting stories about the plane having been in Houston on Thursday which later seemed to be false.

The plane, a piper comanche, went down in a sharp dive and struck in a small valley on the Sam Flemming ranch about eight miles southwest of Pontotoc on the Mason-San Saba County line.

## Crockett County Pioneer Dies In Angelo Hospital

Roger R. Dudley, 78, pioneer Crockett County rancher and business man died at St. John's Hospital in San Angelo this morning at 3:30 a. m., after a long illness.

Dudley was born in Coleman, Texas, on December 23, 1885 and came to Crockett County and Ozona in 1898 having resided in the County ever since.

In 1917 Dudley built what is now known the Wood House in Ozona the building at that time being designed to hold Mr. Dudley garage and car dealership which he operated a number of years before going into the ranching business in the western part of the County a number of years ago.

Mr. Dudley has been in failing health for over a year but had not been critically ill until the last few months.

The plane crashed among a heavy growth of live oak trees amidst outcropping granite rock and was torn to bits by the force of the impact, all three occupants being killed instantly.

Mrs. Simons had been under care of a doctor in Houston and her brother had been having trouble with his hearing.

According to relatives, the two had planned to take a commercial flight to Houston but missed it and chartered Longenette's plane. Longenette was a well known and an experienced charter pilot and instructor.

Due to lack of a flight plan and also due to the indefinite nature of the trip, relatives were not alarmed when they did not return Thursday, and it was Sunday morning before a search got under way that finally discovered the plane near Mason.

The San Angelo Civil Air Patrol Unit was alerted at 4 a. m. Sunday and planes were up soon after daylight with the wreckage being spotted by Robert Lawrence of San Angelo about noon. Planes from Brady, Mason, Menard and Ozona had flown 17 sorties before the discovery was made.

Robert West was a graduate of San Angelo High School and later attended T. C. U. where he was a member of Delta Tau Delta fraternity. He married Kathleen McKenzie in San Antonio in 1961 after which he returned to Crockett Co. where he has been in the ranching business. He is survived by his wife and two young children, Robert, 2, and Margo, 4 months.

Mrs. Simons attended Hockaday Junior College and Southern Methodist University where she was a member of Kappa Gamma Sorority.

In 1951 she married Edwin Simons in San Angelo and later married Bob Bissett of Ozona and resumed the name Simons following a divorce. Mrs. Simons is (Continued on Last Page)

**Bill To Eradicate Salt Cedar Out Of Committee**

Washington, June 4. The Irrigation and Reclamation unit of the House Interior Committee has passed legislation introduced by Rep. Joe Pool, Democratic Congressman at Large from Texas, to eradicate 70,000 acres of salt cedar along the Pecos River in Texas and New Mexico.

Salt cedars are fast-multiplying, water-seeking plants which consume twice as much water per acre as do crop plants grown in the Pecos Basin.

The legislation calls for an interstate removal program which will restore 55,000 acre feet of water per year for irrigation in Texas.

"The benefit of this program will not be limited to the Pecos farmers," Pool noted. "Estimates are that it will send an additional 11,000 acre feet of water downstream to the Rio Grande."

**White Thank Voters of County**

El Paso, June 9 — Richard White, who successfully won the Democratic nomination of Congress from Texas sprawling 16th District in Saturday's runoff balloting, leaves today for a "thank-you" tour of six of the district's 19 counties.

"This was an exceptionally hard-fought primary and runoff campaign which demonstrated the fixed intention of the Democratic Party in West Texas to wage an all-out effort to reclaim the 16th District seat in Congress now held by a Republican incumbent," Mr. White said.

"Spirited inter-party elections have always been traditional in the Democratic Party, and it has been equally traditional that following the selection of a nominee, ranks are closed with a solid front being formed for the general elections," he added.

"I feel that the present Democratic administration is taking a prudent approach to the tremendous problems which face this country today — both on the domestic and foreign scenes — and I believe strongly that the people of West Texas will favor the positive, analytical approach to representation we offer in conjunction with the administration." In the months ahead I intend to continue to carry my proposals to the people, including my positive and basic programs for economy in government.

Mr. White said that his immediate plans include a trip to Washington to confer with top administration officials and my many friends in Washington sometime this month following completion of his "thank-you" tour of the district.

"We will then immediately start laying the groundwork for the campaign leading up to the general elections in November," he said.

Ozona Gets New Game Warden

Crockett County was assigned a game warden this week with the arrival of Norman Hooten and his wife and two children in Ozona.

Crockett County will be Warden Hootens first assignment after graduating this spring from the Texas A&M's game and fish school.

Mr. and Mrs. Hooten moved to Ozona from Garland Texas but Warden Hooten's home had previously been in Lampasas.

Hootens assignment coincided with the first steps toward shaping Texas' vaunted wildlife harvest taken in 152 counties this week, according to E. A. Walker, assistant director for wildlife of the Parks and Wildlife Department.

Under the law, hearings are to be held at this time

in the counties where game and fish seasons, bag limits and other details are determined by the Parks and Wildlife Commission. Proposed changes in existing rules and regulations were explained at the meeting in Ozona Monday. Regulations for the taking of game and fish in the remaining 102 counties in the State are set by legislative action.

Results of the hearings, which was presided over by hearing officers selected from the Department's staff were forwarded to the Commission for formal action.

"We hope local hunters and fishermen, and all others interested in wildlife and fisheries conservation, will attend these hearings," said Walker, "Because of the limited number of hearing officers available and time requirements involved, it has been necessary to schedule the hearings at varying times of the day."
