## YOU CAN BUY 'EM CHEAPER - Drouth, Aphids, Casebearers, Shuck Worms - Few Of The Things That May Be Causing Your Pecans To Drop Off

What's making your pecans drop off the trees before maturing? W. H. (Cooch) Chandler, spraying service man, had been asked the question so many times by Ozonians that he gathered a batch of samples of the fallen immature nuts and sent them to A&M College for examination by specialists.

Harlan E. Smith of the A&M staff, answered the query by listing three possible causes of the condition, Chandler reported.

One of the causes as listed by the specialist was "Later generation pecan nut casebearer (feeding on the shuck after the nut has hardened). A second possible cause was "inadequate supply of

moisture in the soil." And that's the most common cause of all kinds of plant growing troubles in West Texas.

And a third and last listed possible cause of the falling nuts was "partial defoliation of pecan trees by the black pecan aphid." This little fellow, Mr. Chandler said, is the cause of the "honey dew" drip from pecan trees in this area in the summer. His activity can be at least slowed somewhat with frequent spraying, but if you pour enough water around your trees and spray them often enough you can grow some pecans right in your own yard - but you can buy 'em a lot cheaper at the store.

## Heavy Rains To South And East Put Draws On Run

Heavy rains, reportedly up to five inches, fell south and east of Ozona in weekend disturbances which brought spotted showers in West Texas areas.

George Montgomery's Hudspeth ranch is reported to have received up to five inches of rain and draws were running over a wide swath of ranch country south of Ozona. High waters stopped traffic on Highway 163 for a time, according to reports, and to the east of Ozona the Albert Bailey ranch reported a heavy fall of more than four inches with neighboring ranches reporting good rains.

## WTU Announces Property Wide Rate Reduction

A company-wide \$1,100,000 annual reduction in electric rates was announced today by West Texas Utilities Company. One hundred and sixty three towns and communities served by the Utilities Company will benefit from the rate reduction.

The new rates will be effective with meter readings made after August 31, 1964. These new rate schedules result from a reduction in the Company's income taxes due to recent changes in the federal income tax rates and the increased usage of electricity by present customers together with greater company operating efficiencies and economies.

"These rate reductions," St Phillips, WTU President said, "are evidence of our policy of reducing the cost of service to customers whenever we can. The \$490,000 direct reduction in our federal income taxes, plus the improved operating efficiencies of new generating equipment we have recently put into service, as well as the new facilities now under construction, make it possible for us to pass on again real savings to our customers. ### Crockett Co. 4-H Record Books In District Judging

Seven Crockett county 4-H members have prepared and submitted their 4-H record books for district judging.

In the senior division, Lelie Mitchell is entered in Texas Sheep & Goat Program; Larry Williams in Conservation of Natural Resources; Rex Bland in Range Management Result Demonstration; and David Jacoby in Santa Fe Achievement.

Junior 4-H members entering records are Steven Hubbard in Agriculture; Fred Deaton in Wildlife Conservation; and Kathy Williams in Beef Cattle Demonstration. Larry Williams also entered his record for the J. T. Rutherford Achievement Trophy Award.

According to county agent Pete W. Jacoby, the senior records entered this year will offer strong competition in district and state judging. Senior records that win in the district will be entered for state competition and will be judged in September. Crockett county 4-H members have won ten state awards with 4-H record books in years past.

### Ballot Mailed For County ASC Committee Slate

Ballots have been mailed out this week from the Crockett County ASC office to eligible producers in the county for the election of a new county committee to administer affairs of the ASC program in this county.

Ten nominees have been presented for consideration of the cooperating ranch operators who participate in the government conservation program. From this number the first five receiving the highest number of votes will become members of the county committee, the highest being named board chairman, the next two vice chairman and secretary, respectively, and the last two will be alternates.

The ten names from which the new committee for the coming year will be picked are James Baggett, Charles S. Black, Jr., D. F. Coates, Jr., Joe Tom Davidson, Fred Hagelstein, Dempster Jones, Beecher Montgomery, J. B. Parker, Nat Read and W. P. Seahorn, Jr.

The ballots must be mailed back to the office not later than September 10 and will be opened and tabulated Sept. 14. Wives of eligible producers are also eligible to vote for committee members.

The new committee will take office Oct. 1, 1964.

Ground was broken early this week at the west side site where construction is soon to get under way on the new \$125,000 civic center for Ozona, made possible by voter approval, at a recent election, of a bond issue in that amount for its construction.

The preliminary work of grading, leveling and filling the lot, donated by Ranchman Dick Henderson as a memorial to the pioneers of Crockett county, is being done with county machinery before the construction contract is awarded.

The building site, on the northeast corner at the intersection of First Street and Avenue H, across from the football stadium to the north and from the medical center building to the east, is 200 by 200 feet out of the corner of the Henderson ranch trap. County crews have rolled up the ranch fence and installed new fence on the north and east boundaries of the lot and county machines were busy at the first of the week hauling caliche for the fill and grading, packing and sprinkling equipment going over the newly laid dirt to settle it in preparation of the building site.

The county Commissioners Court ordered the site preparation to be done with county machinery rather than include this work in the construction contract, the county being able to do the work at a considerable saving in the final construction cost.

San Angelo Architect Jack McDermitt, who has been employed to prepare plans and specifications and supervise construction of the building, has told the court that he expects to have plans and specifications ready for final approval in about three weeks. As soon as these final plans are prepared and approved, advertising for bids can begin, County Judge Brock Jones said.

The civic center, which will be available for use of organized groups for public meetings, for conventions, entertainment features, club meetings, family reunions and dozens of other types of gatherings, will be of brick and tile construction on a concrete slab.

It will provide a large auditorium where banquets, concerts, convention meetings and the like may be held, complete with stage for dramatic or musical (Continued on Last Page)

TOCSIN OF TONKIN

Americans are indebted to the mysterious attack of North Vietnamese P. T. boats on the USS Maddox on patrol in Tonkin Gulf on several counts.

First, it provided comforting evidence that US defense forces can move quickly and decisively under provocation.

Second, it demonstrated in the swift passage of the Congressional resolution supporting the President's action our essential unity irrespective of politics.

Thirdly, and of the utmost importance to our realistic evaluation of where we stand on this strife-torn globe, is the firm and unequivocal declaration of Russia's Khrushchev of his solidarity with Red China's Mao.

Despite the widely-discussed and obviously overblown ideological "split" between the Russian and Chinese brands of Communism, Khrushchev has made it plain that the world is divided into just two camps — those of communism and capitalism.

The Soviet Union, said its Number One, was willing and ready to fight for itself and other Communist na-

tions if the Western powers sought war. Such a war, provoked by "imperialists," could only, he said, "end in the complete defeat of capitalism."

His words should wake the dream-walkers who have wishfully looked upon Khrush and Mao as modern day Kilkenny Cats.

Safeguard — An amendment proposed by Rep. Walter Rogers (D., Tex.) that would make it possible for Congress to overturn some Supreme Court acts by a two-thirds vote is said to be gaining favor among members of both houses.

An active livestock market is noted in the area and buyers are bidding up prices on lambs and yearling ewes, with goats and calves coming in for some activity. Lamb prices have advanced to 7 cents a pound, a bunch of old ewes were sold by Ad Harvick at \$3 a head. Harvick also sold 400 mixed calves at 7 cents a pound, November delivery. Masie West bought 600 head of yearling ewes at \$6 a head.

Repeal of the state's constitutional prohibition against the sale of liquor was approved by Crockett county voters in Saturday's special election by the slim margin of 3 votes, the county being 97 for repeal and 94 against. Pensions for the aged carried in this county by a 137 to 53 vote.

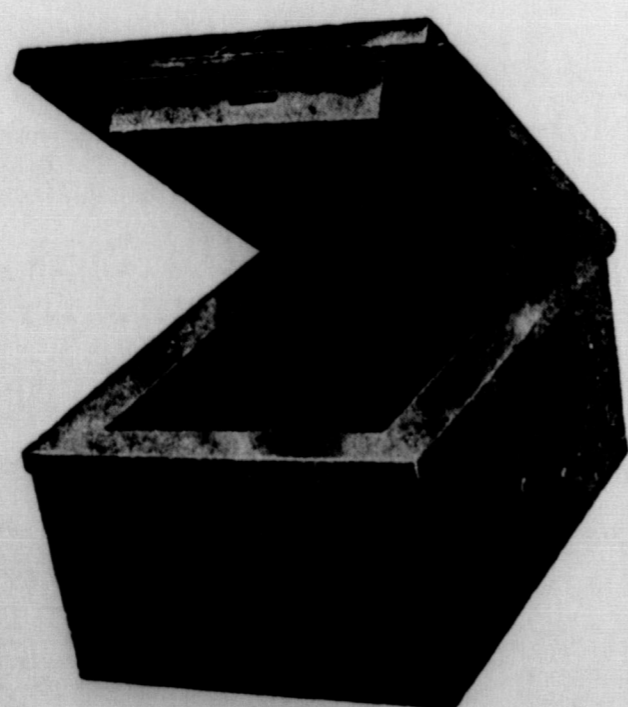

## Texas-American Finals Two New Canyon Gas Find

Dalton H. Cobb and Texas American Oil Corp., Midland, have completed two Canyon sand gas producers in the Ozona, Southwest multipay field of Crockett County, six miles southwest of Ozona.

The No. 1-A Heibing, one mile north-northwest of the nearest production was finaled for a calculated, absolute open flow of 1.3 million cubic feet of gas per day, plus 65 barrels of 50 gravity distillate.

Production was through perforations between 6,318-888 feet.

Location is 3,500 feet from the east and 1,320 feet from the north lines of 23-QR-HE&WT.

The No. 1-B Heibing, one mile south-southeast of the nearest production, was finaled for a calculated, absolute open flow of 4.2 million cubic feet of gas per day, plus 44 barrels of distillate, through perforations between 6,247-820 feet.

Location is 660 feet from the south and 14,157.74 feet from the east lines of 2-QR2-William Powell survey.

Texas American now has 11 shut-in gas wells ready to go on production. Northern Natural Gas Co. recently has contracted to purchase the gas.

M&G and Schneider, Iraan, No. 1 Half Estate, Crockett County lower Seven Rivers gas discovery, three miles southeast of Iraan, has been completed.

It was finaled for a calculated, absolute open flow of 1,030,000 cubic feet of gas per day, through perforations between 880-930 and 1,154-1,168 feet.

Location is 11,496 feet from the east and 150 feet from the north lines of 69-1-I&GN.

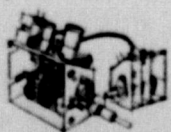



**From Your State Capitol**

Austin, Texas — Texas Democrats and Republicans are gearing for their big clash in the November general election.

Democratic leaders are in Atlantic City, N. J., at their party's national convention.

Gov. John Connally indicated both national and state campaign organizations will be put together in Texas soon after the convention.

Meanwhile, Republicans report they already have built an organization far stronger than any they have fielded to date. They plan to do vigorously battle in local races, as well as national and state campaigns.

GOP assembled its candidates and campaign leaders here last weekend for a special training school in practical political organization, vote-getting tactics and fund-raising activities.

**Oil Rise** — Texas Railroad Commission ordered a substantial increase in oil production for September.

Wells which are under proration will be allowed to produce 28 per cent of their capacity during September, compared with 26.5 per cent this month.

New production quota amounts to 2,831,583 barrels daily, compared to 2,794,312 for August.

Commission also took under advisement conflicting testimony on effect of its proposed \$5,000 bond requirement for drilling or reworking wells in the interest of pollution control. Fifteen days were allowed interested parties for filing for additional briefs.

**Blood Tests** — Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr ruled that it is legal for the Texas Animal Health Commission to use state funds to give its employees blood tests to see if they are susceptible to poisons being used in sprays in the screwworm eradication program.

Ruling was based on the finding that discovery of the condition in advance would prevent sickness and absenteeism by the agency's employees.

**Liquor Tax** — Texas Liquor Control Board, which enforces liquor laws and collects taxes on liquor, wine and beer, has taken in \$32,483,997 more in the last 11 years than it has spent. Its expenses during the 11 years were \$18,202,539.

Tax revenue is allocated by legislative act to old-age assistance, public schools, aid to needy blind and dependent children, farm to market roads, teacher retirement, state hospitals and state employees retirement.

State Highway Department reports that it has licensed 5,632,373 motor vehicles this year — ranging from the 747,734 in Harris County to 184 in Loving County.

This is a gain of five per cent above last year.

**Short Snorts**

Texas Highway Commission authorized urban transportation studies to determine future highway needs of Abilene, Midland, Odessa and Texarkana.

Cigarette taxes continues to increase — to \$8,400,000 in June, a jump of \$317,942 over the previous month — according to State Comptroller's office.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler refused to consider the sale of 10 tracts of school land in Bandera County, explaining that he thought his own staff had set values too low.

Treasurer Jesse James reported an increase of \$459,999 in tax revenue for stamps on ale, liquor and wine from July, 1963, to July, 1964, for a total of \$10,000,000 last month.

Texas Education Agency has formally requested of federal authorities the establishment of a multi-million-dollar residential vocational education school at old Gary Army Airfield, San Marcos.

University of Texas' Bureau of Business Research reveals that its seasonally-adjusted index of business activity in Texas for June hopped 16 per cent above the June, 1963, level, marking the 41st month in an upward swing that rivals the 45-month expansion record set between October, 1949, and July, 1953.

Tourist attendance of 16 key Texas attractions have served 10,100,000 this year, up 15 per cent over the first six months of 1963, and will get better during the second half of the year, Texas Tourist Development Agency predicts.

**Mexicans Want Country Freed Of Screwworm Pest**

Mission — Ranchers from Mexico, after touring the screwworm eradication headquarters early in August, expressed the hope that their country would soon be included in an expanded eradication program.

Indication that a cooperative program between the United States and Mexico is a strong possibility was evident from the announcement that the groundwork is being laid for a study of the economic and technical feasibility of eradicating screwworms from Mexico. This study would also supply valuable data on the severity of the screwworm problem in Mexico that would be necessary for conducting an eradication project.

The ranchers were visibly impressed with the operations of the facilities near Mission where more than 100 million screwworm flies are reared and sexually sterilized through exposure to gamma radiation each week. Dispersed by airplanes over screwworm-infested land areas, these flies mate with native, fertile flies and prevent production of offspring.

More than two-thirds of the flies are being released in northern Mexico to keep fertile flies from migrating into the United States and reinfesting areas freed from the pest. While this is chiefly a protective measure for the U. S. livestock industry, ranchers in northern Mexico report considerable reduction in their own

screwworm problems.

The leaders of the Mexican delegation, Dr. Oscar Valdes Ornelas, secretary of agriculture for livestock, and Octavio Ochoa y Ochoa, president of the Mexican National Livestock Confederation, enthusiastically endorsed the program and urged the governments of both countries to proceed with action that

would lead to expansion of the campaign to liberate Mexico.

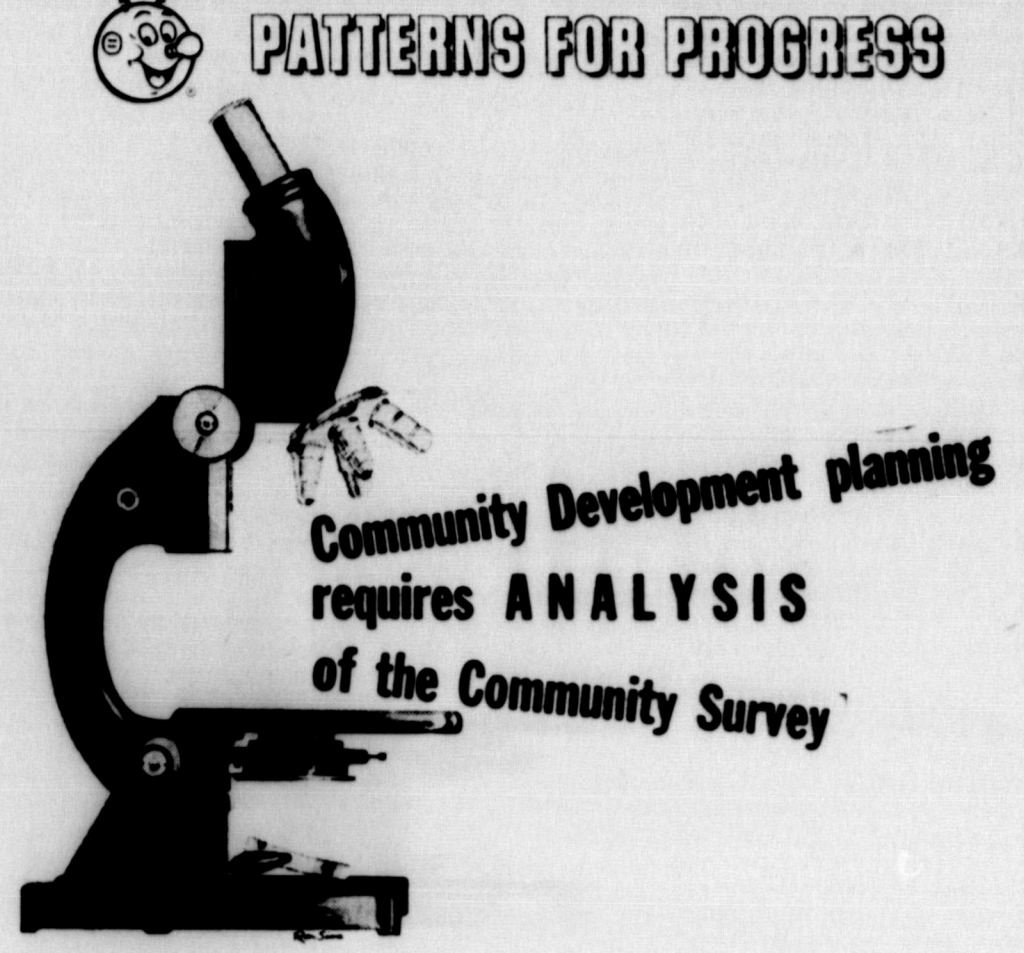

sales, the new rate schedules will represent a reduction of about 3 1/2 percent company-wide."

Approximately \$390,000 of the annual savings from the reduced rates will go to residential customers. Phillips said that with the new rates the average residential customer will get about one-third more electric service for his money than he did at the end of World War II.

In addition, the new rates will mean a saving of \$274,000 for commercial lighting customers. The cost of service to combination general power and commercial service customers will be reduced another \$221,000. Phillips said that churches, schools and smaller commercial customers will particularly benefit from this rate change.

Large light and power customers will have a saving of \$140,000. "All customers", Phillips pointed out, "will share in the \$75,000 saving resulting from lowering the fuel clause adjustment factor made possible by improved power plant efficiencies."

In addition to the general reduction which affects virtually all customers, the new rate schedules provide an extension of the residential and commercial electric space heating rate from four to six months. Presently WTU electric space heating customers buy electric heat at a base rate of 1¢ per KWH.
