Lions Edge Sonora 21-17 Win See-Saw Battle

The Ozona Lions surged in the second half last night and came behind twice to capture a thrilling 21 to 17 victory over the hard fighting Sonora Broncos in a game played by a large crowd at the Ozona stadium.

White Rides On Landslide Beat Foreman

The long coattails of Lyndon B. Johnson extended to far West in Tuesday's general election and a young El Paso attorney, Richard C. White, rode in on the Democratic landslide to defeat incumbent Republican Congressman Ed Foreman in the congressional post as representative from the 16th Texas district.

In a late election night poll, White led by approximately 13,000 votes which the margin accorded in El Paso county, the best county in the 16th district. A 5,000 plus lead in Midland county and 1,000 in Ector county was added in losses suffered by incumbent Congressman Ed Foreman in 13 of the other 14 counties. Foreman carried Crockett county 200 to 176.

Funeral Services Monday In Spokane For Buck Baileys

Funeral services were held Monday in Spokane, Washington, for Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Buckner (Buck) Bailey, who were killed instantly early Wednesday morning of last week in a head-on collision miles west of Albuquerque, N. M.

Buck Bailey, a colorful figure in West Texas athletics in the twenties, and a baseball coach and football line coach at Washington State University for years, was a brother of J. Bailey of Ozona. He and his wife were on their way back to the west coast after visiting relatives in Ozona and Eldorado the previous week-end.

T. J. Bailey is expected to return to Ozona late this week after attending the services in Spokane and handling affairs of the estate as administrator.

Mr. Bailey and their children, Joe Bailey of Midland and Mr. and Mrs. John Lee Henderson of San Angelo, went to Albuquerque where services were held before the bodies were shipped to Spokane, returning to Ozona ahead of Mr. Bailey.

Carson scored twice on short sneaks, picked up 42 yards rushing and completed 3 of six passes good for 42 yards during the contest which saw the Lions tie, fall behind, go ahead, fall behind and finally go ahead to stay in the fading minutes of the game.

Bob Amthor, Alejos Tambunga, Beto Ramos, Rick Hagelstein, and Mike Walters sparked the Ozona defense, which, after getting off to a slow start, turned into a raging Lion in the last two quarters, limiting the Sonora team to just 18 yards rushing in the last half and three first downs.

Things began to look bad for the Lions early in the game when the Broncos on their first possession took the ball 62 yards for the game's first score. The drive was principally on the ground even though the score itself came on a pass from Bill Elliott to Roy Glascock from the 4 yard line, after three running efforts failed.

The Lion tackling during the drive was poor and on several occasions the Broncos were able to gain first downs due to ineffective Ozona defensive work.

The Lions, trailing 7 to 0, went to work following the kick off and drove deep into Sonora territory before a fumble killed the effort but got a break on a Sonora penalty a few plays later and this time took advantage of it.

The Lions, riding the runs of Richard Vargas and Geo. Cox, drove to the Sonora 3 where a look-in pass to flanker Sam Cervantez scored an apparent touch-down (Continued on Last Page)

C of C To Erect Sign at Turnoff From Big Lake

The third phase of the Chamber of Commerce sign project, the placing of signs at major turn-off points to Ozona, was approved at a recent meeting of the Chamber directors.

The first sign in this phase of the project will supplement the Lions Club sign at the turn-off from Big Lake. The sign will be placed about two miles from the turn-off and will direct attention to the turn-off.

The first phase of the Chamber sign project was completed in May when three large signs were installed at the junction of US 290 and State 29, directing traffic through Ozona when enroute to Austin, Houston, etc. This was the cooperative effort of towns along U. S. 290.

The next step in the Chamber's sign program was the construction and erection of the "Welcome to Ozona" signs to be placed at the north, east and west edges of Ozona. Two of the signs, to the west and to the north of Ozona, have already been erected and the one east of town will be in place along the highway in the next few days.

The sign projects are being financed through the Chamber with special contributions by interested citizens of Ozona.

B Team Loses, Juniors Win In Big Lake Tilts

The Ozona High School B team closed its 1964 season last Thursday night in Big Lake, losing a thrilling and well played contest with the Big Lake reserves 24 to 18.

Much of the game's scoring was packed into about two minutes before the half and 20 second after the half when three touchdowns and one two-point play took place.

The flurry of action, which began with Big Lake ahead 8 to 6 saw the Lion reserves capture a fumble and score in two plays kick-off, and see Big Lake score in just three plays, and then kickoff in the third quarter only to see the Owls' Charlie Knight return it for a touchdown.

Aside from the mid-game scoring surge, the Owls were only able to add their first quarter 3 points while the Lions added one more T. D.

The game was of some satisfaction to the Lion reserves who felt the margin of the Big Lake win in Ozona was largely due to some poor calls from the officials late in the game, and with several regulars out with injuries in this contest, it was pleasingly close.

In the Junior High game, played before the B contest, the Ozona Junior High maintained its unbeaten record by downing the Reagan reserves 20 to 14 despite a spread formation which gave the Ozona Juniors worlds of trouble in the second half.

Rodney Pagan and Randle Klepper sparked the Ozona attack while Mike Thompson stood out in a defense that was weakened to the loss of Steve Farris, who was out because of illness. The Cubs will end their season in Eldorado today, and a win will give them their first unbeaten season in several years.

Airman Dies In Head-On Crash North of Ozona

One man was killed and six sent to the hospital with injuries in a two-car collision just north of Ozona Saturday night.

Killed was Benny Joe Collins, 22, an airman at Webb Air Force base in Big Spring who was a passenger in a car driven by Wesley S. Hendricks, 22 of Big Spring. Hendricks was taken to Crockett County Hospital with possible chest injuries. He is a civilian employee at Webb AFB.

The second car was driven by Jesus Richarte, 27, a ranch hand on the Jack Holt ranch in Crockett Co. Richarte was returning to the ranch with his wife, Maria, and his three children, Louis, 8, Ernest, 7, and Eudalia, 13 months, when the collision occurred just north of the Highway Dept. building on Highway 163.

All members of the Richarte family were admitted to Crockett County hospital with cuts and bruises, the most seriously injured being Ernest Richarte, who suffered multiple cuts and bruises and a broken leg.

Both cars were total losses with the engine in the Big Spring boys car driven almost into the front seat.

The fatally injured Webb Air Force Airman listed his home as being in Alabama.

Iraan comes to Ozona with a list of impressive performances to boast of this year, having led both Big Lake and Sonora at the half and having scored more than once on each of those two teams as well as tying Eldorado last week.

The Braves, with two outstanding running backs as well as a strong air game feature a varied attack which has made them one of the scoring leaders in District 8-A this year. The Lions are expected to have trouble with any team that could score twice on Big Lake, particularly early in the game when the points put the Braves ahead.

The Lions, after a sluggish start against Sonora last Friday, seemed to shake off the Big Lake game and played some fine football both on offense and defense in the second half.

The Lions emerged from the Sonora tussle with no injuries of note and should be at full strength Friday except for guard Joel Huff, who is out for the season.

Antlerless Deer Hunt Permits To Be Issued Here

Game Warden Norman Hooten reminded Crockett County landowners this week that antlerless deer permits will be issued at the Crockett County courthouse next Monday and Tuesday, Nov. 9 and 10.

The Game Warden will be on hand from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. on both days to issue the doe permits. Any landowner who wishes to secure these permits to issue to hunters on his land should call at the courthouse during those hours next Monday and Tuesday.

The permits will be issued at the approximate rate of one doe deer per 200 acres of land. The landowner holder may issue all or any part of the permits to hunters, depending on the need for harvesting the antlerless deer on his ranch.

Inquiries are already being received by the Chamber of Commerce for hunting sites. Manager Luther Walker said. Ranchers are urged to list their names with the Chamber if they will have hunting leases or day hunting available.

To Sell Radar Base At Auction Here January 21

A public auction sale will be held in Ozona in January, 1965, by the General Services Administration to dispose of buildings and equipment at the former Ozona radar base, declared surplus and turned over to the GSA for disposal after the installation, which cost the government more than a million dollars to build, was declared not needed and de-activated as a military installation.

The auction date has been tentatively set for January 21, 1965, according to a letter received by the Ozona Chamber of Commerce from Paul Flynn of the GSA office in Dallas. The General Services Administration is the branch of government charged with disposing of surplus government property.

Mr. Flynn explained that the auction had been planned at an earlier date but had to be postponed because of conflicts in schedules of approved auctioneers.

According to present plans the auction will be held in the district courtroom in Ozona. It is expected to attract several hundred persons, including prospective bidders and spectators.

Full details of the sale plan will be announced as soon as date is available, Mr. Flynn wrote.

Industrial Plan Expert Coming

Larry Milner, West Texas Community Coordinator for the Texas Industrial Commission, will be in Ozona Thursday, November 12. He will hold a group meeting at the Chamber of Commerce office at 2:30 p. m., Thursday.

At that time, Mr. Milner will be available to discuss industrial problems relating to local industry, and the possible use of the Radar Base as an industrial complex. Anyone interested in industrial development is invited to attend, Troy Williams, Chamber president, said.

presidential slate won a two-to-one margin of victory in Crockett county, which went for Richard Nixon in the 1960 voting.

Except for Senator Ralph Yarborough, whose margin was the thinnest, only 179 votes over Republican Geo. Bush, all other Democratic candidates were heavily favored by two to one, and an even better margin, over three to one, for Governor John Connally, Lt. Governor Preston Smith, Attorney General Waggoner Carr Agricultural Commission John White, Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler Comptroller Robert Calvert, and Treasurer Jesse James over their Republican opponents.

Among the unopposed local candidates appearing in the Democratic column, Sheriff Billy Mills topped the slate with a total vote of 1133. State Representative Jim Nugent of Kerrville was second with 1118 votes and State Senator Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo polled 1113.

District Attorney Dixon Mahon of Ozona polled 1109; Gene Williams 1104 for constable and the two County Commissioners up for re-election received near the top number of votes cast in their respective precincts, C. O. (Lefty) Walker in Precinct 1 with 359 votes, and U. S. (Rusty) Smith with 376 in Precinct 3.

The Constitution party, occupying third column on the ballot, drew a smattering of votes in this county and at the same time accounted for invalidating an undetermined number of ballots through neglect of voters to cross out the Constitution candidates when voting for candidates in either the Democratic or Republican parties. Strawn Wildcat Set On Kenley Crockett Ranch

Ashmun & Hilliard Oil Co., Midland, will drill a 11,000-foot Strawn lime wildcat in extreme south-east Crockett County, 30 miles southeast of Ozona and 14 miles southeast of the one-well Miller (Ellenburger gas) field and the same distance northwest of the Vinegarone (Strawn gas) field of Val Verde County. It is the No. 1 C. H. Kenley.

Location is 560 feet from the north and 660 feet from the east lines of 80-0-GH & SA. Elevation is 1,876 feet. Macdonald Oil Corp. Midland, will drill the No. 1-11 Henderson as a 1 1/2-mile west-northwest outpost to Strawn and Canyon gas production in the Ozona, Southwest multiphase field of Crockett County, 15 miles southwest of Ozona.

Location is 660 feet from the south and west lines of 11 - M - GC&SF. Contract depth is 9,800 feet.

Texas American Oil Corp., Midland, will drill the No. 2 Henderson 1/2-mile north and slightly east of its No. 1 Henderson, opener of the four-well Ozona, Southeast (Canyon gas) field, 20 miles southwest of Ozona.

Location is 990 feet from the north and 660 feet from the east lines of 9-TCRR. Contract depth is 7,100 feet; ground elevation, 2,445 feet.

Two Confirmations To Crockett Fields

The Todd multipay field of Crockett County gained its second Grayburg producer and a one-mile southwest extension to that pay with recompletion of Val-Carroll Oil Co., San Angelo, No. 2-C J. S. Todd, former San Andres producer, 20 miles northwest of Ozona.

It was finalized for a daily flowing potential of 114.97 barrels of 32 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 228.1. Production was through a 14-64-inch choke and perforations between 1,595,164 feet, which had been fractured with 30,000 gallons and 30,000 pounds of sand.

Total depth is 1,874 feet; pluggedback total depth, 1,680 feet.

Location is 2,630 feet from the north and 330 feet from the west lines of 15-10-GC&SF. It is 990 feet southeast of the firm's No. 1-C Todd, the former Grayburg opener, which recently was recompleted from the San Andres.

The Grayburg re-opener, Amerada Petroleum Corp. No. 6-K Todd, same section, was finalized Sept. 23 to pump 39.99 barrels of 33.8 gravity oil, through perforations between 1,447-547 feet. It was dually completed from the San Andres.

Texaco Inc., No. 3-B Kincaid, in 1-KL-GC&SF, indicated one mile east extension to Canyon production in the Ozona, East multipay field of Crockett County, three miles southeast of Ozona, flowed 92 barrels of condensate, plus 30 barrels of load water, in 64 hours.

Flow was through a 15-64-inch choke and perforations at 6,168 to 6,311 feet. No gauge was reported on the gas. Testing continued.

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

From Your State Capitol

Salt Water — Trial is scheduled to begin on November 2 in a lawsuit brought by Superior Oil Co. to determine whether the Railroad Commission or the Water Pollution Control Board has jurisdiction over the disposal of salt water produced with oil and gas.

But the lawyer for both state agencies, Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr, has stepped out of the case. Carr said there appears to be a "conflict of interest" between the two state agencies, so he advised them to use their own staff lawyers if they want to be represented in the trial.

Attorney General's Department will take part in the trial only to see that all evidence is fully developed.

In an informal opinion, First Asst. Atty. Gen. Hawthorne Phillips wrote that the Water Pollution Control Board does not have the authority to require oil operators to get permits for use of open salt-water disposal pits.

A special study committee of the House of Representatives will meet on October 30 to decide whether to recommend legislation. Bills giving control of pits to the Board, the Commission, and to both, will be proposed to the committee.

Coke County Dam Hearing Put Off — Hearing was postponed until December 14 by the Texas Water Commission on the application of the Colorado River Municipal Water District (Big Spring) to relocate a dam in Coke County and increase reservoir capacity to

438,760 acre feet.

Workmen's Comp Rates Up — After a public hearing, workmen's compensation rates probably will go up an average of 23 percent, effective December 1, says the State Board of Insurance.

Club Women To Tour Odessa's Globe Theatre

A group of members of the Ozona Woman's Club will go to Odessa Saturday, Nov. 7, for a tour of the Globe Theatre, a replica of the famous London theatre, where Shakespeare's plays were originally presented and which is still preserved. The Odessa Globe is located on the campus of Odessa college.

After the tour, the Club women will attend a performance of a Shakespearean play which will be presented by the College Saturday morning.

Miller, 1/2-mile southwest extension to Strawn production and third Canyon producer and 3/4-mile southwest extension to that pay in the Hunt-Baggett multipay field of Crockett County, six miles southwest of Ozona, was continuing to test through Canyon perforations at 6-116 to 6,358 feet.

Tested four hours on a 27-64-inch choke, it flowed six barrels of condensate and six barrels of acid water, plus gas at the daily rate of 6.6 million cubic feet daily; and then flowed three hours on a 24-64-inch choke, making four barrels of condensate and four barrels of acid water in three hours, plus gas at the daily rate of 4.2 million cubic feet.

Strawn gas-distillate production was assured earlier through perforations between 8,612-713 feet.

Ozonan's Ancestor Honored By Marker Placed At Bandera

A recent article in several state papers had this bit of history which is of interest to Crockett County residents.

A granite marker erected on the courthouse square in Bandera recently honoring the site of Camp Montel of the Civil War period.

The camp was named in honor of Captain Charles DeMontel, grandfather of Monty DeMontel of Tyler, Texas, father of Mrs. J. A. Pelto of Ozona.

Captain DeMontel surveyed and laid out the town of Bandera. He was also one of the founders of Castroville, which was named in honor of Count Henri Castro, who brought in a shipload of colonist from France and, directed by Captain DeMontel, settled the town that is now his namesake.

Captain DeMontel was a Captain in several capacities in the early days of Texas. He served as a Captain in a Texas cavalry regiment during the Civil War and later in the war was made the Captain of a Confederate steamship in the Gulf of Mexico and following the war served as a Captain in the Texas Rangers.

The town of Montell in Uvalde County is also named in honor of Captain DeMontel and the extra "l" was formerly in the name in the early days but was dropped somewhere along the line, apparently before the Civil War.

party's candidate for president and vice president, Joseph B. Lightburn (get well with JBL) and Theodore C. Billings, received three Crockett votes, the candidate for U. S. Senator, Jack Carswell, received 2 and for Congressman at Large, W. A. (Bill) Johnson, 5 votes. The Constitution party candidate for state treasurer polled a whopping 10 votes, with 9 for the state Comptroller candidate, John C. Williams, the gubernatorial candidate, received 4 votes in this county and the candidate for lieutenant governor 3.

With a surprising near two to one vote, Crockett county joined in defeating Congressman Ed Foreman of Odessa for re-election to that post as representative from the 16th District.

This county, which went for Foreman over former Congressman J. T. Rutherford two years ago, voted 802 to 433 for White in Tuesday's general election.

Crockett voters approved all three proposed amendments to the Texas constitution, the first, to remove authorization for transfer of funds from the permanent school fund, by a vote of 600 to 326; the second, relating to proposed law changes affecting certain conservation and reclamation districts, was approved 528 to 381, and the third, authorizing expansion of welfare program in Texas was approved 674 to 286.

The Ozona team promptly compounded the mistake by jumping off sides and this time the ball came to rest on the 13. However, the Lions then righted themselves and, on a good call,

completed a pass from Carson to Upham who was knocked out of bounds at the flag. Carson went in on a quarterback sneak on the next play and Amthor converted to tie up the score.

The Broncos did not leave the score tied for long. They picked off another Lion fumble late in the second quarter at their own 49 and quickly went into the lead, thanks to a interference call on a fourth-down pass which gave the Broncos a new life on the Lion forty yard line.

The Broncos used the on-side end-around play, but this time end Mike St. Clair stopped and heaved a perfect strike to halfback Ben Perez, who was completely behind the Ozona secondary and took it for the touchdown. Once again the point was good and the home team left the field with a 14 to 7 advantage.

The third quarter saw the Lions stand off disaster by

Trailing 14 to 13, the Lions decided to go for the lead and on a beautiful power sweep with Cox carrying, they got their fine running halfback inside the 4 flag for the two points and a 15 to 14 lead.

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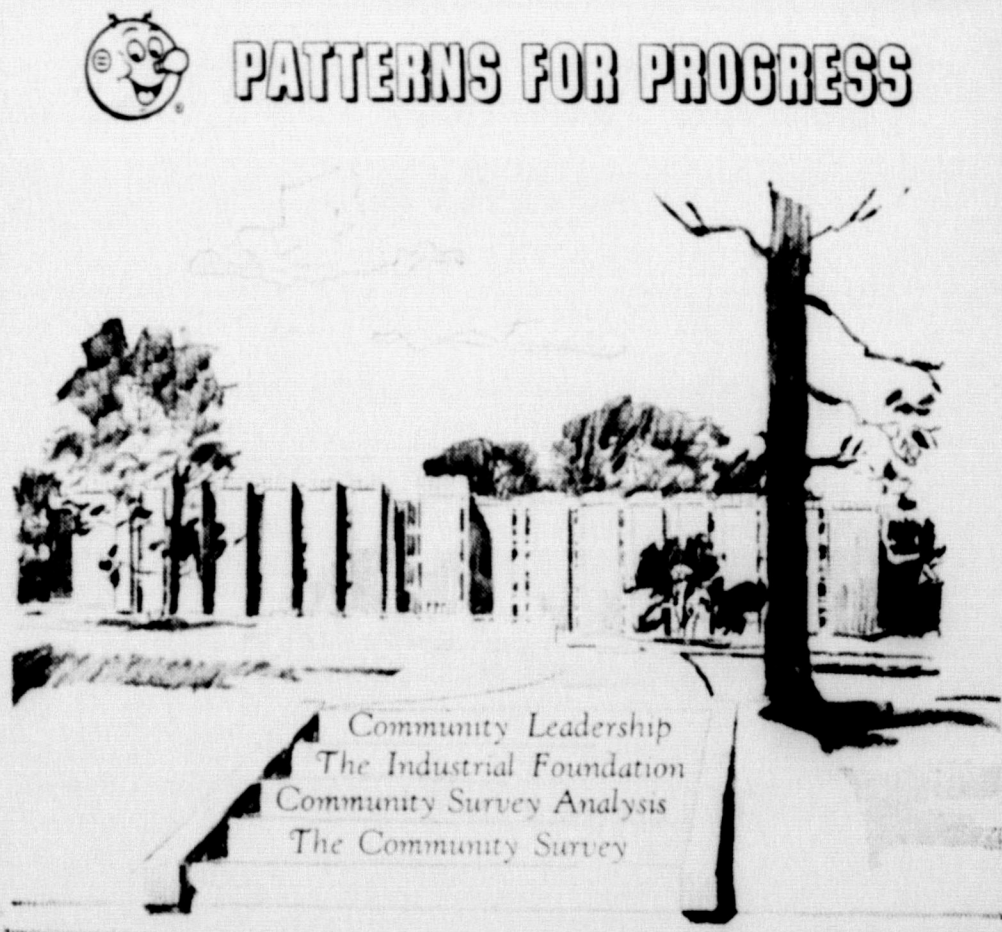
