Ozona Industrial Expansion Talk At CofC Meeting

Larry Milner, West Texas Community Coordinator for the Texas Industrial Commission, met with a group of Ozona citizens at the Chamber of Commerce office last Thursday afternoon at 2:30.

Ozona has been picked as headquarters for an engineering crew of the State Highway Department assigned to do the engineering details on Interstate Highway 10 through this area, a job estimated to last at least seven years, and offices have been established in the shopping center.

Five men attached to the engineering office, with their families, have already moved to Ozona and have begun their work.

Mr. Dixon is the resident engineer in charge of the Ozona office. Other men in the engineers detail already here include V. A. McGee, R. A. Barfield, G. D. Olson and J. C. Schroeder.

The exact route of IH 10 through Crockett county, and particularly through Ozona, is a question most frequently asked him, Mr. Dixon said, but he is as much in the dark as to its answer as anybody else, he said. Enumerators for Co. Ag. Census Appointed Here

Enumerators are key workers in an agriculture census. It is the enumerator's responsibility to locate every farm within an enumeration district assigned to him (or her), determine if the operator of the farm has answered all questions on a questionnaire that will be mailed to the farmer by the Census Bureau, help the farmer complete any unanswered questions on the form, check answers for accuracy, and deliver the form to the Census Bureau.

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TOWER OF BABEL CRISIS

Difficult as it may be to believe, in view of the consistent and persistent efforts of our UN Ambassador Stevenson to make concessions and accommodations to the Russians, high-level mutterings have been reported from the State Department itself which suggest that Uncle Sam, the UN's favorite patsy from its very inception, will get tough if the Russians continue their reiterated refusal to pay their assessments for UN "peace-keeping" operations.

Not only are we continuing to insist on enforcement of Article 19 of the UN Charter, under which a nation over two years behind in its assessments (as the USSR now is) loses its vote in the General Assembly; but the horrible thought has now been raised that perhaps we ought to take a hard, second look at some of the assessments levied against us and do some withholding on our own account!

The latter is the gist of a statement by Harlan Cleveland, Assistant Secretary of State for International Organization Affairs. It takes the position, for the first time so far as we can recall, that if the General Assembly considers that assessments are binding on some nations and optional on others, we may have to decide "that we don't pay for things we don't like."

Nor should we have long to wait to see how this little drama works out since the assessment showdown should come with the opening of the General Assembly on December 1. Will the new Kremlin gang — and our Ambassador Adlai, who at his report still winces at the thought of pressure — be a match for the rising puke-rate in the State Department. We shall wait and see — with considerable interest.

In the meanwhile, as the UN faces a combination of insolvency and rising budgets for 1965, the great American taxpayer from whom an inordinate share of the UN's blessings flow may well ponder the effectiveness and value of this debating society that can't collect its dues and assessments, and in the face of \$134 million deficit calmly presents a 1965 budget proposal of \$164 million!

If it's worth saving, the US had better get tough. Who else?

Ellenburger Test Shannon Makes 318 Bbls.

Ellenburger production has been opened in the Shannon (Fusselman and Crockett) field in Crockett County with completion of Continental Oil Co. No. 1-7 J. M. Fusselman production 14 1/2 miles north of Iran.

It was finalized for a daily flowing potential of 318 barrels of 40.6 gravity oil, with a gas-oil ratio of 57-1, through a 7-64-inch choke with perforations between 8-24 and 9,228-35 feet, which had been acidized with 300 gallons.

It was finalized July 4 from Fusselman for 349 barrels of 48 gravity oil, and a gas-oil ratio of 1,900-1,

through a 14-64-inch choke and perforations between 8,666-677 feet. It also was finalized April 29 from the lower Pennsylvanian for 316 barrels of 48.6 gravity oil, through a 16-64-inch choke and perforations between 8,404-415 feet, however that zone has been squeezed off.

Location is 1,980 feet from the south and 660 feet from the east lines of 7-2-GC&SF.

Several projects in the field, including the discovery, have indicated production in the Ellenburger and one in a Strawn gas zone, but none have been completed in those zones.

Operator suggested field designation of Escondido, Hidden Draw, and Live Oak Draw.

Canyon oil production was extended one location east in the south portion of the Ozona, Northwest (Canyon oil and gas and Strawberry oil) field of Crockett

County with completion of Pan American Petroleum Corp. No. 3 E. H. Chandler, one mile west of Ozona.

It was finalized for a daily flowing potential of 240 barrels of 41.4 gravity oil, plus 14 barrels of load water, with gas-oil ratio of 892-1. Production was through a 19-64-inch choke and perforation between 6,461-6,555 feet, which had been acidized with 2,500 gallons and fractured with 60,000 gallons.

Location is 750 feet from the north and 2,252 feet from the west lines of 25-OP-GC&SF.

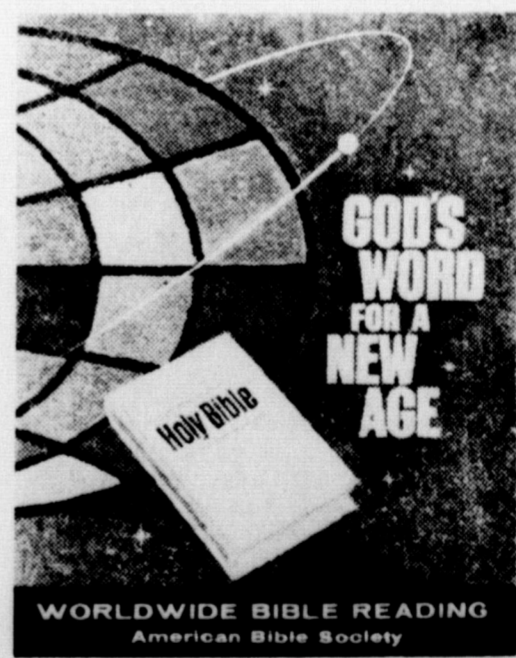

Abel Given 12 Years In Pen For Garage Burglary

Arthur Gordon (Sonny) Abel, 25, was assessed a 12-year term in the state penitentiary by a jury in Crockett county 112th district court last night on conviction of a charge of burglary of the former Knox Motor Co. here, now the Wooten Motor Co., in December, 1962.

The trial got under way shortly after noon Wednesday after the morning had been spent in picking a jury. The verdict was returned to Judge Charles Sherrill's court at 9:25 last night. Abel was represented by court appointed attorney James H. Johnson of San Angelo, assisted by James H. Cowden of Johnson City. The prosecution was directed by District Attorney Dixon Mahon, assisted by County Attorney Fred Chandler.

Abel was arrested in Hamlin shortly after the local burglary and safe cracking, after his car had been traced to that city. Deputy Sheriff Von Parker had spotted the car on the streets here the night of the burglary and noted its license number, ownership of the car later being established, leading to Abel's arrest.

The garage was entered through a service department door and the firm's own cutting torch was used by the intruder to cut the bottom from the company safe and empty it of \$265 in cash. A number of tools were also reported missing from the service department.

Abel was convicted on a charge of "burglary at night with intent to commit theft."

Pure-Bean Field Gets New Producer

The Pure-Bean, South (San Andres) field of Crockett County gained its second producer and a location southwest, extension with completion of I. W. Lovelady, Odessa, 2-Bean, 12 miles northwest of Ozona.

It was finalized for a daily pumping potential of 50 barrels of oil, gravity unreported, plus 5 per cent water, and gas-oil ratio of 100-1, through perforations between 1,378-84 feet, which had been washed with 200 gallons and acidized with 2,000 gallons.

Location is 2,490 feet from the north and east lines of 81-OP-GC&SF.

The discovery, the same operator's No. 1 Bean, was finalized May 27 for 62.1 barrels of 33.5 gravity oil, through perforations between 1,372-376 feet.



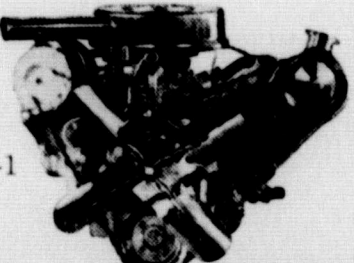

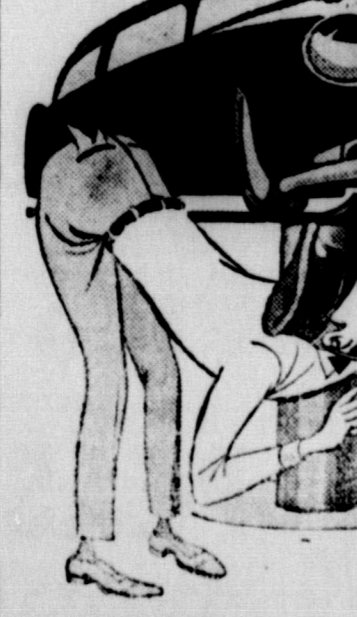

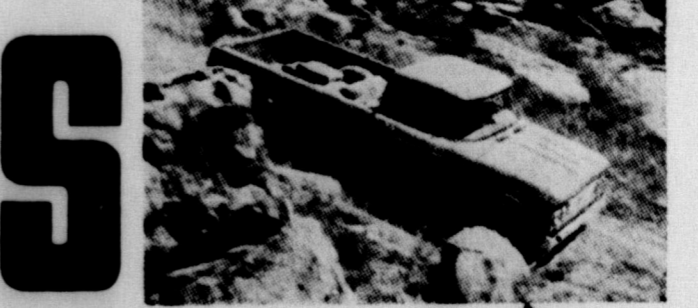
