Board Works out More Details Of School Building

Ozona school board members this week revealed more details of the proposed building program for the entire school system, which is necessary by steadily increasing enrollment, which threatens to produce critically overcrowded conditions unless additional classrooms are provided before another year.

In consultation with the Ozona architectural firm Dawsey, Joiner, Coburn and King, successors to the district associates, employed on other local school projects, the board has secured some estimates on the cost of the various projects included in the general building program, proposed a bond issue to be submitted to voters early next year.

Additional classroom space being needed in both elementary schools and in the high school, the program includes the proposed addition of three classrooms and toilet facilities at the North Elementary school, a total addition of 3,592 square feet of floor space.

Addition of two new classrooms a total of 1,952 square feet of floor space, contemplated at the South Elementary school. A separate building, to be located on school land between the administration building and the home economics cottage, east of the high school building, would house the school library, which would be readily accessible to both the high school and junior high, and the public as well. The proposed building would include two additional classrooms for high school.

Moving the library from the present high school building would make two more classrooms available for the growing high school.

An expansion of existing teacher housing units and the construction of a home for the superintendent of schools is also included in the school-wide building program proposed by the board. The program proposes to add a bedroom and bath to each of four of the teacher housing units in southwest Ozona, making these units more livable for teachers with larger families.

The new home for the superintendent will probably be located on school property on the hill east of the hillside teacher apartments.

To improve athletic facilities at Lions Stadium, the building project proposes to build a new field house with toilet facilities, a total of 1,861 square feet of floor space.

Further detailed study is under way on all facets of the program and further information will be given the public as it is developed.

The Ozona Public School will dismiss Wednesday for the Christmas holidays with the Elementary schools getting out at 2 p. m. and the Jr., High and High School being dismissed at 2:40.

The Elementary schools will get out at 2 p. m. in order to be in the city park for Santa Claus' annual visit which is sponsored each year by the Lions Club and carried out by the Ozona Fire Department.

The holidays will extend this year until Monday January 4, when classes will resume. It was pointed out that while there will be but one day before Christmas included in the holidays there will be several days after the first, since it comes on Friday this year.

Even though a number of the teachers will travel home before Christmas it is expected that a larger number than at any time in recent Ozona history will be in town for the holidays, or at least through Christmas day.

\$350,000 Suit Filed In Death Of Ozona Pair

The estate of a dead San Angelo pilot was sued Tuesday for \$350,000 by the heirs of two persons who died with him in a plane crash last June, a news item in Wednesday morning's San Angelo Times reports.

The suit, filed in 51st District Court in San Angelo by Wilson, Logan and Lear, San Angelo law firm, stemmed from a June 4 airplane crash in Mason County in which Robert Massie West, Jr., his sister, Mrs. Ann West Simmons, both of Ozona and the pilot, John W. Longnette, were killed.

Styled Mrs. Robert Massie West, Jr., et al, vs. J. W. Longnette Flying Service, et al, the suit names the Longnette Flying Service, the estate of John W. Longnette, and Virginia Speck Longnette, independent executrix of the estate as defendants.

Plaintiffs in the suit are Mrs. West, Massie West, as guardian for the estate of R. M. West, III, and Margo Chrisann West, and Edwin M. Simmons, next friend for Rebekah West Simmons, Edwin M. Simmons, Jr., and Robert West Simons.

West, Mrs. Simmons and Longnette took off on a privately chartered flight to Houston June 4. Investigation revealed they had reached Houston and were returning to San Angelo when they crashed in Mason County.

The badly torn bodies of the plane's occupants and the wreckage of the plane were found three days later in rugged ranch country 25 miles north of Mason.

GSA Announces Air Base Sale On January 21

Killingsworth Heads March Of Dimes Campaign

Under the leadership of Roy Killingsworth, who has accepted the post as campaign director, the traditional January March of Dimes, now an all-out campaign against the national tragedy of birth defects, will open in Crockett county January 1, 1965. The local drive will be climaxed by the annual Mother's March on a date to be announced later.

One out of every 16 American babies born this year will have a serious birth defect, the National Foundation has pointed out. This can cause partial or permanent disability for thousands of children and years of anguish for their parents and families unless people become aroused about birth defects.

"Folio wasn't conquered until we became alarmed enough to support the March of Dimes with enough volunteers and enough money," Mr. Killingsworth pointed out in calling for all-out support from Crockett county people of the 1965 drive.

Gene Schubert, charged with theft over \$50 in Crockett county, and Charlie Foster, also of Odessa, as an accessory in the thefts. The Crockett sheriff and his staff and officers in Odessa and other area counties have been working on the case for several weeks, the local sheriff said, and after the arrests secured a signed confession from Schubert admitting at least three robberies in Crockett county in recent weeks.

In his signed statement given to local officers, Schubert recounted having stolen a saddle and bride from a barn belonging to Preston Heath about two miles east of Iraan on September 24, this year. He later sold the saddle and bridle to a Clarence Allison in Odessa, he said.

Later, Schubert continued in his statement, he returned to Crockett county and at the Marathon Oil Co. camp east of Iraan in Crockett county took eight high pressure well head valves which he sold to a C. H. Brockett Pipe & Supply Co. in Midland.

Schubert also cleared up the disappearance of 1,900 feet of 7/8-inch rods belonging to R. R. Kennedy of McCamey and on location eight miles south of McCamey in this county. With the help of a colored boy he picked up in Odessa, Schubert said he drove a pickup and pole trailer to the local and loaded the 1,900 feet of rods which he later sold to Brockett.

Another visit to the Marathon camp in early November netted a Fairbanks-Morse motor which Schubert said he sold to Foster.

Schubert is charged with theft here and it is understood that other charges have been filed against him in Odessa. Foster is charged in Odessa and both are being held by Ector county officers.

Ozona F F A Wins Livestock Judging At Iraan

Ozona F F A Chapter's judging team won first place Saturday in Iraan at the invitational livestock judging contest sponsored by the Iraan FFA.

The Ozona FFA team won over the Iraan team by the narrow margin of five points, scoring 819 out of a possible 900 to 814 scored by the Iraan team. Alpine FFA and Odessa FFA tied for third place with 775 points.

Members of the winning Ozona team were Bill Everett, Dwight Childress, and Jerry Johnson. Twelve teams competed in the meet and the boys judged and placed two classes of Rambouillet rams, two classes of fat lambs, one class of barrows and one class of gilts.

Bill Humphries of Marfa was top individual scorer with 286 points. Bill Everett of Ozona was second with 283; John Word, Iraan third with 277 points; Fred Chandler of Ozona with 275 points, was fourth, and Dwight Childress, Ozona, was fifth with 271.

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AFTER 14 (b) — THE DELUGE

America's labor tycoons have laid it at the White House door.

In return for the landslide victory of President Johnson, they expect prompt and favorable action from the President and the Congress on a list of demands that would speed our creeping socialism to a full gallop.

Having delivered the 16 million votes making up the difference between the 42 million for LBJ and the 26 million for Barry Goldwater (as they modestly claim) the unions have instructed the Administration to:

Repeal Section 14-B of the Taft-Hartley Act. This would automatically outlaw the Right to Work laws that have been passed thus far by 20 states (including Texas) and give back to the union bosses a nationwide closed shop with the right to levy tribute on every working American, man or woman, in every unionized craft or industry anywhere for the privilege of making a living.

Amend the Landrum-Griffin Act to remove restrictions obnoxious to the unions.

Impose the 35-hour work week and double pay for overtime on the nation's economy, two demands that combine to achieve appreciable wage-hikes in defiance of existing contracts and without negotiation.

Boost the Federal minimum wage of \$1.25 (now responsible for widespread unemployment among workers of limited capabilities) to \$2.00.

Place all employment service in the hands of the Federal Government.

These are the demands most immediately affecting labor; but there are many more, such as Medicare, the scrapping of present immigration laws, and colossal public works for the "war on poverty," together with others that would render specific aid to spread of

Communism in the US. But first and foremost is repeal of Section 14(b) — proclaimed by the Executive Council of the AFL-CIO as its number one objective. Right to Work laws must be smashed even though official figures show that union membership gains have been greater, and the economic gains of workers have been greater in the RTW states than in those where compulsory union membership is imposed.

It should be apparent to the Congress that the greedy demands of the labor bosses are no more in their own long-range interest than that of the people of the US. And let the Congress beware in approaching unionism's prime exaction for political services. If 14(b) should prove to be the domino that tumbles all the others on the "must" list, our public servants will have voted their own destruction as well as that of all the rest of us — the union fat-cats included.

News Note: Labor leaders launch drive to kill Taft-Hartley Act provision protecting workers in 20 states from being forced to join unions to hold jobs.

The Rev. Martin Luther King, winner of the Nobel Peace Prize and bantam-weight challenger of J. Edgar Hoover, delivered himself of the following observation in "A Letter from Birmingham City Jail":

"There are just laws and there are unjust laws... I submit that an individual who breaks a law that conscience tells him is unjust, and willingly accepts the penalty... is, in reality, expressing the highest respect for the law."

Does that apply to the Ten Commandments, too, Reverend?

No One Could Quarrel with President Johnson's recent declaration for "A tight fist and an open mind" as Administration policy.

But it is oddly out of harmony with his earlier inkle down on the ranch of a \$109 billion budget for the new fiscal year. Nor is the tight fist compatible with the lavish plans for the "Great Society" of a welfare state.

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RALLY ROUND THE FLAG BOYS

At a time when youth all over the nation — and around the world — is busily "demonstrating" and indulging in a frenzy of destruction aimed at symbols of "imperialistic" United States, it is encouraging to detect a whiff of patriotism in the teen-age wind.

Young ladies entering a beauty contest held annually by an amusement park on the Jersey Palisades overlooking the seething ideological battleground of New York City are proudly subscribing to William Tyler Page's "The American Creed" in signing up to compete for the 1965 "Miss America Teen-Ager" title.

"I believe," these youngsters attest, "in the United States of America as a government of the people, by the people, for the people, whose just powers are derived from the consent of the governed; a democracy in a republic; a sovereign Nation of many sovereign States; a perfect Union, one and inseparable, established upon those principles of freedom, equality, justice and humanity for which American patriots sacrificed their lives and fortunes."

"I therefore believe it is my duty," they pledge, "to love it, to support its Constitution, to obey its laws, to respect its flag and to defend it against all enemies."

Inclusion of the Creed in the application is the idea of Irving Rosenthal, national chairman of the contest who says he is "shocked" that so many similar events "that dare use the name of America or UST have no trace of anything in their make-up format, program or charter that resembles anything American." He thinks it's time to

demonstrate some Americanism and believes most teen-agers are with him in rejecting the subversive sneer that it's "out of style."

We will frankly admit that we've always taken a dim view of these so-called "beauty contests" — "Miss America" and all the rest. But, if such a national diversion, exciting to all the young things from 13 to 17 in 50 states, is to inculcate patriotism, it might be more effective than preachments and tear gas in reversing the pinko trend. No one should ever underrate the female of the species, and when they're pretty, too, Mr. Rosenthal could have an army with nuclear capability!

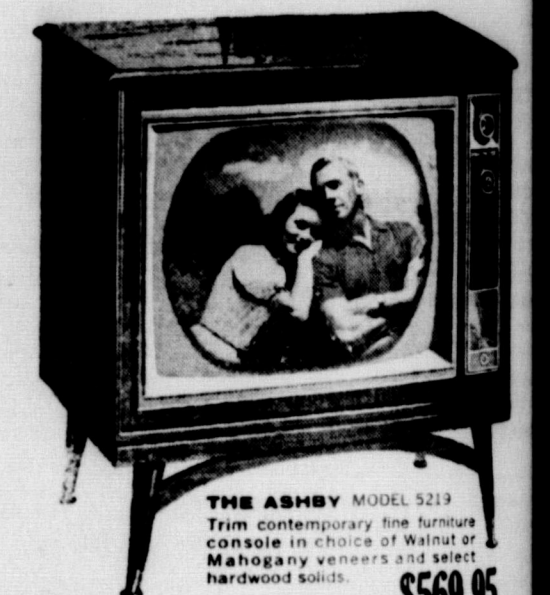

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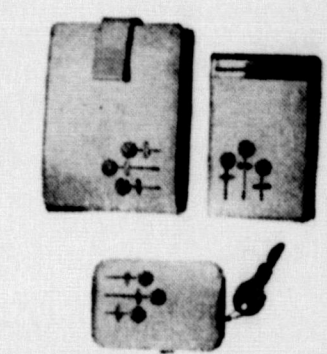

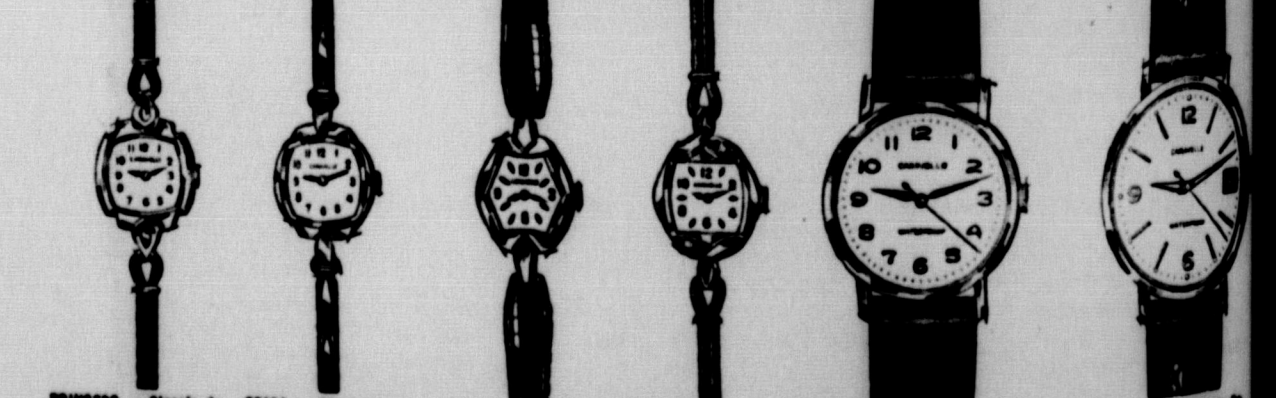

2nd Ellenburger Producer Tested On Mitchell Land

Second Ellenburger producer and a 1 1/2 mile east and slightly south extension to the Crockett County portion of the Brown-Bassett multipay field was assured with the flowing of gas at the maximum daily rate of 1,250,000 cubic feet at Shell Oil Co. No. 1-6 Mitchell, in 6-Q5-L. R. Rutledge, 13 1/2 miles northwest of Palestine.

Tested one hour through 10-64-inch choke and opened hole between 14,260-14,950 feet, it flowed gas at a daily rate of 1,061,000 cubic feet with tubing pressure of 2,900 pounds.

Tested one hour on a 14-64-inch choke, it flowed gas at the daily rate of 1,250,000 cubic feet with tubing pressure of 2,350 - 1,250 pounds; and then tested one hour on an 18-64-inch choke, it flowed gas at the daily rate of 1,162,000 cubic feet daily, with tubing pressure of 1,750-1,000 pounds.

The other Crockett producer, Sun Oil Co. No. 1 Mitchell, was finished June 7, 1963 for a calculated, open flow of 4.3 million cubic feet of gas per day through perforations between 13,750-14,950 feet. It was given field designation of Pandale (Ellenburger) however, production later was assigned to the Brown-Bassett area.

Tidewater Oil Co. No. 1 Ed Bean, in 81-OP-GC&SF, one location northwest of the two-well Pure - Bean, South (San Andres) field of Crockett County, 10 miles northwest of Ozona, swabbed 850 barrels of fluid, approximately 20 gallons of oil on the first run of the wab through perforations of ween 1,386-92 feet.

The project then swabbed dry, and after being shut in 14 hours, it has a 175-foot fillup with 20 feet of oil on the top.

Operator was preparing to fracture with an unreported amount and resume testing.

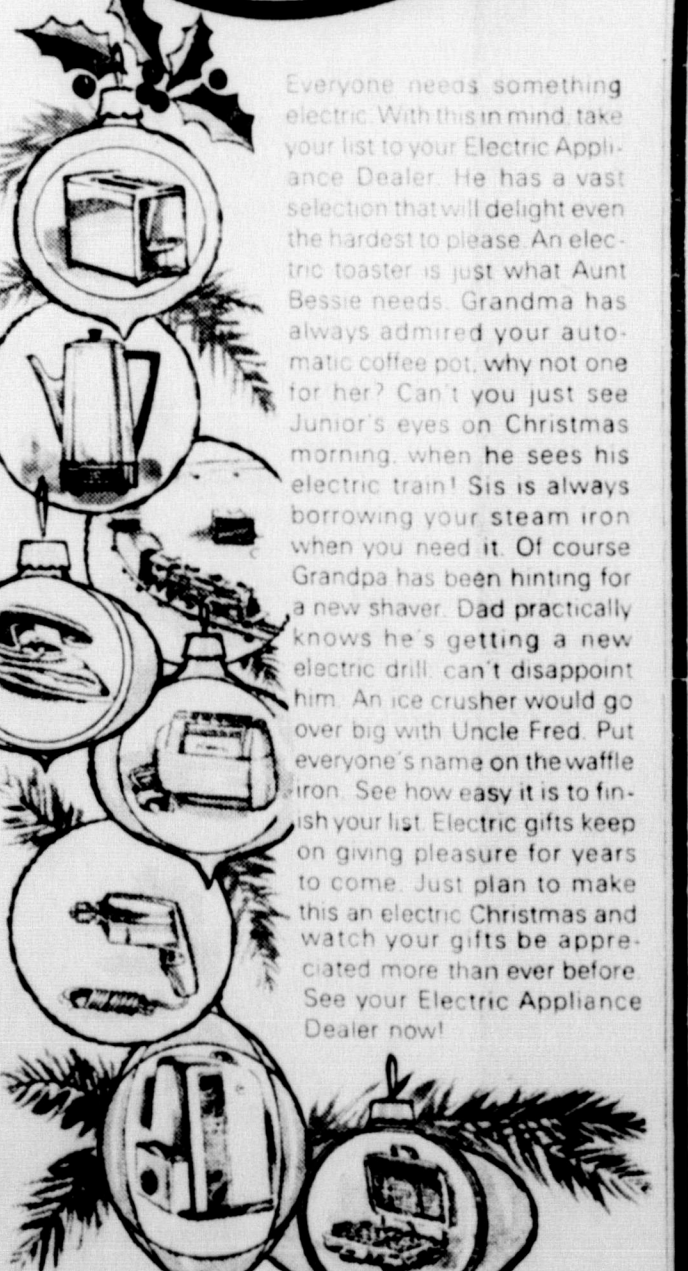

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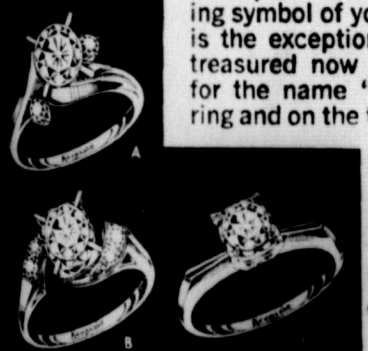
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Ozona B's Reach Final In Garden City Tournament

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — Gov. John Connally's delayed second inaugural program may set some records for simplicity.

The Legislature, in an informal poll, has agreed to postpone the inauguration from January 19 to January 26. This to avoid conflict with the swearing-in of President Johnson in Washington on January 20. Formal approval of the delay will be necessary after lawmakers convene on January 12.

There will be no parade, inaugural ball or all-night reception for Connally.

Governor Connally and Lt. Gov. Preston Smith will take the oath of office at high noon at the state capitol. An afternoon reception will follow at the governor's mansion.

Jobless Rate Declines — Unemployment in Texas during October dropped to 133,000, 3.5 per cent of the labor force, Texas Employment Commission reports. This is 3,000 below the September level and 20,000 under October, 1963.

TEC also reports that the state unemployment compensation trust fund finished the year in the black for the first time in eight years due to the decline in joblessness. Number of claimants for unemployment insurance dropped 12 per cent.

UT Land Lease — University of Texas leases of 47,770 acres of land brought, \$2,076,000 or an average of \$43.46 an acre at the 49th public auction.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler reports that bidding was active on 140 of the 169 tracts offered. Tracts included acreage located in Reagan, Crockett, Schleicher, Terrell and Ward Counties.

Water Project — Texas Water Commission has declared that the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation's Palmetto Bend water project for the Jackson County Flood Control District is feasible. But it questions the district's ability to finance Stage 1 of the project.

Commission suggested that the U. S. Congress authorize construction of Stage 1. Cost would run \$29,500,000. However, the commission did advise that authorization should provide a method of automatic de-authorization within five years. This, in case local interest fails to approve a cost-allocation contract.

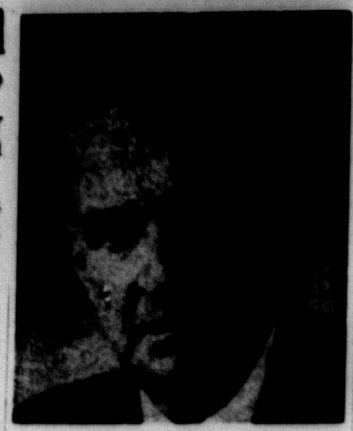
In the third quarter, the Lions range up 24 points to put the game out of reach and reserves continued the assault in the final period, chalking up 21 more points against the out-manned Eagles.

The March of Dimes is also supporting a massive scientific research program seeking the causes of birth defects and the means to prevent them.

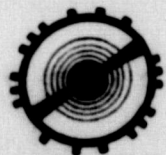

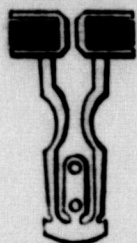
