Cal. Congressman Talks Tourism On Visit Here

Congressman Richard T. Hanna (D. Cal.) was a visitor in Ozona Tuesday evening. He was entertained by Chamber of Commerce president Troy Williams and manager Luther Walker.

Congressman Hanna represents the district in California in which Disneyland is located. He is a member of the Banking and Currency committee and the newly formed committee on tourism. He discussed the activities of these committees with Mr. Williams and Mr. Walker. He stated that until the formation of this committee there was no central place in the national level to work out problems regarding the tourist trade. He also explained that an attempt would be made to obtain more overseas tourist trade by printing major brochures in different languages.

The Congressman said his committee will also encourage travel agencies to offer more package type trips at different price levels and encourage banks to help finance these trips through installment loans. The increase in traveling would also solve one of the problems of the Banking and Currency committee, according to Mr. Hanna. This would be the problem of keeping adequate currency in circulation.

Mrs. Montgomery To Head Mothers March In Jan.

Mrs. Vic Montgomery was appointed chairman of the Crockett County Mothers March on Birth Defects, Climax of the January, 1965 March of Dimes campaign, Roy Killingsworth, county drive chairman, announced this week.

Mrs. Montgomery will lead a crew of Ozona Marching Mothers who will make house-to-house calls to Ozona homes to ask support for the March of Dimes fight against birth defects.

Date for the Mothers March will be set later after the campaign gets under way, Mr. Killingsworth said. "Mothers have a moral responsibility to get across to the public the point that birth defects are a shocking national problem - shocking to see and shocking in their effect upon the afflicted children and their families," Mrs. Montgomery said.

Mrs. Montgomery pointed out that it was the knowledge of this terrible toll in young lives and minds that led the March of Dimes to enter the fight against birth defects. Now, despite a lack of public awareness of the problem, significant advances have been made in treating birth defects and in research seeking their cause and prevention.

Lions Wind Up Pre-Christmas Season With Win

The Ozona Lions closed their pre-Christmas play Tuesday night by gaining a measure of revenge on a determined Menard crew as the Lions downed the visitors 66 to 61 in a tense, action-filled contest.

Bill Carson pumped in 18 points in the final two periods to lead the Lions, who gained and lost the lead 13 times during the contest, and found themselves tied on three other occasions by the hard fighting Yellowjackets.

Menard had four men in double figures with Louis McInnis, who hit well from the side and did a fine job of rebounding, getting 18. Pe Ellis had 15 and David Walston 14.

Rick Hagelstein, who has not been a starter until recently, got the Lions off to a good start, hitting for 8 points in the first quarter and 4 more in the second to lead the Lions in the first half. Hagelstein fired only once at the bucket in the second half, however, as David Childress, who ended up the night with 13, and Carson, bombed the nets.

Ozona once held a 5 point lead in the second quarter, a lead matched by Menard in the third quarter but neither team could hold off its hot shooting foe. Ozona led 23 to 20 at the quarter and 33 to 31 at the half, but trailed 50 to 47 at the end of three quarters before Richard Vargas hit a jump shot with 4:02 to go to send the Lions into the lead to stay. Bill Carson hit a free throw to put the Lions two ahead and Thomas Garza extended it to three before Ellis hit a field goal to cut it back to one. Carson hit a jumper to recapture the three and Vargas hit a free toss to make it 4 before Carson hit a lay-up to make the final margin. (Continued on Last Page)

Two Wildcats, 3 Completions, Week's Oil News

Marcus Drilling Co. Midland, will drill a 2,600-foot rotary wildcat in Crockett County, 28 miles northwest of Ozona and 1 1/2 miles southwest of the Todd (San Andres and Grayburg) field but separated by failures. It is the No. 1 J. S. Todd.

Location is 660 feet from the north and 1,980 feet from the east lines of 8-WX-GC&SF. Elevation is 2,650.6 feet.

The Tippet multipay oil and gas field of Crockett County gained its fifth lower Leonard oil producer and a one-mile southeast extension to that pay with completion of Gulf Oil Corp. No. 7-G J. H. Tippet, Wolfcamp detrital gas producer and former upper Wolfcamp oil producer in the Tippet, South multipay field, 11 miles southeast of McCamey.

It was finalized for a daily flowing potential of 131 barrels of 49.8 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 915-1, through a 11-64-inch choke and perforations. (Continued on Last Page)

Official Winter Brings Balm 70 Degree Weather

Winter officially arrived Monday and was it ever a relief from fall. The first day of winter temperature was in the balm 70-seventies - shirt-sleeve weather throughout the day except for the very early morning.

This compares with the biting 16-degree temperature, the coating of sleet and ice that crusted highways, streets and sidewalks Friday morning as fall's final effort to prepare us for winter.

The coming of winter was a welcome change from the uncomfortable two-day blizzard-like weather, the tail-end of a real blizzard which all but paralyzed the northern segment of the country. It was the coldest of the present winter here, but beginning Sunday, and so far persisting, the weather has been mild and weathermen promise no radical change for the Christmas week-end.

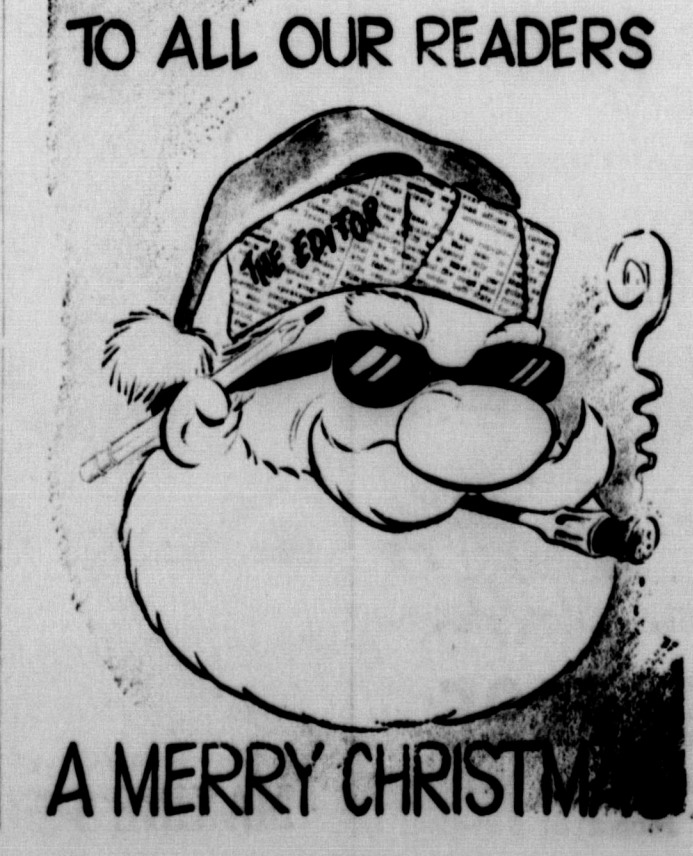

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — A budget trimmed to fit available revenues, so there will be no need for new taxes or for doubling college tuition, was sent to members of the Texas Legislature by Gov. John Connally.

A \$96,000,000 surplus in the state's general revenue fund makes expansion possible without new taxes, said Connally. However, if the Legislature decides to grant the request of the Texas State Teachers Association for a \$45 a month pay raise for public school teachers, some new form of taxation will be necessary.

Connally's budget was hitched to his main thesis — that higher education needs to be improved. He urged the Legislature to pour many new million into the state's colleges and universities and the junior college system.

Screwworm Money Short — Leaders of the screwworm eradication program notified Governor Connally that their funds will be gone by April 1 unless they get supplemental appropriations.

They need about \$530,000 in state or private money to run the program between April 1 and July 1 when the new federal fiscal year begins.

U. S. Department of Agriculture will ask a supplemental appropriation, too, the group told Connally.

Only 224 cases of screwworm have been reported in Texas cattle this year, compared with 4,898 in 1963 and 50,000 in 1962 when the program began. Federal, state and livestock industry appropriations have financed the \$13,600,000 program.

Redistricting Ordered — Governor Connally expressed confidence that the Legislature will redistrict itself by the new court-fixed deadline . . . August 2, 1965.

A special three-judge federal court at Houston declared present legislative districts (in both House and Senate) unconstitutional. It ordered reapportionment on a basis of population.

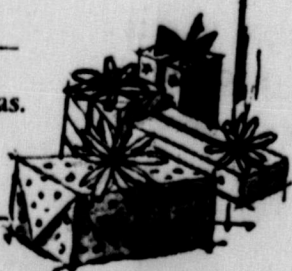



Texas Dues During Holiday Season

The Texas Department of Public Safety today that 190 will meet violent during the coming New Year's holiday season, including 105 fatalities.

In addition to the traffic deaths, it is estimated there will be 40 suicides and 45 accidental deaths other than traffic.

Homer Garrison, Public Safety Director, said the estimate is based on the DPS Statistical Bureau on the basis of past experience and the current trend.

The deaths that occur during the 11-day holiday period will be tragic last additions to the worst year in Texas history for traffic fatalities.

The DPS is carrying out annual special emphasis program called "Operation Deathwatch," Garrison revealed. "From 12:01 a. m. on December 24 until 11:59 p. m. on January 3, 1965, we will have every available means to help accidents at a minimum by promoting strict observance."

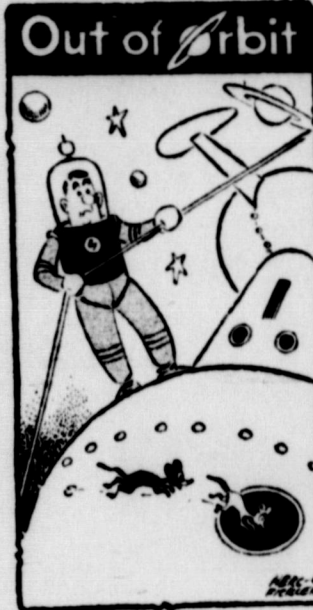

Delta Takes Over Drilling Wildcat On Kenley Ranch

Delta Drilling Co. Odessa, has taken over operations and was drilling below 11,175 feet in sand and shale at the former Ashmun & Hilliard Oil Co. No. 1 C H Kenley, in 80-0-GH&SA, extreme southeast Crockett County Strawn wildcat, 30 miles southeast of Ozona and 14 miles southeast of the one-well Miller (Ellenburger gas) field and the same distance northwest of the Vinegarone (Strawn gas) field of Val Verde Co.

The project was scheduled to drill to 11,000 feet.

Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 2-D Alma Cox, in 5-QR-D&SE, 3/4-mile north and very slightly west extension to Canyon sand gas production in the Ozona, East multipay oil and gas field of Crockett County, three miles southwest of Ozona, flowed 23 barrels of

condensate and eight barrels of acid water in 24 hours, plus gas at an daily rate of 2.2 million cubic feet.

Flow was through a 1/2-inch choke and perforations between 6,211-257 feet. Testing continued.

Fewer Lambs, Higher Prices Forecast In '65

College Station — Although 1964 lamb prices have been higher than in several years and will continue above this level in '65, next year's lamb crop is expected to decrease four to six percent.

"Evidently, this year's favorable prices have not been high enough to encourage producers to retain large numbers of ewe lambs for their breeding herds," says John McHaney, economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

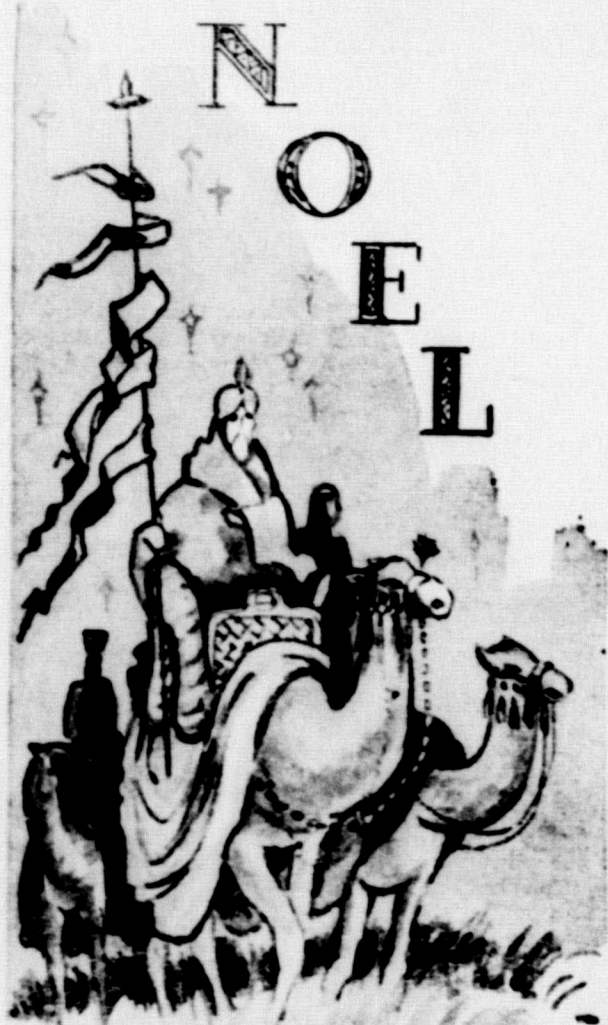
Sheep and lamb slaughter in '65 is anticipated to be down from this year, whether or not rebuilding of breeding herds begins during the coming year. If such rebuilding does begin, slaughter supplies will be substantially reduced, strengthening prices even more than expected.

McHaney attributes the

past year's favorable price situation to smaller slaughter supplies. Since mid-1964 average monthly lamb prices have been the highest since 1958. Lamb slaughter this year was down about seven percent from the previous year.

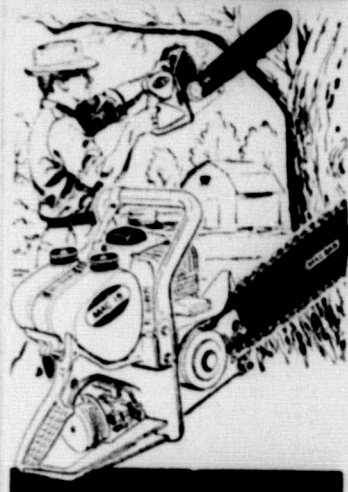

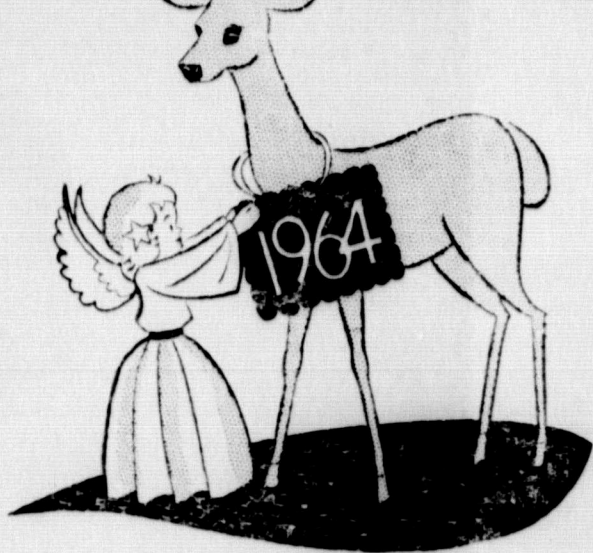

All Aliens Must Register In Jan.

J. W. Holland of the Immigration and Naturalization Service stated that aliens in the United States will be required to report their address to the Attorney General within the near future.

All aliens, with few ex-

ceptions, who are in the United States on January 1 each year must report their addresses by the end of that month. Only the following classes of aliens are excused from this requirement: (1) Accredited Diplomats; (2) Persons accredited to certain international organizations; and (3) Those admitted temporarily as a-

gricultural laborers.

Forms with which to make the report can be obtained from any Post Office or Immigration Office during the month of January.

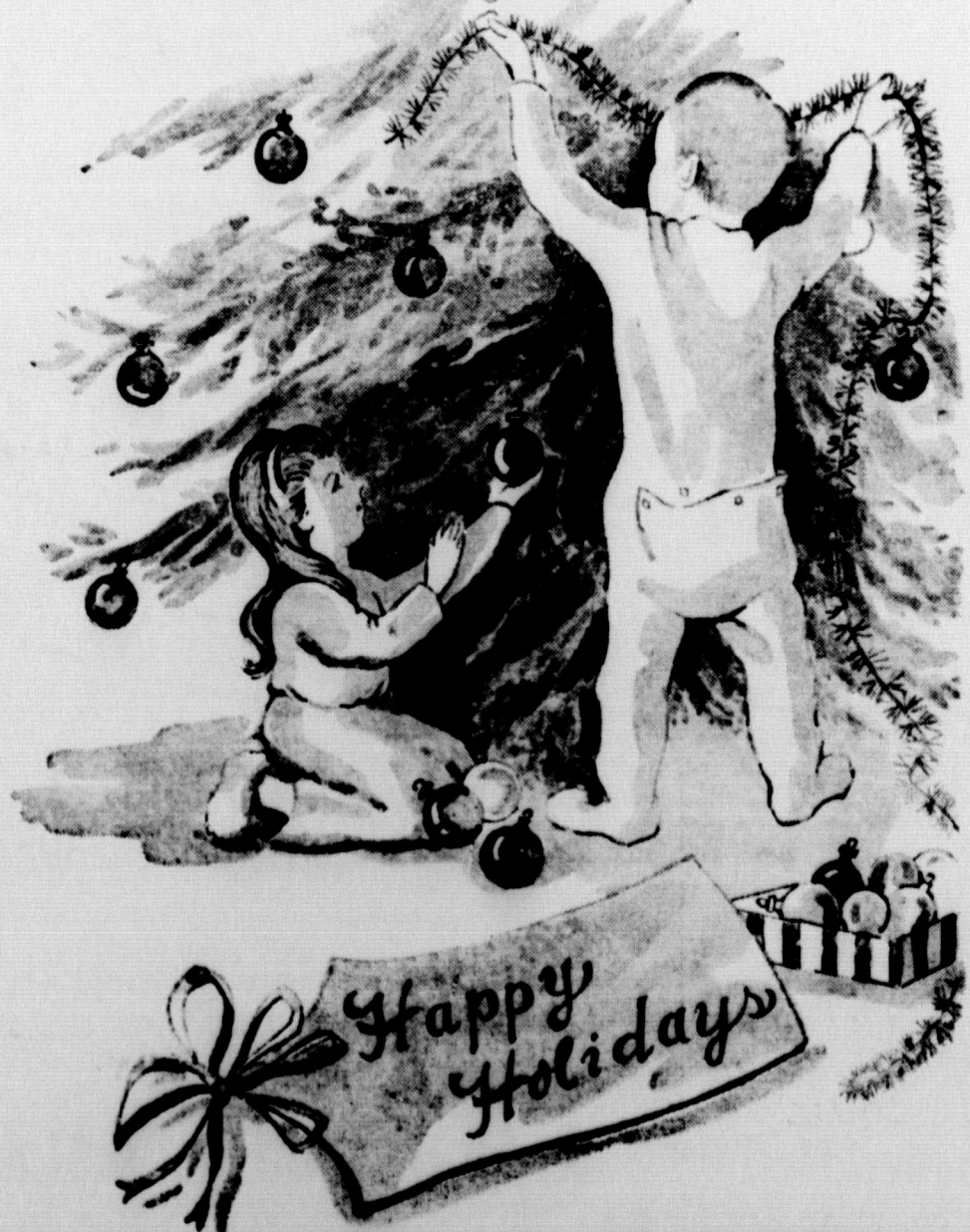
Mr. Holland said that the law provides severe penalties for failure to comply with the reporting requirement.

between 3,676 - 4,678 feet, which had been acidized with 500 gallons.

Location is 8,310 feet from the northeast and 990 feet from the northwest line of 42-31-H&TC.

Delta Drilling Co. and Pauley Petroleum Inc. completed two extenders to Canyon and gas production in the Ozona, Southwest multipay field of Crockett County.

The No. 1-C Couch, a one-mile west extension, and 8½ miles southwest of Ozona, was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 4.25 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 39,800-1. Gravity of the liquid was 64.9 degrees.

Location is 660 feet from the south and east lines of 9-ST-M. F. Roberts.

The No. 4 Montgomery, ½ mile south, and 14½ miles southwest of Ozona, was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 580,000 cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 28,800-1. Gravity of the liquid was 54.9 degrees.

Location is 1,980 feet from the south and 660 feet from the west lines of 16-NG-GC&SF.
