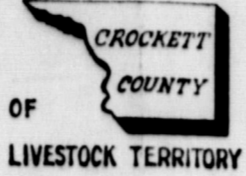

## Abel Sentenced To 12 Years In Pen; Will Appeal

Arthur Gordon Abel, found guilty by a Crockett county jury in 112th district court three weeks ago, was sentenced to serve 12 years in the state penitentiary by Judge Charles Sherrill when the court convened here Wednesday.

Abel, who had a considerable part in his own defense despite the appointment of counsel by the court, gave notice of appeal from the verdict and wrote a note to Judge Sherrill declaring himself a pauper and asking the court to order preparation of the transcript preparatory to the appeal.

Abel was convicted on a charge of burglary in connection with the burglary of the Wooten Motor Co. and theft of money from the company safe. Entry to the safe was gained with the use of the motor firm's own cutting torch.

Judge Sherrill set Abel's bond at \$20,000, which he had not furnished to yesterday.

Judge Sherrill also received a plea of guilty from Paul Harrison Leach, charged with felony theft in connection with the theft of a saddle belonging to A. L. Manica here in October, 1963. Leach was arrested in West Virginia on information of local officers and extradited to Texas for trial.

Leach entered a plea of guilty and received a two-year suspended sentence.

On the civil docket, the judge heard pleadings in a trespass to try title case in which trustees of the Shannon West Texas Memorial Hospital sought to clear title to a parcel of Crockett county land. The suit was styled the trustees against William Fauds and others. Judgement was rendered in favor of the plaintiffs.

## 4-H Rifle Club Members Shoot For NRA Award

Members of the Crockett County 4-H Junior Rifle Club have started shooting for NRA awards, according to county agent Pete W. Jacoby, who is the club's chief instructor and a NRA Certified Rifle Marksmanship Instructor.

Members of the club are being trained in groups by volunteer adult leaders who have received training in basic rifle marksmanship. The junior members receive training in the fundamentals of good rifle marksmanship and gun safety while shooting for their awards.

The club is also enrolled with the Director of Civilian Marksmanship and members are eligible to shoot for awards with this organization. Both the NRA and DCM offer valuable assistance to the club in its training program with youth who are interested in learning to shoot properly and handle guns safely.

Mr. Jacoby said that a number of outstanding shooters are showing up among the membership already. Several could probably qualify for the Sharpshooters award now, he added. ## Delta-Pauley To Drill Outpost; Noelke Re-Entry

Delta Drilling Co. and Pauley Petroleum Inc. will drill the No. 1-E Couch as a 1 1/2-mile northwest outpost to Canyon sand production in the Ozona, Southwest multipay field of Crockett County, five miles southwest of Ozona.

Location is 660 feet from the south and east lines of 8-ST-J. H. Gibson. Contract depth is 7,200 feet; ground elevation, 2,480 feet.

Allied International Petroleum, Baton Rouge, La., will attempt to open the Noelke multipay field of Crockett County with the re-entry and cleaning out to 4,315 feet of a depleted producer, five miles southeast of Iran. It is the No. 1 Bouscaren Heirs.

Application was filed to clean out to the same depth by Frank W. Burger, Abilene, in March 1963, however, operations were never begun.

Original completion was Aug. 15, 1950, as a gas well for 50 million cubic feet of gas per day; it was recompleted by Sandor Petroleum Co., Abilene, as the opener of the 4,400-foot sand pay on Dec. 8, 1952, for 242 barrels of oil through a 1/2-inch choke and perforations between 4,430-40 feet.

It was re-entered by South Texas Well Service Inc. and recompleted May 10, 1960 as a Queen sand oil discovery for 60.5 barrels of 29 gravity oil through a 1/2-inch choke and perforations at 2,065-078 feet and became depleted in April, 1961.

Location is 2,490 feet from the north and west lines of 29-GG-HE&WT.

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#### "RATHER EFFECTIVE"

The President's less than spirited support of the dedicated, efficient and long-suffering FBI Chief J. Edgar Hoover at his press conference at the LBJ Ranch should have prepared us for ensuing reports that one of the most respected and admired public servants of our time is about to walk the plank. According to one source, any delay will be due to the considerable task of finding a replacement who will not offend public sensibilities too deeply.

Asked whether he thought Mr. Hoover's usefulness "had been impaired" by his statements on the subjects of the Rev. Martin Luther King, the Warren Commission and the Supreme Court, the President narrowed his reply to the colloquy between the two individuals. In the course of his answer, he said:

"... Mr. Hoover has been called up on by the President and others on many occasions to do work in the examination and the study and the investigation in this field of civil rights. He has been diligent and rather effective, and I would hope in the months ahead he would have further evidence of his — the outstanding capacity of his people — and that this would not degenerate into a personal — battle of personalities."

Not since the days of Harry Truman, we would say, has any public servant been publicly damned by such faint praise. And the sudden shift of reference from "further evidence of his" (Mr. Hoover's), to "the outstanding capacity of his people," is hardly subtle.

Nor, despite the President's recent dedication to civil rights, and in view of the record on which Mr. Hoover based his evaluation of Dr. King's proclivity, does it seem likely that the President underestimates the F. B. I. Chief's effectiveness. And it will be a sad day for all Americans, including Dr. King and his cohorts, when

#### "REALISM" DEMANDS REJECTION

Now that Red China has managed to detonate some sort of atomic bomb, the same people who hailed as a great victory our abandonment of meaningful nuclear testing, because the USSR said it would also (but don't peek), are urging that we recognize Red China as a fact of existence and admit the murderous Mao mob into the UN as a "peace-loving" nation.

A more subtle approach is the latest effort of Roger Hilsman, the late President Kennedy's Assistant Secretary of State for Far Eastern Affairs, and now teaching our youth at Columbia University. His newest thesis for cosying up to Red China is that even if Mao is the bloodiest thug un-hung, he's getting old and so is his mob, and it's unlikely he can find any younger Chinese Communists to take over who are quite as bloodthirsty as the team.

In a recent speech on the West Coast, Mr. Hilsman urged President Johnson to increase communications with Peking, perhaps bring the Red Chinese into the Geneva disarmament discussion. He might also remove travel restrictions and think about trade policies with Red China.

"We should seek," Mr. Hilsman is quoted as saying, "a frame of mind toward (Red) China such as we have developed toward Russia — to deal firmly with the Soviets when they put missiles in Cuba, and yet a few months after the missiles are removed, be able to negotiate a nuclear test ban with them."

It may be, of course, that Mr. Hilsman has been too busy thinking about the Far East to realize that when Washington got through dealing "firmly" with the

direction of the Federal Bureau of Investigation passes from the hands of J. Edgar Hoover.



GOOD ADVICE

Russians they had Cuba "firmly" — and apparently irrevocably — under their control; also that it is no great feat to sign a treaty with a nation that never keeps an agreement when there's any advantage in breaking it.

But, by the same token, Mr. Hilsman should know that while the shameful truce of Panmunjom prevails, Red China as well as North Korea is still our enemy in the unresolved Korean War; that Red China support of the Viet Cong makes her our enemy-in-fact in the South Vietnamese nightmare.

And it is our profound hope that President Johnson will not be too impressed by Mr. Hilsman's report that Mao and his contemporaries — who have the blood of 30 million of their fellow countrymen on their hands — are aging and not feeling very well, and may not be able to find equally murderous successors.

Further, we hope the President has maintained the attitude he expressed at his February 1 press con-

ference. Asked whether he could foresee a situation that might cause him to "recommend or accept the admission of Red China into the UN," Mr. Johnson replied simply and directly: "I do not!"

# TIPS FOR OUTDOORSMEN

**Innertube Protects Motor**  
When transporting your outboard motor in the trunk of your auto, try placing it on a half-inflated innertube.

Tubes reduces the bumps of the car to more quivers. This helps prevent injury to the motor or parts from shaking loose.

**Carp Love Wheaties**  
When fishing for carp, try using a simple bait made from Wheaties.

Simply mix the cereal with enough water to knead into a ball. It will remain on a hook for long periods. Carp really go for it.

**Pipe Cleaners Useful**  
An ordinary pipe cleaner can serve many purposes for the outdoorsman, besides cleaning his pipe.

It can be used to hold parts of a rod together when disassembled; keep line from un winding on a reel; and as a nook and cranny oiler.

**Handy Gun Oiler**  
Saturate a lamb's wool pad with oil and pin it to the flap of your gun case. There it will be handy at all times for oiling the gun.

**Peps Up Batteries**  
Heat flashlight batteries over your campfire for a few more hours of life.

**Repairing Rod Guide**  
A hairline crack in a rod guide can wear fishing line thin in a very short time.

To fix it temporarily, wrap a section of line carefully all around the guide. Weave it around and around and lay it up smooth. Then lash it to supporting arms.

It will last for several days. Early attention may prevent loss of the lunker fish.

**Handy Lure Box**  
Some salt water fishermen use toothbrush holders to store their feathered lures.

Keep 'em in good shape a lot longer than bouncing around in the bottom of a tackle box.

**Another Use For Magnet**  
When refinishing ultra-deluxe items like a gun

stock or rod rack, run a magnet over the surface before varnishing. It will pick up every last trace of steel wool used to smooth the surface.

**Excellent Fire Starter**  
To make an easy starter for a campfire, soak a charcoal briquet in turpentine and wrap it in aluminum foil. It burns hot and lasts a long time.

**Storing Minnow Seines**  
Use old newspapers to keep your minnow seine from rotting while in storage.

Carefully but loosely wrap the seine in an old newspaper. Paper will draw off the moisture. Mildew then never has a chance to attack the net fibers.

**Holds Fish For Cleaning**  
As an aid to cleaning fish, mount a mouse trap on a plank. Use the spring of the trap to hold the tail of the fish while you scale it.

**New Use For Milk Cartons**  
To make a long-lasting ice supply for the ice chest, collect empty milk cartons fill them with water and freeze.

When they finally do thaw, you have a container of emergency drinking water.

Another twist is to freeze milk. It, too, serves as an ice supply and the contents taste refreshing after thawing. Homogenized milk loses little flavor in freezing.

**Makeshift Sinkers**  
For a makeshift sinker, use small squares of cheese cloth filled with sand or gravel.

If snagged, the cloth rips. This frees the line and saves expensive hooks and swivels.

**Cattails for Camp Lights**  
A cattail soaked in kerosene burns for long periods.

Makes a good light in camp or is dandy for starting stubborn campfires.

**Use Foil To Reflect Heat**  
Aluminum foil, that all-purpose "Handy Andy" of the camper, can make you an efficient camp oven.

Also, it can double as a fire reflector in cold weather.

**Here's how to do it:** Drive four 18-inch stakes in a square around your campfire. Leave one side open to stoke the fire and handle the food. Fasten the foil to the stakes to cover the other three sides. Make a top of small, straight, interwoven, green sticks and cover with foil. Secure top to the four stakes.

Foil surfaces reflect heat, creating high, even temperatures even with a small ember fire.

**Effective Lure Polish**  
Water in which your wife boils potatoes makes an effective polish for spoons and spinners. Objects to be polished should be soaked for several hours.

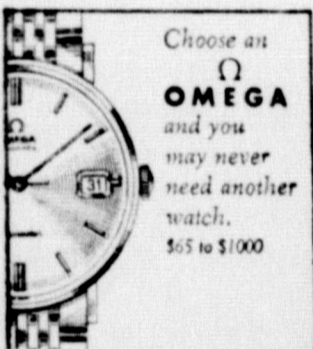

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman From The Stockman, Dec. 12, 1935

Members of Boy Scout troop 53 and the local committee were hosts to nearly two hundred visiting leaders and interested citizens at a barbecue supper preceding the district mid-winter Scout Rally held in the high school gymnasium.

—30 years ago— Butch Lenz, star third baseman of the fast-stepping Ozona Giants 1935 baseball squad, back in Ozona. Lenz has accepted a position as manager of the Mike Couch original store. He has been in San Antonio where he is associated with his father in the grocery and market business.

### HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

#### From Your State Capital

Austin, Texas — Officials of State and Federal water agencies and river authorities and cities, heard the Texas Water Commission outline the procedures by which it will develop a statewide water plan for Texas.

They gave it their warm endorsement, and pledged to help the state agency in its job of putting all the many regional and river basin plans into a unified whole.

However, spokesmen for cities disagree sharply over the vital issue of diverting water from areas of surplus to areas of need.

#### One-House Legislature?

Latest of the proposals being prepared for the 1965 Legislature is one from Rep. Will Smith of Beaumont to abolish the State Senate and establish a one-house Legislature, such as the one in Nebraska.

Smith's unicameral plan, which he says he'll introduce shortly after the Legislature convenes on January 12, includes proposals to reduce the House of Representatives' membership from 150 to 100, and raise House members' pay from \$4,800 a year to \$10,000 a year.

The lieutenant governor's job of presiding over the Senate also would be abolished. This is one bill that likely will not make it through either house of Texas' bicameral Legislature, much less both.

But the board will continue to supervise disposal of oil and gas brine after it leaves the producer's hands.

**Welfare Rolls Increase** — Texans on welfare rolls in-

creased from 260,781 to 264,639 during the last year, Texas Department of Public Welfare reports.

D P W's annual report shows public assistance payments of \$221,190,000. Biggest share, \$159,400,000, went to old age assistance for an average of 230,000. Grants ranged from \$5 to \$83, and averaged \$58.16 a month.

The Lions placed one man on the tourney all-star team, David Childress being named to the honorary squad.

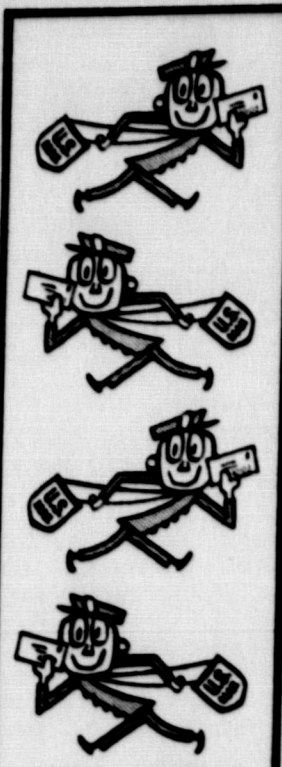

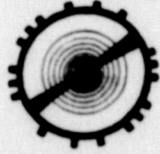

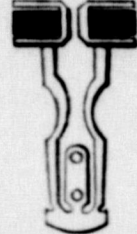
