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Look Forward To Improved Facilities At Football Stadium

School Bond Issue Approved

Plans for improving playing conditions at Ozona stadium included in the current proposed bond issue which Ozona football track fans have for a number of years and should be of interest to a large number of Ozona fans.

Ozona fans have been well known for a number of years for the football field was one of the poorest lighted in this area and, in addition, the light poles along been a sore spot for fans who seem to find one right in the line of their field of vision when some exciting occurs.

Under the current proposal, the light poles would be moved from in front of stadium and additional added, thereby making two major improvements in just one move.

Track fans, however, would find still a third improvement in the light adjustment since, in moving the poles, present guy wires which are too close to the track in several places, would be removed, allowing for possible improvement in the track, which has not been possible under the present conditions.

The construction of a new and larger field house would of course, remove a bottle neck which has been getting worse every year as the number of boys taking part in athletics has increased.

With the prospects of more freshmen in high school next year than there were high school students and teachers confined at the time the present high school was built, it might be reasonable to expect that current squads of 40 to 45 will increase to 60 and better in the next two or three years when as many as 300 are expected in high school.

Ozona Juniors Outscore Foe In Practice Meet

Ozona Junior High won its practice track meet Thursday, March 11, with a score of 43.5 points. Big Lake was the closest competitor with 25 points, while Sonora and Eldorado scored 19.5 and 18 points respectively.

Ozona came in last in the 440 relay which Sonora won, but Fleet Coates and Rodney Pagan picked up a third and fourth place in the 100 yard dash. Abel Lara of Big Lake won this event with a 10:9.

Humberto Diaz and Randal Clepper ran first and second place in the 100 low hurdles. Diaz's time for first was 12:1 seconds.

Abel Lara of Big Lake won the 330 with a time of 4:10 seconds. Fleet Coates and Sylvester Rios of Ozona came in second and third.

Ozona won the 880 relay and took the lead. With all running events completed, Ozona led with 22 points; Big Lake followed with 15 points, Sonora had 11 and Eldorado had 7 points.

Carlos Sanchez of Ozona won first in the broad-jump distancing 16'8". Fuentes of Big Lake won the discus with a throw of 120'2", but Rodney Pagan and Fleet Coates won 3rd and 4th places to add to Ozona's overall score. Corbell of Eldorado won the shot with a put of 41 feet. Marlin Farris and Rodney Pagan placed second and fourth.

Humberto Diaz won the pole vault with a vault of 9 feet 6 inches, and David Huff placed second with fewer misses than Barnes of Big Lake who "went out" at the same height. Ed Lee Renfro of Sonora won the high jump, and Randal Clepper of Ozona, who jumped the same height but had more misses, placed second.

The track meet ended on a cloudy day with a deluge of rain and hail fell and covered the field ankle deep.

The Ozona Junior High teams, 7th and 8th grades, go to Crane Friday to participate in the annual Crane meet which starts at 4 p.

Wildcat Slated In Todd Field

Southwestern Natural Gas, Midland, will drill a 2,000-foot San Andres wildcat in Crockett County, 1/2 miles east-northeast of a recent San Andres gas discovery, 3/4 mile southwest of San Andres gas production in the Todd, Northwest field and one mile northeast of a northeast extension area in San Andres oil production in the Todd (Grayburg and San Andres) field. It is the No. 1 Shannon Estate. Location is 990 feet from the south and 467 feet from the west lines of 11-10-GC&SF.

The discovery, Roy Kimsey No. 1 Texaco-Shannon Estate, was finalized Feb. 2 for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2.05 million cubic feet of gas daily through perforations between 1,540-1,709 feet.

It also tested through lower San Andres perforations between 1,881-99 feet, making gas at the estimated rate of 1 million cubic feet daily.

Field designation has not been granted.

Records Fall As Lions Win Sonora Relays Sat.

David Childress and Gary Pagan led the Ozona track team to a thrilling 122 to 107 win over Eldorado and the balance of the field last Saturday when the Lions won the Sonora relays, cracking two records on the way.

Childress set a new high hurdles mark at 15.2, won second in the broad jump with a leap of 21'4" and ran the opening leg on two

winning relay teams. Pagan won the shot put, setting a new mark with a heave of 52'7 1/2", won the discus with a throw of 150' and won a point in the 100 yard dash.

The Lions really determined the outcome of the meet in the relay events, however, as they won the 440 relay with a time of 45.0 after running a 44.9 in the prelims and then set a new meet record of 1:34. In both instances, the Lion quartet of Childress, Ramos, Cox, and Mike Walters, who just became eligible this week, were well ahead of the field at the finish.

Bill Carson won the pole vault for the second week in a row with a leap of 11 feet some 11 inches off his mark last week, but none the less, the best of the meet, and Sammy Cervantez picked up a fifth place in the event.

Richard Vargas, who did a good job with the team year before last, but who had an off year last year, contributed some valuable help to the Lion cause with a second place in the low hurdles and a sixth place in the broad jump.

One of the bright spots of the meet for Ozona was the mile run turned in by Pablo Diaz of Ozona. Diaz, running against time in a very slow heat, ran one of his better miles and doubtless would have finished much higher had he been in a faster heat, as he won by over 100 yards and sprinted the last 440. Diaz' fifth place came while the Lions and Eagles were tied for the meet lead and gave the Lions the lead, though a slim one, going into the final event.

As was the case last week, the Lions came down to the final event needing a win over Eldorado for the meet title. A foursome of Beto Ramos, Joel Huff, Darold Maney, and George Cox had no trouble beating Eldorado decisively, even though Bander's fine 440 man, Wayne Causey, nipped Ozona's George Cox at the tape to give Bander first place. It was the only two yards during the mile that Ozona did not lead and Eldorado was out of it by the time Maney finished his leg.

The Lions missed George Parker, who was still out with injuries, and Joel Huff is still limited in his efforts, but the Lions gave their best performance in a number of years and will be seeking to extend their string of meet wins to three this week when they travel to Eldorado for the annual Plateau relays.

Armond Hoover, Crockett county rancher, injured recently when he fell from a bluff on his ranch, has been released from the Crockett county hospital and is at his home here recuperating. Mr. Hoover suffered breaks in both legs and one arm. He underwent bone surgery to repair a break in one knee, which was badly shattered when he landed at the base of the cliff, and surgeons hope for almost complete recovery of the use of the joint. The other breaks were less serious. All broken limbs are still in casts.

A BASIC FREEDOM

The unions' all-out campaign to force repeal of section 14b of the Taft-Hartley Act, which permits the states to adopt Right-to-Work laws if they so wish, could lead unknowing people to believe that this provision is a deadly weapon aimed straight at the heart of organized labor.

Anyone who believes that would do well to read the section. It says: "Nothing in this Act (Taft-Hartley) shall be construed as authorizing the execution or application of agreements requiring membership in a labor organization as a condition of employment in any State or Territory in which such execution or application is prohibited by State or Territorial Law."

To make that seem, in any way, an anti-labor provision requires some massive twisting of plain language. It simply says that, in states which take advantage of 14b, each worker will have the right to join

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Less Than Month Remains For Check On Auto's Safety

Austin — "Only one month remains for some 1,500,000 vehicles registered in Texas to secure the 1965 safety inspection sticker," Col. Homer Garrison, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today.

"The period set by law for securing the 1965 sticker ends at midnight, April 15, and there can be no extension of that deadline," Garrison pointed out. "Any Texas motorist whose vehicle does not display the new sticker after April 15 is subject to arrest by any sheriff or his deputy, any city policeman, or by officers of the Department of Public Safety."

Garrison said that in the remaining month of the inspection period there is sufficient time for the 5,300

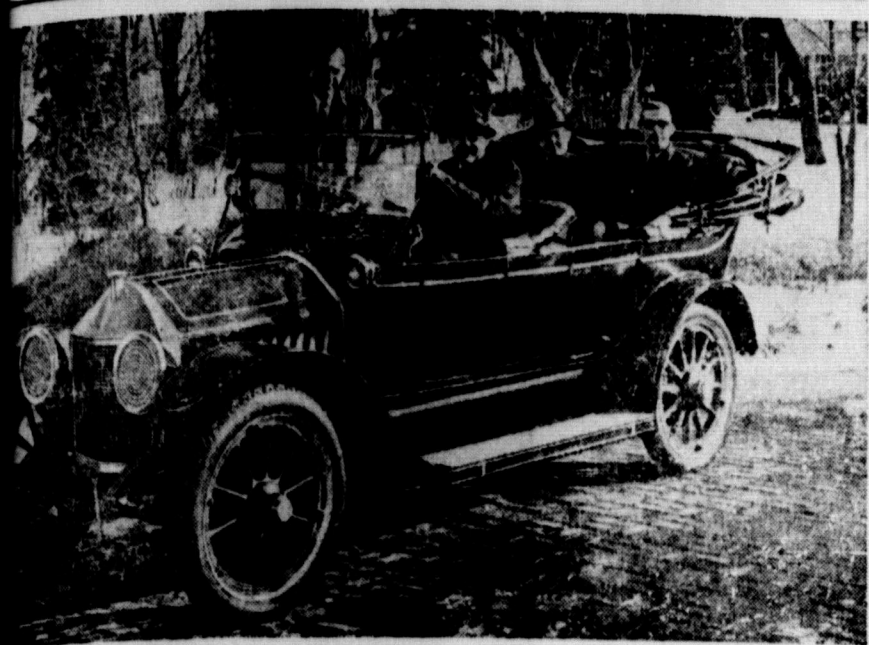
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College exhibit gets oldest Chevrolet known to exist

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — A bill to regulate commercial applicators of pesticides is having a hard time in a House committee. This is an indication that it probably will be changed considerably before it is reported for floor action.

Health Legislation — Sweeping new concepts for treatment of tuberculosis, mental illness and mental retardation are about to be written into Texas law.

Bills overhauling the entire state organization for dealing with these vast problems soon may be sent to Gov. John Connally for signature.

House passed 142-0 an amended version of legislation already approved by the Senate to set the tuberculosis eradication program in motion.

A separate bill to establish a new Texas Department of Mental Health and Retardation cleared the House 139-1 and was sent to the Senate.

Horses Booked — Odds are long against the horse race betting advocates this session, but they will provide one of the Legislature's most colorful shows.

On March 29 the House State Affairs Committee will hear a bill to legalize pari-mutuel betting on supervised tracks. Bill is backed by the Texas Racing Association. It was introduced by Rep. Maurice Pipkin of Brownsville.

Rep. Rayford Price of Palestine has introduced a constitutional amendment which would outlaw pari-mutuel (in a pool) betting and all other forms of gambling in the state.

Budget Conference Take Over — Whether Texans will face substantial new taxation to finance expanding state services rests largely with 10 top lawmakers.

Budget writing was checked to a joint conference committee of senators and

representatives after the Senate, without discussion, passed a \$3,650,000,000 appropriations measure. It called for \$617,000,000 in general revenue spending.

Pickups May Speed Up — House has approved and sent to the Senate a bill permitting pickup trucks to travel 70 miles an hour on Texas highways instead of the present 55 mph limit.

Another bill by Rep. John Traeger of Seguin specifies that pickups may be driven with a regular operator's license. Some law enforcement agencies (not the Texas Highway Patrol) contend that drivers of pickups must have a commercial license. They say law is not clear on the point.

Property Titles Unclear — Rep. Forrest Harding of San Angelo believes that no Texan can be sure he has a clear title to any of his personal property because present law permits the state to get a preferred lien without notice on any property which has gone through the hands of a person arrears on his taxes.

Harding said the state can do this regardless of how many times the property has changed hands.

He has introduced a bill which would provide for handling of personal property liens in the same manner that liens on real property now are handled, including filing of a notice with the county clerk. No

lien would be effective on personal property before the filing of such notice.

Vocational Education Plan — Rep. Milton Schiller of Cameron has introduced a bill calling for a statewide plan to take maximum advantage of federal funds for vocational and technical education.

Bill would make the State Board for Vocational Education, established in 1949, the coordinating agency for setting up standards and requirements for school districts which want to set up a vocational and technical school.

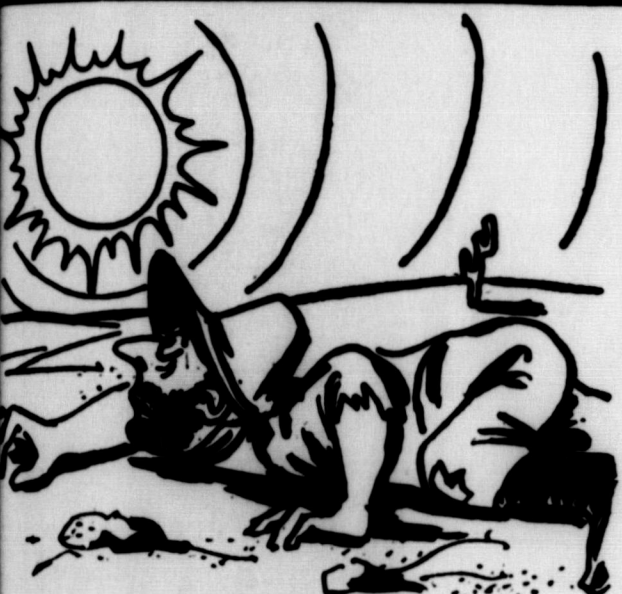

Livestock Men Asked For More To Fight Worms

Dallas, — Texas farmers and ranchers have been asked to raise \$300,000 to keep the screwworm eradication program in operation through June.

The Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation set the two-week period beginning March 29 for committees in all Texas counties to ask livestock producers for contributions to keep the popular insect eradication project alive until the Federal government can assume full financial responsibility. Livestock industry leaders are hopeful that with Congress considering a U. S. Department of Agriculture request for \$5 million, this will come about July 1.

Dolph Briscoe, Jr., SWAHRF president of Uvalde, stated his organization had investigated all alternatives before deciding to ask additional contributions from producers and assured the livestock industry that its funds are vital to the continuation of the eradication project. He said a reduced level of operation during the winter and economies in production of sterile screwworm flies have extended available funds by several months else a fund drive would have been necessary much earlier.

Eradication experts have estimated that during April, May and June, which in the past has been a time of heavy screwworm activity, 100 million sterile screwworm flies will be needed each week to keep fertile insects from Mexico from reinfesting the Southwest where the livestock pest has been eradicated through use of the sterile male fly technique. Cost of operating at this level will be \$12,000 a day or approximately \$1.1 million for the three-month period.

The \$300,000 to be raised by livestockmen along with \$250,000 already appropriated by the Texas Legislature, will match an equal amount of Federal funds to supply the total required.

Animal health committees have been organized in all counties. Livestockmen will be asked to contribute 10 cents for each head of beef or dairy cattle or horse

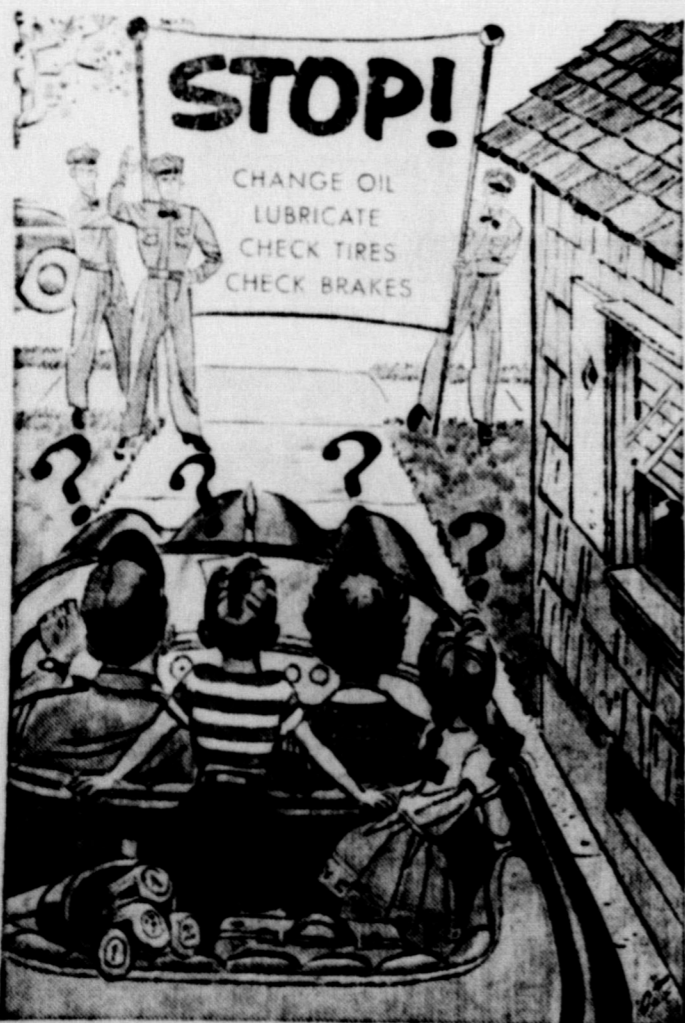
