Services For Jim Jones Tuesday

Funeral services were held from the Ozona Methodist Church at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon for Ronald Jones, 19-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Lester Jones of Ozona, who died at about noon yesterday from injuries suffered in an automobile accident near Seguin Feb. 13.

Funeral services were held at the Ozona Baptist Memorial Hospital in San Antonio for the injured girl, who died as a result of head injuries sustained, however, she was thrown through the steering wheel windshield of the car.

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Ranchers Invited To Hear Plan For Trapper Explained

The government pays a good part of a trapper's salary, the balance furnished by rancher groups in the affected area.

Dr. Ennis Hill To Preach Here In Brief Mission

Dr. Ennis B. Hill, pastor of Laurel Heights Methodist Church in San Antonio, will do the preaching at the annual Preaching Mission at the Ozona Methodist Church which will begin Sunday evening and conclude with evening services Wednesday.

Rain and cold limited track activity to almost nothing this week as the Ozona Lions prep for their first meet of the year, the big Ft. Stockton relays this weekend.

Coaches Chick Womack and Sonny Cleere have had a number of team members in training for some time but, aside from that group, the bulk of the squad, which joined the team following the end of basketball season, has been held to little work due to the elements.

Just how many entries Ozona will send into action Saturday seemed to be an unknown factor at the mid-week point but chances are that a mile relay team, made up mostly of boys who have had some conditioning and weight man Gary Pagan will see some action.

The Lions' own meet will be staged next week and Ozona coaches are hoping that this week's frigid blasts will be the last of what up until now has been a very mild winter.

About 16 teams are expected to be on hand for the annual invitational meet, but few if any of the teams are expected to be near top strength due to the lack of training time allotted thus far.

So far Joel Huff, who injured a leg in football practice, and David Childress, who has a recurring hip injury, have not shown any signs of being bothered by injuries that have slowed them in the past and coaches hope that good conditioning and some good fortune will keep both boys in action this spring.

Coach Womack expressed optimism that his sophomores, who did well in action last spring will be improved enough to give the team a big push this year. Only time will tell, but this week will not see the Lions anywhere near ready for a team effort.

Tourism Course To Be Offered By West Texas C of C

A two-day course in Tourism, sponsored by the Ozona Chamber of Commerce, will be held here May 5 and 6 in the Chamber offices, Troy Williams, president, announced this week.

George Jordan, tourist department manager for the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, will instruct the class which will be open to all business men or others interested in the effect of the tourist dollars on local economy.

Those taking the course will have a choice of either two day sessions or two night sessions at a cost of \$2 per person. Chamber officials expressed hope that a cross section of the community will be enrolled in the course. Invitations are being sent to neighboring communities to join the class. Less Than Half Cars Here Have Been Inspected

Patrolman James Cumby with the vehicle inspection division, Department of Public Safety, had something of a warning for Crockett county motor vehicle owners who have not yet secured that little safety inspection sticker on their windshields.

The deadline, if you didn't know, is April 15 — and after that, if your sticker is out of date, you are subject to a fine if a patrolman catches you.

April 15 may sound like a long time off but Patrolman Cumby has some sobering information. Crockett county will have registered approximately 2,950 cars by April 1. To yesterday only 1,380 new safety inspection stickers had been issued here. That leaves 1,570 vehicles which must undergo inspection at the four local garages which are approved stations by April 15. A lot of these cars may need work done on them before the station can attach the sticker and if you wait too long to have your car inspected you may find yourself waiting in line near the deadline.

Approved local inspection stations are Woody Mason Motor Co., Wooten Motor Co., James Motor Co., and Stuart Motor Co. The inspection fee is still \$1 plus whatever repairs are required.

New Directors For C of C Take Office Monday

The Ozona Chamber of Commerce ends its second year of operation March 1 and on that date, four new directors of the organization, elected in a recently completed mail ballot, will be inducted into office.

Newly elected directors are W. H. Whitaker, Bill Cooper, Ted Lewis and Sam Martinez.

Retiring directors who have served since the organization's inception, are Oscar Kost (first president of the CoC), Buster Miller, Gene Lilly and Woody Mason. Hold-over members of the board of directors will be Troy Williams (retiring president), Lowell Littleton, John Held, Bill Watson, Jack Baggett, John Childress, Joe Williams and Dick Henderson.

The newly elected directors will serve three-year terms. The original board selected by the membership drew lots for one-year, two-year and three-year terms so that continuity will be maintained on the board through the years with staggered terms for directors.

An organizational meeting will be held at the Chamber offices Monday night when the new directors will be inducted into office and new officers for the coming year elected.

Court to order the election and as soon as the required number of signers is secured, the petition will be turned over to the court whose duty it is to order the election and set a date for the balloting.

The proposition on which voters will be asked to decide at the polls on the date set by the court is stated as follows in the petition:

"Shall the Commissioners Court of Crockett County, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of Crockett County Consolidated Common School District No. 1, of Crockett County, Texas, to the amount of \$320,000, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed four percent (4%) per annum, and maturing serially or otherwise in such installments as are fixed by said Commissioners' Court, with a maximum maturity not to exceed ten (10) years from their date, for the purpose of the purchase, construction, repair and equipment of public free school buildings within the limits of such district, and the purchase of the necessary sites therefor, and shall said Commissioners' Court be authorized to assess, levy and collect taxes annually in such an amount and at a rate sufficient on each \$100 valuation of taxable property in said district to pay the interest on and principal of such bonds, as authorized by the Constitution and laws of Texas" . . . and citing governing statutes.

The move toward the bond issue was launched by the school board of trustees after months of study of the local situation where the community growth has taxed school facilities to the maximum and expected future growth makes the building of additional facilities necessary to meet the needs of school age youngsters.

To meet expansion needs of the high school, the building program includes a separate library building, which also will include two classrooms for high school students, and which will release two more classrooms in the present building, now occupied by the library.

Both the North and South Elementary schools need additional classrooms, three at the North elementary, with additional restroom facilities, and two at the South Elementary, also with (Continued on Last Page)

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HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas—Gov. John Connally passed the first legislative test of his program for improving higher education.

House of Representatives overwhelmingly approved the bill to name an 18-member commission to decide which colleges and universities shall teach what, to assign fields of teaching, and to take over state supervision of academic work in the 32 junior colleges.

Shoals lie ahead, because some strong senators are against such a delegation of powers, or oppose some phases of the bill as passed by the House.

Sen. Dorsey Hardeman is opposed to some of Connally's programs. This has led to talk of pressure tactics. Forces of Speaker Ben Barnes, who support Connally, may hold up action on Hardeman's bill to transfer San Angelo College to state-supported status on September 1.

Hardeman, long a power in the Senate, heads the Senate Finance Committee which will make the fiscal decisions on many programs. This key position makes it vital to Connally that he have acquiescence, if not support, from Hardeman.

Economy Commission — A commission study which experts testified could result in savings up to \$8,000,000 a year in state gov-

ernment operations has House approval and now is in the Senate.

Called the "Little Hoover Commission," the survey is aimed at achieving "economy and efficiency" in the executive branch of the government.

TB Program Urged — House and Senate committees heard convincing arguments that tuberculosis can be eradicated in Texas within a decade through new drugs and treatment methods and an intensive program of care, case-finding and follow-up.

Senate Public Health Committee immediately approved setting the program in motion in a group of south-central Texas counties around San Antonio and Mexican border counties from El Paso to Brownsville.

Plan would call for State Department of Health to take over all hospitals and consolidate the entire program in a special division. Contract care of patients near their homes where possible is an important part of the program.

Oil — Oil production will be down a bit in March. Railroad Commission cut allowables 11,000 barrels a day after hearing discouraging forecasts of need for Texas oil during the month.

Oilmen got House committee approval of the oil and gas pooling bill backed by several oil associations. Strong opposition had been voiced by the Texas Farm Bureau, but the committee approved with only Rep. Amando Canales of El Paso opposing the

In simple terms, the bill would allow landowners or leaseholders who do not have enough land to obtain a drilling permit from the Railroad Commission to get the Commission to order adjoining operators to bring the small tract into a pool. Likewise, owners of large tracts can force the pooling of small tracts for oil and gas development.

Cotton — Legislation by Sen. Jim Bates of Edinburg and Rep. Menton Murray of Harlingen to restore the pink bollworm control law to full effectiveness is nearing final passage.

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White asked for the bill, changing an "and" to an "or". Cameron County court declared the present law invalid, after 40 years of enforcement.

UCRA May Expand — Rep. Forrest Harding of San Angelo will offer a bill permitting 10 West Texas counties to vote on creation of an enlarged Upper Colorado River Authority.

Counties are Tom Green, McCulloch, Menard, Schleicher, Concho, Coleman, Irion, Runnels, Coke and Sterling.

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Historical Survey Co. Chairmen Meet In Austin

Mrs. R. A. Harrell of Ozona, chairman of Crockett County Historical Survey Committee, will participate in the 1965 State-wide County Chairmen's Meeting on March 16 in Austin.

Highlight of the session is a discussion and planning of the second year for RAMPS, according to information Mrs. Harrell has received from the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, sponsor of the meeting.

RAMPS is the accelerated five-pointed program of Recordation, Appreciation, Marking, Preservation and Surveys of Texas history. It was begun, kept going and is now being enlarged through the cooperation of the county, regional and state historical survey groups.

Twenty-one projects pertaining to RAMPS are slated for completion during a five-year period, announces the TSHSC, a state agency with headquarters in Austin.

Mrs. Harrell will meet with other county chairmen for a discussion of plans and problems in having successful RAMPS projects in Crockett County.

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The state-wide goal of placing 1,000 markers a year was reached the first year of RAMPS — and went over with more than 1,300 markers erected in 1964.

To this date, there are 2 Official Texas Historical Markers and Medallions erected in Crockett County, one on the Courthouse and one on the Ozona National Bank building. Joe Couch was County Chairman when these markers were erected.

The marking portion of RAMPS is receiving major emphasis this year. Markers placed are to commemorate houses, sites, landmarks and individuals over the state, explained the state survey committee president, John Ben Sheppard of Odessa. County survey committees and the state organization will also stress publication of the proper tourist information on the markers, he added.

One of the featured events for the one-day county chairman's meeting on March 16 is a luncheon to which Mrs. Harrell has been asked to invite this district's state legislators.

Mrs. Harrell long has been one of the county's most prominent figures in local history preservation and study. She was appointed recently for a two-year term by County Judge M. Brock Jones.

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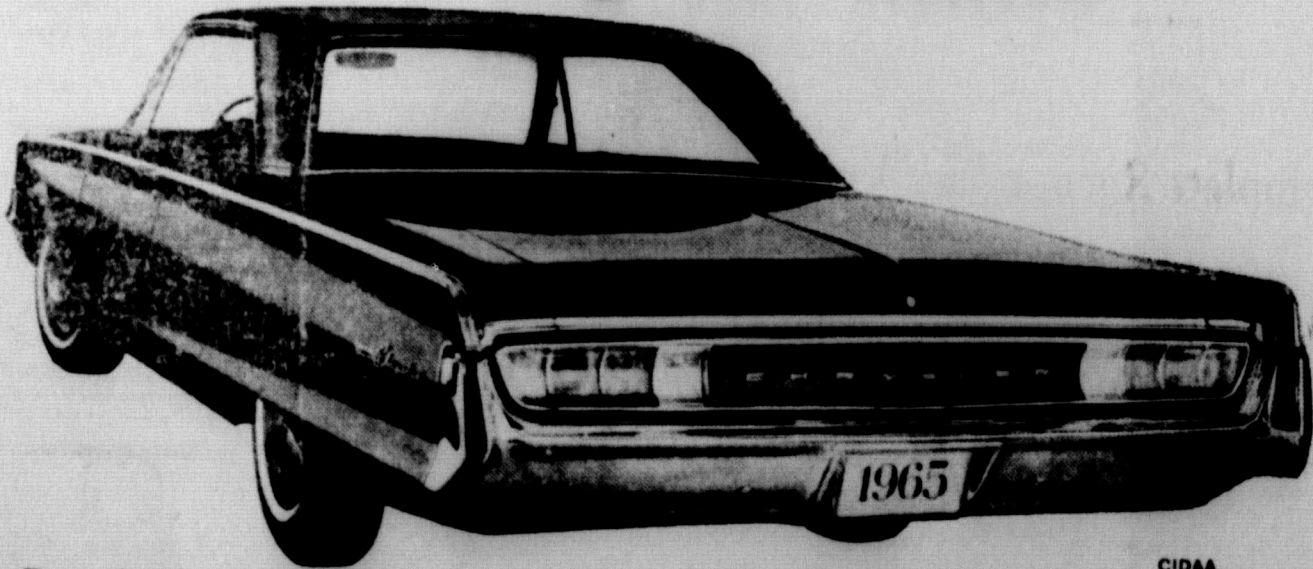

Report From Washington

This is a special news letter for readers of the twenty or so weeklies, semi-weeklies, small dailies, and six-time-a-year publications like that of our friend Juan Rivera down in Presidio. I will be issuing these news letters from time to time because I feel that the vast rural, small-town and small-city areas of my district deserve little attention with the metropolitan centers of El Paso, Odessa, and Midland.

Here, briefly, are some of the subjects with which I am concerned for the benefit of the less-populated areas of the 16th District. In Pyote, there is an abandoned air-base, lying useless, and therefore an economic waste. I have initiated studies for the future utilization of this base, possibly as a site for manpower development and training under the Labor Department and the Office of Economic Opportunity. I offer the cooperation of my office to all groups in the area who are working toward this same end. I have already had several consultations with the responsible government officials, and am presenting the problem to my liaison committees in the necessary local action. There is much competition for the available projects of this type throughout the country, and local interest and action is a necessity.

In the Dell City area, I have been able to get additional personnel assigned to the Farmers Home Administration to make it easier for farmers to get proper financing. I will continue to work on this problem.

blem in this area and in other areas in cooperation with people of the district.

As a member of the House Interior and Insular Affairs Committee I am working to speed up the research on various methods of converting the vast mounts of saline underground water of our district into water that is drinkable.

In the Alpine area, we consider Sul Ross State College to be a prime asset to the region, and I took special pride in announcing the Federal grant for an advanced summer institute for teachers there, as well as special funds to permit part-time employment for low income students. I am also working on a project to provide landing lights for the Alpine airport.

In Pecos, the national guard is sorely in need of a new armory and I have requested the necessary action.

Eight counties of my district have been listed by the Department of Agriculture as eligible for the purchase of feed grains from government stocks at low prices, due to the long West Texas drought.

Much of our area benefits, directly and indirectly, from the many tourists that visit Big Bend National Park and Fort Davis National Historical Monument. In 1964, 119,700 visitors registered at Big Bend, and 86,000 at old Fort Davis. As a member of the National Parks Subcommittee, I will exercise every vigilance to see that these projects receive proper support in future years.

The creation of a new National Park in the Guadalupe Mountains under the bill I introduced at the beginning of the Session, will benefit still others of the communities of our district.

I hope you will let me hear from you as to how I, as your elected representative, can best serve the town or city or area where you live.

Bill Cooper To Lecture At Water Works Assn. School

W. D. Cooper, of Ozona, superintendent of the Crockett County water district No. 1, will serve as a special lecturer and expert advisor during the annual short school of the Texas Water and Sewage Works Association, February 28 through March 5 at Texas A & M University.

This year's event the 47th in an unbroken series of annual sessions, will bring together some of the nation's top brains in both public and industrial plant management.

This assignment: to share

their knowledge and skills and experiences with all who register for the unique exercise in self-improvement.

Under sponsorship of the State Health Department, Texas and A & M University, the Texas Water Pollution Control Association, and TWSWA, the instruction is expected to attract some 800-900 utility plant operators from across the state.

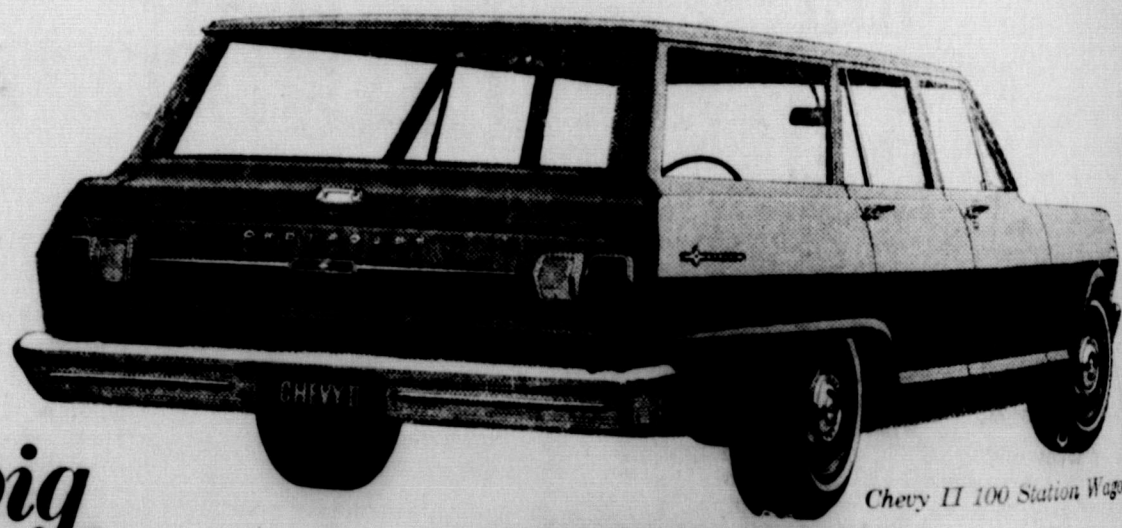

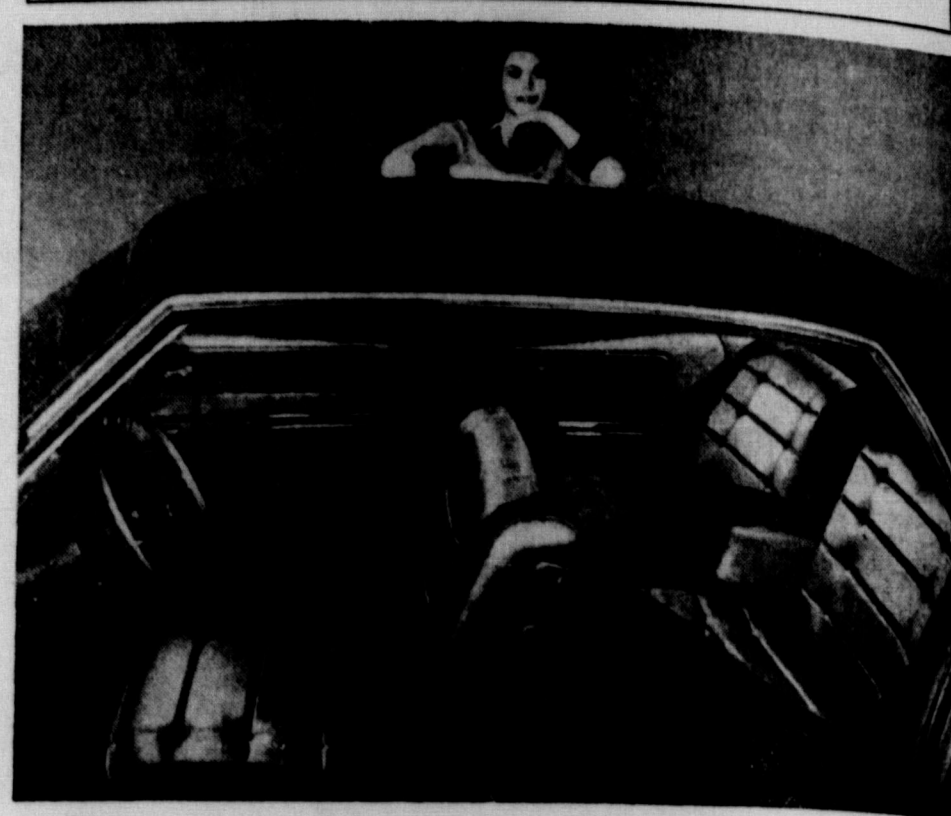
Mission Study By Girls Auxiliary

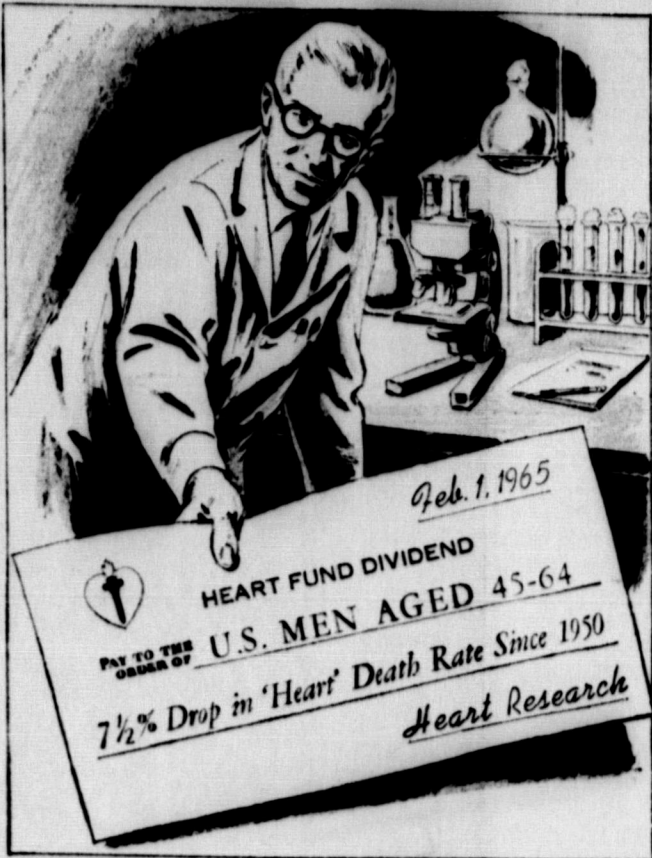
Plan Bi-Lingual Drivers License School In Del Rio

When the Indians revolted against Spanish rule in 1681-2 in the upper Rio Grande Valley in New Mexico, refugees sought safety at the mission at El Paso del Norte (now Juarez). 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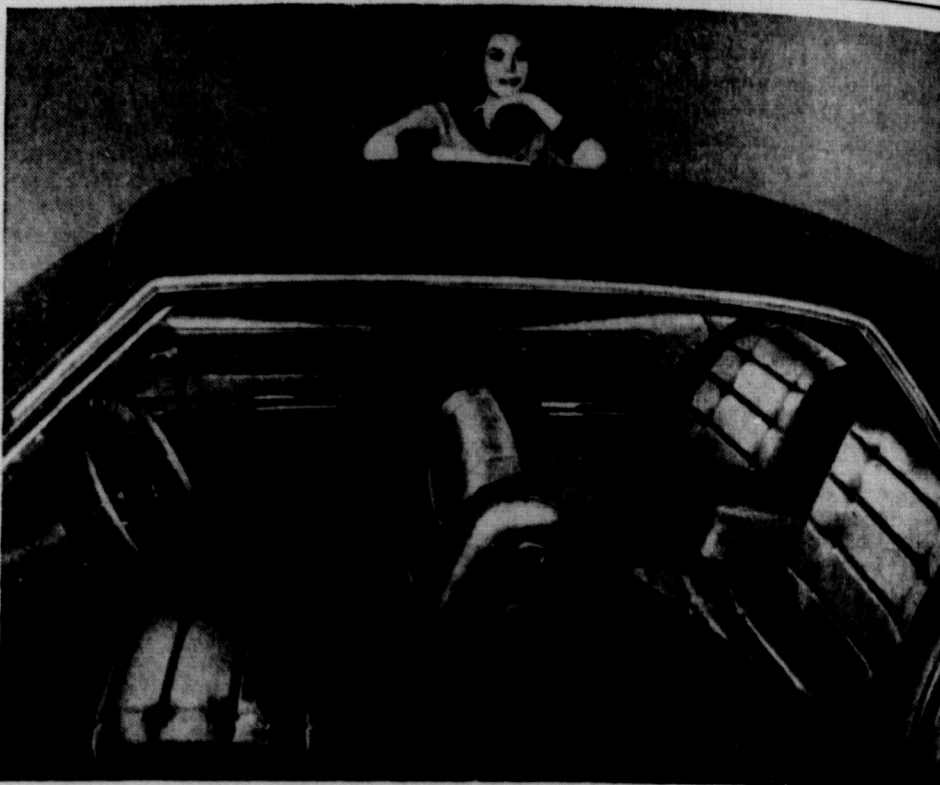

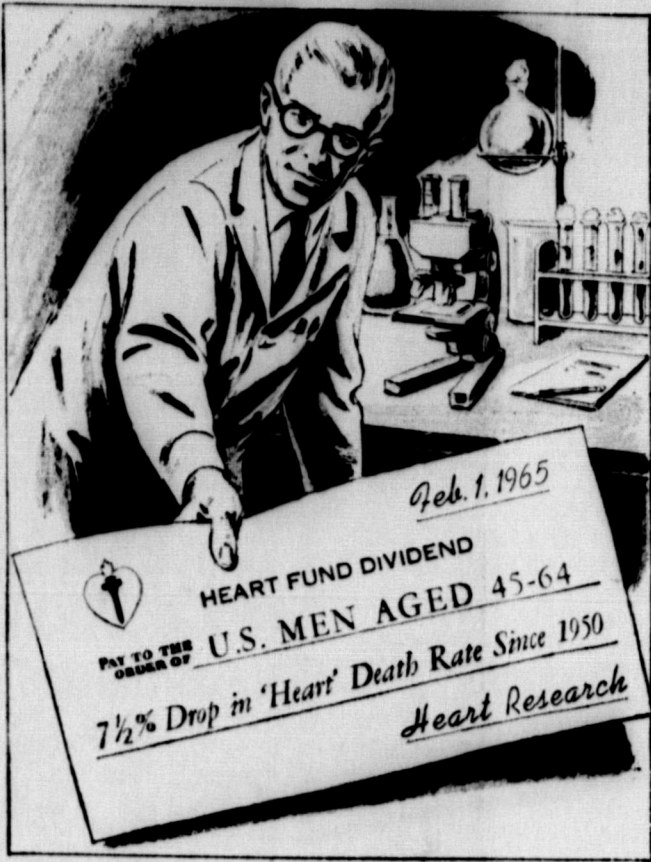
Plan Bi-Lingual Drivers License School In Del Rio

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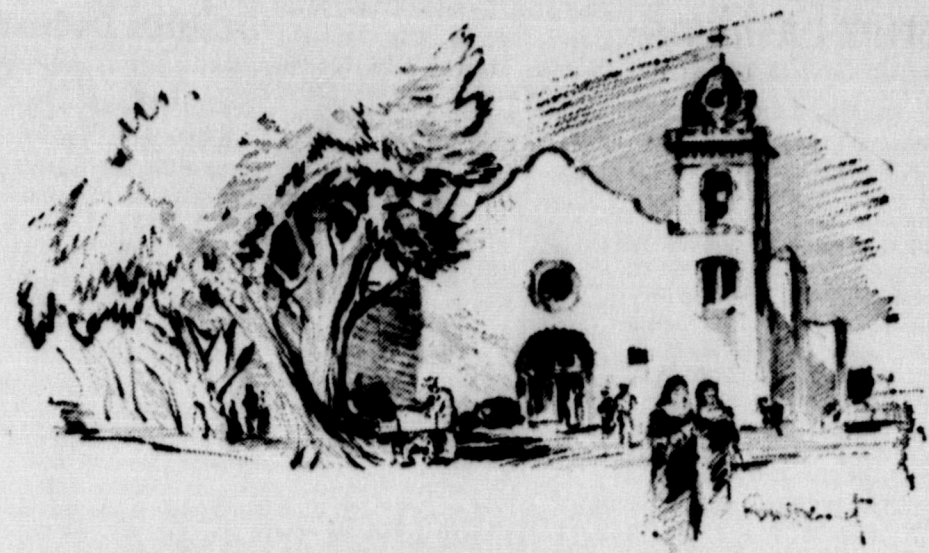

Expansion of present teacher housing facilities, the addition of one bedroom to make four of the present teacher houses into three-bedroom homes, and the construction of a new superintendent's home, is contemplated in the program.

The present Junior High School building is short on restroom facilities and improvements at that building are contemplated, plus painting the exterior woodwork on the high school building, painting the interior and exterior of the Davidson gym and new drapes for the high school, North and South elementary schools.

At the football field expanded field house facilities are needed for the growing number of students making use of athletic and physical training facilities. The program contemplates the construction of a new field house and install-

ation of new lights for the football field.

The proposed building program will include \$277,400 of contemplated new construction, including architect's fees and contingency fees; \$32,400 of repairs and improvements, plus another \$10,200 for furniture and other items.

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
