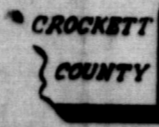

Some statistics from the American Heart Association the way this week and view of the recent series of deaths from heart attacks that compelled to pass them to you.

Heart and blood vessel diseases are responsible for 30% of deaths in the United States yearly, killing three times as many people as the number two killer, cancer. An enormous death toll in 1965, 547,000 victims of heart attack and 200,000 of stroke.

In recent years the percentage of deaths due to chronic heart disease, hypertension, heart disease and stroke has decreased, however, the percentage of deaths due to heart attacks has increased. At the present, more than 60 million Americans now living die of heart attack. American men at age 50 have heart attack death rate times as high as that of women of the same age. The Heart Association suggests several simple precautions which can reduce the risk of heart attack. First, control high blood pressure. Second, don't smoke cigarettes. Third, reduce if overweight. Fourth, eat foods low in saturated fat and cholesterol. Fifth, exercise regularly. Sixth, have periodic health check-ups.

Hardeman Seeks Re-Election As State Senator

State Senator Dorse B. Hardeman of San Angelo today announced his candidacy for re-election in the 25th Senatorial District which now includes twenty-one counties.

"I am grateful to the people for their confidence and respectfully ask their support," Senator Hardeman said in a brief statement. "My record in office has been predicated on a deep and abiding respect for the principles of our Constitution. It has been my purpose to help maintain a sound, responsive state government and to handle all legislation of local interest with dispatch. This I will continue to do."

Elected to a four-year Senate term two years ago, Hardeman is running for re-election in 1966 as a result of the redistricting law enacted by the last Legislature which re-aligned the state's senatorial districts to comply with the U. S. Supreme Court's "one man, one vote" decision.

The 25th District includes 15 of its previous 20 counties: Brewster, Crane, Crockett, Edwards, Irion, Jeff Davis, Presidio, Reagan, Schleicher, Sutton, Terrell, Tom Green, Upton and Val Verde. The six counties of Ector, Kinney, Loving, Midland, Reeves and Uvalde were added to make up the new 21-county district.

The late Arthur Buckner "Buck" Bailey, one of the most colorful characters in all West Texas sports annals, is soon to be immortalized in the College Baseball Hall of Fame, soon to be established in Kalamazoo, Mich.

The American Association of College Baseball Coaches will convene in Washington, D. C. on January 10 to induct a group of coaches in the College Baseball Hall of Fame, and the late baseball and football coach at Washington State University will be among them.

T. J. Bailey of Ozona, a brother of the colorful player and coach, has accepted an invitation from the Association to attend the Washington affair and to accept the honor on behalf of the Bailey family. Buck Bailey and his wife were killed in an automobile wreck in Phoenix Arizona a few years ago.

Judge Fields Asks New Term In J. P. Office

A. O. Fields, who has served the past six years as Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1, Crockett county, led off this week to launch the 1966 political activities in Crockett county with his announcement as a candidate for re-election to the J. P. post.

Judge Fields has seen his office grow from a part time post to an almost around the clock duty in recent years. This is due in part to the increase in population in Crockett county, but aggravated recently with changes in the Criminal Code of Texas. Those changes, in effect Jan. 1, require the services of the magistrate immediately in many cases of arrest and thus make it necessary for the justice to be available at all hours. The case load in the J. P. office, too, has increased enormously in recent years.

In order to understand provisions of the new code, Judge Fields has attended two institutes presented by the Attorney General of Texas and one seminar presented by the Law School of the University of Texas. The training from these schools and his experience will help him considerably, he feels, in his work with local and state law enforcement officers.

Judge Fields asks the consideration and support of all voters in the Democratic primary election on May 7, 1965.

If the Lions can get by the AA Cowpunchers, they will receive a second round bye into the semi-finals at 2:30 p. m. on Saturday afternoon. A loss will throw Ozona into the semi-final consolation bracket against Garden City or Imperial.

The ten team tournament is one of the Owl's smallest in a number of years. In recent years Owl tournaments have drawn as high as twenty-five teams.

During the Christmas holidays, the Lions entered the Howard Payne Tournament in Brownwood and advanced to the consolation finals in Division II before bowing 71 to 43 to Ballinger. The Lions were paced in this game by Win Saunders with 16 points.

The Ozona quintet opened tournament play with a narrow two point loss, 49 to 47 to Jacksboro with forward Pon Seahorn tossing in twenty points to lead the Lion scorers.

In the Lions' second match, Saunders, who was named to the All-Tournament team, had fifteen points as Ozona clipped Comanche 47 to 44. The Lions had trailed the Comanche team by seventeen points as the fourth quarter began.

This past Tuesday Coach Brooks Dozier's crew were in Sonora for a return match.

The Lions lost to the Broncos by a score of 59-37, Win Saunders tossed in 16 points for the Lions.

With mid-term exams scheduled for next week, the Lions will wait until Friday night when they will entertain the Big Lake Owls in their second West Zone Contest.

Elusive Pair Jailed Here On Forgery Charge

Tim Richardson, 18, of Lakeland, Mich. and Bruce Calvin Parks, 26, of Tom, Okla. are in Crockett County jail awaiting action of the grand jury on charges of forgery and passing of forged instruments.

The two arrived in Ozona last Friday from California. Securing some blank checks, Parks allegedly forged the name J. L. Jackson and Richardson cashed them at the Foodway Store and the United Department Store.

Becoming suspicious after Richardson made a purchase and received the balance of the check in cash, Paul Martin, manager of the United Store, called the bank and discovered there was no account under the forged name. Martin got in his car and picked up the pair. He followed them west on 290 and then notified the sheriff.

After Sheffield officials failed to locate the men, an alert was sent out by radio to all points. The two had doubled back through Ozona and were located in the Fredericksburg jail. They were charged with theft of gasoline in Fredericksburg and were apprehended after wrecking their car while fleeing from officers there.

George Cox, Ozona Lions star half-back, landed a place on the 1965 Class A All-West Texas grid squad with Pon Seahorn, Larry Williams, Gary Sutton, David Lewis and Randy Upham getting honorable mention.

Cox, 150-pound OHS junior, gained 1,284 yards on 148 carries for an average of 8.7 and 14 touchdowns. He caught 13 passes for 315 yards and three scores, kicked two extra points and averaged 36.9 yards on 20 punts. One of only two juniors picked for the team, George set an outstanding record.

Other members of the All-West Texas Team include Bobby Pherigo, senior end of Coahoma; Mike Wuest, senior end of Sonora; Tom Duren, senior tackle of Goldwaite; J. W. Crockett Wildcat Flows Gas From Second Pay Zone

A Crockett County gas prospect flowed gas in a second zone and a deep wildcat was scheduled.

A second gas pay, possibly Ellenburger, has been indicated with the flowing of gas at two different intervals while drilling at Socony Mobil Oil Co., Inc., No. 1 Blakemore - Krueger, in 35-Q3-TCRR, Crockett County un-identified shallow prospect, 32 miles southwest of Ozona and eight miles southeast of the recently opened J-M (Ellenburger gas) field.

It flowed gas for one hour at the rate of 638,000 cubic feet per day, through 4-inch drillpipe when drilling reached 13,883 feet. Thirty-minute shut-in tubing pressure was 70 pounds. When drilling reached 14,034 feet, it flowed for 45 minutes, making gas rated at 748,000 cubic feet daily, with 30-minute shut-in tubing pressure of 150 pounds. At each of the intervals, it flowed 10 barrels of water along with the gas. Drilling continued below 14,366 feet on a 15,000-foot Ellenburger contract.

Chas E Davidson Native Of Ozona Buried Here Sun.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon from the Methodist Church for Charles E. Davidson, Jr., 61, native of Crockett county and son of the county's first county judge, the late Judge Charles E. Davidson, and Mrs. Davidson.

Mr. Davidson, who had been active in ranching all his life, died in the Crockett County Hospital Friday morning after suffering a heart attack at his home a short time before. As was his custom, he had gone to a downtown cafe to have coffee with friends in the early morning and had returned to his home to prepare for a trip to San Angelo when the fatal attack came.

Services were held at 3 p. m. with the Rev. Leonard Garrett, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery, James Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Pallbearers were Sherman Taylor, W. E. Friend, Jr., Bill Cooper, R. L. Flowers, Lowell Littleton, Pleas Childress, Hilley Phillips and Boyd Clayton.

Mr. Davidson was born in Ozona Nov. 7, 1904. His birth was on almost the identical spot of his death, the home being located on the site of the original Davidson family home here.

Although shunning the political life of his father, Mr. Davidson nevertheless entered into many local civic enterprises and served his community in many capacities, including service on the school board and as a member of the board of supervisors and first chairman of the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District, organized in 1950. He had been re-elected last October to a new five-year term on the SCD board, of which he was vice chairman. He was a member of the board of directors of the Federal Land Bank Association of Sonora, which serves Crockett, Sutton and Schleicher counties.

Mr. Davidson married Miss Edna Elizabeth Barron of Temple in Ozona, in November, 1927. He was a member of the Methodist Church, a 32nd degree Mason and member of the Shrine.

Surviving are the widow of Ozona; a son, Charles E. Davidson, III, of Ozona; a daughter, Mrs. H. P. McClanahan of Fowler, Colo.; five sisters, Mrs. Betty Garver of Los Angeles, Calif.; Mrs. Frank McMullan of Ozona; Mrs. W. J. Grimmer of Winfield, Iowa; Mrs. Bryan McDonald of Canyon, Texas, and Mrs. Robert J. Meybin of Sewickley, Pa., and six grandchildren.

W. T. Childress, Former Ozonan, Dies In Calif.

W. T. Childress, 59, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Walter Childress, pioneer Ozonan, died Wednesday of last week in Los Angeles, Calif. where he had lived for many years.

The body was brought to Wichita Falls, for funeral services and burial Friday. His wife was a former resident of Wichita Falls. It was while he was stationed at Sheppard Air Force Base in Wichita Falls that they met and married, later moving to California.

Surviving are the widow and one son, Tommy Childress, who is stationed at Camp Folk in Louisiana.

Childress was born in Ozona in October 1906, leaving here shortly before the outbreak of World War II.

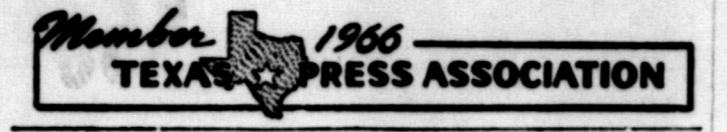

Recipe of the Week
From
Kitty's Kitchen

Vegetables can quite often be the duller food around and although a necessity, they can be quite a bore to the cook. The following two recipes can turn the two most ordinary vegetables into dishes fit for a king.

Crunchy Creamed Squash

- 2 lbs. yellow summer squash
- 2 tbs. margarine
- 1 cup chopped onions
- 1/2 cup mixed nuts or peanuts (dry roasted)
- 1 cup sour cream
- Paprika

Scrub squash and cut into strips about 1/4-inch wide and 3 inches long. Heat margarine in a large heavy skillet. Add chopped onions, salt and prepared squash. Cook, uncovered, over medium heat, stirring occasionally, until vegetables are tender (about 20 minutes). Stir in nuts and sour cream. Heat through but do not boil. Serve hot sprinkled with paprika. Serves 6 to 8.

Braised Cabbage

- 3 bacon slices
 - 2 qt. (2lbs.) finely shredded cabbage
 - 1 1/2 teas. salt
 - Dash of pepper
 - 3 tbs. white wine vinegar
- In 12-inch skillet, saute bacon over low heat until crisp. Remove; drain on paper towels and crumble. Add cabbage to bacon fat in skillet, toss with salt, pepper and vinegar coating cabbage well. Cook, covered over high heat about 3 minutes or until cabbage is tender. Sprinkle with bacon. Serves 6.

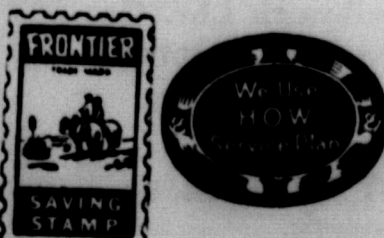

Former Ozonan Back After Hitch With Peace Corps

Mrs. H. B. Tandy, former Ozonan now living in Orofino, Idaho, where she is doing community service work with the Methodist Church, and son, Mills Tandy, just back from serving two years with the Peace Corps in Nigeria, are in Ozona for a visit with Mrs. Tandy's brother, R. L. Bland and family.

Mills Tandy, a graduate of Ozona High School and of the University of Texas, completed his two years with the Peace Corps as a teacher in Nigeria, and for the past three months has been doing research work on amphibian evolution in central and east Africa for the University of Texas department of zoology. This research has been with frogs in various parts of Africa. Tandy's work including on the ground study and the gathering of specimens for shipment back to the University for study in laboratories there. The project was financed by a grant from the National Science Foundation.

The research project took Tandy over some 11,000 miles of travel through Africa by auto and by plane. In the course of the study he visited in South Africa, Swaziland, Mozambique, Rhodesia, Kenya, Tanganyika and Uganda.

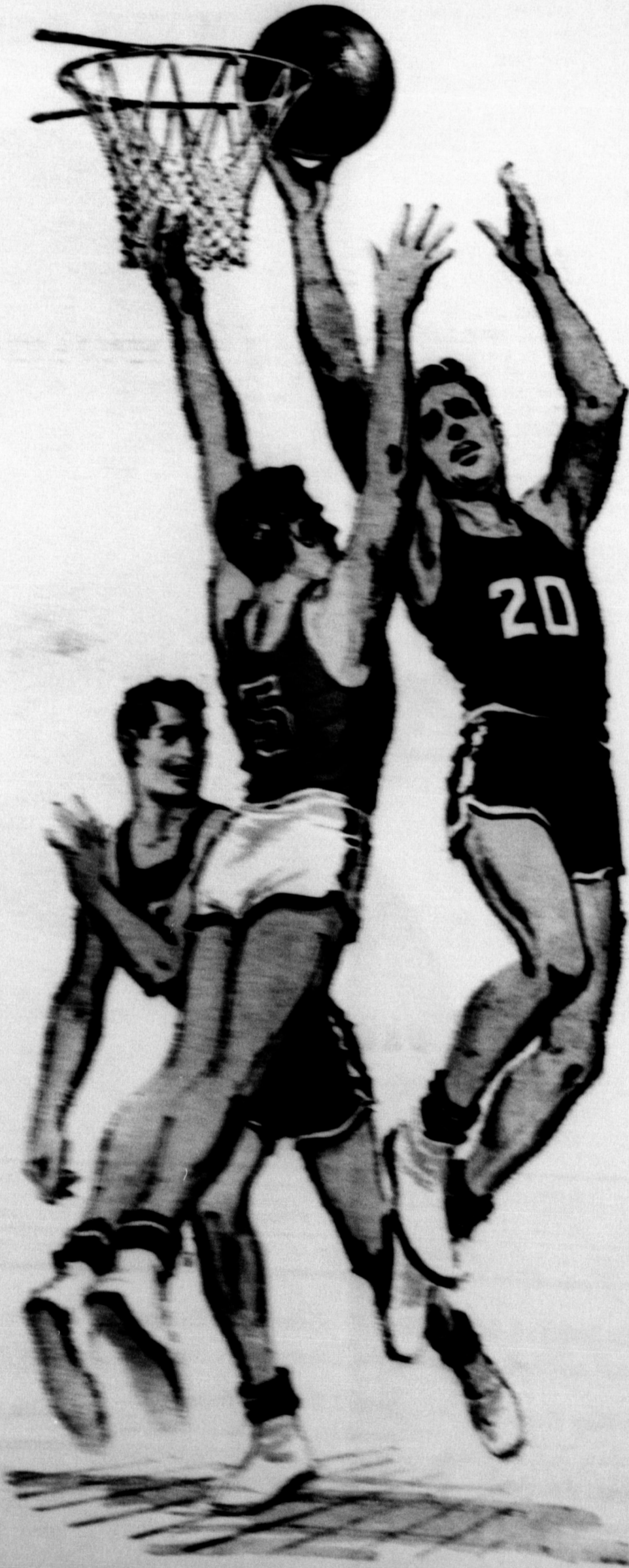

From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — One of the big sleeper battles on the Texas political scene during 1966 will be for control of the state Democratic party machinery.

Some observers think this brewing struggle is behind the fuss between U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough and Gov. John Connally. Few think Yarborough has any intention of running against Connally for governor, as some have suggested.

But there is every reason to believe that Yarborough will be the key figure in any all-out liberal Democratic effort to wrest control of the State party committee from hands of the governor's friends.

Shifting population patterns and legislative redistricting tend to shorten long odds against a liberal victory in this year's conventions. Half the 6,000-plus delegates to the September state Democratic convention will come from 12 major counties where liberals are gathering strength.

Giant Parks Plan in Offing — Most extensive state parks and recreation plan in Texas history may be submitted to the Legislature next year, says Governor Connally.

He may ask the lawmakers to approve a \$25,000,000 to \$50,000,000 land purchase program for parks during the next biennium. Total budget for parks this bienn-

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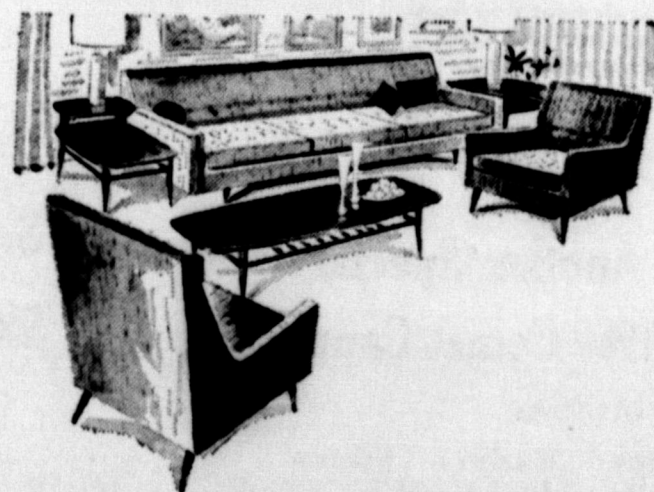

others being the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the Lieutenant Governor, who presides over the Senate. Hardeman is presently chairman of the influential Senate Committee on Finance, a member of the Senate Investigating Committee and is serving his fourteenth year in the Legislative Budget Board.

During nine regular and several special sessions of the legislature, Hardeman has served as chairman or as a member of all major Standing Committees of the Senate. He has received numerous honors. Hardeman was elected him President Pro Tempore of the Senate during which time he served as Acting Governor of the State. He is highly respected as an authority on constitutional law and on Texas and American history. He was accorded honorary life membership in the Texas State Historical Association for outstanding services rendered in Texas, which is the highest honor the Association bestows. Only five other persons currently hold this honor. Hardeman also has been awarded the Distinguished Service Medal by the Texas Heritage Foundation in recognition of distinguished and meritorious public service in preserving the Texas Heritage.

Senator Hardeman has resided in San Angelo since coming to Texas in 1932 from Tennessee. He is a 108-year-old Democrat and holds mem-

bership in the Sons of the American Revolution, Sons of the Republic of Texas, Sons of Confederate Veterans, the American Legion and the Elks Lodge. A lawyer, Hardeman is partner with Earl W. Smith and Justin A. Keener, both former District Attorneys, in the law firm of Hardeman, Smith and Keener in San Angelo. He formerly served as mayor of San Angelo and as a member of the House of Representatives from which he resigned in November, 1942, to volunteer as a private in the U. S. Air Force. He was graduated from Officer Candidate School and served in the Judge General's Department, assigned to the 2nd Air Force. He was honorably discharged with rank of Captain in February, 1946. Hardeman re-entered politics and began service in the Senate in 1947.

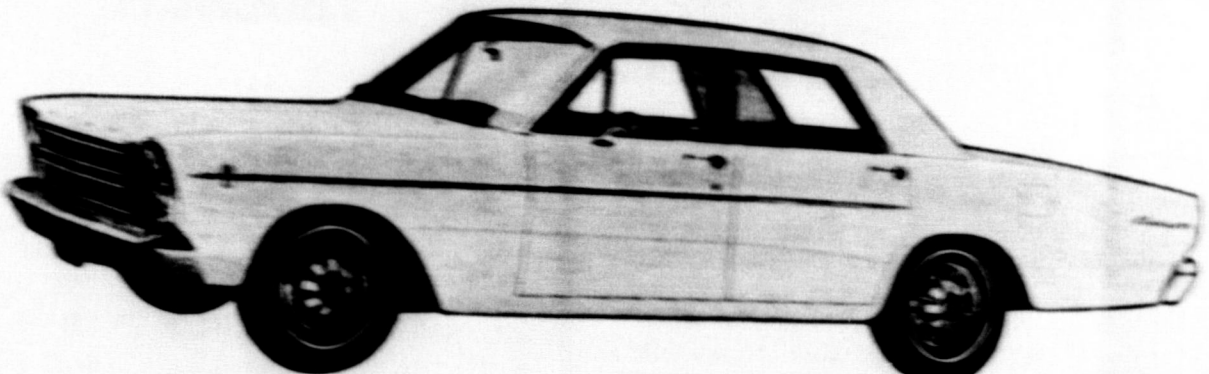
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
