### Woody Mason Is Candidate For County Judge

First candidate to seek the post as Crockett County Judge in the 1966 elections made his announcement for the office this week.

Woody Mason, Ozona automobile dealer and resident of Ozona nine years, this week announced that he would be a candidate for the office, held until recently by the late M. Brock Jones who died suddenly of a heart attack following an auto accident near his ranch east of Ozona. The office is being filled at present by the late judge's widow, Mrs. Brock Jones, under appointment by the Commissioners Court.

Mr. Mason came to Ozona nine years ago from Big Lake where he had been in the automobile business in association with his father-in-law, M. H. Boone. He has operated a Ford agency here since.

A veteran of six years service in the Air Force in World War II and the Korean conflict, Mr. Mason served several years as a City Councilman in Big Lake and also served on the school board in that city. He is a member of the Masonic lodge and of the Ozona Lions Club.

Trained as a fighter pilot, Mason served as an instrument instructor in training new pilots through the second world war. During the Korean conflict, he was stationed in the British West Indies as supply and transport officer and transport pilot. He emerged from the service with the rank of Major and remained in the officer reserve until his final discharge in 1957.

Mr. Mason is married and has two children, Ronnie Mason, a senior in Ozona High School and Mrs. Brent Moore who, with her husband, is attending Angelo State College in San Angelo. The Masons own their home in Ozona.

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### Bishop Slater To Speak Sunday At Methodist Church

Bishop Eugene Slater, residing Bishop of the San Antonio Area of the Methodist Church, and a former pastor of the Ozona Methodist Church, will speak at the coming service of worship at the Ozona Methodist Church Sunday, Jan. 16, the pastor, Rev. Leonard Garrett, announced this week.

### Probated Sentences Given Pair Charged In Forgery Here

Two-year probated sentences were meted out to 18-year-old Timothy Robert Richardson, and 26-year-old Bruce Calvin Parks here in 112th District Court this week when they entered pleas of guilty to charges of forgery and passing a forged instrument.

Richardson, from Lakeland, Mich., and Parks, of Tom, Okla., were arrested in Fredericksburg on charges of theft of gasoline and were found there by Crockett county officers, who had traced them west out of Ozona after one of the victims followed the pair after becoming suspicious of them. The pair had doubled back and passed through Ozona after passing two checks in local business houses.

### Official Salary Hikes Put Into Effect By Court

Crockett County Commissioners Court meeting in the first session of the new year Monday, carried through with the salary raises for themselves, two other county officials and one precinct officer which were authorized at the December meeting of the court and announced as required by law.

The raises amount to 20 percent of the previous maximum salaries drawn by these officials. Such a raise was made possible by a recently enacted state law, House Bill 374, which permitted a 20 percent salary raise above previously allowed maximums for county officials, where authorized by the Commissioners Courts.

The new salary schedule will increase salaries of Commissioners from a previous total, (salary and expense allowance) of \$4,525 to a new total of \$5,250 per year.

The county and district clerk and sheriff, tax assessor and collector were granted similar 20 percent raises over their previously maximum salaries. The clerk's salary was raised from \$6,750 to \$8,100 per year and the sheriff's from \$6,870 to \$8,244 per year. The justice of the peace salary was lifted by 20 percent to \$3,960 from a previous \$3,300.

The county judge's salary and that of the county attorney and county treasurer were left the same. The judge draws a salary of \$6,750 from the County plus an allowance of \$2,600 as ex-officio county school superintendent for a total salary of \$9,550. The attorney's annual salary is \$4,200 and the treasurer's \$3,150.

The court, in a day-long session, heard annual reports of officers and transacted other routine business, with Crockett county's first woman Judge, Mrs. M. Brock Jones, presiding.

The court voted to buy two new cars for the Sheriff's department, in a sealed bid purchase. The court ordered a new Chrysler and a new Plymouth, both from James Motor Co. a 1966 Chrysler Newport at \$2150 net with trade-in, and a 1966 Plymouth Fury at \$2935, outright purchase.

Woody Mason Motors submitted bids to furnish Mercury and Ford cars, a 1966 Mercury at \$1995.90 net with trade-in, and a 1966 Ford police special at \$2696.86, outright purchase.

Wooten Motor Co., bid a 1966 Pontiac Catalina at \$3,135 outright purchase and a 1966 Chevrolet Biscayne at \$2,400 net with trade-in.

### HALYDIER CANDIDATE - Young & Sutton In Contest For Precinct 4 Post

First contest of the new election year in Crockett county developed this week with the announcement by Jake Young, Crockett county ranchman and former County Commissioner, for the office of Commissioner from Precinct 4.

Making simultaneous announcement for re-election from that precinct as Commissioner was Glenn Sutton, Ozona business man, who is serving in his fourth year of his first term in the office.

Also in the running for re-election is the only other Commissioner up for re-election this year, Rex Halydier, Commissioner from Precinct 2, announced his candidacy this week for re-election to his second term. He is so far unopposed.

Commissioner Halydier expressed his appreciation to all for their support and cooperation during his term in office and asked their continued support in the first primary May 7.

"I will continue to fulfill the obligations of my office to the very best of my ability," he said.

Sutton, likewise, expressed his appreciation for the support which elevated him to office.

"I am grateful for the opportunity to serve in this important post and will deeply appreciate the continued support of all my friends in the coming election," Sutton said in announcing his candidacy.

Young served eight years, two terms, as Commissioner from Precinct 4 and in announcing his candidacy for the office in this year's elections, he asks consideration on the basis of his experience.

"I will appreciate the earnest consideration of every voter in Precinct 4," he said.

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### Inspection To Be Made To Clear up Scabies In Texas

The Texas Animal Health Commission assisted by the Animal Health Division of the United States Department of Agriculture has launched an extensive inspection of all sheep flocks in Texas.

Dr. W. A. Belcher, Area Veterinarian of Brackettville will supervise inspection of sheep flocks in this area. Dr. Belcher has advised county agent Pete Jacoby that inspection of sheep flocks in Crockett County will start around January 15.

As a result of two outbreaks of sheep scabies within the last year other states have imposed dipping requirements that hamper the marketing of Texas sheep. Relinquishing of these requirements will be considered upon an inspection of all flocks without evidence of scabies being found. Industry cooperation is needed so that the necessary inspections may be conducted in an organized manner with a minimum of inconvenience to the sheep producer.

The County Chairman of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation and the Agricultural Extensive Service through the local County Agent are assisting in the cooperative effort.

### Big Lake Clash Will Test Lions District Chances

After capturing the third place trophy in the Big Lake Tournament last week-end with a 49-48 win over Denver City, the Lions will host the Big Lake Owls tomorrow night in a vital West Zone clash.

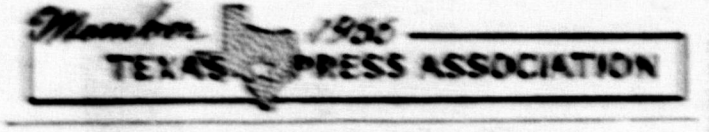

#### Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen

Here are the days the cook stays in the kitchen all day to make delicious yeast breads and desserts. With the new hot roll mixes even the most elegant desserts and yeast breads can be made in record time and by the most inexperienced cooks. The following two recipes fall into this category and make unusual and delightful desserts.

#### KOLACKY (Slovak Origin)

- 1 pkg hot roll mix
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 egg
- 2 tbs sugar
- 1 cup cooked apricots
- 3 tbs sugar
- 2 tbs cornstarch
- 1/2 cup water
- 2 tbs butter
- 1 cup sifted confectioner's sugar
- 4 t-8 teaspoon milk

Sprinkle yeast from hot roll mix over water in large bowl; stir to dissolve. Add eggs, raisins, almonds, lemon rind, and dry mix. Mix well. Let rise in warm place until light and doubled in size, 30 to 45 minutes. Shape 2/3 of dough into a ball and place in well-greased 1 pound coffee or shortening can. Shape remaining dough into a ball and place in well-greased No. 303 can. Let rise in warm place until light and doubled in size, 30 to 45 minutes. Bake in moderate oven (350) 30 to 35 minutes for small loaf and 35 to 40 minutes for large loaf, or until deep golden brown. Combine confectioner's sugar and milk and brush over warm coffee can and almond. Make and 1 small Kolack.

Roll out the dough on floured surface to 1/2 inch square (about 1/2 inch thick). Cut into rounds with 2 1/2 inch cutter. Place on well greased baking sheet. Let rise in warm place until light and doubled in size, 30 to 45 minutes. Press an indentation into the center of each round. Place a rounded teaspoonful of filling in each indentation.

sprinkle with chopped nuts. Bake in moderate oven (375) 12 to 15 minutes until golden brown. Combine confectioner's sugar and milk and glaze warm rolls.

#### KULICH (Russian Origin)

- 1 pkg hot roll mix
- 1/2 cup warm (not hot) water
- 1 unbeaten egg
- 1/2 cup raisins
- 1/2 cup chopped blanched almonds
- 1 tbs grated lemon rind
- 1/2 cup sifted confectioner's sugar
- 1 to 2 tbs milk

Sprinkle yeast from hot roll mix over water in large bowl; stir to dissolve. Add eggs, raisins, almonds, lemon rind, and dry mix. Mix well. Let rise in warm place until light and doubled in size, 30 to 45 minutes. Shape 2/3 of dough into a ball and place in well-greased 1 pound coffee or shortening can. Shape remaining dough into a ball and place in well-greased No. 303 can. Let rise in warm place until light and doubled in size, 30 to 45 minutes. 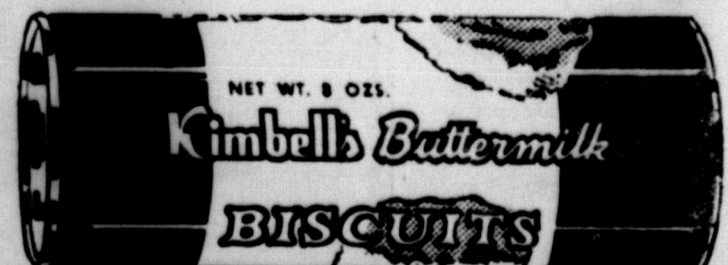

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

**TO VOTE IN 1966 YOU MUST PAY YOUR POLL TAX BY JAN. 31**

Your are reminded that a poll tax receipt is still needed to vote in the coming elections in 1966.

A person may vote for federal offices only without paying a poll tax but he must have a poll tax receipt stamped "Poll Tax Not Paid." To vote in all other elections, a person must have a poll tax, or, in case of those just reaching 21 years, an exemption. Those 60 years of age or over do not have to apply for an exemption.

Other tests of voting eligibility are that you must have been a resident of the state one year and of the county six months.

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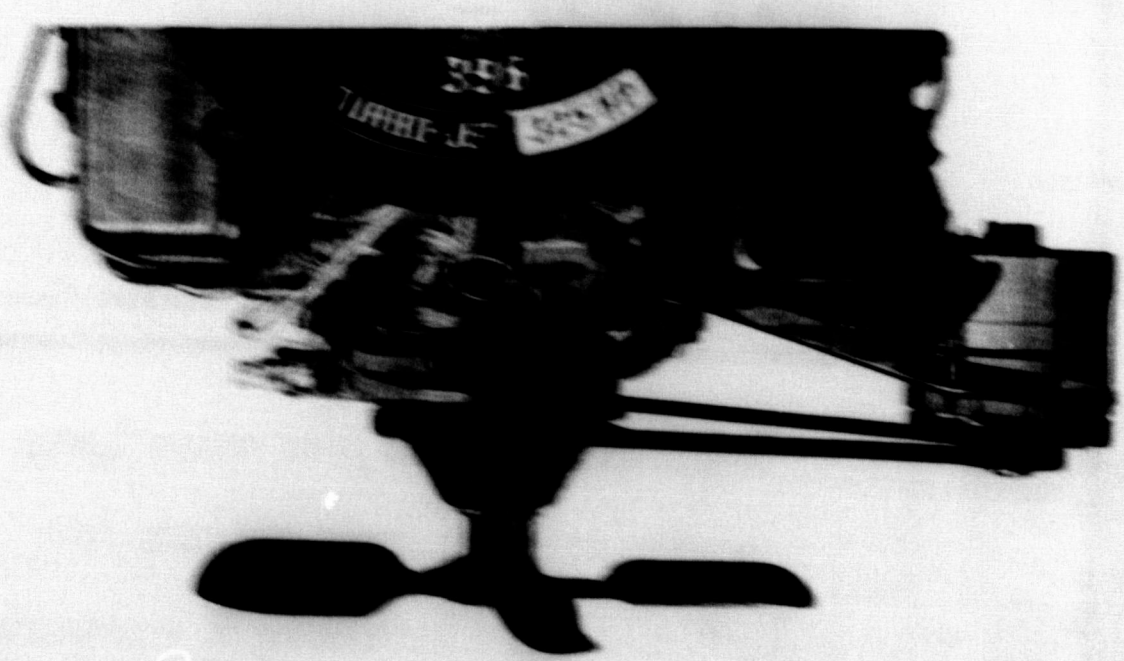
