A total of 18 Crockett county citizens had registered for a free vote in the 1966 elections to yesterday, fourth day of the 15-day registration period specified in a federal court order which abolished the poll tax as a voting requirement in Texas.

Since this county was one of those Texas counties picked by the U. S. Department of Justice for so-called "spot checks" on the registration, two FBI agents were on hand to monitor the registration in the office of Sheriff Tax Assessor-Collector Billy Mills.

The Agents, Dick Burnett of San Angelo and Manning Clements of Dallas, were here the night burglars entered the Ozona National Bank and assisted in investigation of the burglary along with local and state officers.

"The court allowed a 15-day registration period, but from our observations here and in Mills County, we could give back about 14 of those days," commented one of the agents after checking the meager local registration.

Of the 18 who had registered to yesterday, 11 were Anglo-Americans, 5 Latin Americans and 2 colored.

In a letter to the tax assessor-collector in Crockett county, one of the counties designated for the FBI registration watch, Attorney General Waggoner Carr asked that he be notified "if Mr. Katzenback's FBI agents interfere in the performance of your lawful duties or if their actions in any way intimidate you so that you are deterred or delayed in any way in rendering full and adequate facilities and service to your registrants."

"The FBI agents were very nice and carried out their assignments with the least possible interference in our office," said Mrs. Gertrude Perry, office deputy. "They were very polite and considerate and helpful as they have always been to this office."

Sheriff Mills also complimented the FBI men.

"Of course, the FBI is welcome in our office anytime," the Sheriff said. "We depend on them a lot in our work and we were doubly glad they were here to assist in investigating the bank burglary."

## Lion Speedsters Chalk Up Win Of 14th Track Meet

Coach Chick Womack's Lions captured their 14th Annual Invitational Track Meet last Saturday at Lion Stadium as they outdistanced the runnerup Eldorado Eagles 131-113.

The Eagles had been picked as favorites, but Ozona scored in 13 of the 15 events and gave indication of developing into a strong contender for their third straight district title.

Womack's crew hopes to add another championship trophy this week-end. They are entered in the Sonora Relays Saturday.

Leading the Lion squad in the win was Billy Carson, last year's pole vault champ. Billy won the trophy for high point individual as he won the pole vault, took a third in the high hurdles, and ran on two relays for a total of 25 points.

Only one record fell Saturday and that belonged to Big Lake's Don Childs. Childs set a new record in the shot with a toss of 51'5".

In addition to Carson's first in the pole vault, Geo. Parker won the low hurdles in 21 flat; Randy Upham took the broad jump with 19'3"; Maggie Galindo, the Lions' sophomore distance man, came on fast in the final lap for a win in the mile in 5:00.7; and the Lion sprint relay team of T. DeHoyos, B. Ramos, Carson, and G. Cox won in 46.6.

Gary Sutton, the Lions' strong sophomore weight man, finished second in the discuss behind Childs, who won with a 147 ft. toss. Gary added a 4th in the shot. Upham finished a close second to teammate Parker in the low hurdles, and Catarino Cervantez was second to Upham in the broad jump.

## Funeral Services Friday Afternoon For Rob Miller

Rob Miller, 77, pioneer Ozona ranchman, died shortly before midnight Wednesday in the Crockett County Hospital after an illness of about 6 weeks duration.

Funeral services will be held tomorrow at 3 p. m. from the Ozona Church of Christ with Darrell Browley, pastor, and Bill Brown of Lubbock officiating. Burial will be in Cedar Hill Cemetery under the direction of James Funeral Home.

Mr. Miller was born February 27, 1889, in McCulloch County the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jones Miller. He moved with his family to Crockett County at the age of 6 years. On April 23, 1911, he was married to Zilla Bennett here in Ozona.

Active in the ranching business all his life, Mr. Miller had extensive ranch holdings south of town. His twin brother, Roy, preceded him in death in 1960. Mr. Miller served as County Commissioner of Precinct 1 for 14 years and was a member of the school board for many years. A 32nd degree Mason and a Shriner, he was a member of the Ozona Church of Christ and an elder in the church. He was on the board at Abilene Christian College for several years.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, J. B. and Eugene Miller, both of Ozona; one daughter, Mrs. Nema Wiet of Merced, California; 8 grandchildren and 3 great-grandchildren.

## Captain Lewis Given Combat Infantry Badge

MOC HOA Vietnam - Captain Larry M. Lewis, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ted M. Lewis of Ozona, Texas was recently awarded the Combat Infantryman Badge for his participation in combat operations in Vietnam.

Captain Lewis, a member of the US Army's elite Special Forces, the highly trained guerrilla experts who wear the green beret, is stationed in the Mekong Delta with Detachment B-41, 5th Special Forces Group (Airborne) approximately 55 miles West of Saigon near the Cambodian border.

The Combat Infantryman Badge, one of the most cherished awards of ground fighters in World War II and the Korean Conflict, is awarded to members of the US Army who have participated in combat operations and have been under direct hostile fire. Captain Lewis was awarded the CIB as a result of his participating in several combat operations against the Viet Cong while acting as an Advisor to Vietnamese Infantry units engaged in combat with the Communist troops.

Major William J. Yantis, Commanding Officer of Special Forces Det B-41, presented the award to Captain Lewis and two other Special Forces personnel in special ceremonies in Moc Hoa, Vietnam.

## Robbers Fail In Attempt To Cut Way Into Ozona National's Vault

### Man Arrested Here On Theft Warrants

Sheriff's officers arrested Thomas Richard Stephenson early Sunday morning as he drove into Ozona from Big Lake. He was picked up on warrants from Guadalupe and Comal counties charging him with theft.

Stephenson had been under surveillance by local officers for several weeks. A search of his living quarters here turned up a gun that had been stolen in Llano, in November of last year. He is believed linked with a big theft ring operating in central Texas.

Another of his alleged confederates was picked up last week in Midland.

Sheriff Mills felt Stephenson picked Ozona to lie low until the "heat was off" in his regular haunts.

## W. V. Adwell, 71 Former Theatre Owner Here Dies

W. V. Adwell, 71, veteran theatre owner, former Ozonan, died early Tuesday morning at his home in Arlington where he had lived since moving from Ozona about fourteen years ago.

Mr. Adwell owned and operated the moving picture theater in Ozona from about 1935 when he bought the business from the late J. R. Kersey. He built the present ranch theatre building in 1948 and with his son, Bernie Adwell, operated the business until retired from active business and moved to Arlington. The theatre is presently owned and operated by Bernie Adwell.

Funeral services were to have been held at 2 p. m. Wednesday in Arlington with burial to follow in Grandview, Texas, a former home.

Mr. Adwell was born in Kentucky Sept. 25, 1894, and came with his family to Texas in 1902. He had been in the theatre business most of his life, operating shows in Itasca, Grandview, San Angelo, Fort Worth and Ozona. In Arlington he was a director of the Arlington State Bank, the bank that former Ozonan, the late Scott Peters, helped found in that city. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge.

Surviving are the widow of Arlington; one son, Bernie Adwell of Ozona; one sister, Mrs. George Seelye of Ozona; one brother, Johnny Adwell of Fort Worth; five grandchildren and two great grandchildren. Mrs. Seelye makes her home here with her daughter, Mrs. Robert Cox and family.

After hiding in a closet while the Masonic lodge was in session an hour or more Monday night, then sawing through the lodge floor to the bank below, would-be bank robbers spent the rest of the night pounding with hammer and chisel on unyielding masonry walls in a futile attempt to gain entry to the vault in the Ozona National Bank, then turned out on the floor the contents of a couple of desks in the bank offices and finally left with aching backs and empty hands.

At the end of the second game, the teams were tied 10-10 and went into a 16 minute overtime with the Lionettes emerging winners 17-15. In the third and decisive game, the host team was defeated 10-8 in another overtime game, and won the second place trophy.

The would-be robbers gained entrance to the bank by climbing onto the roof of B & B Grocery, crawling through a window of the Masonic lodge hall and sawing a hole in the floor directly above the bank vault. From there it was a short drop to the top of the vault and on to the floor of the bank. Efforts to gain entry into the main vault where the money was kept were futile and the thieves left the same way they came in and not a penny richer. After the debris was cleared away it was determined that nothing was missing.

J. W. Howell, bank cashier, discovered the burglary when he went down about 7:30 Tuesday morning. Within minutes officers from the sheriff's department, Texas Ranger, Alfred Alee and two FBI men were covering the bank and adjoining roof for clues to the identity of the criminals.

Identification experts from the Department of Public Safety in Austin arrived Tuesday afternoon and found by footprints that at least two men were involved. Sheriff Billy Mills is awaiting further reports and laboratory findings from this department at the present time. The ID men found similarities between this break in and the recent robberies of the Santa Anna and Paint Rock banks, leading officers to believe that the same men took part in all three jobs, according to Sheriff Mills.

Further investigation by officers Tuesday night brought to light the fact that one of the burglars was hidden in a closet of the Masonic hall while members held their lodge meeting. The Mason, guarding the door to the main meeting room, heard an unexplained noise during the meeting and checked windows and doors but did not open the door to the closet where the man had apparently made a noise climbing to the top of the enclosure, footprints revealed. Officers theorized that members of the lodge had surprised the man shortly after he entered the building, forcing him to take cover while his partner or partners were forced to wait for the meeting to end on the roof of the adjoining building.

At press time today officers had uncovered no further clues as to the identity of the men.

**MISS ALMA'S SOURDOUGH BISCUITS**

5 cups unsifted flour  
3 teaspoon baking powder  
2 teaspoons salt  
1 teaspoon soda  
1/4 cup sugar  
1/2 cup shortening (scant)  
1 pkg. dry yeast (dissolved in 1/2 cup warm water)  
2 cups buttermilk  
Sift all dry ingredients together then cut in shortening. Mix in remainder of ingredients in order. It is not necessary to let the dough rise, just roll out like biscuits. Cook in preheated oven 450 degrees 12 to 15 minutes. This dough keeps well in refrigerator.

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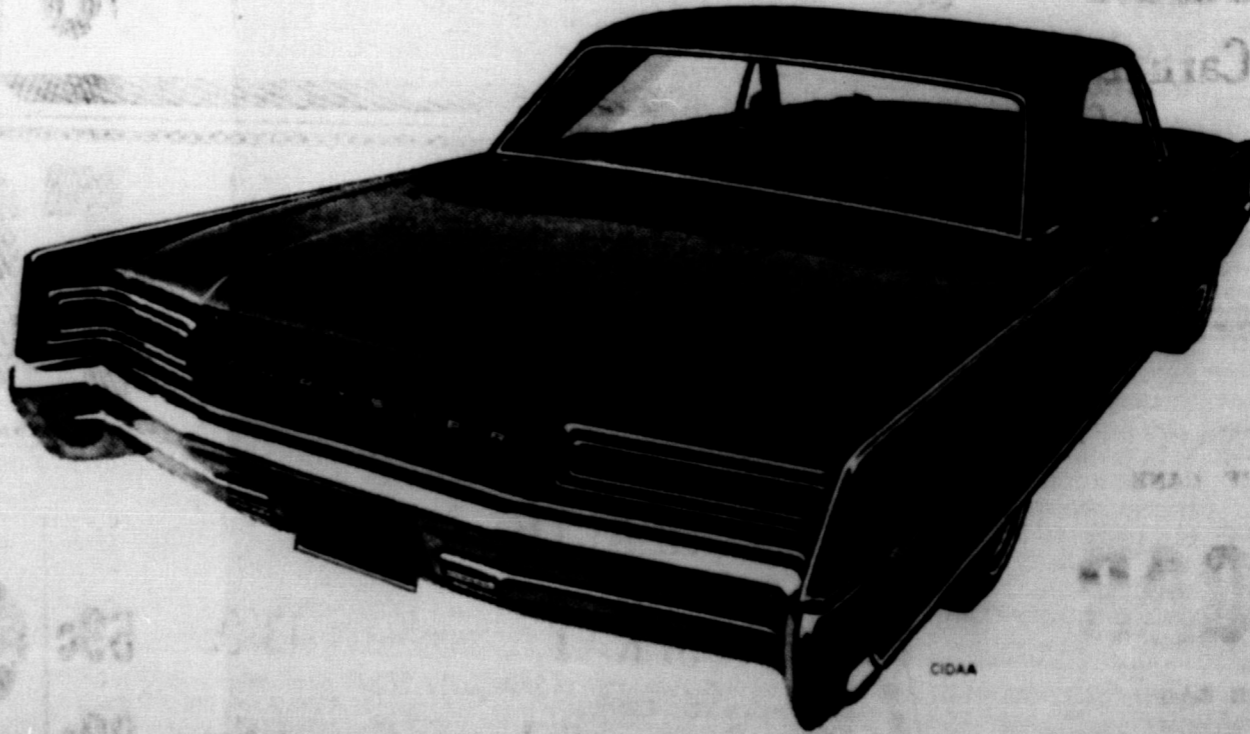

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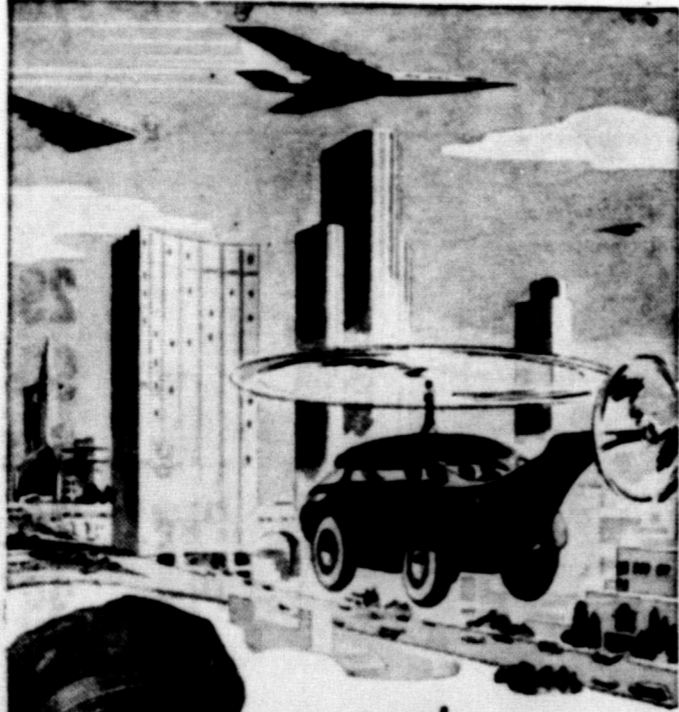

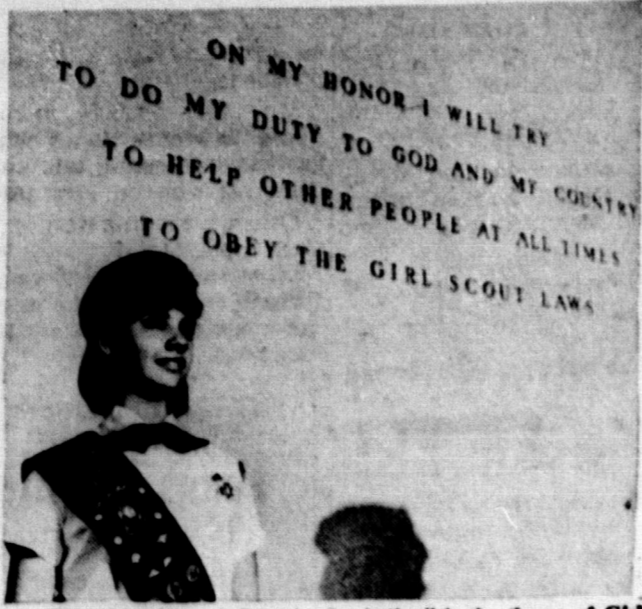

A good gun can last a lifetime. Such a guarantee — covering defective material & workmanship — now goes to every purchaser of Browning's O/U shotguns. But there is little reason why most any good gun can't last well beyond the life of its owner. All it takes is a little care.

Too many of us get careless with guns. We fail to clean and oil them properly. We toss them around in the back seat of an automobile, or store them away for several months of the year in some damp spot where rust can develop.

In the olden days much better care was taken of fowling pieces. In the first place, a gun was essential to a man. He needed it for taking food and sometimes for protection. He used black powder, with mercuric primers that would cause corrosion.

Back in those days when the hunter came home he swabbed out the tubes of his shotgun with soap suds, or wiped his rifle barrel clean with a good commercial cleaner capable of eliminating the mercury flakes from the primer.

Then along came the non-mercuric primers. Black powder gave way to smokeless and we were told it was no longer necessary to clean a gun after every shoot.

Some believed this. As a result their guns became pitted. Not from the effects of the primer and powder, but from handling and moisture that got into the barrels.

If you are shooting a gun every day, it still is a good idea to clean it often. It should be wiped thoroughly with a silicone cloth after every handling.

I know a fellow who has a cabinet containing a dozen or more fine guns. They are behind a locked glass door, away from easy handling. But occasionally some friend does get to look them over. Before they are put back into their rack they are wiped over with the silicone cloth. This prevents any

possibility of barrel rust from damp fingers, or hand-prints.

This chap has one gun in his case that is 60 years old. It has been used a lot under almost every condition. First shells shot in it were black powder with mercury primers. But today that gun is just as shiny as it can be. It has no rust spots, even though the blue is worn thin in places. And the wood still retains its polish.

There are many agents on the market today for cleaning guns. Some are solvents, some are inhibitors which can be applied under pressure. Then there are the old reliable oils, any of which will do a good job.

Many gun owners find that a 15c can of household lubricant available in any service station is adequate. It certainly is better than nothing at all.

If you treat your gun properly you won't care whether it is guaranteed for your lifetime or not. It still will be shooting good when it passes into the hands of your grandson.
