April showers were a little late this year but Crockett County residents were jubilant over the slow falling rain that left an inch and upwards of moisture on Ozona and surrounding ranch lands over the three-day period of the weekend.

Ranchers, who were in the midst of shearing, were not one bit unhappy over the delay caused by the rain. Most of them had tightened their belts in anticipation of a long dry spell as April wore on and only .15 of an inch of rain had been recorded.

One inch of rain was recorded here in town with most of the ranch land reporting over an inch. It started with a slow drizzle Friday, turning to a slow steady rain Friday night and continuing through Saturday and Sunday with no runoff, bringing the total rainfall for April to 1.15 inches and the total for the year to 3.6.

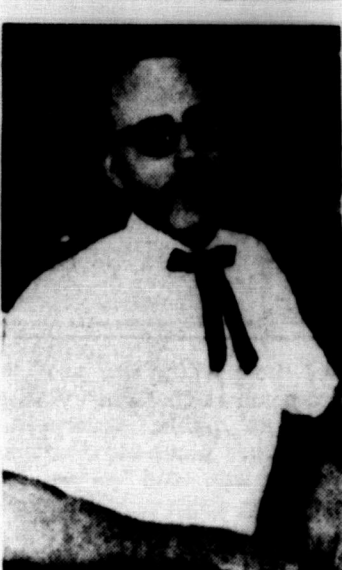

**BIG MONEY IN POVERTY!**

If you happen to have a son who is smart enough to rate an appointment to West Point, the Naval Academy or the Air Force Academy, put your foot down. That is, if you want him to have a good thing and become a member of the affluent society. Steer him instead into the poverty racket. It's the hottest thing since Prohibition and Ponzi.

Rep. William Ayres, of Ohio, made this clear recently when he cited some of the lush salaries being paid to the top brass of the Poverty Corps. The Generalissimo, Sargent Shriver, draws down \$30,000 a year for his efforts in planning strategy and directing the troops, and serving pretty much as his Joint Chiefs of Staff are 23 other world-renowned authorities on poverty-fighting who are paid more than \$25,000 a year apiece.

By way of contrast, the U.S. commander in Vietnam, General Westmoreland, has a base pay of \$23,268. However, it must be understood that the jobs are different. On orders from the White House, General Westmoreland is fighting only a limited

war. Accordingly, you might say that he has only a part-time job. On the other hand, the White House has given Generalissimo Shriver the green light. To fight this kind of war, men are needed — the right kind of men, and lots of them.

Holding the poor man's citadel in Washington with the Generalissimo and his Joint Chiefs are 2,350 full-time employees. Of this number more than a thousand draw down more than \$10,000 a year. This elite corps has many reserve units available to it, and all over the country thousands of well-connected poverty-baiters are rallying to Shriver's colors — described as "long green."

That the Office of Economic Opportunity, which runs the Poverty Pentagon, is getting only the best, or at least the most expensive, manpower is obvious from other statistics released by Congressman Ayres. The OEO boasts 310 payrollers who make more than \$17,055 a year. The FBI has only 192 in this wage category, and the Office of Education 172.

**CALLING THE PLAYS**

A person who seriously studies sports develops in time an uncanny ability to call the plays.

It is too bad that more Americans don't study international affairs the way serious sports fans apply themselves to baseball, football, and so on. If they did they would be able to see certain plays shaping up on the global scene, understand the strategy behind the moves, and predict with some certainty who is likely to do what.

Right now, for example, we are witnessing something which is mystifying to most Americans when there should be nothing at all unusual about it in view of the forces and the personalities involved.

We refer to the current drive to help China — Red China, that is — in various ways. We are being urged to invite this outlaw nation to the United Nations, as

though this would change Communist China's character and its aims. We are told we should trade with these Communists, even though such trade would strengthen Red China's war potential. We are told that we have to write off Nationalist China — in other words to knife one of the few loyal anti-Communist allies left to us.

There isn't an American who hasn't already been subjected to this current brainwashing which is being mouthed by people who are presumably responsible. And what we're getting now is only the beginning. We predict that in the months to come there will be a deluge of propaganda of the vicious nature, all based on the asinine premise that if we're especially nice to Red China, she may just possibly be nice to us. This is the same fuzzy thinking that would recommend putting murderers and rapists in nice homes instead of jails, where pleasant home surroundings and complaisant people might just possibly convert them.

Moreover, if you look at the record of those who are promoting Red China's interests, it isn't so mysterious after all. You'll usually find that it's nothing new for them to advocate causes that, somehow, end up by
