Mrs. Henderson died at 6:30 a. m. Wednesday in Sannon Hospital in San Angelo, where she had been a patient a week.

Mrs. Henderson was born February 10, 1892, in McKinney, Texas. She came to Ozona in 1915 as a governess. She was married to John W. Henderson, Jr. May 16, 1916. He preceded her in death November 24, 1965, after an illness of about 30 years duration.

Mrs. Henderson became a successful ranch woman after her husband became ill, and personally attended to her ranching interests during his illness and after his death. She was a lifetime member of the Methodist Church, an active member of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, and a regular attendant at Sunday School. A long-time member of the Ozona Woman's Club, she took an active interest in Ozona's civic affairs.

Survivors include a daughter, Mrs. Joe Sellers Pierce, III; a son, John W. Henderson, III; three sisters, Miss Rachel Shrader, Mrs. Charlotte Fisher and Mrs. Dorothy Hensley, all of Dallas; four grandchildren and one great grandson.

AT \$1,000 PER MONTH — Former Medic At AF Station Hired As Administrator

Lee Rheubottom, former medic at the Ozona Air Force Station, was employed as administrator of the Crockett County Hospital at a salary of \$1,000 per month in action by the Crockett County Commissioners Court meeting Monday. Motion to hire Rheubottom was made by Commissioner C. O. Walker, seconded by Rusty Smith. The Hospital Board had recommended to the court that it employ Rheubottom.

Arthur C Hoover Crockett Pioneer Dies At Age 87

Funeral services were held at 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon in the First Baptist Church for Arthur Clinton Hoover, 87, member of the first family of settlers to set up in the ranch business in Crockett county.

Services were conducted by the Rev. Max Brown, pastor of the church which Mr. Hoover had served as a lay leader throughout most of his lifetime, both here and in the church's activities throughout the state. Burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery under the direction of James Funeral Home.

Mr. Hoover was born Nov. 26, 1877, in Junction, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Hoover, who came to Crockett county in 1881, to become the first settlers on the Pecos river area. Mrs. Hoover, the former Laura McNutt, was the first white woman in the county.

The Hoovers controlled vast acreage in the area on which they establish one of the largest cattle operations of the time. Mr. and Mrs. Hoover reared nine children, four girls and five boys. Arthur Hoover was the oldest. He was three years old when the family moved to this county, his sister, Hattie, Mrs. Hattie Holmsley was a year old. All the other children, Mrs. Elmer Hatton, Mrs. Mable Kinser, Mrs. Myrtle Mitchell, Brock, Rowdy, Bill and Armond Hoover, were born after the couple came to Crockett county.

Married to Dora Dunlap June 10, 1902, in Ozona, Arthur Hoover accumulated vast ranch holdings in West Texas which he actively managed until a few years ago when failing health forced his retirement. Mrs. Hoover died April 23, 1965, after a long illness.

Mr. Hoover had served as Crockett county Commissioner from 1905 to 1914. He was a member of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers Association 47 years and served 18 years on the executive board of that organization.

But Mr. Hoover was perhaps best known for his untiring work in and liberal support of the Baptist Church. When he was made a deacon of the church he said that he considered the (Continued on Last Page)

Lions Open Season In Rain With 20-0 Victory Over 2-A McCamey

Rains Brighten Winter Prospects In Ranch Country

A slow falling three-day rain literally soaked Ozona and the surrounding countryside for a radius of miles the latter part of last week. The official gauge at the Fire Department listed 1.73 inches Friday and 2.0 of an inch Saturday morning for a three-day total of 2.15 inches of moisture.

Coming on the heels of the 1.90 inches of rain that fell the previous week-end brought the total thus far in September to 4.05 inches.

Ranchlands around Ozona are in better shape for the fall than in many years. Some usually dry ranchlands on the Pecos near Pandale reported as much as 7 inches of rain with rances around Sheffield reporting 5 to 6 inches. There was practically no run-off, as the rains fell intermittently night and day during the three-day period.

Acidizing Truck Pressure Blowout Injuries 2 Men

Two men were injured, one critically, in an oil-field explosion southeast of here late Sunday afternoon. The two, both from Rankin, were in the process of acidizing a well when the mishap occurred.

Johnny Brewer, 38, was rushed to Shannon Hospital in San Angelo in a James ambulance. He was trapped at the scene of the accident for about an hour. Surgery was performed immediately for removal of a ruptured spleen and multiple internal injuries. His condition was listed as critical in Shannon hospital.

Also injured was Harold Porter, 38, who was admitted to Crockett County Hospital but transferred to San Angelo Monday afternoon in order to be placed under the care of an optometrist. Both men were sprayed in the face with the acid when the explosion occurred. However, according to latest reports, both will retain their eyesight.

Kick-off is set for 8 p. m.

Against the McCamey Badgers, the Ozona line controlled the ball game, allowing only one drive to go as far as the Ozona 45. The Ozona 176 pound line should get a severe test against the Owl fast backs.

The Lion secondary, which swiped 3 against the Badgers, may face a stronger challenge this week as Owl quarterback Wade Daugherty, who did not play against Iraan last week, will return to the lineup.

The Owls bumped the Iraan Braves 25-6 last week. Other 8A powerhouses enjoyed a good week as Sonora beat a strong Ballinger team 12-6, Rankin knocked off AA Marfa 33-6, and Eldorado beat Eden 25-0.

Again this week the Lions will be severely handicapped by injuries with Don Leech, Thomas DeHoyos, and Rex Bland — all regulars — expected to sit out the ball game.

Starting for the Lions will be (offense) Oscar Flores and Larry Kilgore, ends; Gary Sutton and Wesley West, tackles; Dwight Childress and John DeHoyos, guards; and Marlin Farris, center; George Cox and Beto Ramos, halfbacks; Fleet Coates, fullback; and Randal Clepper, quarterback.

Defensively the Lions will have Farris, J. DeHoyos, Sutton, and West up front; Flores and Derold Maney at the corners; Kilgore and Ramos, linebackers; Jack Applewhite and Clepper, halfbacks, and Cox, safety.

As the third quarter drew to a close, Cox returned a Badger punt 45 yards to the McCamey 42. Cox then added 5 yards up the middle, and Clepper spotted Cox all alone at the Badger 20, and Cox easily raced into the end zone for third touchdown. Freak Accident At Park Entrance Damages Vehicle

A head-on rear-end collision is the only way to describe the car-pick-up accident that occurred last Thursday afternoon 2.7 miles east of here on rain-slick Hwy. 290.

A 1950 Chevrolet pick-up driven by Hamilton Dowling and headed west had passed the roadside park where he apparently meant to stop and was backing down the highway to reach the park entrance. At this moment a 1966 Lincoln driven by George Roberts of Houston topped the hill above the park entrance and was unable to swerve enough to miss the pickup traveling in his lane in reverse.

Mr. Roberts and his companion, Miss Leann Bevet of Hillsboro, California, were taken to Crockett County Hospital in a James ambulance where they received emergency treatment and were released.

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

From The Stockman Thurs. Sept. 16, 1937

However, some of them got anxious and started to bet too soon. Word leaked out and by the time of the race, the odds had dropped to 13 to 5. Sidereal won and paid off \$770,000 to Rothstein, but to his dying day, Rothstein would fly into a rage at the mention of the race and curse the agents who had disobeyed his orders.
